



## Well, Pfc. Dood It Just the Same!

A IX AIR FORCE SERVICE COMMAND UNIT—Installing an aircraft camera in the tail of the famous P51 "Mustang" after leading aircraft engineers and designers in the States had said "it can not be done." Private First Class H. P. Chapman and his IX Air Force Service Squadron have won the attention and commendation of high ranking Army Air Force officers who took their hats off to these men who have yet to see an impossible job.

Pfc. Chapman is the son of Mrs. Nora Bell Rolland of Box 745, Brownfield, Texas. His attractive wife, Mrs. Leta Mae Chapman, and children, Mary Janette, aged 4, and Billy Frank, aged 2 live at Box 382, Brownfield, Texas. Pfc. Chapman's experience as a truck driver with the Bryant trucking firm in Brownfield is standing him in good stead now as his duties in his squadron are as a truck driver.

Successful installation of the camera was accomplished by the squadron after tests by North American Aircraft Corp. makers of the Mustang, and Wright Field aeronautical engineers, had already proved the job impossible.

Nevertheless, the commanding general of the Ninth Air Force fighter command, who knows and respects what his men can do, gave permission to Pfc. Chapman's squadron to attempt the installation. In one week after the general said "go ahead," the first aerial camera, of the type desired, had been installed in the tail of a Mustang.

The job that "stumped the experts" had been done by a service squadron under difficult field conditions. Modifications had been made on the plane that the manufacturers never dreamed of!

In less than three months 50 more Mustangs were camera equipped. Planes of the only tactical fighter reconnaissance group in any theatre, serviced by Pfc. Chapman's squadron, were streaking over enemy territory, blasting at Nazi targets with their 50-cal. machine gun, "shooting" sites and installations with their newly installed cameras to give Ninth Air Force intelligence officers vital pictorial information essential to effective aerial warfare.

With the small camera previously used, pilots had to go down "on the deck" to get their photos. Chances had to be taken that risked lives, planes and important pictures, too.

But now, with the new large camera, pilots go out over enemy territory at the Mustang's best flying level, where enemy planes can't match their speed—and the chances of bringing back important photos, good photos, as well as their planes and themselves, have been tremendously improved by the outstanding achievement of a small group of men who refused to say, "it can't be done."

## American Soldier

The night before he enlisted in the United States army in 1917, Edward Markham, editor of St. Peter (Minn.) Herald, wrote a little essay that hundreds of thousands of other American soldiers are saying in their own way today. What he printed then is worth printing now:

"I am a mother's son . . . I am the pride of a family and part of a home . . . I love my life, yet I am a gambler, betting the highest stakes that a man can wager . . . my life . . . If I win, you win; If I lose, I have lost all . . . The loss is mine, not yours; and there is a grieving mother, a saddened family and a broken home to which I can never return.

"I ask only for the Godspeed and support of my nation in return for laying upon the altar of my country my all . . . For bravery and blood will you furnish bullets and bread? Will you pawn your shekels if I pawn myself? Will you bet your gold while I risk my life? I am the flower of a nation's manhood, the glory of a noble race. I am the American soldier."

## Hardin Joyce, Now A Second Lieutenant Graduate of Yale

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 22—The gold bars of second lieutenant were awarded Aviation Cadet Hardin Joyce, jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Hardin Joyce of Brownfield at graduation exercises of the army air forces training command school at Yale university. Graduation ceremony was held in the auditorium of the Sterling Law buildings before an audience of classmates and friends on hand to congratulate the new officers and pin on their gold bars.

According to C. I. Raymond J. Reeves, commanding officer of the post, the new lieutenant has been trained as a technical officer in armament, and may soon join a tactical unit of the army air forces for duty at an advanced air base where he will be in charge of a crew of enlisted men specialists in aircraft armament.

As a technical officer in armament, Lieutenant Joyce will be responsible for the functioning of guns, the synchronization of gun sights and gun cameras, and the loading of explosives and ammunition on board a plane before it leaves on a mission over enemy territory.

Overseas reports on armament men indicate that they are the backbone of the air corps in importance in the preparation of every plane for combat. In addition, new technical officer has technical school at Yale trains men in hardship—to carry on duties efficiently whether in jungle hanger or desert airdrome. For two weeks prior to graduation, the new technical officer has trained under simulated battle conditions, from sleeping in his plane to working on it at night with the aid of black-out lanterns.

To the above article, we would like to add that Lt. Joyce is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hardin Joyce of the Pool community, and being old-timers, are well-known. He was born and reared in Terry county, and finished high school in Brownfield in 1938. He then took a course in Tech college in mechanical engineering, and was a student instructor in the college, where he received his degree—in absentia.

He first entered training at Seymour Johnson Field, N. C., the 18th of November, 1943, being transferred later to the Yale university to complete his course and receive a commission.

## Canning Center

Recognizing the continued necessity for placing emphasis on food preservation, Brownfield public school officials have completed arrangements for setting up a canning center with sufficient facilities to process the major portion of the garden products of those citizens who do not have adequate equipment or knowledge to do the job correctly.

Mr. Tom McCollum, Superintendent, has announced that Tom Neely, Vocational Agricultural Teacher, will have general supervision of the project, and that the school board will provide instructors with training and experience in canning to assist local victory gardeners lay away a supply of home grown food.

Each individual using the canning facilities will furnish his own cans or jars and produce. The equipment, heat, water, and other essential items will be furnished free to patrons of the canning center, Neely said.

Funds for this service is made available through the State Board for Vocational Education at Austin, Texas. It is hoped by local officials that this opportunity for conserving food for victory will not be passed up.

This canning center will be located in the basement of the West Ward School building, and the proposed starting date has been set for July 10th.

## Postoffice Busy Place

Postmaster L. A. Greenfield revealed to the Lions club luncheon Wednesday that his office sends out daily about 5,000 pieces of first class mail, and receives 7000 of the same class daily. It sends some 75 parcel post packages and receives 150 daily, handling over 2000 pounds of mail, and two thousand dollars worth of money orders.

Say what you will about the United States Chamber of Commerce, and we have taken a few ugly cracks at it in times past, their president's recent visit to Russia may gain us several billion dollars of post-war trade. This man simply took the lion by the beard, instead of going to Russia with an inferior complex, as if the Russians were hobgoblins or something equally bad. He won their confidence and got some real figures on what to expect from Russian distributors of American merchandise after the war.

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, took time out from his weekly statements about contagious diseases, care of the sick, health programs, etc., to compliment Texas dairymen for carrying on and furnishing the public in essential milk. Like all who have looked into the matter, Dr. Cox knows that with labor almost unobtainable, feed high, and a ceiling price on milk, dairymen have had a rocky road to travel the past two years.

Had you noted in reading the Texas casualty list from the Pacific war zone, and particularly from the European fronts, the large number of names of Latin-American, mostly of Mexican ex-

traction? Most of these boys are from south and southwest Texas. But they paid the supreme sacrifice, or were wounded for their adopted country. These folks are loyal Texans and loyal Americans, no matter if their names do sound odd to you.

The railroads and bus companies, as well as the government have tried in vain to persuade civilians to stay off trains as much as possible here of late. It has even been hinted that people may be put off trains most anywhere to make accommodations for the wounded coming back from Europe, and being carried to hospitals in Texas and other middle states. But civilians persist in riding anyway. That is one way for them to spend some of the filthy lucre they have made the past few years and at the same time visit the wife's kin-folks. Train travel by civilians, despite all warnings, has increased 25 per cent over last year. Service men who have had short furloughs home recently have had to stand or walk about all the way from Lubbock to the Pacific coast. The trains were crowded by civilians taking pleasure trips.

Because the OPA was a long time learning that merchants would rather put in the higher class goods and make more money on them than clutter up their shelves with cheaper clothing with just a mite of difference between cost and selling price, so now dry goods shelves have become almost bare of clothing commonly worn by people who do work in fields and factories. Manufacturers have almost quit making them. But at this late date, OPA is trying to remedy the situation. Then, also, we have the situation of a new firm going into business who had no ceiling prices in 1942, and that makes the new firm an unfair competitor to the older merchants, who have to sell according to his ceiling prices back in 1942. OPA tainous job on their hands, and we might state has had a moun- there is little wonder that mistakes have been made.

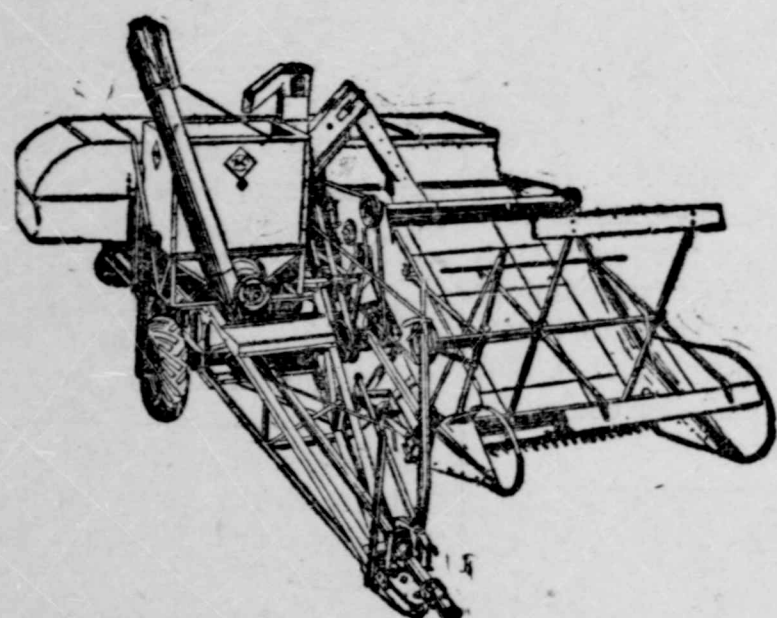

### WACS CAN SHOULDER ARMS

According to news received here today from the Army Recruiting Station in the Post Office building at Lubbock, WACS may now carry weapons under certain circumstances.

An April War Department Circular provides that commanders may submit for approval to their commanding general requests that certain WAC officers and enlisted women be permitted to carry the weapon or arm required by reason of a specific assignment or duty. Women assigned as finance officers or an MP's, for instance, may bear arms.

The Circular requires that the individual have completed a training course to familiarize herself thoroughly with the weapon, and that while on duty which requires carrying of it, she carry a copy of the document which authorizes her to bear the arm or weapon.



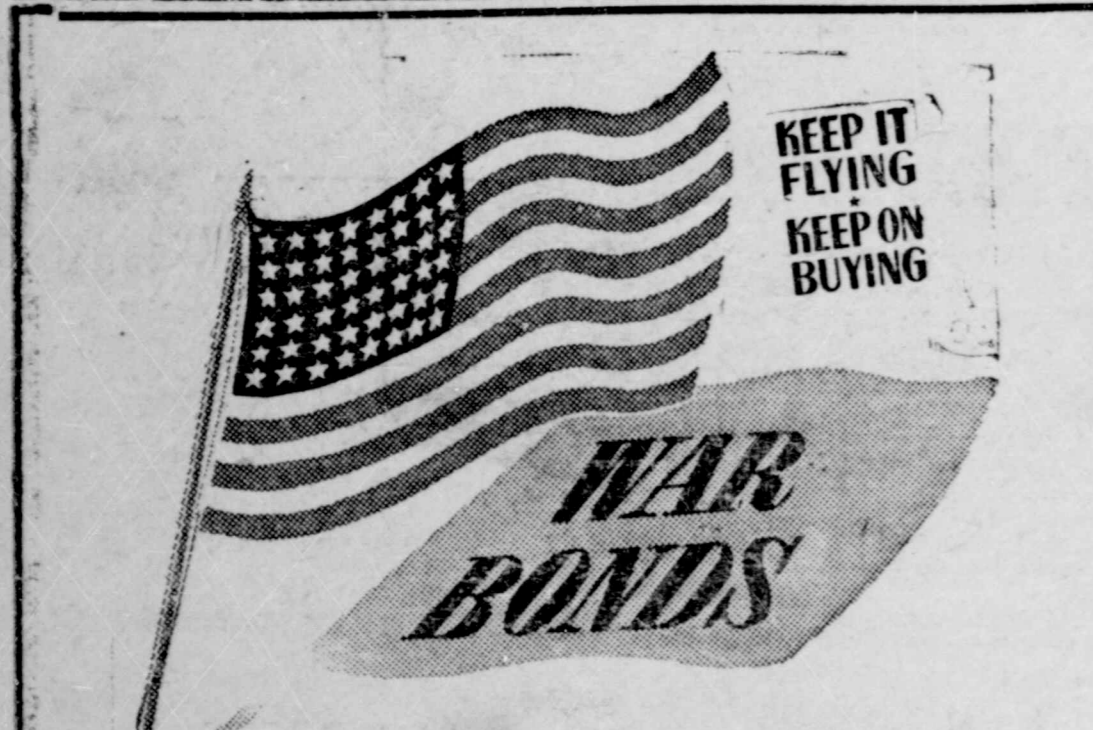

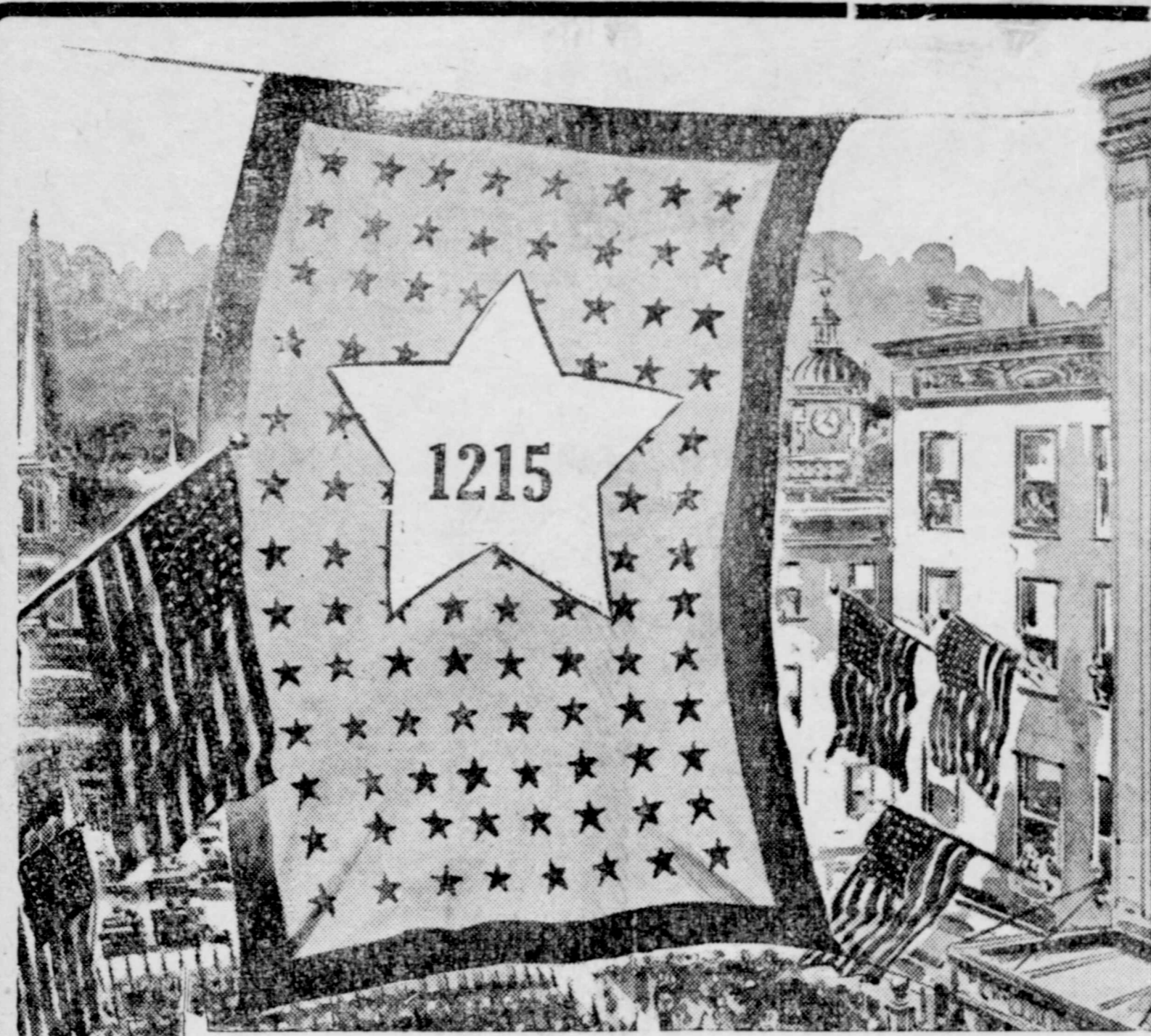
