

## Sons Of The **Alamo Always Good Fighters**

AUSTIN-The ill-fated Alamo was no "military mistake," but an "act of mighty human effort and one of undying glory" that has fired Texas men of arms since 1836 and will continue to spur them on to fearless achievements on the battlefields of World War

Thus predicts Charlie Jeffries of Winkler, writing in the June issue of the Southwestern Historical Quarterly, published at the University of Texas.

Jeffries points out that the battle of the Alamo delayed Santa Anna's invasion for three weeks, thus giving the Texian forces time to rally; that it gave the Mexican commander an incautious overconfidence; that it cost him 1,000 whose strength might have made a different story at San Jacinto.

But 'its greatest effect has been on Texas men under arms," Jefferies believes, citing the decisive Battle of San Jacinto, fought with the battle cry "Remember the Alamo" on the lips of the Texian soldiers; Terry's Texas Rangers and Hood's Brigade in the War Between the States; Roosevelt's Rough Riders, trained under the shadow of the Alamo for the war with Spain; the famous 36th and 90th divisions in World War I who "were always ready to go forward when the order was given; they never lost one inch of ground they had taken."





In regard to the collection and delivery of mail by city carriers, there are rules and regulations which must be followed. Please do not expect your carrier to break these rules.

Carriers, while on their routes, shall receive letters with postage stamps affixed. They shall not accept money to pay postage on letters tendered to them for mailing.

When making delivery at any residence, carriers shall collect such letters placed on the mail box, but they shall not delay their deliveries by waiting such letters. When the carrier does not have mail to deliver at a residence, he will not collect mail at that residence. In that case, patrons may drop letters in the nearest collection box or mail them at the post office.







A substantial reduction in the tremendous fire loss of this country would result from a thorough hunt for fire hazards from attic to basement of every home, and the removal of such hazards, the Commissioner stated.

"Texas home owners," Hall continued, "have recently earned an annual saving on fire insurance in excess of two and a half million dollars because they have successfully prevented fires. - (3) Made speeches asking the people to vote for it during the summer of 1935.
- (4) After people had voted the amendment, he called special session of the legislature to put the amendment into effect.
- (5) Signed first old age pension bill in Texas history November 19, 1935.
- (6) Called three special sessions of the Legislature in efforts to raise sufficient funds.
- (7) Was always opposed by the same special interests who are now supporting O'Daniel in this race.
- (8) Additional funds finally provided, effective November 1, 1936.
- (9) 114,500 on pension rolls as his term ended.

## O'DANIEL

- (1) Made no speeches for adoption of the amendmen in 1934.
- (2) Did not vote for it (had no poll tax).
- (3) Never appeared before any of the special sessions of the Legislature asking them to raise funds for pensions.
- (4) Ran for Governor in 1938 glibly promising \$30 per month
- (5) Got in fight with the Legislature in 1939 over transaction tax and SJR 12, a pet Sales Tax measure and hence did not raise any money.
- (6) Told the Legislature to submit a better plan; they did; he went on the radio against it.
- (7) Lowered pension payments \$6.00 per peson per month in 1939 to every person in Texas on the rolls so that the big banks could be paid off.
- (8) Refused to call a special session to raise money to make it up.
- (9) Was re-elected, still promising \$30.(10) In 1941, opposed the omnibus tax bill to raise taxes. He said "the law stinks" (The Legislature passed it anyhow).
- (11) He signed the bill, but said that he had to hold his nose while he did it.

**NOTE:** All the pension money ever paid to the old folks in Texas was raised by laws passed during Governor Allred's administration; or by laws passed by the Legislature during O'Daniel's administration, but in spite of his **opposition** to them.

#### A SYMBOL OF COURAGE

The New York Times in a recent issue, cited the value of Texas' Alamo as a symbol of courage providing inspiration for many young American soldiers who daily are visiting the "shrine of Texas liberty" in San Antonio. "Men died there because they mind. our hat is off anyway. It came off instinctively when you HOMER GARRISON walked into the door, as it does NAMED ON NATIONAL when you go up the steps of the SAFETY COMMITTEE Lincoln Memorial in Washington.

"This is a place wrere Americans proved that they were strong. t is not far from where thousorce are showing that they are made of the same stuff as Bowie, Crockett and Travis. Not long from now they will be writing their epitaphs on the sky: 'Take it; this time we win'."
