Randolph Field, Tex., Feb. 8-Texas, already traditional as the home of great combat pilots, placed another 470 names on the list of its aerial fighting men today as graduation ceremonies held at eleven AAF Training Likes Scenery Command advanced schools this state and Oklahoma.

In this class, largest ever produced by the Central Training Command, Texans far outnumbered the representatives from any other one state. The 470 fighter and bomber pilots who received their wings today could, alone, fly a good-sized mission against an Axis industrial bastion. Nine of the eleven schools in which these pilots obtained their final training as cadets are located in Texas. The other two schools are in Oklahoma.

Among the new pilots is one Jones of Meadow, who was transferred from Pampa AAF.
