And it does happen. There are those, who never spend a dime with you, and haven't, but hardship cases, then every case in the state is a they don't hesitate to ask you for special favors. There are those, who never support local institutions but they seek to use these institutions when they need them.

Such an attitude doesn't ring true and as a result it doesn't help build Artesia.



Company Offers to Arbitrate Wages in Threatened Telephone Strike



The company has previously offered to extend the present liberal contract for 90 days. This offer has not been accepted to date by the union.

There are many issues in the present controversy besides wages; such as union shop, and changes in the pension plan to which employes make no contributions. But the main issue is wages and will have to be settled before any overall agreement can be reached. The Company thinks its present wages are good, the average hourly rate has been increased 69 per cent over the

1941 average.

A strike and interruption of telephone service would be so detrimental to economy of the country as well as such a hazard to the public health and safety, that the company, in order to avert this, is agreeable and has offered to submit to any impartial board of arbitration the issue as to whether its present wages are just and adequate in com-

parison to what other workers receive in this Rocky Mountain area for work of similar skill and training.

The Company thinks that the matter of wages should be settled by a panel of impartial citizens selected from the area from which the company receives the revenues with which it pays wages and in which most of its rates and charges are regulated by public author-

It is particularly important at this time for the company's earnings are such that any increase in the cost of furnishing telephone service must be passed on to the public through rate increases, if the company is to improve and expand the service in keeping with community needs.

It is believed that excessive dilution of the drug by the sap stream is responsible.



County Agent Warns Farmers, Never Trust Bull

The "gentle" bull is too often the one which acts at unexpected moments, gores someone to death, or inflicts serious injury, County Agent Dallas Rierson warned

"One of the principal safety rules for dealing with dairy bulls is to handle them as little as possible,' Rierson said. "With a wellconstructed bull pen, any bull can be handled safely. The gates and doors, as well as facilities for feeding, watering, and breeding, can be arranged so that there is no need for the caretaker to expose himself to attack. The complete layout consists of an oblong exercise pen connected to a shelter and breeding chute.

"As an additional safety feature, the bottom fence rail should clear the ground by at least 12 inches so that a man can escape if he should get trapped in the pen. Upright safety escape openings are sometimes provided at the chute and at the corners.'

The county agent suggested that farmers ring their dairy bulls at an early age and replace worn or weakened rings on older bulls. When ringing and dehorning, he advise, always have the animal securely fastened.

When it is necessary to lead a bull," Rierson said, always use a staff so you can keep him at a safe distance. And never let a dairy bull run with the herd. Beit is injurious to the bull.'




