A YOUNG HERO.

He Kills Six Ocyennes and Escapes With a Scalp. From the Leavenworth Commercial, Aug. 15]

Some four or five weeks ago, one of the grading parties in advance of the railroad, had with them a young man of about eighteen years, named George Wait. His business was to break the prairie ground with a plough, for the graders along the line. One morning, as he was out about two and a half miles as he was out about two and a half miles from the camp, 21 miles beyond Ellsworth, mounted on a mule, he discovered a party of about thirty Indians dash out of the timber, on the Smoky Hill, and make towards him and another man, who was on foot, about a quarter of a mile nearer camp than he was. He started to go towards camp, but the Indians discovered his intention, and, by the superior fleetness of their ponies, cut him off. Young Wair new saw them divide into two parties—one party going him off. Young Wait new saw them divide into two parties—one party going towards his comrade and the other towards him. He attempted to make the timber on the Smoky Hill, but the Indians were too rapid in their morements for him. He had two navy revolvers, and resolved that the redshins should pay for their scalp if they got it, and at a fair price, too. Soon they came near, circling around him with savage yells, and began shooting at him.

The Indians seemed to be well armed with pistols and lances, very few having

with pistols and lances, very few having bows and arrows.

Wait returned the fire, and he says that several times they came so near that the lances nearly touched him. Indian after Indian fell before the unerring aim of Wait's six-shooters, and the assaulting party was getting smaller very rapidly; the dead Indians being carried away by the survivors according to Indian custom. the survivors according to Indian euitom. Soon he heard the shouts of approaching comrades, and the Indians made a final dash to kill the brave boy, who, maimed already with a builet in his leg, still atuck to his mule. One young warrior came up until the muzzle of his pistol nearly touched that of the boy, and both fired—the Indian falling from his horse with a mortal wound, while the hero of the fight only got a revolver ball in his the fight only got a revolver ball in his side. In a few moments more the rescuing party came up, consisting of half a dozen negro soldiers and some railroad employees, when the Indians suddenly retreated. Wait still had strength to dismount and take the pistols and scalp-lock of the "last of the Cheyesnes," which last he now bears as a frophy of his fight.

GOING ON IN THE QLD WAY.—At the recent commencement of the Georgia State University at Athens, one of the raduates delivered an address on the "Vital Principles of Nations," the senti-ments of which were evidently drawn from the same sources of inspiration as the recent letters of that thoroughly un-reconstructed ex-senator Ben. The Hopfen Zeitung (Hop Gazette) of Nuremberg gives some curious statistica respecting the consumption of beer in Europe. The average quantity consumed by each person in the year 1866 was 27 quarts, but it differs greatly in the various countries. In Bavaria the average is 134 quarts; in England, 113; in Wurtemberg, 104; in Belgium, 80; in Brunswick, 68; in Thuringia, 60; in Saxony, 39; in Holland, 39; in Baden, 81; in Austria, 22; in Switzerland, 20; in Prussia, 106; in France, 15; in Sweden, 11.5; in Spain, 2; in Russia, 1.3; in Italy, 1; and in Portugal, 0.8. Of the capitals of Europe Munich relatively consumes the most beer, the average drunk by each of sits inhabitants being 427 quarts a year. ANOTHER AMNESTY.

A telegram dated the 3d inst. says: "The President's amnesty is lefore the Cabinet this morning. The President hoped last night it would be disposed of to day. The proclamation will be based upon that of March 1862, issued by Johnson while Provisional Gov. ernor of Tennessee, which was approved by Lincoln and Congress. That procla-mation said in effect, while conscious that treason may be punished, no vin-dictive or retaliative measures will be dopted, but a general amnesty for all past acts and expressions, will be grant-ed to the people on the single condition that they yield themselves citizens under the majority of the law. He appealed to all erring and misguided people to re-turn to their allegiance, and avail themselves of this amnesty.

What can this mean? Is Johnson preparing to recognize the South as it stands, without reconstruction? Is he determined on overturning the whole Congressional plan? It looks like it; no other use for an amnesty could be sug-

CITY FINANCES.

We find the following in the San Antonio Herald, the city organ, intended we suppose, as a report of our city fi-

The first item is \$5,202 10 "issued to pay debts contracted under the administration of D. Cleveland ;" also further down, 1,450 00 "contracted under D. Cleveland's administration." This is meant to lead people to believe that the Cleveland administration left the city in debt the sum of \$6,650 10. From the best information we have we learn that every dollar's indebtedness contracted by the Cleveland administration was paid up to the hour of Cleveland going out of office, and \$1,000 left in the treasury. These sums above stated may be for work commenced or contracted for which have been carried out by the present administration and belong to the present administration.

The second item is \$75,856 60, "issued to pay expenses incurred since August 25th, 1866." Add to this another item, to pay the expenses during said time, 83,084 70, making of November, 1855, has been abro-\$81,941 30, "issued to pay expenses incurred since August 25th, 1866." Add to this the amounts claimed to have been paid on Cleveland's account, and we have an expenditure of \$88,893 40.

Now who got this money? Where are the items? It is little antisfaction for our people to look in vain for a valuable public improvement and learn that ed \$88,598 40 has been expended by the

What a magnificent report to make of a year's administration of the city!

Now just let us glance at the Cleveland administration. In the same length of time they paid a debt of \$20,000, made more permanent improvements than any former administration, left a eity serip at par. THE TREATMENT OF REBEL PRISONERS.

A Rock Island (Ill.) paper publishes the following:

"The official record of the rebel prison on the island of Rack Island, as kept by the Commissary of Prisoners—a copy of which, and the only one that was taken from the original, and is now in the possession of C. B. Knox, of this city shows that out of fifteen thousand prisoners kept on the island only eight died of scurvey. This is a much smaller proportionate number of deaths from the disease than occurred in the federal army, even in time of actual service. No prison was ever neater kept, or sanitary rules and regulations more strictly en-forced, than at the Rock Island barracks. The rebel generals had but little feeling for the welfare of their men. They were only poorly fed, poorly clothed and overworked while in the service, and it was not until they fell into the hands of the federals as prisoners of war that they received full rations. This we learned from the lips of those who had been prisoners themselves, and with whom we afterward became intimately acquainted. To charge cruelty in the management of the Rock Island prison, in order to draw attention from the investigation about to be made in the treatment of federal prisoners in southern prisons, and thereby apparently lessen the enormity of the guilt that attached to those in command there, at the time when men were absoitely starved to death, shows a want of the commonest humanity."

FENIAN ADVENTURE .- The New York Times publishees a "curious and romantic, but true paration" of the adventures of a party of Fenians who fitted up a vessel and sailed in April last from New York for Ireland, from which they returned a short time age. There were three hundred and fifty of these bold adventurers, all picked men, thoroughly armed, and well supplied with warlike stores. They got to the Irish coast in stores. safety, touching at different points, and landed an armed force at the most prom-ising locality. But nobody gathered round them, or knew anything of them or their project, or cared anything at all about them. And so, after a series of mishaps, and daring attempts, in which a number of them were captured, the bark Plato has returned to New York bearing a body of men who have suffered hardships that they are not willing to repeat.

[OFFICIAL.] PROCLAMATION.

By the President of the United States

Whereas, by the act approved July 4, 1864, entitled "An act further to regulate and provide for the enrolling and calling out the satienal forces, and for other purposes." It is provided that the President of the United States may, "at his discretion, at any time hereafter, call for any number of men, as volunteers, for the respective terms of one, two, and three years, for military serving," and "that in case the quota, or any part thereof, of any town, township, ward of a city, precinct, or election district, or of a county not so subdivided, shall not be filed within the space of fifty days after such call, then the President shall immediately order a draft for one year to fill such quota, or any a draft for one year to fill such quota, or any past thereof, which may be unfilled;"

And whereas the new enrolmentheretofore ordered is so far completed as that the aforementioned act of congress may now be put in operation, for recruiting and keeping up the strength of the armies in the field, for garrisons, and such military operations as may be required for the purpose of suppres-sing the rebellion and restoring the authori-ty of the United States government in the

ty of the United States government insurgent states:

New, therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, do issue this my call for five hundred thousand volunteers for the military service: provided, nevertheless that this call shall be reduced by all credits which may be established under section 8 of the aforesaid act, on account of persons who have entered the naval service during the present rebellion, and by oredits for men furnished to the military service in excess of calls heretofore made. Volunteers will be

suraished to the military service in excess of calls hereiofore made. Volunteers will be accepted under this call for one, two, or three years, as they may elect, and will be entitled to the boun'y previded by the law for the period of service for which they enlist.

And I hereby proclaim, order, and direct, that immediately after the fifth day of September, 1864, being fifty days from the date of this call, a deaft for troops to serve for one year shall be had in every town, township, ward of a city, precinct, or election district, or county not so subdivided, to fill the queta which shall be assigned to it under this call, or any part thereof which may be unfilled by volunteers on the raid fifth day unfilled by volunteers on the said fifth day

of September, 1864.
