
## RETARD DAM APPROVED



Where the primary is strictly a party affair, as it must be under the present setup, it is practically impossible to eliminate irregularities. If a state law were passed and enforced, punishment might be meted out to the guilty parties, but not so where the primary is run under no better regulations than "a gentleman's agreement."


# RETARD DAM APPROVED

E. B. Bullock, owner, said Friday morning he estimated the loss at about \$15,000 or better. Four thousand dollars insurance partly covered the loss. A crew of WPA workers was placed on the job Friday morning, clearing away the debris. The warehouse, a metal frame structure, occupied a floor space of approximately square feet. It was one of the old land marks of Artesia, built in about 1908 and purchased by Mr. Bullock after he came to Artesia.

Burning cinders from the big building carried by a west wind threatened the property of both the Artesia Alfalfa Growers Association and the State Oil Service.

Mr. Bullock has established temporary office quarters in the D. & R. Motor Company building.


