September is National **Voter Registration Month**

AUSTIN, Texas - Texas Secretary of State Hope Andrade today is announcing September is National Voter Registration Month. Secretary Andrade joins her colleagues with the National Association of Secretaries of State (NASS) in making this important announcement.

"Voting is every Texan's opportunity to make their mark on Texas' future," said Secretary Andrade. "Registering is the first step in the voting process. I urge Texans to check their voter registration status at VoteTexas.gov and learn about how, when and where to register and vote."

October 9th is the deadline to register to vote in Texas to be eligible to vote in the November 6th General Election. Texans can verify their voter registration status or find information on how to register to vote at the state's online, one-stop voter resource, www.VoteTexas.gov. They can also find contact information for all local elections administrators or county clerks around Texas. The early voting period in Texas begins October 22nd and continues through November 2nd. The deadline to request a ballot by mail is October 30th.

The nation's secretaries of state established September as National Voter Registration Month to encourage voter participation and increase awareness of state requirements and deadlines for voting. September 25th is National Voter Registration Day. "Secretaries of state want to encourage eligible voters to reg-

ister and make sure their registration information is up-to-date before deadlines pass," noted NASS President Ross J. Miller, who serves as Nevada Secretary of State. "If your information is outdated or incorrect, or if you aren't sure how to register to vote, there is time to get it straightened out with your state or local election office, so you

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
