



Crash In Italy Fatal To Lt. Wade K. Hill

First Lieutenant Wade K. Hill, 23, son of Mrs. Ben J. Hill, has been officially announced as dead, his wife, the former Miss Maxine Kuykendall of Lubbock, was notified late last Friday.

Lt. Hill was killed July 55, in a plane crash in Italy, the official communication said. He was a transport pilot and had been flying supplies into China from India.

Lt. Hill had never seen his son, who is nine months old. The baby was born October 28, last, about a month after his father left for duty overseas.

Mrs. Hill, his mother, is one of Terry county's four-star mothers. Her other sons in the service are Sgt. Gene Hill, Moses Lowe, Washington; Harold Hill, Reno, Nevada; Lt. Kenneth Hill, who is in a hospital in England, recuperating from wounds received recently in France, and Dale Hill, who will likely be called soon into service. He is also survived by three sisters: Mrs. Kathleen Bennett, Salinas, California; Mrs. Lewis Huckabee and Mrs. Cecil Aker of this city.

Lt. Hill was graduated from the Brownfield high school, where he was captain of the football team and a popular student in all activities. He attended Texas Techological college for 2½ years as a pre medical student. He was a former employee of Mark Halsey Drug, in Lubbock.

T-Sgt. Norwood Browder Missing In Action

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Browder received a Wire Monday from the Provost Marshall stating that their son, T/Sgt. Norwood M. Browder, has been missing in action since July 11, over Germany.

This is the second message like that, that the Browners have received in the past 2 months. The other stated their son Sgt. Jack Browder was missing, in the meantime he has been reported a prisoner of the Germans.

T/Sgt. Browder was a member of the Eighth Air Force and had been in England about eight months as a crew chief on a Liberator bomber. He has been in the Army Air Corps about twenty months, and received his basic training at LAAF. Before entering service, he was employed at Goodpasture Grain and Milling Company.

Cpt. Truett Flache with the 256th Field Artillery Battalion, landed safely in England the latter part of June. Cpt. Flache is the husband of the former Queenelle Sawyer, who is making her home here with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Sawyer. He is the son of Mrs. Ame Flache, of the Lubbock road.

Jimmie Bishop Gets Naval Training

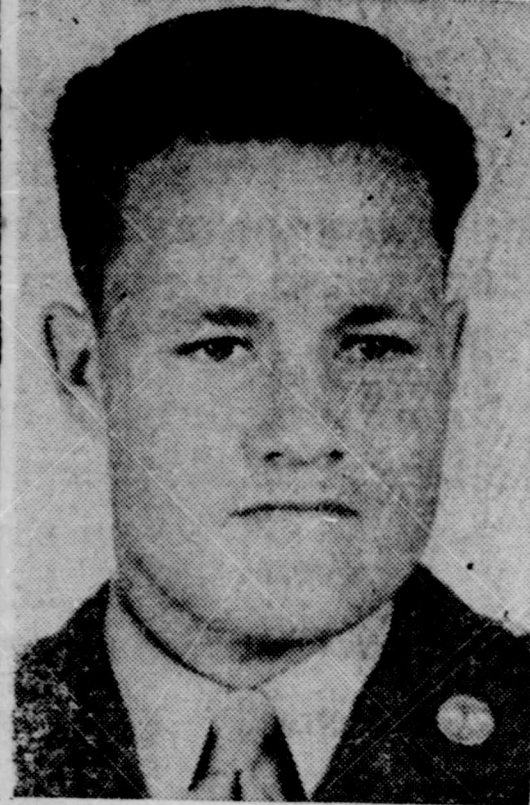

Pfc. Aubrey W. Jones Training for Veterinarian Technician

Camp Carson, Colo.—Pfc. Aubrey W. Jones, Route 2, Brownfield, Texas, is now in training as a veterinary technician with the 613th F. A. Bn. (Pack), at Camp Carson, Colo. Before entering the service he was a student. His brother, R. D. Jones Jr. is in the U. S. N. R.

The pack artillery units are some of the most colorful in the Army. In the first place a man must be a hardy fellow who is at least five foot ten inches tall, over 160 pounds in weight, and under 30 years of age. The men are selected for their patience and understanding of animals and for physical endurance. Tall men are needed to lift the loads up high and set them down on the backs of the mules and long legs are handy for the four or five mile pace kept by the units when on a march.

The combination of sturdy mules carrying powerful 75mm. howitzers and hardy men, makes an unbeatable team. Once the mules have carried the guns over rough territory into the position needed, it takes the men only a few minutes to unload and assemble the guns and have them ready for action.

In the jungles of the South Pacific, the hills of Tunisia and mountains of Italy, the army pack mule has proven his worth. Many times the only thing that could get supplies through to the men was the pack mule.

In these bitter hours of European invasion, when time is precious, each woman should double her effort in Red Cross work. We MUST help our boys NOW or NEVER. Every wound must be dressed—not just some wounds, or certain wounds, but all wounds, large or small, must be dressed and dressed often.

Reminders like that, in letters from overseas, keep the volunteers of the Brownfield Red Cross chapter loyal to their task of surgical dressing making these hot days, according to Mrs. L. Nicholson, surgical dressing chairman.

The volunteers grow weary, of course, and sometimes the work looks like a very small contribution in the war effort and unimportant, but a few letters of appreciation from the men overseas are received and it all seems worthwhile again.

Our summer quota will keep volunteers busy here all summer and that more workers are needed if production is to be kept up to schedule.

A medical corps captain in the North Pacific has written the Red Cross as follows:

"We here, and on every other front, are fully and completely dependent upon the things you in the states send to us . . . It takes many things to fight wars . . . and our weapons are dressings and plasma, first. Were the supply of surgical dressings to stop, and then we would stop and stay stopped. That you keep up your supply is of utmost importance in the winning of this war."

If you are not doing your bit, we urge you to think of your son, your neighbor's son, or someone in the service dear to you, who might need the dressing you are not folding.

Army Trucks to Stage Paper Drive Here

A. L. Hartzog, salvage chairman, announces that army trucks from a Lubbock air base will make a city-wide drive here on August 2nd to gather paper. Every citizen is asked to gather up their paper, tie securely in bundles, preferably not over 30 pounds each, and place same on the sidewalk or curb, where it is within easy reach for the truck to pick up. The drive starts about 9 a. m. that day.

Try to separate magazines from newspapers, and also as to sizes, such as colliers, Saturday Evening Post, Life, and like size in the one package; American, Time, Red Book, and like size in a separate one. Tie securely so it won't spill over or bust in handling. This is our war, our job, no one profits out of this project, so let's each one do his little part, so as to make it convenient for his co-worker.

Paper is a vital war material, urgently needed for both military and civil uses. Paper mills are running part time; the war is running overtime. Geo. W. Neill, who has been assembling papers in small parcels brought to his home, since January, has already shipped four tons and has two more tons ready for the trucks just any day—and is still taking all you can bring him.

So many Brownfield householders are without a way to bring the paper to him, so he urges you to have it ready at your home by 9 a. m., August 2nd, for the army trucks.

The "Ins" Get Nod Of Texas Voters

The primary Saturday seemed to be a field day for the ins, in the county, district and state; most of others being new comers so far as politics are concerned. However, there will be two new faces at the court house here the coming year, a county commissioner and a constable.

The official count is as follows: Gov. Coke Stevenson received 1913 of the total vote, his eight opponents getting only 331 votes.

John Lee Smith for Lieutenant Gov. with 1543 votes, was far in the lead of his three opponents with only 550 votes.

For attorney general, Martin of Tarrant county lead with 1065 votes; Erisman got 237 and Sellers 796.

For Comptroller, Sheppard was far in the lead with 1866 votes.

Jesse James, Treasurer; Bascum Giles, Land Office and Beauford Jester, Rail Commissioner, all had no opponents.

Congress: George Mahon 1360, Harris 973.

Parish for State Senate had no opponent, got 2421 votes.

For State representative, Douglas 388, Neill 1668 and Smith, 321.

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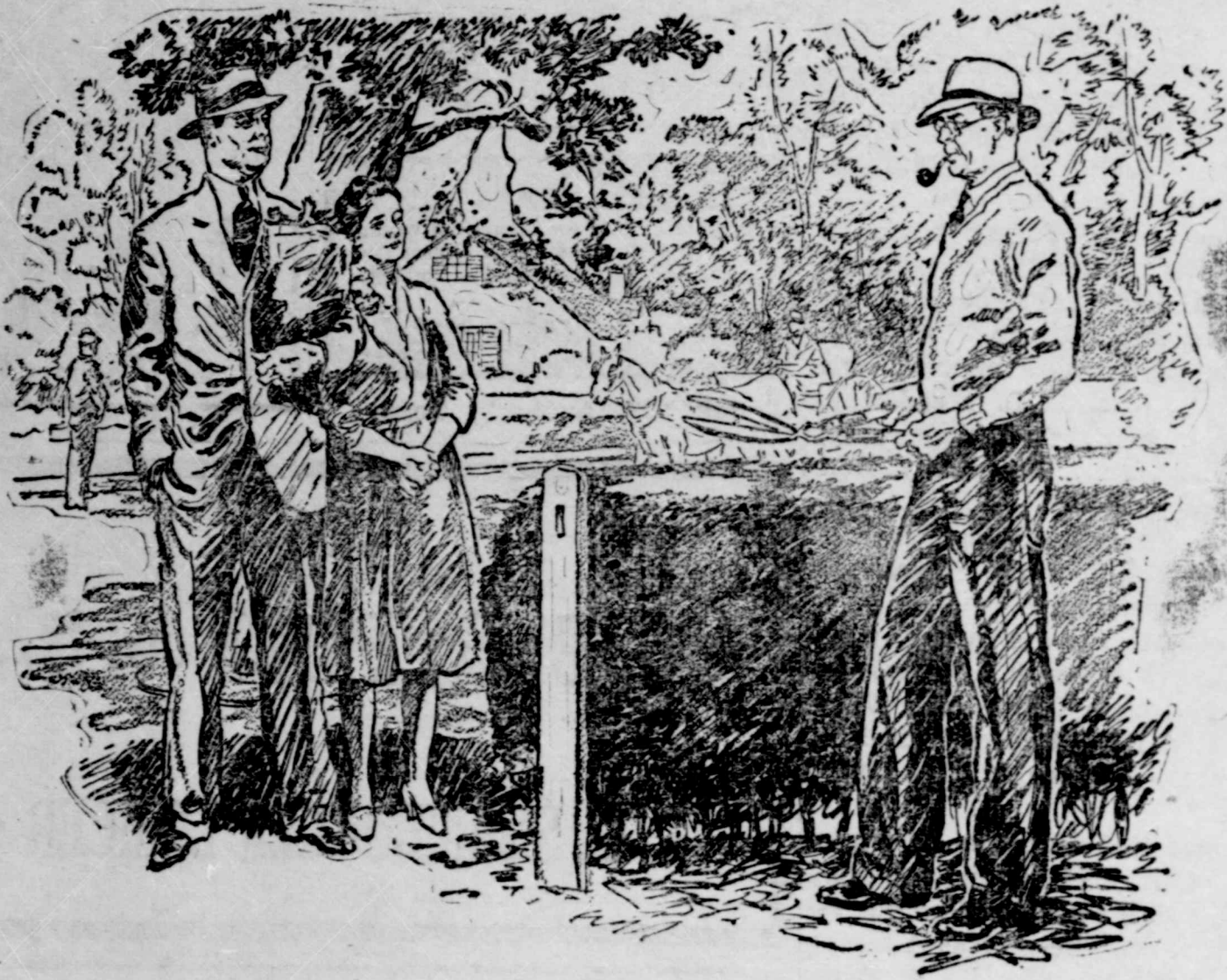

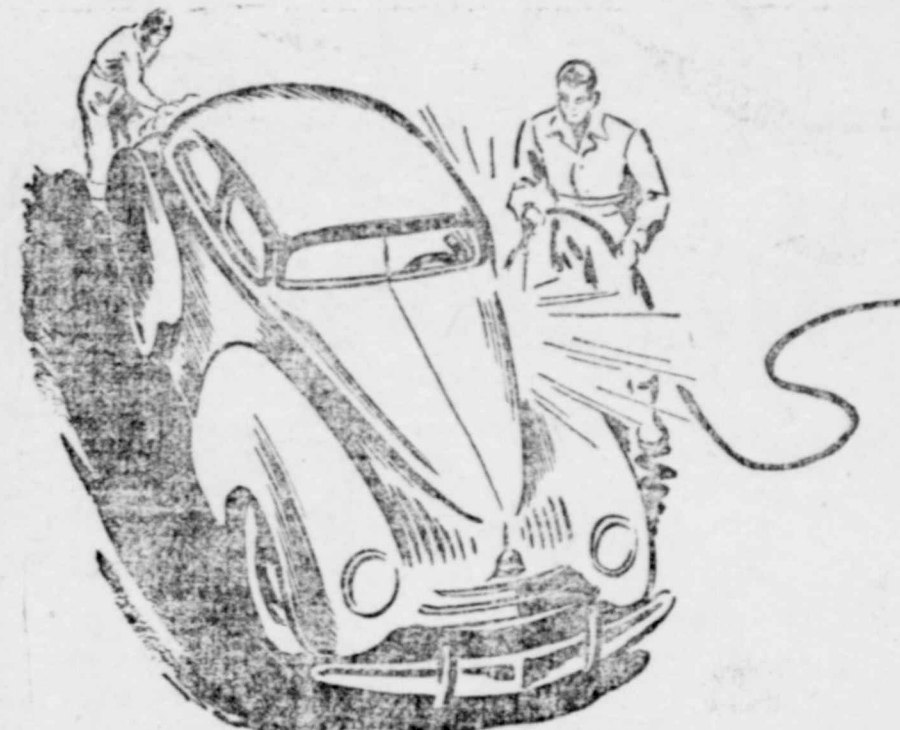

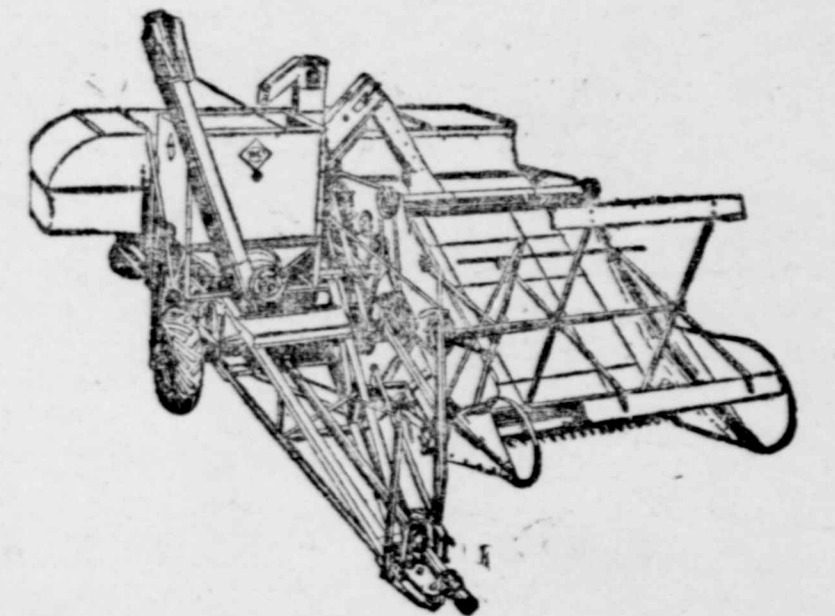

Matt. 9:2—Jesus said unto the sick man: Son, be of good cheer: thy sins be forgiven thee.

Luke 5:20—And when he saw their faith, he said unto him: man, thy sins are forgiven thee.

Luke 7:47—To the sinful woman, Jesus said: "Thy sins are forgiven."

Luke 23:43—To the thief, Jesus said: "Today shalt thou be with me in Paradise."

We ask that you notice that Jesus did not ask for faith in every case on the part of the person forgiven, but he forgave because of the faith of others. Neither did he ask for repentance or baptism. These are individual cases brought to the attention of our Lord.

Mark 1:4; Luke 3:3—John the Baptist preached the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins.

Jesus Also Taught and Baptized We see from this that the Lord did not deal with all cases in the same manner while he was on the earth.

John 3:5—Jesus said unto Nicodemus: "Except a man be born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." After his resurrection, Jesus

said to his apostles: "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth."

Matt. 23:18-19—Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."

Mark 16:15, 16—"And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned."

We will notice the difference in the remission that Jesus gives his apostles, and in his manner of dealing with sinners before his death. In his commission he tells his apostles what they shall teach, and the things necessary for salvation. Did the apostles obey the commands of the Lord?

Acts 2:14—The apostles began to preach, and at verse 7 the sinners "said unto Peter and the rest of the apostles, men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

Verse 41—"Then they that gladly received his word were baptized."

Verse 47—"And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."

Without a doubt the apostles did carry out the will of the Lord. They taught as the Lord commanded them. Sinners that heard and obeyed were saved. Verse 47.

Can you see the difference? When the Lord was here he saved in some cases, those that had no faith. Nothing was required of the sinner; but now, he tells the apostles to preach faith, repentance and baptism, for the remission of sins. This baptism was to be in water. John 3:5; Acts 10:47, Acts 8:36-38.

Acts 22:16—"And now why tarriest thou? arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." These are the words of Ananias to Paul. Paul refers to himself as the chief of sinners. Paul was baptized (in water) in order to have his sins washed away. In the sight of God, Paul was a murderer, and a persecutor of the church.

1 Peter 3:21—"The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but, the answer of a good conscience toward God), by the resurrection of Jesus Christ." Sinners become children of God after baptism.

Gal. 3:26, 27—"For ye are all children of God by faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ."

Hebrews 5:9—"And being made perfect, he (Christ) became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him." Jesus tells us that "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." "Except a man be born of water and of the spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." This, then, is the gospel, that Jesus had his apostles preach unto sinners. To those that obeyed this gospel, the kingdom is promised.

Hebrews 9:16, 17—The apostles tells the Hebrews that this will, this testament, is of force after the death of Christ. While the Christ was living in this world, he pardoned men of their sins, on these special occasions, as he saw fit. But after his death, his testament is in force, and is to be enforced. If we are to be saved it will be because of our obedience to his gospel.

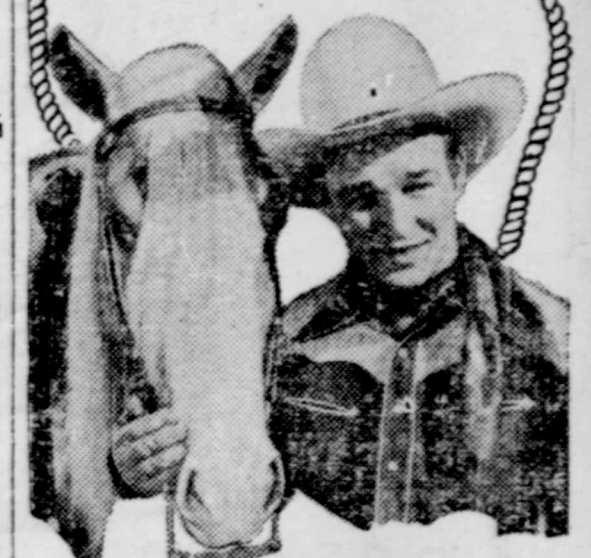

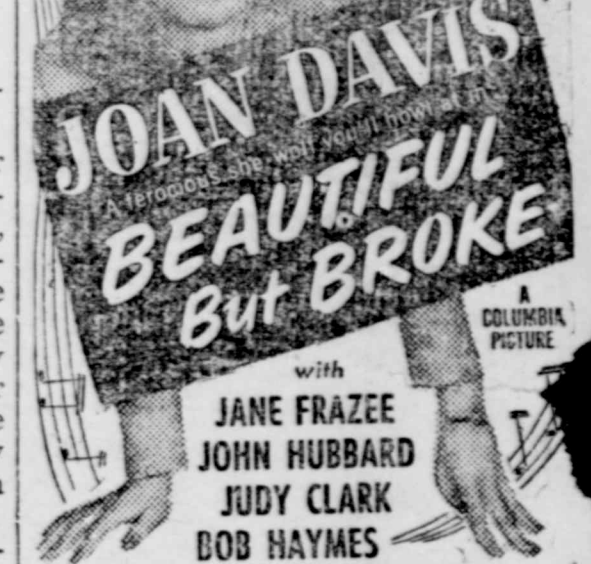

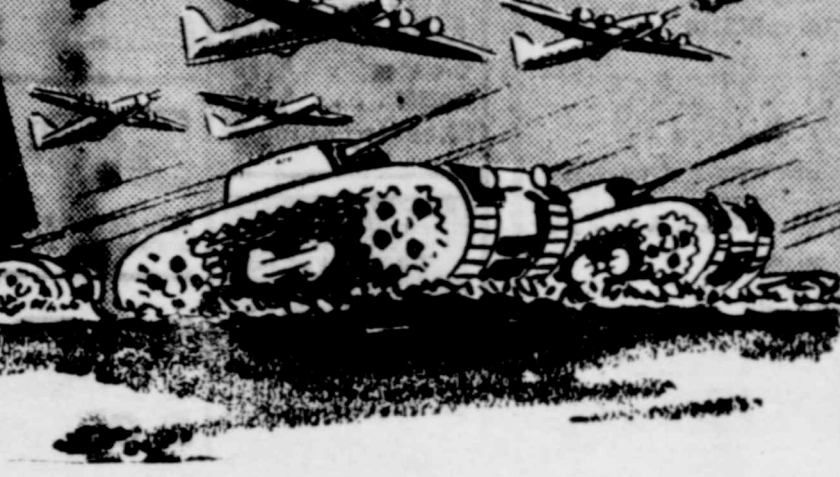
