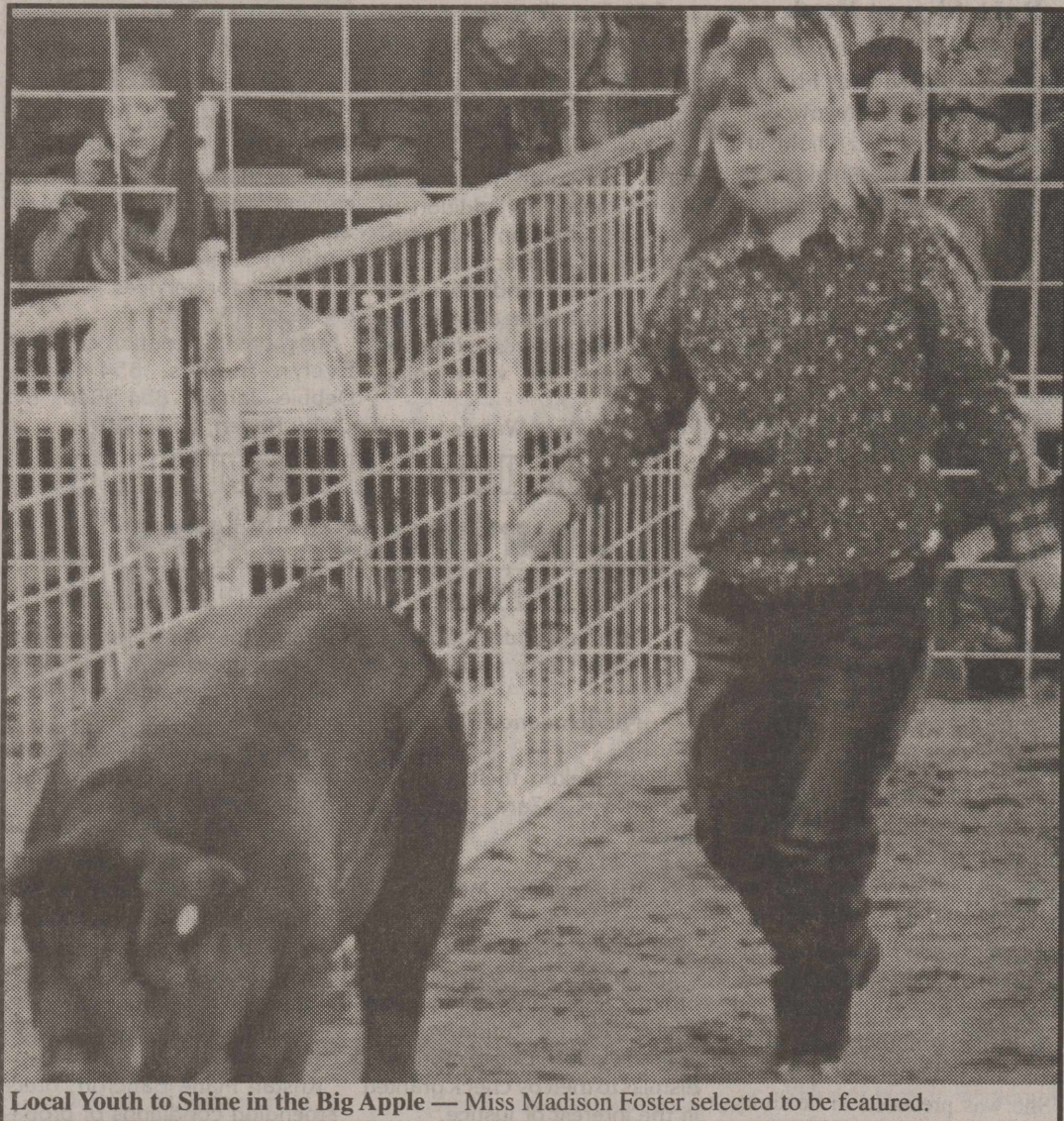

The current location of the Cross Plains ISD was first built in 1927. Although other schools were built in and around Cross Plains before 1927, the new building of 1927 was the first brick building. Enrollment has continued a downward spiral in recent years—going from the peak enrollment of 474 in 1999 down to 339 total students in 2012.

Modern-day Cross Plains ISD is well-known for its strong academic programs, well-

rounded agricultural classes and countless extra-curricular and sporting activities. Many of Cross Plains students participate in virtually every activity, causing some parents to be concerned that their child is pulled in too many ways.

College entrance exams and state mandated testing results list Cross Plains as one of the top schools in the nation, according to *U.S. News and World Report*.

Superintendent of School Phil Mitchell is starting his fourth year

with Cross Plains ISD. Diana Dobbins, High School Principal, is also in her fourth year. Jeremy Williams has recently replaced long-time Elementary Principal Margie Sowell. Ms. Sowell remains with the system in charge of federal and state programs.

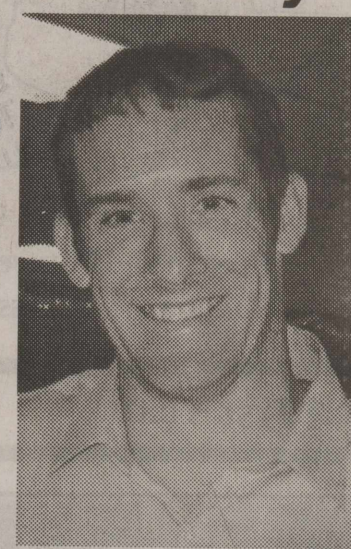
She was preceded in death by her parents; her husband Raymond Earl Watson; Troy and Mae Watson; Daniel Gresham; Darrell Gresham and three sons.

September is National Voter Registration Month

AUSTIN, Texas - Texas Secretary of State Hope Andrade today is announcing September is National Voter Registration Month. Secretary Andrade joins her colleagues with the National Association of Secretaries of State (NASS) in making this important announcement.

"Voting is every Texan's opportunity to make their mark on Texas' future," said Secretary Andrade. "Registering is the first step in the voting process. I urge Texans to check their voter registration status at VoteTexas.gov and learn about how, when and where to register and vote."

October 9th is the deadline to register to vote in Texas to be eligible to vote in the November 6th General Election. Texans can verify their voter registration status or find information on how to register to vote at the state's online, one-stop voter resource, www.VoteTexas.gov. They can also find contact information for all local elections administrators or county clerks around Texas. The early voting period in Texas begins October 22nd and con-

tinues through November 2nd. The deadline to request a ballot by mail is October 30th.

The nation's secretaries of state established September as National Voter Registration Month to encourage voter participation and increase awareness of state requirements and deadlines for voting. September 25th is National Voter Registration Day.

"Secretaries of state want to encourage eligible voters to register and make sure their registration information is up-to-date before deadlines pass," noted NASS President Ross J. Miller, who serves as Nevada Secretary of State. "If your information is outdated or incorrect, or if you aren't sure how to register to vote, there is time to get it straightened out with your state or local election office, so you can cast your vote easily in the November 6th presidential election."

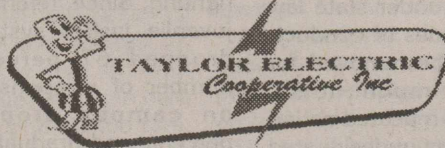

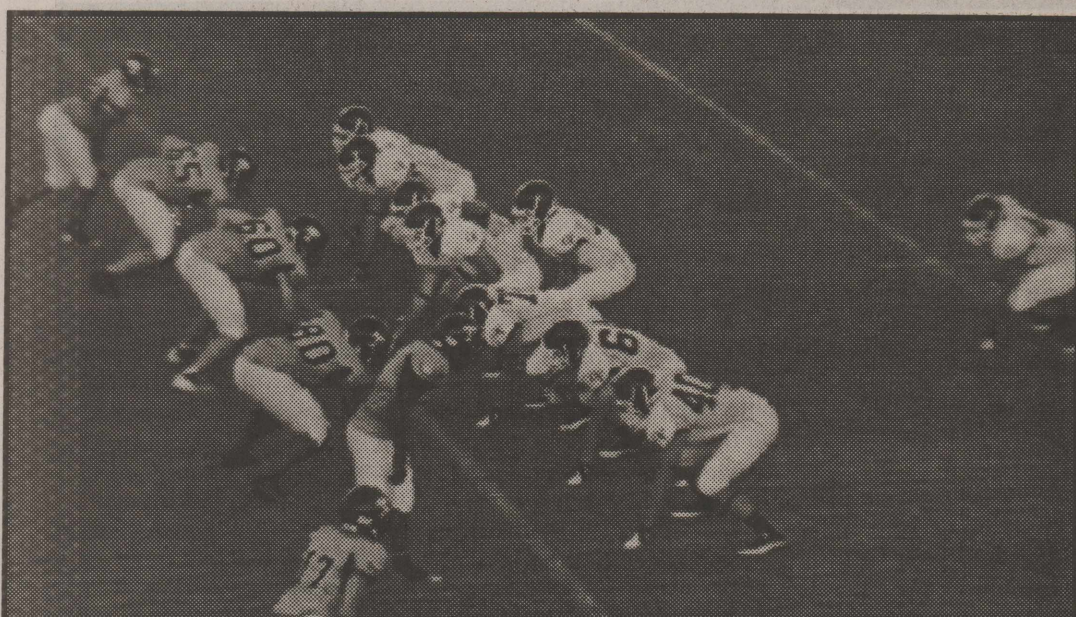

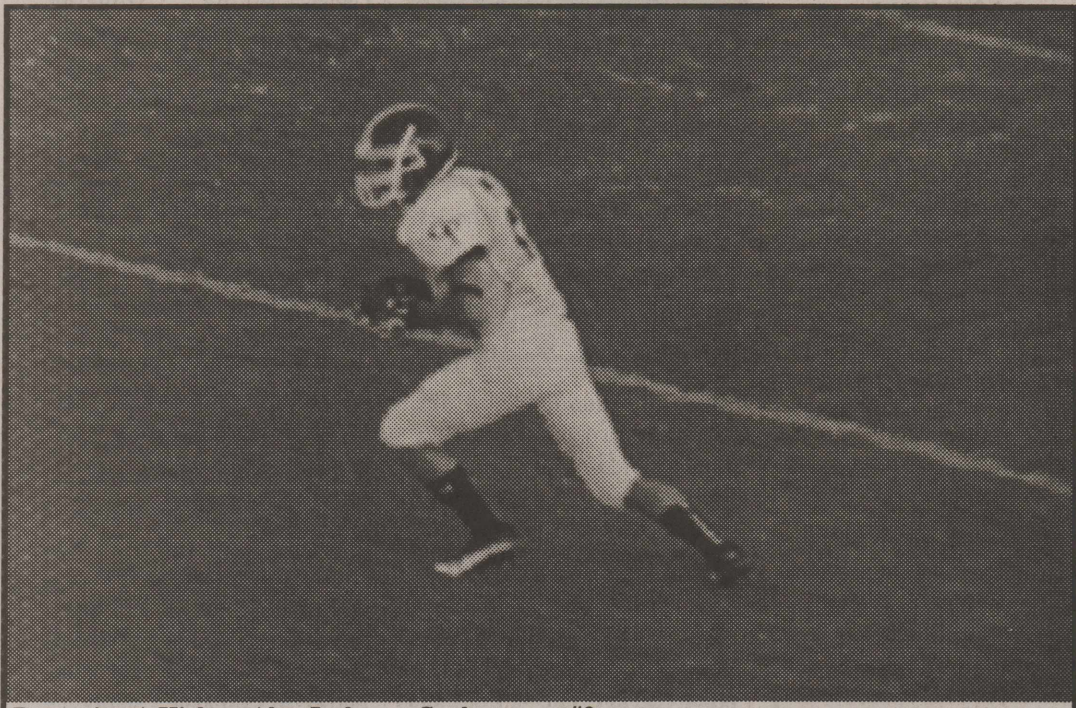

Across Texas this week, nearly five million students will begin a new school year. As the first bell rings, youths break the seal on boxes of pencils, and begin writing in a fresh new notebook, the last thought we would want to cross their minds is whether or not their schools are safe. Unfortunately, school crime remains a significant concern in Texas. While the overall Texas crime rate has dropped dramatically in the last few years, it is unfortunately no safer in Texas public schools than it was fifteen years ago. In fact, across the country, current school discipline practices have failed to substantially increase public school safety. The Texas Public Policy Foundation recently analyzed years of data on violent crime victimization as well as referrals to the juvenile justice system from Texas schools, and found that the exact same proportion of violent crime, 13.3 percent, exists in schools today than in 1996. Moreover, because of the decreasing crime rate elsewhere, students today are proportionally more likely to be a victim of a violent crime on a school campus than off. While it is excellent news that overall crime is decreasing, we would have hoped to see significant gains in school safety in recent years. This is because in 1995 Texas, and many other states, implemented a statewide zero-tolerance policy. Billed as the best way to keep students safe, the policy mandated the removal of students committing certain violations

from school through expulsion or suspension. Texas version of zero-tolerance was gradually expanded to include not just violent or dangerous behavior, but also drugs, alcohol, and sometimes even relatively minor infractions. For example, under state law and district codes of conduct, students can be removed for making too much noise, tardiness, and repeated eating or drinking in an undesignated area. These draconian policies often remove students from the education system altogether and instead use the juvenile justice system as a method of imparting discipline. Given the high rates at which zero-tolerance policies are applied, 60 percent of Texas students have been suspended, expelled, or placed in an alternative educational setting, we would expect to see dramatic gains in school safety. But that isn't the case. And at the high costs for current disciplinary practices in one year, Texas schools spent \$327 million on security and monitoring and an additional \$232 million on alternative education programs for disciplined students, Texas taxpayers are getting a poor return on their investment. A new model for school-based discipline has emerged, and it is of rather simple origin; a return to traditional school-based discipline for most minor misbehavior. A tiered discipline system, wherein students are first warned, then placed in a skills building, family meeting, or conflict resolution type program, and then finally on the third

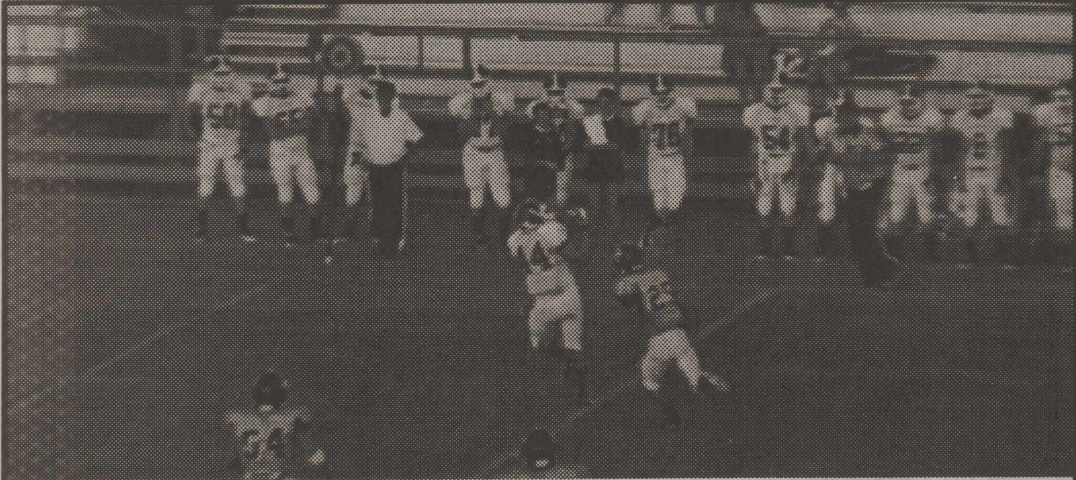
violation may be sent to the juvenile justice system, has proven to be incredibly effective at addressing school misbehavior. Clayton County, Georgia, was the first to adopt a tiered discipline system for minor misbehavior such as fighting. Since, referrals to the juvenile justice system have dropped 67 percent, the number of weapons brought on campus dropped 73 percent, and graduation rates actually increased 20 percent. Further, with each fewer student disciplined by the justice system, taxpayers can save a bundle, and courts can focus on truly pressing matters. These substantial gains, after just a few years of implementation, suggest that this new model presents a viable alternative to the one-size-fits-all zero-tolerance policies of yesterday. Texas schools should begin transitioning away from the inflexible policies that failed to correct student behavior or increase the safety of Texas schools. Instead, tiered discipline systems can provide sufficient local control while increasing the number of students who can safely stay in school and receive their full education. By rethinking zero-tolerance policies, which have failed to create safer schools, Texans can keep more of its kids in school, off the streets, and cracking the books. Neil Armstrong: A True American Hero

In the passing of Neil Armstrong, America has lost not only a national hero, but a man of great character who served his country in more ways than one.

We all know the highlights: those first historic steps on the moon's surface, those unforgettable words, the day that held not only the country but the world transfixed. But there was much more. Neil Armstrong was, at heart, a dedicated engineer — or, as he put it, "a white-sock, pocket-protector, nerdy engineer" — who preferred a private life to the public adoration so many would have reveled in. That was a key part of what made him a true American hero in the classic, and far too rare, sense: his bravery, his intellect, his talent, yes; but also his inability to seek adulation and his reluctance to accept celebrity.

He didn't rush to the spotlight or pound his chest. He always noted that his and his colleagues' accomplishments were the result of hundreds of thousands of people over years and years. He was a man who loved what he did and was good at it; that was all the reward he needed.

Neil Armstrong served his country as a Navy fighter pilot in the Korean conflict, in the NASA space program and as a senior NASA official.

Upon his retirement from NASA, he continued to give back, as a professor of aerospace engineering at the University of Cincinnati. And in fighting to preserve America's manned space-flight program, he did his country a tremendous service yet again.

I first met Neil after he, Apollo 13 Commander Jim Lovell and Gene Cernan — the Apollo 17 Commander and the last man on the Moon — wrote an open letter questioning the Obama Administration's proposal to abandon the moon program. It was a rare breaking of the traditional silence on such matters and an even rarer step into the spotlight for Mr. Armstrong.

They were not alone in their concern — it was shared by experts and members of Congress on both sides of the aisle.

The initial Administration plan proposed cancelling the existing space exploration program and suspended plans to build a replacement for the space shuttle, placing immediate reliance on commercial capabilities, which were undeveloped and unproven. Neil Armstrong was particularly concerned about leaning too heavily on commercial crew vehicles, rightly believing that NASA should have ultimate ownership and stewardship of deep-space exploration.

The astronauts' testimony at a subsequent Senate hearing helped inform the 2010 NASA Reauthorization Act, and their unyielding advocacy helped get the bi-partisan bill passed, saving the nation's manned space exploration program.

They perfectly summarized why the program is both exceptional and necessary in their initial: "America's space accomplishments earned the respect and admiration of the world. Science probes were unlocking the secrets of the cosmos; space technology was providing instantaneous worldwide communication; orbital sentinels were helping man understand the vagaries of nature. Above all else, the people around the world were inspired by the human exploration of space and the expanding of man's frontier. It suggested that what had been thought to be impossible was now within reach."

America's space program continues to hold the world in thrall. Hundreds of millions of people have seen the amazing pictures beamed back by the Mars rover, knowing its continued exploration brings the next logical step in our space-flight program — a manned mission to Mars — that much closer.

And that is thanks to Neil Armstrong in more ways than one.

Texas Prepaid College Tuition Enrollment Opens Sept. 1st

(AUSTIN)—Parents looking to make their child's college education more affordable can begin enrolling in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund™, the state's prepaid college tuition program, on Sept. 1st. The enrollment period runs through Feb. 28, 2013.

"This program is a great way to prepay all or part of a child's undergraduate tuition and fees at Texas public colleges and universities at today's prices," said Texas Comptroller Susan Combs. "And we offer flexible payment options to help fit any family's budget as they save for college."

Families in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund purchase prepaid "tuition units" that can later be used toward undergraduate tuition and required fees at schools ranging from Texas public community colleges to four-year, in-state universities. Prices are based on 2012-13 academic year costs for the state's public colleges.

- Type I units, priced for tuition and required fees for the most expensive public four-year school in Texas, cost \$115.92 per unit.
- Type II units, based on the weighted average cost of tuition and required fees across all Texas public four-year schools,

cost \$82.92 per unit.

- Type III units, priced at the weighted average cost of tuition and required fees across all Texas public two-year schools, cost \$21.39 each.

Under the plan, 100 units equal one academic year consisting of 30 semester hours of tuition and required fees at the Texas public school that most closely matches the pricing base. Families can prepay for up to six years (600 Type I units or the equivalent amount of Type II and III units) of undergraduate tuition and required fees.

The plan's payment options include lump sum payments, installment payments that include 8 percent interest or a pay-as-you go plan that allows parents to gradually add more units when the family budget allows. Payments can be as low as \$15 after an account is established by paying a one-time fee of \$25 and purchasing at least one unit.

DPS Announces New Residency Requirements for First-Time CDL Applicants

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) has announced that it will begin implementing the new proof of residency (domicile) requirement for obtaining a commercial driver license (CDL) effective September 4, 2012. The requirements, which only apply to first-time CDL applicants, are the result of legislation approved by the Texas Legislature and comply with federal regulations.

First-time CDL applicants are required to establish domicile in Texas to be eligible for a CDL. Domicile is defined as a true, fixed and permanent home and principal residence.

All new CDL applicants will be

required to present two acceptable documents containing the applicant's name and address to establish proof of domicile in the state of Texas. The two documents must be issued by two different companies or agencies. Under certain circumstances, applicants who are unable to provide two acceptable documents proving domicile may be eligible to complete a Texas Residency Affidavit.

Texas Transportation Commission Waives Fee for Select Veterans Driving on State Toll Roads

AUSTIN—In a gesture to honor those men and women who have made great personal sacrifices to ensure our freedom and protect our nation, the Texas Transportation Commission today approved granting free passage for select veterans on several Texas toll roads. The decision will benefit veterans who are either disabled or recipients of the Purple Heart and/or Congressional Medal of Honor.

In central Texas, those toll roads where some veterans will be able to drive free of charge include Loop 1, SH 45 North, SH 45 Southeast and SH 130 (Segments 1-4) in the Austin area. Additionally, qualified veterans will be able to travel free of charge on the Camino Colombia, which is SH 255 near Laredo and Loop 49 in Tyler.

House Bill 3139, passed by the Legislature in 2009 and enacted in the Transportation Code (Section 372.053), stated that the state's toll authorities may develop a discount program for various veterans.

Governor Rick Perry recently called on the Transportation Commission to begin implementing a program that would help support Texas veterans getting around Texas with less financial burden.

"Our veterans are motivated by a higher calling that is rooted in the fundamental values of our nation," Gov. Perry said. "In Texas, we understand and appreciate the sacrifices the men and women of our armed forces make in defense of our freedom, and we consider it an honor to support them."

Currently, there are 7,360 specialty license plates indicating drivers are disabled vets, Purple Heart and Congressional Medal of Honor recipients in Travis, Williamson and Hays counties closest to the central Texas toll roads. Statewide there are 160,666 similar specialty plates. "We are able to celebrate our freedom each and every day due to the unwavering sacrifice of our military's brave men and women, so making it a bit easier

for them to move through our great state is the least we can do," said Phil Wilson, Executive Director of TxDOT. "We thank Texas veterans for their service and hope the free use of our toll roads recognizes the price they paid for our freedom."

The latest estimates show the cost of managing this program to be less than \$1 million annually. The Transportation Commission has asked TxDOT to implement this program for qualified veterans by January 1, 2013.

TxDOT to make paying tolls much easier for Central Texas drivers; Pay system to keep motorists moving

AUSTIN - Travel on Central Texas toll roads will become even easier with today's approval to implement a permanent pay-by-mail system that eliminates the need to stop and make cash payments for non-TxTag vehicles.

The Texas Transportation Commission, at its August meeting, gave the Texas Department of Transportation approval to eliminate the cash payment option for the Central Texas Turnpike System (CTTS). The CTTS consists of the following four contiguous toll highways serving the Austin metropolitan region and the Austin-San Antonio corridor: SH 45 North, Loop 1 and SH 130 (Segments 1-4) and SH 45 Southeast.

"Not only is TxDOT committed to enhancing safety, but also to ensuring Texas drivers get to where they're going with ease," said James Bass, TxDOT Chief Financial Officer. "By implementing a comprehensive 'pay-by-mail' system in Central Texas, motorists will avoid any delays previously caused by lines at toll booths."

The pay-by-mail option is administered via video to accurately read vehicles' license plate numbers. After passing the toll

equipment, driver's vehicles not enrolled in the program are billed through the mail. TxTag provides an easier way for drivers to manage their toll road driving payments and offers a discount that delivers greater value.

The commission also agreed to establish new toll rates on the CTTS facilities. The changes, which will become effective Jan. 1, 2013, make fees more compatible with other toll fees charged regionally, and provide for increases that will keep pace with the consumer price index in the future.

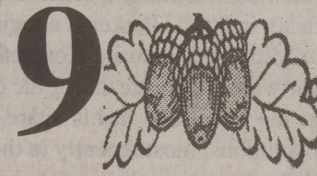

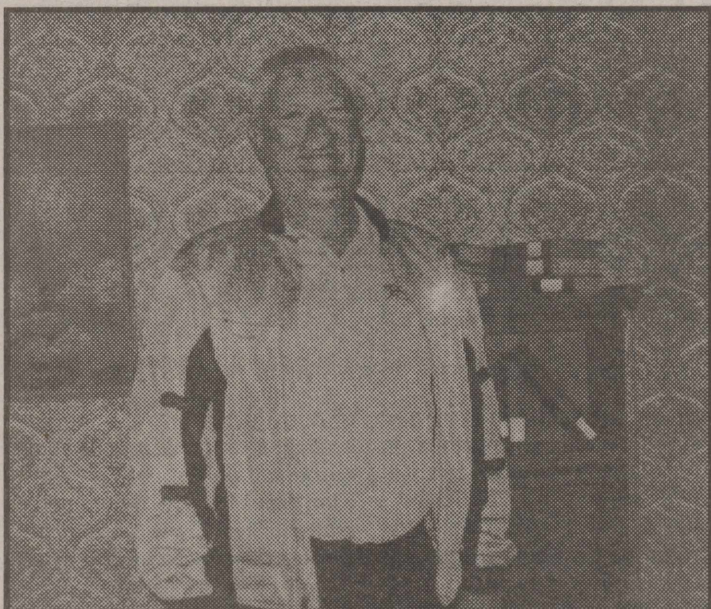

Changes to Form 1099-G and 1099-MISC for FSA Producers and Vendors

(Baird, TX), August 31, 2012— Callahan County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Robert Frost, announced that calendar year 2012 brings several changes to the way FSA reports a producer's farm program payments to the producer and to the IRS.

In past years, IRS Form 1099-G would be issued to show all program payments received from the Farm Service Agency, regardless of the amount.

"Starting with calendar year 2012, producers whose total reportable payments from FSA are less than \$600 will not receive IRS Form 1099-G (Report of Payments to Producers)," said Frost. Additionally, producers who receive payments from more than one county will only receive one Form 1099-G if the total of all payments from all

counties is \$600 or more, Frost said.

"Producers who receive less than \$600 in combined payments should consult a tax advisor to determine if these payments must be reported on their tax return," he said.

If the payments were subject to voluntary withholdings or subject to backup (involuntary) withholdings a Form 1099-G will be issued regardless of the total amount of the payments, Frost said.

The same changes will apply to producers and vendors who normally receive IRS Form 1099-MISC from FSA.

The new town is "Carbon" and is about eight miles south of Eastland, in section 33 at the head of Hunting Shirt Creek. The streets are named "Coal", "Jet", "Anthracite" "Coke," "Asphalt," &c., &c. from which we infer that they expect it to be the junction of the coal road from Stephen County.

The Eastland Review Mr. D. Richardson left last Wednesday morning for Fort Worth. He will return again tomorrow.

Ed Seay has gone to New York and Mrs. Seay accompanied him as far as McKinney where she visits friends.

Mr. O.M.L. Parker has a new front to his store completed, and its presents quiet a credible appearance.

The Clarendon, not to be outdone, has a sign over its office.

County Commissioners Court convenes next Monday. County Attorney Bell leaves next Monday for a visit to his old home in Virginia. Re. John Brown, of Abilene informs us that he will preach at Belle Plain tomorrow morning and at his place in the evening, where he will be pleased to greet a large congregation. Commissioners approve 2012-13 proposed budget, tax rate

The Callahan County Commissioners Court approved the proposed budget and proposed tax rate for the 2012-2013 fiscal year during a brief commissioners' court meeting held Thursday, August 30th at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The proposed budget for the 2012-2013 fiscal year includes a total budget of \$4,991,779.13. This budget includes \$3,482,088.92 for the General Fund and \$1,509,690.21 for the Road and Bridge Fund.

On a motion by Commissioner Bryan Farmer and a second by Commissioner Cliff Kirkham, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 to adopt the 2012-2013 proposed budget.

The commissioners' court also voted to adopt the 2012-2013 proposed tax rate. Callahan County's proposed tax rate is \$0.48137 per \$100 of property value. The proposed tax rate includes \$0.33878 per \$100 of property value for the General Fund and \$0.14259 per \$100 of property value for the Road and Bridge Fund.

Last year's total tax rate was \$0.46365 per \$100 of property value.

The proposed tax rate for the 2012-2013 fiscal year will raise the tax on the average home in Callahan County by \$9.14.

On a motion by Commissioner Kirkham and a second from Commissioner Farmer, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 to adopt the proposed total tax rate of \$0.48137 per \$100 of property value.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:01 a.m. with Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, and Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham present. Also present at the meeting were County Clerk Donna Bell and County Treasurer Dianne Gunter.

—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting at 9:11 a.m. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a unanimous 5-0 vote.
