

# ARE ANY OF YOUR CHARGE ACCOUNTS IN DEFAULT? BETTER CHECK UP NOW

THIS PROVISION WILL EXPLAIN IF YOU ARE IN DEFAULT

Sec. 5, Paragraph (c) Federal Regulation "W":

"A charge account shall be deemed in default if any article (whether listed or unlisted) for which credit has been extended in such account has not been paid for in full on or before the 10th day of the second calendar month following the calendar month during which such article was sold."

For instance, purchases made during June are due on July 1 and if not paid by August 10 are in default.

## THIS IS A CURE FOR DEFAULT CHARGE ACCOUNTS

Paragraph (d), Section 5, Federal Regulation "W":
"When a charge account is in default, the default may
be cured either:

- (1) By payment of the amount in default.
- (2) By purchaser entering into a written agreement in good faith to pay the amount in default within a period of six months or less from the date of such agreement by substantially equal amounts of not less than \$5 per month or \$1.25 per week, at substantially equal Intervals not exceeding one month."

Provisions are made for those with seasonal incomes.

The merchants of Brownfield are required by law to abide by this Federal Government Regulation. Do not expect these merchants to make charges to your account when you are in default. The Retail Merchants are cooperating with the merchants in enforcing this Regulation "W". Regulation "W" affects every man, woman and child in the United States.
