To Prevent Bloating On Green Pastures

LUBBOCK, April 16-Cattle are not likely to bloat when grazing pastures of alfalfa or alcreation, we would solve this falfa and grass mixtures if the pastures are completely dry and animals are full of dry feed when they are turned in, and if stacks of dry feed are available in the pasture, according to W. L. Stangel, dean of Agriculture at Texas Technological College.

Dean Stangel suggested that cattlemen start initial grazing about noon on a sunny day and watch the animals for signs of bloat at first. Cattle may then be left on the pasture, but if they are taken off, the entire procedure must be repeated before grazing begins again.







Apparently through the CYT district there is a decided increase in the development of more new irrigation wells and this being true, many new farmers should give consideration to the quality of the water after it has been found in sufficient quantities. Recently an authority on irrigation offered the following comments: "It has come to the attention of those of us who have worked with the development of well irrigation are here in the South Plains that in some instances the water obtained is not suitable for irrigation For this reason all newly drilled wells should have a sample of water tested.

"The following is a short discussion as to the effects of water containing salts upon soil and plant growth.

The use of water of high salt content will cause land to alkali. thereby greatly cutting down crop

Water for irrigation in dry land arming areas should not contain, as a rule, more than 500 to 700 parts per million if the salts contained in the water are principally carbonates, bicarbonates or chlorides, with the higher concentrations permissible only with water containing principally chlorides. If an appreciable part of the water for plant growt his supplied by rain, higher concentrations are permissible.

If soils take water rapidly and have good drainage, 1750 parts per million of salts in irrigation water can be safely used in dry and farming areas if the carbonate salts are not present. Water applied to heavy texture soil that take moisture slowly should not contain fore than 1000 parts per million sodium sulphate being used successfully in sandy soils of good drainage. In irrigation water containing sulphate (gypsum) or calcium chlorides, higher concentration of all salts, particularly carbonate salts, are permissible Because of the flocculating action on soils or salts containing calcium, water for irrigation containing such salts is superior to that without them

If there is any doubt in the nind of the farmer who plans o irrigate from a newly developed well as to the quality of water encountered, a sample (1 qt. or 1-2 gallon sample placed in a fruit jar tightly sealed) should be sent to a laboratory for a chemical analysis report. Through the CYT Soil Conservation District program, headquarters in the P. O. Building at Brownfield, Texas, samples of water can be sent in for a test. Those who want water tested should furnish the following information: Completed depth of well, log or formation of drillin, Section and block number. It is believed that a farmer securing this information will help to protect the further production of his

How To Care For **Baby Chicks**

Farmers may help prevent respiratory diseases in baby chickens by lining brooder house walls up about 36 inches from the floor with heavy tar paper, according to Delbert Devin, assistant professor of animal husbandry at Texas Technological College. Paper will not only keep out drafts. but will also prevent chicks from piling up in corners if it is rounded there instead of being tacked tightly

A chick guard of 12-inch hardward cloth, commonly known as hail screen, should be kept around the hover for 36 hours after baby chicks arrive to keep them in The guard may gradually be moved back for about four days, when it should be no longer need-

Temperature under the hover should be 95 to 100 degrees during the first week, 90 to 95 degrees the second and gradually decreased until the end of the eighth week. Two or three inches of litter should be kept over the floor at all times, to be changed weekly for two or three weeks and twice weekly thereafter. Ground ning bundles or shredded corn stover are recommended for litters, but farmers should make sure no grain remains on the stalks be- rive All movable equipment fore they are ground.

When chicks are 24 to 36 hours old they should be fed a good chick starter, containing about 20 per cent protein and fortified with cod liver oil for vitamin D.
