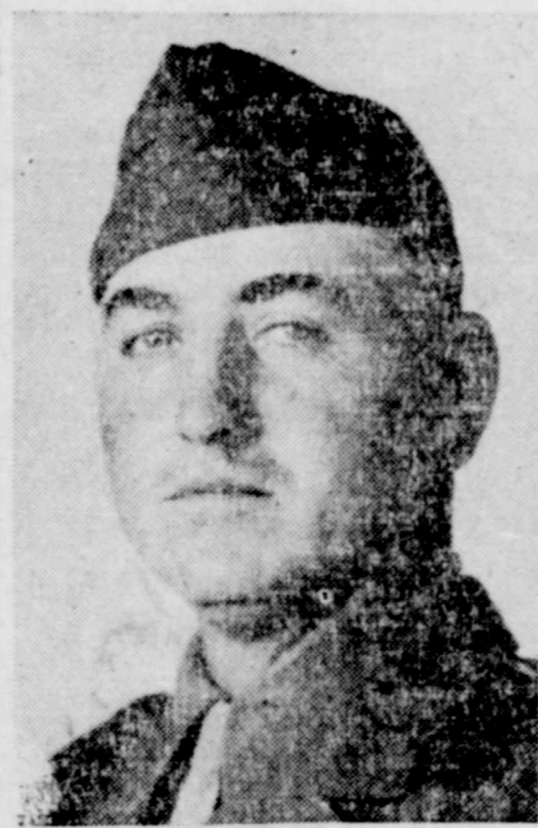

Scholarships Available at Tech

Lubbock, July 12—A number of scholarships of the value of \$200 each for freshmen in the department of textile engineering at Texas Technological college is announced by Dean O. V. Adams of the division of engineering. They are available for the 1944-45 school year.

To be eligible for one of these scholarships a student must be able to enter the division of engineering without any conditions. Graduates of high schools in Texas, boys and girls, may apply for these scholarships. Transcript of applicant record should be sent to the registrar of the college.

The money available may be used for tuition and other fees, loss and breakage deposits, texts books, equipment and other expenses as may be approved by the committee.

July Cotton Report For Texas

Cotton acreage in cultivation in Texas on July 1st, 1944, is estimated by the Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of agriculture to be 7,325,000 acres. The acreage planted this year is 7 per cent below 1943. This is the lowest cotton acreage in Texas since 1899 when 6,950,000 acres of the crop were harvested. The largest acreage ever planted in the State was 18,443,000 acres in 1925. Much of the shift from cotton has gone into sorghums and other feed and food crops, with very little change in the total acreage of land being devoted to crop production.

The season was not favorable for planting cotton this year. Many farmers were not able to plant their intended acreage due to excessive moisture at planting time over central, eastern and southeastern portions of the State, and to dry conditions in the South Plains counties. Many early fields got in the grass and were abandoned and planted to late feed crops. The month of June was more favorable to cotton in areas that had been too wet. Dry hot weather permitted field work and most fields were cleaned. Cotton was making favorable growth by July 1st, and was fruiting well with stands generally good.

For the United States the estimated acreage of cotton and standing July 1, 1944, is 20,472,000 acres compared with 21,942,000, on July last year, and a 10 year average (1932-1942) planted area of 28,189,000 acres.

Nearly An Inch Of Rain Fell Sunday

A hard shower Sunday afternoon totaled 48-100, 43-100 at night, additional, making 91-100 for the day. Many farmers stated they didn't need or want rain, as they had sufficient moisture, and that weed-killing was better done without rain.

This was especially true of the north and west part of the county. We went out and had a Sunday feast with the Ed Thompson family. He had some mighty pretty feed, and his cotton is equaring nicely.

Dr. Whyburn Heads Texas Tech College

The board of directors of the Texas Technological college at Lubbock, setting in session at Ft. Worth recently, unanimously elected Dr. William M. Whyburn, of the University of California, Los Angeles, to head the college.

Dr. Whyburn is a noted mathematician and was a faculty member of Tech in the early days of that college. He is a family man with two children, a girl and a boy.
