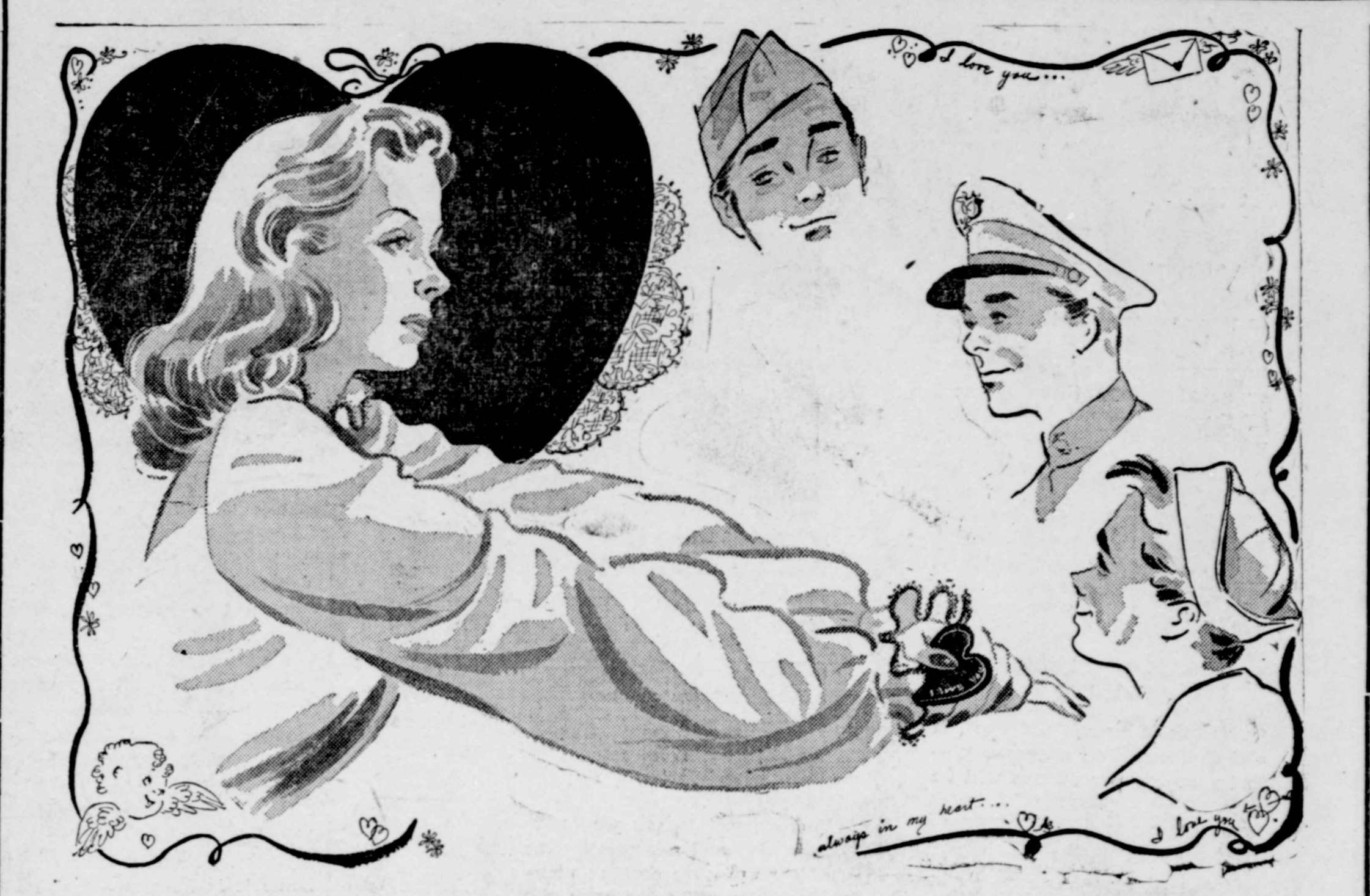

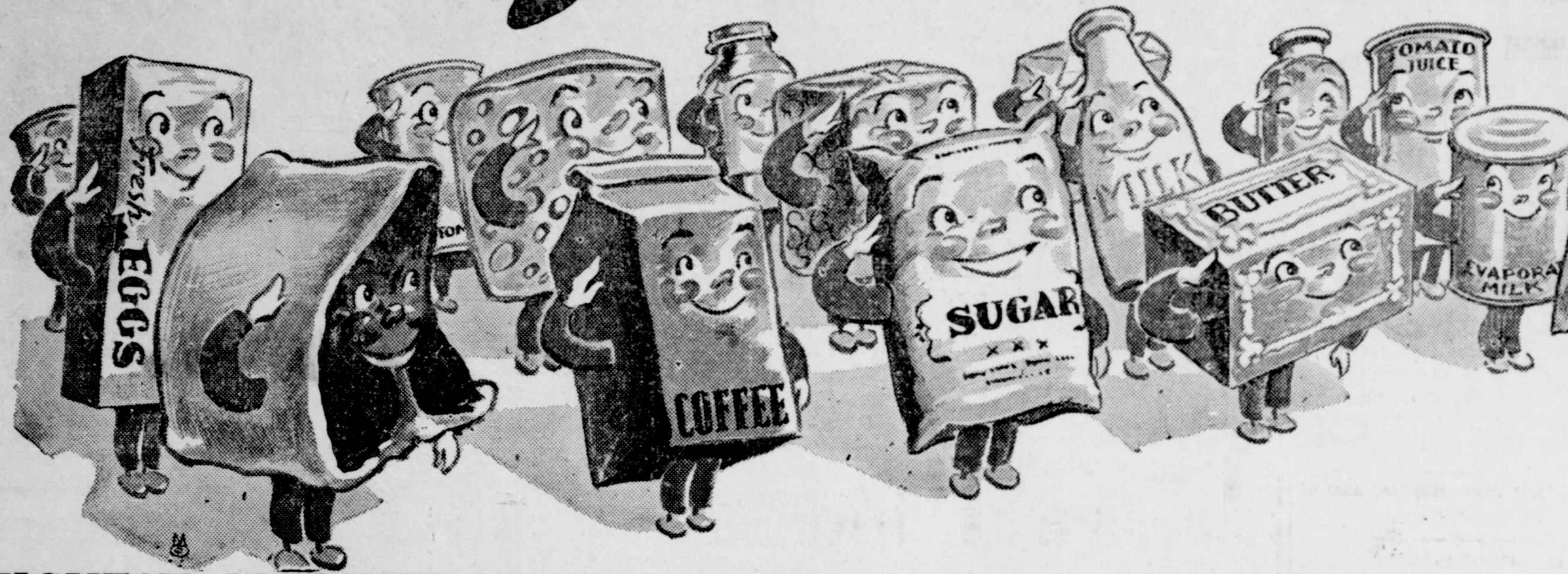
### MORE RAIN FOR TERRY

## McMurry College, Abilene, Raising Huge Endowment

Getting off to a good start, the campaign to raise \$1,750,000 for McMurry College at Abilene, the sponsor, the Northwest Texas

Conference, has high hopes of soon raising the amount. One million dollars will be used for endowment, and \$750,000 will be used for new buildings on the campus. McMurry is a class A-1 senior college.

Four wealthy men in Abilene alone have subscribed a total of \$260,000 in money and property. Three of the large Methodist churches in the conference have or will raise \$125,000, namely, First of Amarillo, \$30,000; First, Abilene, \$25,000, and St. Paul of Abilene, \$70,000. Non-Methodists of Abilene are subscribing \$62,000. The Lubbock district quota, of which Brownfield is a part, has a quota of \$150,000, and with money plentiful and nothing much to buy in way of cars or household utilities, it is believed the district will go over the top handsomely. Some of our greatest men and women were educated at denominational colleges.
