## Compress Handles Lots of Cotton

Mr. E. O. McIver, superintendent of the Texas Compress and Warehouse Co., stated to the Herald recently, that the local press had handled around 20,000 bales from the area this season. We believe that we have heard that they have warehousing for some 45,000 compressed bales, and evidently all the warehouses are full.

This conclusion is reached by the fact that literally thousands of bales of unpressed cotton has been located on some 25 or 30 acres of land just north of the warehouse and south of the Levelland highway. Perhaps there is cotton of the 1941 and 1942 vintage in the warehouses.

Mr. McIver stated that he was trying to take care of all the gins of the area in the same way, without favoritism. If cotton to press was taken as it comes, naturally the five home gins would get the lion's share of pressing. But, he is giving the country gins or nearby towns where there is no press an equal chance with the gins here.

The Brownfield compress has one of the very latest model high density presses, and when it gets through mashing a bale of cotton, it is ready to be shipped to the four corners of the world without further ado.

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"Boondoggling on a Global Basis" was a release sent us this week taken from August Readers Digest. In this it was announced a lot of the younger "diplomats" had made a lot of rash promises, that may backfire on us when the peace is written. It was even intimated that money had been used in some countries to stir up trouble, and turn one political faith against another. This will require the services, perhaps of half a dozen Hulls to straighten out. And, another thing is that electricians (union men only) are being sent to big army airfields like Eritrea to fix wires at \$1,000 per month, more than general Eisenhower himself gets, not to mention the men in the trenches at \$50 per month. What will these men think of such an arrangement?

This is Thanksgiving week, and we Americans have much to be thankful for despite that fact that we are now in a world conflict with those who would make slaves of the rest of the world. We have had the biggest harvest in all time; we broke all records for food produced from the fields and Victory Gardens. We have plenty for our own use; plenty for our fighting men and some for our allies and a bit for the hungry civilians in places where the axis have been driven out. Last, but not least, our women and children are safe, the old people can come and go at will, and our large cities and towns have not felt the rumble of bursting

bombs. Yes, we Americans have much to be thankful for.

If you have the least bit of feeling for the man in uniform, don't permit your own feeling for pleasure to allow you the use of buses and trains from December 17th to January 10th, to make a pleasure trip, anywhere. Remember tens of thousands of service men still in the States may be allowed a pass home for the holidays, to spend a few pleasant hours with the home folks; mother, dad, sister, brother, or the sweetheart or wife and babies. Don't deprive these men of a few days with home folks. You can make your trip later if you do not have your own conveyance. But, STAY AT HOME or off public transportation facilities during the holidays. The war department as well as rail and bus lines are asking that you do not make any unnecessary trip between the above dates. Will you co-operate?

This is conceded to be the wish of thousands of other people, but our area editor says he hopes the "war time" will be continued after the war, in order to have long afternoon to loaf or work (?). Being on the west edge of Central Standard time, we are almost one hour ahead of sun time, but would be nearer sun time in Mountain

**THE BIGGEST DICTATOR**

This is a day of dictators. Hitler, Tojo and the rest have had a big time the past decade. But America has produced in the year 1943, the biggest dictator of them all, John L. Lewis.

Hitler and Tojo are on the wane. John L. Lewis' star is ascending, while the allied armies are cuffing the Nazis and the Japs around, the shaggy-browed Lewis is strutting bigger than ever and having wonderful success.

Our armies and the allied armies of the world over are pressing the enemy everywhere. Such a worldwide offensive requires more munitions of war than ever. In the midst of all this, John L. Lewis, head of the United Mine Workers successfully pulls off a strike which halts coal mining in several producing states.

Coal supplies, prime necessity for the manufacture of hundreds of war needs, began to dwindle and production decreased alarmingly. John L. Lewis seemingly cares nothing for the fact that patriotic Americans all over the nation are sacrificing and working to assure to the boys in uniform everything they need to help in the battle against the Axis.

The big thing in the mind of Lewis and the United Mine Workers is to force a pay raise, taking advantage of the war situation to gain the point.

John L. Lewis once plagued the Democratic part, by aligning with it. Failing to get everything he

wanted there, he became a Roosevelt hater. In the campaign of 1940 his support went to Wendell Wilkie. It is claimed that he took a hand in the elections of November 3, by keeping the strike situation looking badly, until the votes were in the ballot box. Republican majorities in 1943 will make it harder for the Democrats to win in 1944, he doubtless figured.

We imagine the Republicans will tire of Lewis, before they are through with him. Where will he then go, politically?

Wherever Lewis lands, he will aspire to dictatorship, of course. He held his club over the whole country and it's patriotic citizens in his strike maneuvers. He's the biggest dictator now on the stage of action in this country of ours. How long will America stand for Lewis' brand of interference with the war effort?—Kerrville Times.

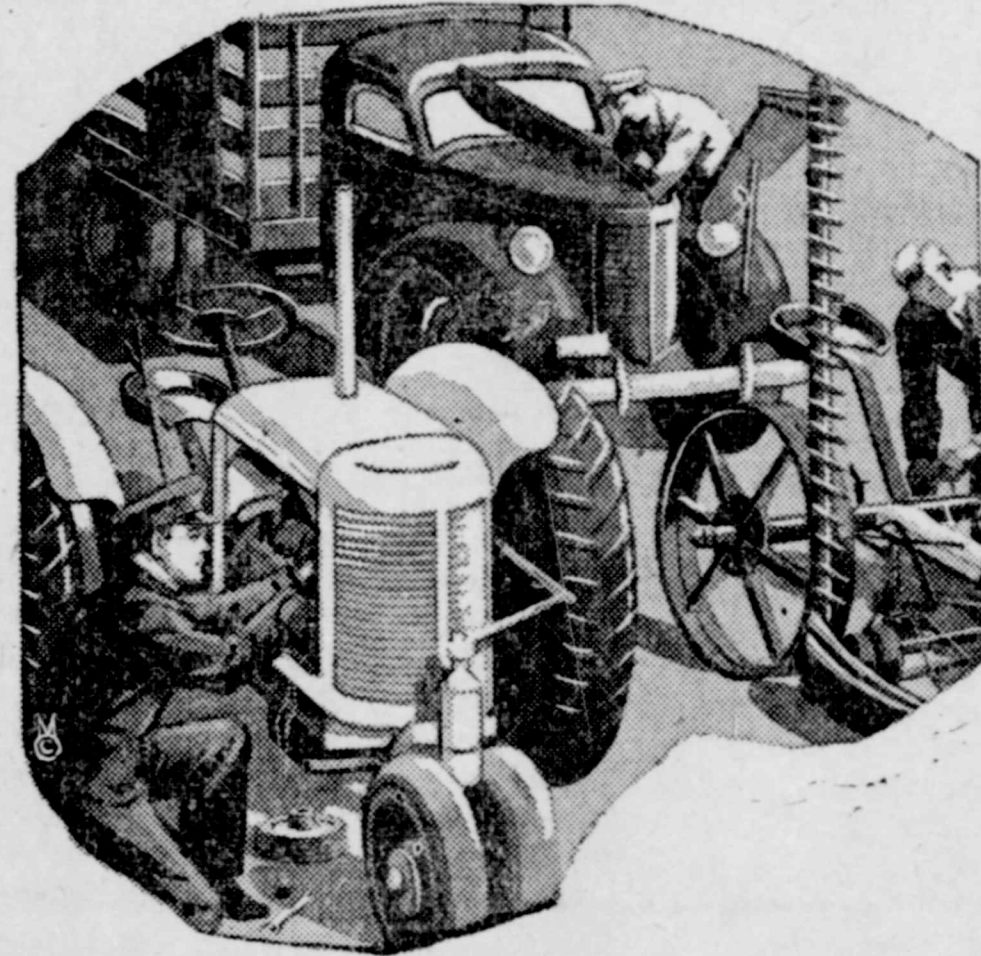

#### Less Coupons But More Gallonage

Lubbock (Special)—The Office of Price Administration has announced a simplification rationing program, effective December 1, under which all "B" and "C" books issued by local war price rationing boards will contain fewer coupons than in the past, but each coupon will be good for more gallons than heretofore. No increase in the amount of gasoline allowed is involved, however.

All "B" and "C" coupons issued throughout the country on and after December 1 will be worth five gallons each, as compared with the present value of two gallons for coupons of those types in the east and mid-west, and three gallons in the far west.

The new supplemental gasoline ration coupons of five gallons value will be issued with the designation, "B-2" and "C-2", on their face. As present "B" and "C" and "B-1" and "C-1" coupons run out, they will be replaced by the new higher-unit-value coupons. Meanwhile, outstanding coupons issued before December 1 will continue to be worth only two gallons in the east and mid-west and three gallons in the far west.

OPA explained that "B-1" coupons are a reprint of the earlier "B" coupons, they are used in the same way and have the same value. The same is true of "C" and "C-1" coupons.

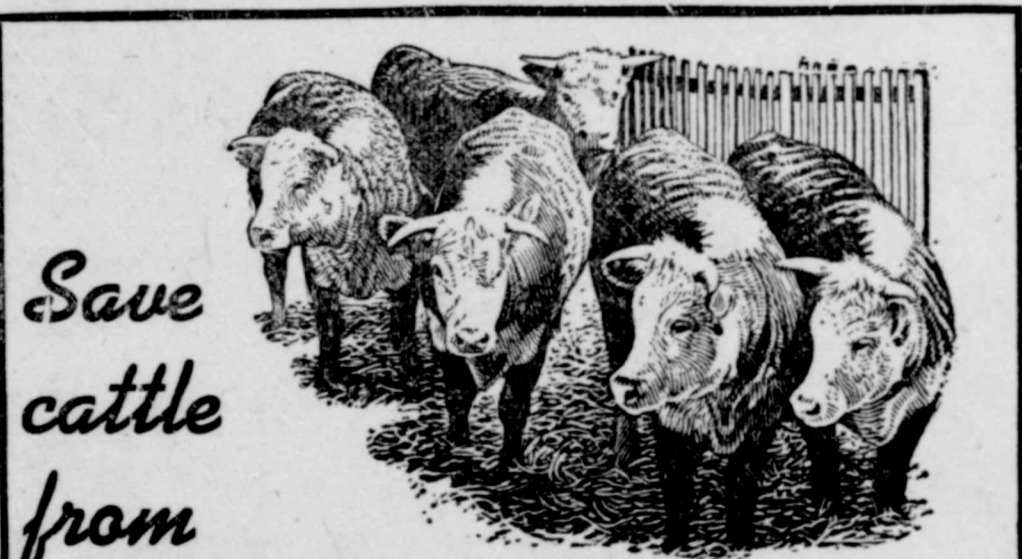

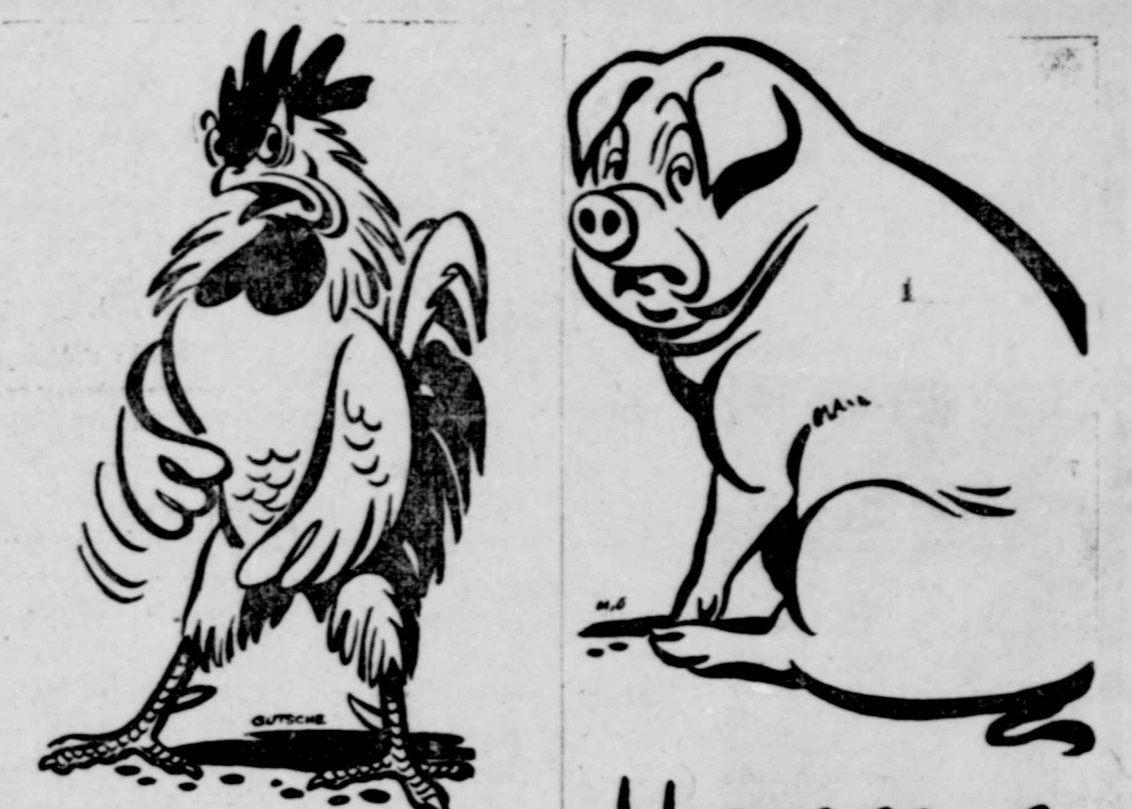
