After several years experimenting the culture of the grape be came a success, and this year it is reported that the grape crop of California will yield thirty-eight millions gallons of wine, and half a million gallons of thrandy. Texas is naturally a bester grape country than California. The people of California have not stopped at grapes, but have gone into planting mulberry trees and raising silk, and already a silk factory is in operation near San Francisco. They also raise flax, and are trying the castor bean. All kinds of druit are raised in California, though it has a long, dry, parching, rainless summer to contend with. The wine interest in California is fast overshadowing the gold yield, and the success obtained in California, where tradition had placed the seal of barrenness on all the land outside of the irrigating ditches of the old missions, should serve as a lesson to the people of Teras. Our farmers seem persistent in cultivating nothing but corn and cotton. We would not say cease to cultivate these two staples, but we would advise the plan of raising the small grains, putting in vincyards, and try a hundred things, which will yield far more certain crops than corn and cotton. It takes as extraordinary wet season to make corn during our summer menths; in such a season everybody makes corn, and its market value goes down be low paying figures. If the season fails to be continually wet, everybody fails and corn is very high, and the whole agricultural effort of the country is wasted.

The importance of diversifying our agricultural products is every day becoming more apparent. In speaking of this subject the Houston Telegraph says:

Wholessie dealers in liquors whose annual sales do not exceed fifty thousand dollars shall pay one hundred dollars, and if exceeding fifty thousand dollars, for every additional one thousand dollars, for every additional one thousand dollars in excess of fifty thousand dollars, they shall pay one dollar, and such excess shall be assessed and paid in the same manner as required of wholessie dealers. Every person who shall sell or offer for sale any distilled spirits, fermented liquors, or wince of any kind in quantities of more than three gallons at one time to the same purchaser, or whose annual sales, including sales of other merchandise, shall exceed twenty-five thousand dollars, shall be regarded as a wholesale dealer in fiquors.

Every person, firm, or corporation, who distils or manufactures spirits, or who brews or makes mash, wort, or wash for distillation or the production of spirits, shall be deemed a distiller; Provided, That distillers of apples, games, or sea ches, distilling or manufacturing fifty and less than one hundred and fifty barrels per year from the same, shall pay fifty dollars; and those distilling or manufacturing less than fifty barrels per year from the same, shall pay tweety dellars; And provide fursier, That no tax shall be imposed for any still, stills, or other apparatus used by druggists and chemists for the recover; of alcohol for pharmaccutical and chemical or estentible purposes which has been used in those processes.

Sevention. Brewers shall pay one hundred dollars. Every person, firm, or corporation who manufactures fermented liquors of any name or description, for sale, from malt, wholly or in part, or from any substitute therefor, shall be desmed a brewer: Pyorided, That any person, firm, or corporation, who manufactures less than five hundred barrels, per year, shall pay the sum of fifty dollars.

Eighteen. Rectifiers who shall rectify any quantity of spirituous liquors, not exceeding five hundred barrels, package, or cask, or any fractional part thereof. Every person, firm, or croporation, who macufactures less, or casks, or refines distilled apirits or wines by any process, or who, by mixing distilled spirits or wine with any materials, menufactures any spurious, imitation, or osmpound liquors for sele, under the name of whisky, brandy, gin, rum, wine, "spirits," or "wine bitters," or any other name, shall be regarded as a rectifier.

Whenever, by a proclamation which was issued on the 15th day of April, 1861, the Fremident of the United States amounced and declared that the lawn of the United States had been for rome fime past, and then were, opposed, and the execution therefore the continued, by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, or by the powers vested in the marshals by law;

And whereas the congress of the United March, 1863, didenset that during the said rebellion the President of the United States, whenever in his judgment the public asfety may require it, is authorized to suspend the

may require it, is authorized to suspend the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus in any case throughout the United States, or in any part-thereof;
And whereas the said insurrection and rebellion still continue, endangering the existence of the constitution and government of the United States;
And whereas the military forces of the United States are now actively engaged in suppressing the said insurrection and rebellion in various parts of the states where the said rebellion has been successful in obstructing the laws and public authorities, especially in the States of Virginia and Georgia;
