From a sketch of Hon. G. Schleicher in this morning's *Telegraph* we learn that he was one of the illustrious army of the Sabine that whipped a hundred times the number it had in the engagement. There is not one of that glorious band but who is worthy to be President, and we are ready to throw up our hat and hurrah for the nominee of the Goliad Convention.—*Houston Age.*

The above is entirely "too thin" for anybody to believe who knows anything about the facts. The defense of the battery at Sabine Pass was made entirely by the "Davy Guards," a company of Irishmen belonging to Cook's Regiment of Heavy Artillery, under command of our old friend, now dead, Dick Dowling, first Lieutenant. The Captain of the Company, Odian, Com. Leon Smith, chief in command, and everybody else, left, with directions to Dick to bring the company out, and save it as he best could. When all were gone, Dick drew his six-shooter and swore he would kill the first man who offered to leave the works,—he intended to fight. One of the men cried out, "Be Jesus, that's all we want," and the guns were again opened upon the advancing ships, and the victory soon won. Nobody was in the fight but Dowling and his Irishmen, the "Davy Guards," and they had been left by all the higher officers, and every one else, and were fighting without orders, and even contrary to orders. The writer of this knows all about the matter, and there is no use trying to "fudge" about it.

The idea of Schleicher being in that fight! Absurd! Ridiculous!

Governmental Protection.

Protection of life, liberty, property, and the pursuit of happiness, is the first and duty of government. It is especially the first duty of that government ordained by a free people, in order to "establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, and provide for the common defense." In Western Texas, this duty is well understood. We have for years called for "Federal protection" of the frontier. We think it no interference with the rights of the States to have our frontier lined with troops, and our border cities and towns filled with the appointments of the Federal army.

And it is just as much the duty of the Federal Government to protect its citizens in the Southern States against the conspiracies and murders of disloyal political leagues, as against Indian incursions or foreign invasion. Hence the *Republic*, published at Washington, very logically and pertinently says that the action of the President in directing the Secretary of War to use United States troops, under the direction of the Attorney General, for the protection of loyal citizens in the Southern States, meets with the unqualified approval of every fair-minded citizen. A few Democratic journals have indulged in the usual howl against Federal interference, but this must be expected when we consider that the outrages committed throughout the South have been inspired by the Southern Democracy.

It is the duty of the Government to protect its citizens everywhere. The butchery of American citizens by a Spanish official at Santiago aroused a feeling of indignation throughout the land. The Government promptly responded to the demand for justice, and put itself in a position to redress the wrong. The power of Spain to our detriment was a war which at first broke. Years ago the arm of our navy cleared

his decks for action and threatened to open fire on an Austrian frigate if Martin Kozta, a naturalized citizen who had been seized by the Austrian officials, was not given up. Ingram held that the American flag carried protection to its citizens wherever it floated, and the nation rang with applause when Daniel Webster transformed the deed of Ingram into logic and sent it to Hulseman as a rule of conduct which would govern the Republic hereafter. If a tenth of the outrages committed on American citizens in the South should be committed by France or England, war would be declared in less than thirty days. To tolerate it longer would be a crime; to refuse to demand the punishment of the offender would be national cowardice. If States are unwilling or powerless to arrest the lawless bands within their limits the Government must treat these bands as public enemies, and arrest and punish them wherever found. Law abiding citizens cannot object to governmental protection; they will accept it as the sign of peace and prosperity. The protest against it will come from those who have conspired at the crimes committed, and who have encouraged the persecution of those who are loyal to the flag which these oppressors once endeavored to destroy. In the name of the millions of loyal hearts everywhere, we thank the President for his timely action. It will come as sunshine, bursting through a cloudy sky to thousands of humble homes in the South. It will banish terror and strengthen hope. It will be hailed by the loyalists throughout the South as the bow of promise. "God bless the President, and keep the Republic in the hands of loyal men," will be the universal prayer of a people who have sacrificed much to save the nation, and who are willing to sacrifice more to protect its citizens.

Minor Editorials.

The "White League" demonstration recently made in Louisiana, is a fair illustration of the real spirit of the ruling elements of the Southern Democratic party. A majority of the voters of that party are good men, who deplore all wrong, but they do not rule the party. It is ruled by bad men, who are ready, on occasion, for blood and murder. This cannot now be denied.

MR. JOHN QUINCY ADAMS has served the Massachusetts Democrats a gubernatorial candidate faithfully for seven years. For seven years has he consented with cheerful resignation to be sat upon, politically, every fall, by majorities ranging from 20,000 to 50,000 votes. We are glad to see that they are going to give Mr. Adams a rest this year and take a new man. The wear and tear of an annual drubbing such as a regular Democratic candidate gets in Massachusetts must be something awful.

MR. WILSON, a capitalist, representing an English syndicate, who had £1,000,000 sterling to invest, and who came with letters of introduction from William Cullen Bryant, of the *New York Evening Post*, and other gentlemen of similar standing, has recently returned from a prospecting tour of the Red river district. He says he never saw a fairer field for railroad and other enterprises for the investment of capital than there, were it not for the excitement and uncertainty of the future caused by the political leagues; that there is no security for capital or labor in that section of the State, and that he had recommended those whom he represented not to invest there.

THE Ku-Klux Democrats of Alabama recently killed a mail agent, Thos. L. Ivey, simply because he was colored, and had said that "the assassins of Billings should be brought to justice." Between York and Livingston, a man flagged the train with his hat to stop. As it did so, Ivey came to the door of his car, and was instantly riddled with balls.

THE intention of the "White League" or Ku-Klux Democracy is to frighten colored Republicans into voting the Democratic ticket, or not voting at all. As soon as Ivey was killed, and while awaiting the coroner's inquest, "some fifty negroes formed a Democratic club." This is boastfully told by the *Selma Times*, Democratic.

THE first object of the "White League" or Ku-Klux Democracy is, to "frighten colored men into voting with them, or not voting at all," and the second is to ostracize all white men in the South who vote the Republican ticket. For instance, White League No. 1, of the Second Ward of Livingstone Parish, La., adopted and published the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That we will have no man on our farms or in our workshops who votes the Radical ticket.
"Be it further resolved, That we consider it the duty of (and cordially invite) all white men opposed to Radicalism to cooperate with us.
"Further resolved, That we consider it beneath our moral dignity to associate with any white man who votes the Radical ticket or affiliates with that party in any manner whatever.
"Further resolved, That we pledge our support to the Democratic party."

LAW
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
PASSED AT THE
FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]
AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.

(Continued.)
WINNEBAGOES.
For interest on eight hundred and eighty-six thousand nine hundred and nine dollars and seventeen cents, at five per centum, per fourth article treaty of November first, eighteen hundred and thirty-seven, and joint resolution of July seventh, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, forty-four thousand three hundred and forty-five dollars and forty-six cents.

For interest on appropriation for interest on the above named principal for last fiscal year, five thousand dollars.

For twenty-eight of thirty instalments of interest on seventy five thousand three hundred and eighty-seven dollars and twenty-eight cents, at five per centum, per fourth article treaty of October thirtieth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, three thousand seven hundred and sixty-nine dollars and thirty-six cents.

For interest on seventy-eight thousand three hundred and forty dollars and forty-one cents, at five per centum, to be expended, under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, for the erection of houses, improvement of their allotments of land, purchase of stock, agricultural implements, seeds, and other beneficial purposes, three thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven dollars and two cents.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to defray the expenses of breaking and fencing eight hundred acres of land for the Winnebago Indians, on their reservation in the State of Nebraska, in accordance with the provisions of the third article of the treaty with said tribe, concluded March eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, which shall available immediately upon the passage of this act, three thousand four hundred dollars.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to purchase from the Omaha Indians in Nebraska such quantity of land, not exceeding twenty sections, as may be required for the use of the Winnebago Indians in Wisconsin, and for improvements on their reservation, to be appropriated from the residue of the one million one hundred thousand dollar provided to be set apart for the Winnebagoes by the fourth article of the treaty with those Indians, November first, eighteen hundred and thirty-seven: Provided, That such amount as may be paid to the Omahas for the lands required shall be applied for their use, under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, for general purposes of civilization, eighty-two thousand dollars: Provided, That said Winnebagoes shall consent to said purchase.

For transportation of such goods as may be purchased for said Indians, two thousand dollars.

YAKAMA NATION.
For fifteenth of twenty instalments, being the last of the third series, to be applied to the use and benefit of said Indians, under the direction of the President, per fourth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, six thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the support of an agricultural and industrial school, and keeping in repair school buildings, and for providing suitable furniture, books, and stationery, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the employment of one superintendent of teaching and two teachers, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three thousand two hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the employment of a superintendent of farming and two farmers, two millers, two blacksmiths, one tinner, one gunsmith, one carpenter, and one wagon and plow maker, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, eleven thousand four hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair saw and flouring mills and for furnishing the necessary tools and fixtures, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair the hospital, and providing the necessary medicines, and fixtures thereof, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair blacksmith, tinsmith, gunsmith, carpenter and wagon and plow maker shops, and for providing necessary tools and fixtures, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the pay of a physician, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand two hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair the buildings required for the various employees, and for providing the necessary furniture therefor, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

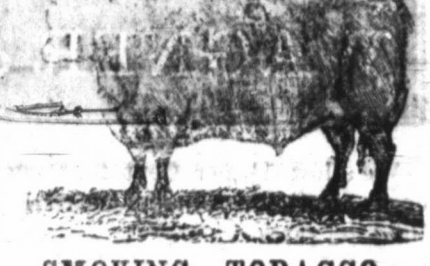
