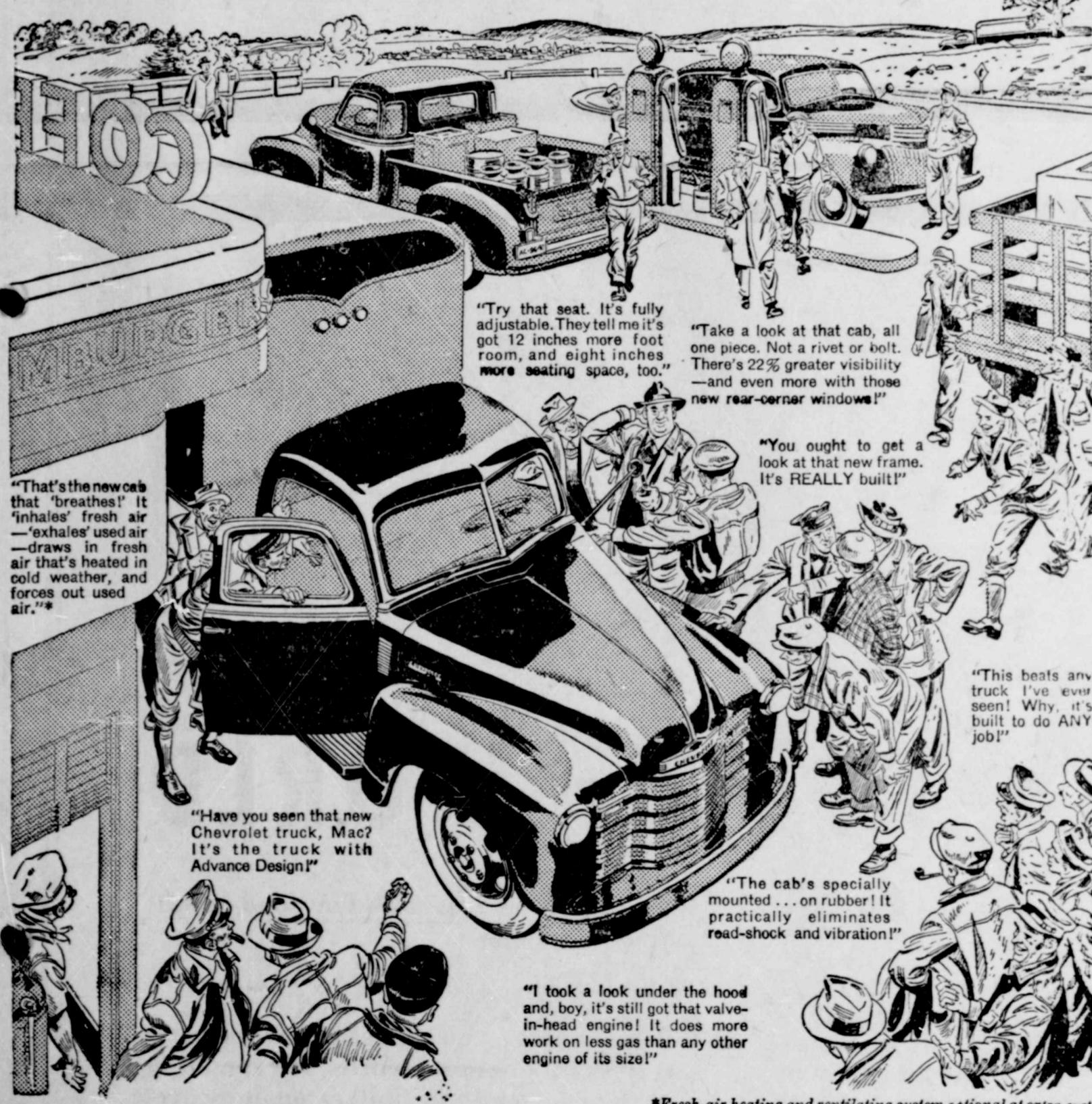

VETERAN'S NEWS

The Veterans Administration has announced a new plan for VA inspection of houses financed by GI Loans while the houses are still under construction.

VA will make a pre-construction appraisal of "reasonable value" based upon complete plans and specifications. A minimum of three inspections are required as work advances to assure adherence to the agreed standards. The plan is optionally available to builders, lenders and sponsors of such projects.

Builders and financing agencies thus may receive a definite commitment as to "reasonable value" in advance of construction, provided the homes are completed

The commitment will remain valid for a specified period—usually predicated on the probable time necessary to complete construction.

With the new plan, VA for the first time is assuming directly the function of assuring proper construction—from plans to completion—of houses built for sale to veterans with GI loan financing.

Inspections will not be required in connection with work supervised by the Federal Housing Administration.

VERBAL hubbub about just how much money the Republicans saved the country during the last session of congress is continuing, and probably will continue, with



a kind of happy frenzy, until the last vote is counted in November, 1948.

We have it now, on the Republicans' own authority, that they scraped a neat \$7,181,000,000 off the federal budget. It's just like finding the money, say they. That particular figure, incidentally, was quoted by Rep. Styles Bridges (Rep., N. H.), chairman of the senate appropriations committee.

Democrats, naturally, will scoff at that claim. Their assertion is that the Republican congress deliberately under-appropriated in order to make a good record.

But for the disinterested bystander (if he exists) there is a third point of view provided by the actual figures in the case. A summary of fund grants indicates that President Truman asked congress for \$38,291,000,000 during the 1947 session. He got \$35,127,000,000. Subtract one from the other and you get a difference of \$3,163,000,000. That falls about four billion dollars short of the Republican claim.

Do Something

More and more people are coming to feel that congress, like a dowdy woman, really should do something about itself. Congressional bumbling and inefficiency have nourished a strong sense of insecurity among Americans who want their governing body to be competent, swift, strong and efficient. They realize that national and international crises can move upon them with incredible swiftness, and have done so. Congress must be a strong bulwark, not an old fuddy-duddy.

Where Are the Irish?

Economy-minded householders still shudder when they think of how some 20 million bushels of potatoes were destroyed, left in the ground to rot in 1946, while another 60 million bushels were given to charitable institutions. At the same time, potatoes were priced higher than they had ever been before.

In line with that, a potato expert recently figured out that Americans today are not eating spuds like their parents did. In 1909, the per capita consumption of potatoes was 195 pounds. In 1946 it was only 126 pounds. But was this because of the high prices? Or in spite of them? Or are we learning to love caviar instead?

Full Employment

It isn't ordinarily the subject of talk among the most select Washington circles, but there are now approximately three million people on the federal civilian payroll. That compares with an original 500,000 in 1932. The Washington pioneers must have come from behind the plows, from the teeming cities, from all over this great land to take federal



jobs paying at least, oh, at least, \$3,100 a year.

What have they been doing to keep occupied? Maybe they establish bureaus for the establishment of bureaus. It's like someone's description of a Hollywood mansion—even bathrooms have bathrooms.

Tour for Votes

With the exception of junkets to Mexico, Canada and Brazil, all of which have paid off in international good will, President Truman has confined his traveling to non-stop trips between Washington and Missouri. That particular type of gadding does not bring home votes for the party, as some Democratic leaders recently have been trying to convince Mr. Truman. They want him to take a transcontinental train tour to get acquainted with the voters.

GI Question And Answer Department

Q. Is Veterans Administration doing anything to keep abreast of improvements in prosthetic equipment so that we veterans may get the benefit of them?

A. Veterans Administration employees who aid disabled veterans in selecting and fitting artificial arms, legs, eyes and other devices are going to school to learn the latest developments and improvements in the prosthetic field.

Q. I received an overpayment in subsistence allowance after I left school. Will I have to refund the amount I received to the Government?

A. Yes. Q. I am being rehabilitated under Public Law 16 and I would like to know what medical treatment is available to me?

A. Under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) you are entitled to any kind of medical treatment needed (hospital or out-patient) to prevent interruption of your training.

Q. How and where do I apply for hospitalization for a service-connected disability?

A. See your nearest Veterans Administration contact representative or apply at a VA regional office or hospital. A letter addressed to the nearest VA office will suffice. In case of emergency you can telephone the nearest VA office collect.

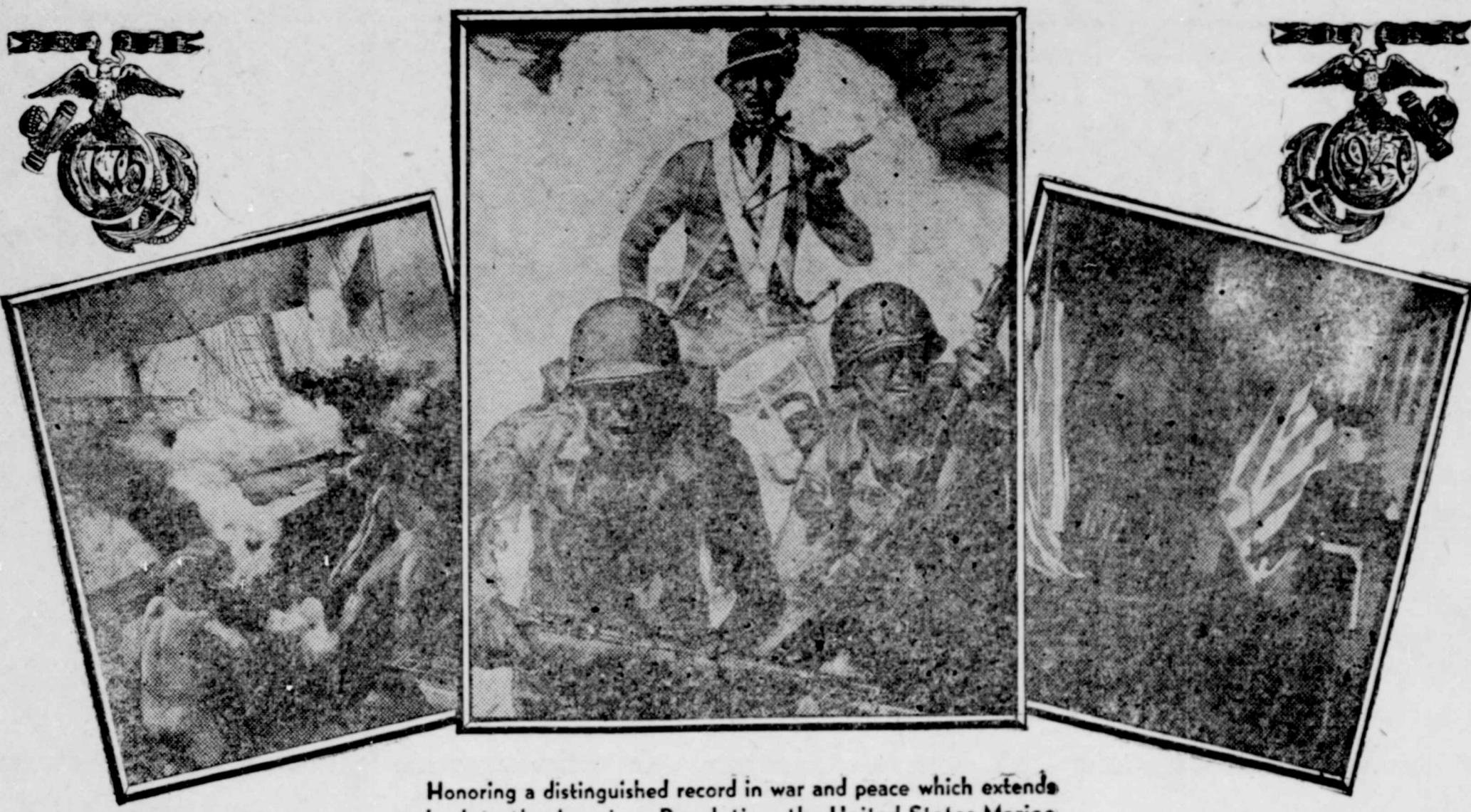

Native Plants Considered Best

A native of an area is usually considered harder than a newcomer because he is adapted to the climate and country.

The same principle holds true for shrubbery. Native shrubbery is generally dependable in growth where some imported stock may have to be pampered to get a good start.

Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist for Texas A and M College, says that fall months, before frost causes leaves to fall, is the time to hunt native shrubs. They can be marked for transplanting later or very tiny plants, a few inches high and taken with an unbroken ball of soil, can be transplanted into cans or cardboard boxes and never show that they've been moved.

Give transplanted native shrubbery the same surroundings they had where they were found growing. Some shrubs like half-shade, while others need full sun. Some thrive on thin soil, and others need deep rich soil.

Optional Transmission Offered by Pontiac

H. J. Klingler, general manager of Pontiac Motor division and vice president of General Motors, today officially revealed that the 1948 Pontiac will offer hydraulic transmission as optional equipment.

Mr. Klingler estimated that 50 per cent of Pontiac's 1948 production will be equipped with the automatic transmission. The 1948 Pontiac, it is believed, will be the lowest priced car in the industry to offer such a transmission. It will be available on both six and eight-cylinder Torpedo and Streamliner models, he said.

Mr. Klingler said that Pontiac plans on producing its first 1948 model soon after January 1 and that change-over schedules have been so arranged that it is likely the last 1947 model and the first 1948 will be produced the same day.

Forty-seven different models of personal and transport planes currently are in production by 29 American aircraft manufacturers.

Texas Still Has Greatest State Fair

Texans have something new to brag about now, as their State Fair of Texas set a new all-time high attendance record. When the gates swung shut Sunday midnight on the 62nd anniversary show, count showed that 1,763,921 persons had been to the Fair during its 16-day run.

This is 123,935 more visitors than attended the 1946 Fair which itself broke all previous records.

The new record upholds Texas' claim to having the world's biggest state fair. Biggest single day was the middle Sunday, Oct. 12, when 221,320 visitors swarmed over the 187-acre grounds and through the mammoth exhibit halls.

May Take Mechanical Courses in UT

Journeyman mechanics are eligible to enroll in a new technical course offered by the University of Texas Bureau of Business and Extension training.

The course is in the servicing and maintenance of automobile carburetors, and is available to any community desiring it. James R. D. Eddy, director said. At the present time the course is being given in Beaumont.

Courses in automobile tune-up and automotive electricity are now in progress in North Texas. They will be given in other towns requesting them.

CORPORATIONS CHARTERED AND BUSINESS FAILURES

Establishment of new businesses in Texas was still going full steam ahead during September, but at the same time the number of Texas businesses closing down remained at its August peak, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

In September 374 new corporation charters were issued compared to 247 in September last year, while Dun and Bradstreet reported that September failures equalled the high August total of 7. In September and August of last year, only 1 failure was registered each month.

Total for the year to date is 33 failures compared to 5 for the same period last year.
