Our Future and the Election for Members of Congress.

A lew days ago we published the law redistricting the State into con gressional districts. Instead of the former four districts we have now six, each of which will elect a member of Congress. Our district reaches from the Rio Grande to the Guadalupe, taking in the counties of Blanco, Caldwell, Gillespie, El Paso, Guadalupe, Hays, Kerr, Pecos, Presidio, Jackson and Calhoun, east of the Guadalupe. The election willtake place this fall.

We congratulate the citizens of Western Texas for being cut loose from Austin. The old ring will now have enough work on hand to carry its own district and let us alone. Since Hon. Degener vacated his seat in Congress, Western Texas has had no representatives at all as Parties are out in search of the murderers is evinced by the total neglect of our main harbor, our celebrated depot business and other matters of equal importance

The Indianola Bulletin of May 14th starts a leader, entitled "Our position and inactivity", with the following well-founded complaint:

"Matagorda bay possesses one of the best harbors on the Gulf of Mexico, with an entrance that is susceptible of being improved so as to admit the largest class of ocean steamers. But, owing to circumstances, caused by the want of proper energy on the part of the citizens of Western Texas, the bay remains useless as a harbor for the exports and imports of a section of country that is imperial in the extent of its territory, fertile and pro-ductive beyond all comparison in the richness of its soils, and possessing mineral wealth that is known to be inexhaustable. Yet Western Texas remains this day comparativels a wilderness, without populaent entirely on extraneous influences, not possessing sufficient energy among her people to arouse them to a sense of the splendid advantages they possess over all other portions of the South."

This is plain truth. The people of Western Texas alone are responsible for the present state of things. When Hancock became a candidate for the Western district, we opposed his election not so much on account of his policy, for Hancock Marine. was not a democrat in the party sense, and he was a Union man besides, but because be was a member of the Austin ring, because all Austin and because Austin was deopment. But party hatred run away with common sense at that time, and we have now to suffer the consequences of our loolish action.





San Antonio now has the prospect of being reached by two railroads in a com-paratively short space of time. The Gal vesten, Harrisburg and |San Antonio rail road has been completed to Platonis, thirty-six miles west of Columbus, and we lears that the grading has been pushed forward to the San Marcus, forty miles from this city. The road is to reach here some time next fall or winter. The Intersome time next fall or winter. The International railroad, having compromised with the Legiclature as to the subsidy bonds, thus securing \$3,700,000, can now go forward. In addition, the company was a few days since awarded the Government transportation of army supplies, to begin in August next; and this makes it a matter of interest to them to peak the railread forward as rapidly as possible, in order to save the expense of wagon transportation. San Antonio is already showing the signs of the quickening effect of these promising railroad prospects.

The Civil War in Arkansas.

The latest dispatches inform us that the contest for the Governorship of Arkansas is about to reach a definite crisis. Baxter and Brooks were candidates for Governor in the fall of 1872; Baxter for Grant and Brooks for Greeley. The Legislature opened and counted the vote, and declared Baxter elected. Brooks contested the election before the Supreme Court, but the court disclaimed any jurisdiction of the case in any State court. Bax ter took his seat, and has been Governor for more than a year. As we understand the history of the matter, Brooks had also applied to the judge of the District Court at Little Rock, the Capital, for a writ to put him in possession of the office. But no action had been taken in the matter from the first, and it had ceased to be thought of. Indeed, the disclaimer of jurisdiction by the Surreme Court had legally precluded a decission by an interior court. But Brooks, by collusion with the District Judge, recently procured a so called decision in his favor, early in the morning, when but few persons were present, and Baxter's counsel not on hand, and in a few minutes the sheriff, conveniently prepared for the job, went with a posse to the Executive Chamber, took Gov. Baxter by surprise, put him out by force, and Brooks took armed possession both of the office and the State House.

Then military operations began, skirmishes and combats followed, and a bloody and decisive battle would have been fought some time since but for the active intervention of the Federal troops, under Col. Rose, stationed at that place. A majority of the best citizens of the State, without regard to party. support Gov. Baxter. Nearly all the officers of the late Contederate army have come to his help, and arrayed themselves under his standard. Gen. Fagan is the only prominent ex-Confederate officer whose name we have noticed as taking an active part on the Brooks side. Gen. Churchhill, who gained distinction at the battle of Richmond, manded the Texas and Arkansas State. chief of the Baxter forces.
