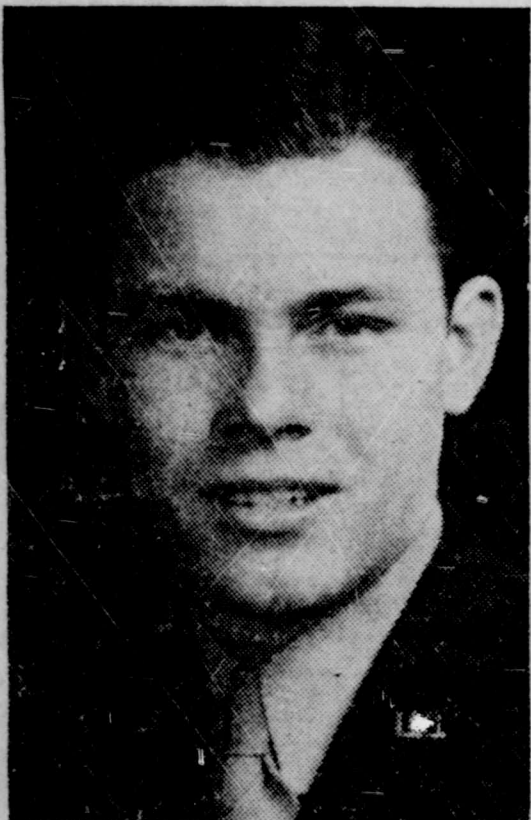

2nd Lieut. Keller Greenfield In India

Second Lieutenant Keller Greenfield informed his mother, Mrs. L. O. Greenfield, in a letter dated April 14, that he had arrived safely in India.

Greenfield is a bombardier navigator, and all of Brownfield are proud of his achievement. He is a graduate of Brownfield high school, class of '38. Young Green-

field enlisted in the reserves in June, 1942, having his first pre-flight training in November '42 at Santa Anna, California. He received his commission and bombardier wings at Roswell May 29, 1943, entering navigation school at Hondo, Texas, and finishing October 7, 1943. He received combat training at Pratt, Kan, where he finished the latter part of March, this year.

Keller was a valued employee of the local Piggly Wiggly store for three years, going from here to Midland, where he was employed with the Magnolia Petroleum company in their offices as a draftsman.

Keller was never without a job, even in high school, he worked summers and ever since has had employment, holding responsible positions.

Milner Training For Combat Duty

Cpl. Buford R. Milner, radio operator-gunner, of Brownfield, Texas, will soon complete an intensive course in combat flying at the Alexandria Army Air Field, Alexandria, La., and in the near future he will go overseas to a combat area.

He is the member of a flying Fortress crew trained by the second Air Force, which has the task of readying four-engine bomber crews for overseas duty.

Listed among the instructors at the Alexandria Army Air Field are more than 250 officers and enlisted men who have seen action in every theatre of war. These veterans direct crews through training conditions that simulate actual combat.

Cpl. Milner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Milner, Box 386 Brownfield, Texas. He is a graduate of Brownfield High school.

CADET LEWIS COMPLETES PRE-FLIGHT COURSE

Heroes of Tarawa Cited

The following article was clipped from a South Pacific paper and sent to Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Rhyne, from their son, Gy. Sgt. Robert L. Rhyne, who is now in a rest camp somewhere in the South Pacific.

Sgt. Rhyne will have been overseas two years the 7th of August. He has received two presidential citations, the first one received when he left the Solomon Islands and all who were in the 2nd division who took part in the Tarawa campaign received a medal.

Edsel Miller, a son of Mrs. I. H. Miller, north of Town, has also been awarded these citations.

The article reads: "Heroes of Tarawa Cited—The marines who took Tarawa from the Japanese have won a Presidential Unit citation, the highest honor that can be conferred upon any American fighting unit. No citation was more richly deserved. The marines of Tarawa, at great cost to themselves, set the pattern for all future atoll conquests. Though they were confronted with problems no American fighting men had ever had to solve before, they went forward to take their objectives with scornful disregard for their own safety. They had a job to do—a tremendous job—and they did it in true tradition of the marines.

"America will never forget the men of Tarawa, nor their gallant commander, Major General Julian C. Smith. They wrote flaming new words for the great marine hymn."

Brownfield Schools Close Today

Enduring a year of teacher shortage, and other wartime handicaps, the Brownfield schools close their session today with graduation exercises tonight at the high school auditorium.

They turned out 63 graduates. There will be 86 seniors in the next term; 108 juniors; 151 sophomores and 122 from the grades go into high school. The average enrollment for the term was 1800. 59 teachers, being about three under requirements. There was a 34 percent turnover in teachers, because of resignations. All teachers were re-elected and were expected to accept.

American Legion Giving Invaluable Aid To Visiting Soldiers

Servicemen who failed, or did not have the opportunity, to notify their families the time they would arrive on a furlough home, are accorded a valuable service by the local American Legion. A dozen names are on file at the bus station of men who will take them any hour of the day or night to their homes. Some of the boys who came from a distance may not have over a few hours to be with their home folks and this may mean a lot to him. Jim Miller, only recently, has taken a boy over in Yoakum county. Chris Quante says this is only one of the many services the local post accords servicemen. If a wire comes here to meet a boy on a certain bus, or other matters vital to the serviceman, and Western Union cannot deliver it, they, too are asked to call and the local post rushes the message to the parties addressed.

At the American Legion hall, there is to be an honor roll erected inside the building and a miniature cemetery on the grounds with markings of the names and locations where each boy from this county is buried. The Legion is doing a great work and the town and county should stand solidly back of them.

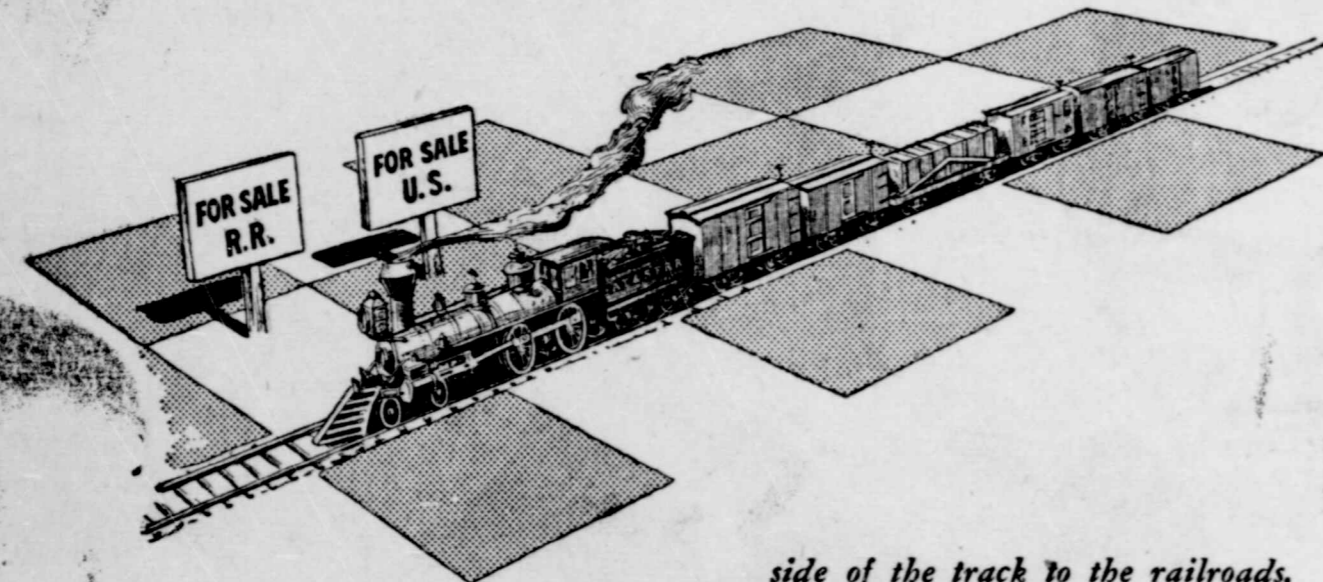

The Railroad LAND GRANT



★ To speed the settling of the West, our nation wanted railroads pushed across great unsettled areas to develop rich but distant regions and to bind the country together for military and other reasons.

In the 1850's and 1860's, to encourage railroads to push their tracks into the undeveloped territory, Congress granted the odd sections on each

side of the track to the railroads, with certain "strings" attached, and these grants varied in depth up to several miles.

The even sections retained by the government were for the most part sold to settlers at a substantial increase in price.

The Land Grant policy was very helpful in getting the railroads started in those early days. BUT...

Isn't it out of date today?

In return for their Land Grants, the railroads originally were required, and are still required to do so in respect of military and naval property and personnel, to haul government passengers, freight, and mail at rates far below those applicable to ordinary traffic.

Since the Land Grants were made, railroads have paid out in reduced rates on government traffic many times the amount they have received from these Land Grants.

In the case of the Santa Fe, here are the figures: In more than 80 years which have elapsed since the

Land Grants were made, Santa Fe's net realization from these lands has been about \$23,000,000. In 1943 alone, the government received from Santa Fe, in the form of rate reductions, approximately \$40,000,000.

Many governmental agencies as well as private shipper groups are convinced that the time has arrived for the entire repeal of these burdensome Land Grant requirements.
