AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending Jane thir-tieth, eighteen hundred and seventyfive, and for other purposes. (Continued.)

For this amount, or so much there of as may be necessary, to carry out the work of aiding and instructing the Indians of of aiding and instructing the Indians of the Central superintendency in the arts of civilization, in providing clothing, fond, and lodging for the children attending school, in cating for the orphans, the sick, and the helpless, and in assisting the Indians generally to locate themselves in permanent homes, and sustain themselves by the pursuits of civilized life, ten thousand dollars.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be required, for the erection of suitable buildings, to be used for the purpose of an Industrial school for the Otoe and Missouris tribe of Indians, on the Otoe reservation, in the State of Nebraska, five
