Our grain sorghums are now Nobel prize winner has been selec- being utilized in many parts of the world.

India is our heaviest overseas consumer of grain sorghum, and the Indians pay cash for it and complain because they are not permitted to buy more. There is a quota system in operation which governs all our shipments of grain abroad. Recently we were successful in getting an increase in the grain sorghum quota for overseas shipment.

Exports of grain sorghum to India during the last 9 months approximate 10 million bushels. This includes March shipments which are now enroute.

I am told that the Indians grind the grain and cook it pancakefashion on top of the stove. In Germany the Germans eat their West Texas grain sorghum in the form of mush or gruel. In Japan the grain sorghum is milled and used as flour or is polished and used in the whole grain as a sub-

Last year the U.S. production of grain sorghum was 107 million bushels, Texas producing 68 million bushels of that amount.







G I Question And Answer Department Hickory Grove

Q. My son was killed in action during World War II and I would like to know if I am entitled to receive compensation?

A. You are entitled to compensation, provided dependency can be shown. Dependency will be held to exist if you do not have sufficient income to provide reasonable maintenance for yourself and your family.

Q. I am taking on-the-job training in a hazardous occupation under the G-I Bill. In case of accident, will Veterans Administration pay my hospital expenses with his calliope and stirring up at a local hospital?

Local counties have been enriched by two of the largest payments in history from government bureaus. As their 25 per cent share of receipts taken in by the forest service, 642 counties containing national forest land collected \$4,546,723. Another peak payment was the \$7,939,487 distributed by the bureau of land management to 22 states as their share of collections for grazing, mineral leasing, timber and petash fees on public lands.

'Small' Business Is Right

This reporter is interested in the small business of the Home Towns of the country so we have attempted to follow hearings of the senate and house special small business committees. They have had many hearings but what they have accomplished for the benefit of small business we are unable to report. Both committees have asked to be extended for the balance of this session. The senate committee, which got an original appropriation of \$50,-000 and another \$50,000 in July last year, has just received another \$15,-000 and has asked for \$50,000 more for the balance of this session. The house committee got \$65,000 at the first session and \$70,000 for this session. That adds up to \$300,000 of your money.

Senators Taft of Ohio, Brooks of Illinois and Jenner of Indiana comprise the trio at the heart of opposition to the Marshall plan. They would wreck it by making it into a European WPA. BENZENE HEXACHLORIDE Wayland To Have MANGE KILLER Temporary Science Building

The high school vocational agriculture boys have been treating their hogs for mange with benezene hexachloride. It has been proved that only one treatment is necessary, if the animals are dipped or sprayed when the mange begins to spread from the flanks. There is no relative comparison of this treatment and the use of oil to rid hogs of the mange mite, because of the sudden cure by the benzene hexa treatment. The treatment is as follows:

Use 1 pound of benzene hexachloride per 5 gallons of water. At close spraying this will treat approximately 20 head of hogs. Dusting the dry powder on the animals gives very successful results but they spray is even better and should be used when the weather is warm.
