PORTLAND, ME, Sept. 15 .- One hundred and ten towns give Dingley, 21,516; Titcomb, 16,347. Last year Dingley got 18,928; Titcomb, 12,625, and Williams, temperance candidate, 975. The election secures a Republican United States Senator.

LITTLE ROCK, Sept. 9 .- The Dem: ocratic State convention effected an organization last night, Resolutions were adopted approving of the new constitution recently framed; calling upon all 'order loving citizens to favor it at the coming election, believing that if enforced it will restore peace, harmony and protection to all citizens, and pledging unabated exertions to secure its adoption.

In balloting for a candidate for Governor Elisha Baxter, received fifty-one votés. There were eleven scattering. Gov. Baxter was then declared nominated, and a committee was appointed to notity him. PRESIDENT GRANT ISSUES HIS PROCLAMA-TION-THE KELLOGG OPPONENTS ORDER. ED TO DISPERSE WITHIN FIVE DAYS.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15 .- The President has just issued the following proclamation: Whereas, it has been satisfactorily repderly persons have combined together with force and arms to overthrow the State Government of Louisiana and to resist the laws and constituted authorities

And whereas, it is provided in the Constitution of the United States, that the United States shall protect every State in this Union on application of the Legislature, or the Executive when the Legislature cannot be convened, against domestic iolence :

And, whereas, it is provided in the laws of the United States that in all cases of insurrection in any State, or of obstruction to the laws thereof, it shall be lawful for the President of the United States, on application of the Legislature of such State, or of the Executive, when the Legislature cannot be convened, to call forth the militia of any other State or States, or to employ such part of the land and naval forces as shall be judged necessary for the purpose of suppressing such insurrection, or causing the laws to be duly executed

New, therefore, I, U.S. Grant, President of the United States, do hereby make proclamation and command said turbulent and disorderly persons to disperse and return peaceably to their respective abodes within five days from this date, and here after to submit themselves to the laws and constituted authorities of said State. And I invoke the aid and co-operation of all good citizens thereof to uphold the law and preserve the public peace.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United





#### LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

GENERAL NATURE-No. 73.] AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventyfive, and for other purposes.

(Coutinued.) For last of four instalments, to furnish said Indians with floor and meat, per sixth article of treaty of May tenth, eghteen hundred and sixty-eight, forty five thous and dollars.
