**Missouri Bandits.**  
 WHEREABOUTS AND DOINGS OF  
 THE REDOUBTABLE JAMES BOYS.  
 DENIAL OF THEIR PARTICIPATION  
 IN THE LEXINGTON EXPLOIT.

BROWNSVILLE, MO., September  
 8.—Mr. Robert James, a cousin of  
 Frank James and Jesse James, the  
 notorious bandits, resides in Elm-  
 wood township, ten miles from the  
 county seat of this county, and was  
 in Brownsville to day, and was in-  
 troduced to me by Mr. Buckner, of  
 the firm of Brown & Buckner, who  
 vouched for his veracity and good  
 citizenship. Other men of stan-  
 dard here inform me that Mr. Robert  
 James stands high with all classes  
 in this county.  
 Mr. James informs me that the  
 whole story of the robbery of the  
 omnibus passengers at North Lex-  
 ington, by the James boys and  
 William Junger, is all a canard;  
 that Frank James came to his house  
 on the Friday previous to the rob-  
 bery, and remained until the Wed-  
 nesday following that affair, and  
 that he did not leave the immediate  
 neighborhood of the house during  
 that time; that he (Robert) will  
 swear that at the time of the Lex-  
 ington affair Frank James was at  
 his house, thirty-five miles distant  
 from Lexington, and that he can  
 prove this fact by several of his  
 neighbors. That Frank James was  
 never wounded so as to require  
 nursing, and that he says he never  
 saw Miss Hammett but once, and  
 then only for a few minutes and in  
 a crowd. That there is no such  
 person as William Younger, and  
 never has been. This seems to dis-  
 pose of Miss Hammett's statement—  
 or rather of the newspaper story  
 that Miss Hammett stated at the time  
 of the robbery that she recognized  
 Frank James, whom she had nursed,  
 as one of the robbers, and William  
 Younger as another.  
 Frank James declared that Jesse  
 James married last spring, and im-  
 mediately left the country. That  
 he is anxious to return and give  
 himself up for the purpose of stand-  
 ing his trial on any of the several  
 offenses charged against him. That  
 Frank is also anxious to have a  
 chance to prove that he was not at  
 Lexington at the time of the robbery,  
 and also that he was not within 200  
 miles of God's Hill at the time of  
 the robbery there.

**How to Manage a Fractious  
 Horse.**  
 A beautiful and high spirited  
 horse would never allow a shoe to  
 be put on his feet or any person to  
 handle his feet. In an attempt to  
 shoe such a horse recently he resist-  
 ed all efforts, he kicked aside every-  
 thing but an anvil and came near  
 killing himself against that, and  
 finally was brought back to his  
 stable unshod. This defect was  
 just on the eve of consigning him  
 to the plow, where he might walk  
 bare foot when an officer in our  
 service, lately returned from Mex-  
 ico, took a cord about the size of a  
 bed-cord, put it in the mouth of the  
 horse like a bit, and tied it tightly  
 on the animal's head, passing his  
 left ear under the string, not pain-  
 fully tight, but tight enough to keep  
 the ear down and the cord in place.  
 This done, he patted the horse  
 gently and bade him follow; and  
 instantly the horse obeyed, perfect-  
 ly subdued and as gentle and obedi-  
 ent as a dog, suffering his feet to  
 be litted with entire impunity, and  
 acting in all respects like an old  
 stager. The gentleman who thus  
 furnished this exceedingly simple  
 means of subduing a very danger-  
 ous propensity intimated that it is  
 practised in Mexico and South  
 America in the management of wild  
 horses.—Live Stock Journal.

**A Vessel Attacked by a Whale.**  
 The following is the copy of a re-  
 port made by the bark Minstrel  
 King, official To. 65, 539, of Swa-  
 sea: "May 10, 1874, latitude 54 de-  
 grees south, longitude 85 degrees  
 west. Strong breeze and fine weath-  
 er, ship going seven and a half  
 knots through the water. From  
 2:15 a. m. to 6 a. m. a large sperm  
 whale chased the ship, and struck  
 her several times, and when under  
 the ship's bottom raised the after  
 end of the ship from 12 to 18 inches  
 out of the water. Started steering  
 gear, and knocked two men from  
 the wheels, although we had two  
 tackles on, with two men at each  
 tackle. We then got the ship's  
 bell, foghorn and tin drums, which

made a tremendous sound, which I  
 consider caused the whale to leave  
 the ship. When alongside, I con-  
 sidered the whale to be from 130 to  
 140 feet long, as the fall was strik-  
 ing the quarter of the ship and the  
 head square with the stem, all  
 hands on deck expecting the rubber  
 to be unshipped and stern-post  
 started. Happy to say, no damage  
 was done outside the ship. The  
 whale along side extended from the  
 after bumpkin to before the cathead;  
 length of ship, 150 feet." This state-  
 ment is signed by George Jameson,  
 master; and all the officers who  
 were on board.

"ALL quiet in New Orleans," says the dispatches. It is the quiet that spreads like a pall over the house of mourning.

POOR SLEICHER, his nomination awakes no enthusiasm,—he finds a more friendly greeting among his old personal friends who are Republicans, than he does from the Democrats, who regard him as the man they do not want.

HAD old Morgan died and been gathered peacefully to his fathers, and New Orleans built her railroad to Texas, we would not be compelled to-day to chronicle the sickening details of mobviolence happening in its streets.

THE acceptance of the nomination for Congress by the Hon. Judge Galvan, tendered him by the Republican Convention held in this city on the 9th and 10th instants, will be found in this issue of the EXPRESS. It needs no comment at present. Our pride in its tone, and to the certainty of his election, will be expressed hereafter.

This real estate notice will be applicable when Coke is dethroned, and we are represented in Congress by a Republican. At present our deserted school houses, and Cokery, chills the hearts of all who would like to seek homes among us.

THE epithet "carpet-bagger" has become obsolete, in fact, and while it may figure somewhat in the fancy of Democratic politicians and may serve as a text for "White League" dispatches, no such animal as a "carpet-bagger" exists to-day. It was the bog-boo that was used to scare timid old ladies with '67, and thereabouts; since then the "Carpet-bagger" has become a naturalized citizen even if he came from over the water. The stranger who comes to-day is no longer called a "Carpet-bagger,"—he is an immigrant, always an interesting object of solicitude to our real estate agents.

## Letter from the State Capital AUSTIN, Sept. 14, 1874.

Editor San Antonio Express:  
Being a regular reader of your journal, I write to not only express my approval of its conservative, comprehensive tone, but also to assure you that its course meets general approbation among Republicans here, and I believe elsewhere throughout the State. Had the polite tone and wisdom which characterizes your paper at the present time prevailed in the Republican party of Texas from the beginning of Gov. Davis' administration, then the loyal sentiment of the State would not be to-day without organization and without hope. But perhaps it is best for all Republicans who care nothing for office and had the good of the State at heart that the Democracy of this State succeeded by such a sweeping and overwhelming majority last year, though it seems hard that a little party which had cost as all so much trouble to build up should have been allowed, by bad management, incompetency and selfish, vanishing ambition to so ingloriously fall to pieces. It was natural, however, that a party, composed almost entirely of comparatively young and inexperienced leaders should make serious and frequent mistakes, especially when they

had a very large ignorant voting element to satisfy, and a large proportion of the old Union men of the Hamilton-Pease stripe alienated from them. Had the doors of the party been thrown wide open immediately after the inauguration of Gov. Davis, and the "bloody chasm" in the party effectually bridged, the Republicans of Texas would not to-day be one grand, incongruous, demoralized, muddled up mass. But let us philosophize a little—let us take the party at its real beginning in Texas as we find it. Being, as I indicate above, deficient in its administrative ability, and its rank and file being generally illiterate and poor, an early and a total route was to be expected, and this being the true make-up and condition of the Republican party of Texas, I assume that its defeat last year was not a calamity, either to it or the State. What all true Republicans in this State most desired was the establishment of Republican principles in the country, and an improved public sentiment. The former we certainly achieved, while considerable headway was made towards the latter. There is now no one opposing the right of the blacks to vote, and Democrats at last are glad of an opportunity to get their votes, and in many places will condescend to walk up to a counter and take a drink with Sambo on election days; while there is a spirit of toleration and respect shown to Republicans all over Texas that did not exist four years ago. And I believe this spirit is growing as rapidly since Gov. Coke's inauguration as it did for a year previous. Whatever will contribute to the doing away with the old sectional prejudices, and stimulate an improvement in a liberal and improved public sentiment should be cheerfully acquiesced in. The success of a party fighting without principle against fate amounts to nothing. Having no real principles, occupying a false position, and being utterly unable to carry out the promises of brazen office-seekers, it cannot long maintain itself in authority. A party to maintain itself in power must represent living, vital principles, and as the Democratic party has abandoned the platform it has stood on in the past, I contend that it will take still more "new departures," experimentally. And whenever it does, a point is gained by the Republicans, who, being in a woeful minority, and having doubtful and difficult material upon which to build a party, should hail that departure with delight, not as a hope of getting into power themselves, but with the hope of the breaking up of old party alliances and associations, and a change and improvement in the public sentiment of the State. But I must not write too much at once, for I know you are crowded for space. I will only add that there is a general disposition on the part of Republicans to run a candidate for Congress in this district. While Hancock is not acceptable to Republicans, still he is not odious with Union men. There is talk of a granger candidate being brought out against him, a man of more notoriety and popularity, on a Democratic record; and it is believed by many that should he come out, Hancock would lose the Republican vote and a portion of the Democratic vote, which would probably be the means of his defeat. **ELECTION FOR A FRENCH ASSEMBLY MAN.**

PARIS, Sept. 14.—Partial returns have been received from the election for a member of the assembly in Department Main et Loire. So far as canvassed the vote stands thus: Comte de Maille, Republican, 3,600; M. Bruas, Government candidate, supporting the septennate, 22,000; M. Boiger, Bonapartist, 19,000. The above includes returns from all important towns of the Department. It is probable that the election will result in no choice, and another will have to be held. Comte de Maille is the present member for Main et Loire.

**GRANT IN WASHINGTON.**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—A large number of persons called on the President, including the heads of departments, after dinner to-day. He leaves for Long Branch and returns permanently about the 24th.

**THE NEW AUSTRIAN MINISTER.**

The President received Baron Schwartz Saborin, Minister from Austria. He succeeds Baron L. Iderer.

**YELLOW FEVER DEATHS AT PENSACOLA.**

The Navy Department to-day received information of the death, from yellow fever, of Mr. Chandler, Superintendent of Improvements at the Pensacola navy-yard, and wife on Saturday.

**AUSTRIAN AND GERMAN MINISTERS PRESENT THEIR CREDENTIALS TO PRESIDENT SERRANO.**

MADRID, Sept. 14.—The German and Austrian ministers were received by President Serrano yesterday with great ceremony and presented their credentials simultaneously. In accordance with instructions from their governments, M. Holsteifeld, the German Minister, said Emperor William, in recognizing the executive power of Spain was moved by a desire to contribute to the restoration of peace in that country, and hoped that President Serrano would succeed in maintaining order by conservative measures. President Serrano replied that his Government would fulfill the expectations of Europe and act with energy to prevent civilization from being again undermined. Speeches of similar import were exchanged between the President and the Austrian Minister.

President Grant and Generals Sherman and Sheridan are expected to visit this city next Thursday to attend the Exposition, and will then go to Columbus to be present at a meeting of the Army of the Cumberland.

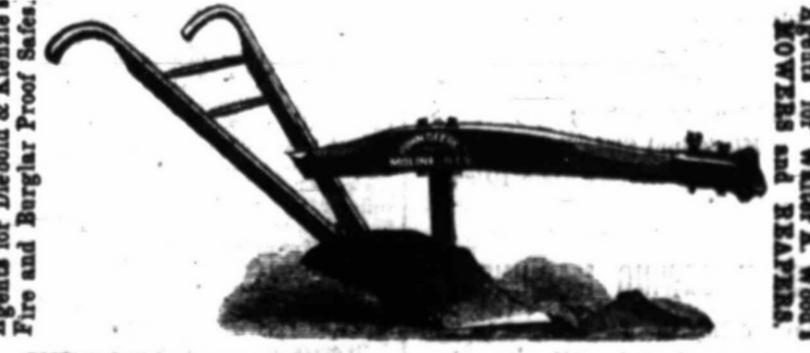

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]  
AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.  
(Continued.)

**MIAMI AND INDIANA.**  
For interests on two hundred and twenty-one thousand two hundred and fifty-seven dollars and eighty-six cents, invested at five per centum, per Senate amendments to fourth article treaty of June fifth eighteen hundred and fifty-four, eleven thousand and sixty-two dollars and eighty-nine cents.

**MOLES.**  
For pay of teachers and manual-labor schools, for all necessary materials therefor, and for the subsistence of the pupils, per fourth article treaty of December twenty-first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three thousand dollars.

**MIXED SHOSHONES, BANNAKS, AND SHEEP EATERS.**  
For this amount, to be expended under the direction of the President, in assisting these Indians to move to and locate on the Fort Hall reservation, in Idaho Territory, and to aid them in educational and agricultural pursuits on said reservation, twenty thousand dollars.

**NAVAJOES.**  
For sixth of ten instalments, of such articles of clothing, or raw material in lieu thereof, for nine thousand one hundred and forty-one Navajo Indians, not exceeding five dollars per Indian, as per article treaty of June first, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, forty five thousand seven hundred and five dollars.

For fifth of ten instalments, to be used by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs in the purchase of such articles as, from time to time, their condition and necessities may indicate to be proper, the sum of ten dollars for each Indian who engages in farming or mechanical pursuits, (estimated to be three thousand and forty-seven persons,) thirty thousand four hundred and seventy dollars.

For pay of two teachers, one thousand five hundred dollars.

For transportation of goods, three thousand dollars.

**NEZ PERCE INDIANS.**  
For last of five instalments, of third series, for beneficial objects, at the discretion of the President, as per fourth article treaty of June first eighteen hundred and fifty-five, six thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the support of an agricultural and industrial school, keeping in repair the buildings, and providing suitable furniture, books, and stationery, per fifth article treaty of June eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the employment of one superintendent of teaching and two teachers, per fifth article treaty of June eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, two thousand seven hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the employment of two farmers, two millers, two blacksmiths, one tinner, one gunsmith, one carpenter, and one wagon and plow maker, per fifth article treaty of June eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, seven thousand four hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for pay of a physician, per fifth article treaty of June eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair the buildings for the various employees and for providing the necessary furniture therefor, per fifth article treaty of June eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the salary of such persons as the tribe may select to be their head chief per fifth article treaty of June eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For salary of two subordinate chiefs, as per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, one thousand dollars.

For sixth of sixteenth instalments, for boarding and clothing the children who shall attend the schools, providing the schools and boarding-houses with necessary furniture, the purchase of necessary wagons, teams, agricultural implements, tools, and so forth, and for fencing of such lands as may be needed for gardening and farming purposes for the schools, three thousand dollars.

For salaries of two matrons to take charge of the boarding schools, two assistant teachers, one farmer, one carpenter, and two millers, four thousand five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair the hospital, and providing the necessary medicines, and the furniture thereof, three hundred dollars.

For repair of houses, mills, and tools, and necessary materials, one thousand dollars.

**NISSAQUALI, PUYALLUP, AND OTHER TRIBES AND BANDS OF INDIANS.**  
For last of twenty instalments, in part payment for relinquishment of title to lands, to be applied to beneficial objects, per fourth article treaty of December twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, one thousand dollars.

For last of twenty instalments, for pay of instructors, smith, carpenter, farmer, and physician, (who shall furnish medicine for the sick) per tenth article treaty of December twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, six thousand seven hundred dollars.

For the last of twenty instalments, for the support of an agricultural and industrial school, and support of smith and carpenter shop, and providing the necessary tools therefor, in conformity with the tenth article treaty of December, twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, one thousand five hundred dollars.

**NORTHERN CHEYENNES AND ARAPAHOES.**  
For sixth of thirty instalments, for purchase of clothing as per sixth article treaty of May tenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, twelve thousand dollars.

For sixth of ten instalments, to be expended by the Secretary of the Interior, one dollar for each Indian residing in the purchase of such articles as, from time to time, the condition and necessities of the Indians may indicate to be proper, as per same treaty, eighteen thousand dollars.

For pay of physician, teacher, carpenter, miller, farmer, blacksmith, and engineer, per seventh article treaty of May tenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, six thousand seven hundred dollars.

For last of four instalments, to furnish

said Indians with flour and meat, per sixth article of treaty of May tenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, forty five thousand dollars.
