Notice To Farmers STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT REGULATION

REQUIRES US TO MAKE SOME CHANGES IN

THE OPERATION OF OUR LOCKER PLANT. The New Regulation under which we are now required to operate, and the provisions of which must be complied with by us, requires that all meat stored in the lockers must be inspected if it is beef, pork, sheep or goat. The meat inspector will be at the plant

each day between 11 and 12 and meat, to be stored, must be brought to the plant and

HERE'S WHAT YOU MUST DO

When meat is brought for inspection and storage, the following items must be presented for inspection:

ON BEEF-Head complete, heart, lungs, liver and carcass, which may be cut into quarters.

be inspected at that time. A small inspection fee will be charged.

ON HOGS—Carcass, can be cut into halves, head and all of insides.

ON SHEEP AND GOATS—Carcass, can be cut into halves, heart, lungs and liver .

The hours (11-12) must be complied with in presenting meat for storage. The above instructions on what to bring must be complied with before inspection can be completed.

NOT OUR RULING!

We ask our farmer friends to please remember that this is not our ruling, but a regulation of the State Health Department with which we must comply in order to operate. (Reference is made to City Ordinance No. 1184 which is reprinted at the right.)

PLEASE REMEMBER, also, that this does not mean you cannot continue to butcher your animals, either at home or at the slaughter pen, but the meat must be presented clean for inspection and the items named above taken from the animals presented for inspection, must be brought along for examination by the inspector.

Ordinance No. 1184

SECTION 12. UNLAWFUL TO SELL WITHOUT PERMITS, etc. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, or association to have, keep, sell, or expose for sale or have in possession with intent to sell for human food within the limits of the City of Brownfield the meat or food products manufactured in whole or in part from the meat of any cattle, calves, sheep, swine or goats unless same shall have been slaughtered under the supervision of the Health Department of the City of Brownfield, in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance provided, however, that this Ordinance shall not apply to the meat or food products manufactured from the meat of cattle, calves, sheep, swine, or goats slaughtered or inspected under the supervision of the United States Government in accordance with the regulations relating to the inspection of meats as prescribed by the Department of Agriculture of the United States, and bearing the stamp of such inspection or to any such meats slaughtered or inspected under the supervision of an official meat or food inspector of another City in this State in which the inspection of meat has been approved by the Health Department of this City and bearing the stamp showing that such meat has been inspected and passed by the meat and food inspector of such other City.


