> MACOGDOCHES, Texas, Feb. 24th 1833.

Gov. Lewis Cass, Secretary of War. Sin: - As military commander of the North Eastern frontier of the United Mexican States it has become a necessary and patriful duty devolving up on me to apprile you of facts, which are not in accordance with the Treaties, and the very amicable relations existing between the two sister repubhics of the United States of America, and the United Mexican States. Which facts I trust you will feel bound to present to the President that he may be enabled to interpose his authority with the agents under his control, and redeem this governmedt from an evil. which is not only an encroachment Colonel of Cavalry of the Mexican Reupon its territory, but must endanger as their lives.

In the treaty concluded at the city of Mexico, on the 5th of April, 1831, provision was made in the XXXIIId Article, that annoyances and .ntrus. ions of all kinds by the Indians within the two republics should reciprocally ART. 4th. co. It is nevertheless true, that these fudians passed by a military post of the United States (Fort Jessup) on their way to the Sabine, where they entered Texas. The route pursued by the Choctaws from Natchitoches was most manifestly different from that which they must have pursued in reaching the country assigned to them on then east ide of the Red river, and, within the cerritory of your government. By this early and sincere application, tog the United States government, it is requesa ed that such measures may be adopted by that government, in its characteristic good faith, as will not only prevent all future "incursions," but also o order that these already within the Hara for enther of

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revince should be placeuting removed to the lands assigned then by the U. States. I flatter my eif, with the pre-Kent existing treaties, and the otherwise friendly relations subsisting between the two governments and their citizens, that the President of the U. S. will feel bound, from his elevated poitical as well as moral character, to rrest and prevent the intentions of the ribe of tribes of the Creek. Indians, from any and all contemplated 'incurs. ions into the territories of Mexico, ind particularly of this province. The consequences to its white inhabitants may prove of a character not only disastrone to them, but such as would claim the consideration of every humane and honorable breast.

You will at once perceive, from the nature of my situation, that my immediate duty will be to apprise my government of the facts, that it may be enabled to understand the exigencies of my command.
