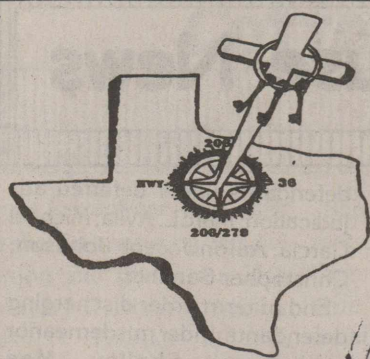

The festival officially "kicks-off" this Thursday, June 6th at 6 p.m. with the Barbarian Festival Parade led by the Six White Horses from Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Ride your tractor, lawn mower, mule, golf cart, 4 wheeler, bicycle, classic car, pick up truck or other vehicle and be a part of the parade. You can walk, walk with your friends or walk your dog. Parade line up is at 5:15 at the Cross Plains High School. Don't forget the candy to toss at the kids along the way.

International Rocket Competition

International Collegiate Rocketry Competition Returns to Cross Plains

Based out of Washington DC, the Naval Research Laboratories are again returning to Cross Plains Texas for their annual CANSAT Competition. (WWW.Cansatcompetition.Com).

This competition has been hosted in Arizona, California, and Maryland in years past, but for 7 years was hosted near Amarillo. Launch Director Pat Gordzelik, after moving to Cross Plains from Amarillo in 2009, persuaded the organization to relocate the competition to Cross Plains, and this event marks the 3rd year it will be hosted locally. College students from as far as Iran, Australia, England, Mexico, Canada, and throughout the USA will be attending.

The first Cross Plains event was hosted on Gordzelik's ranch south of Cross Plains, but the ranch is heavily wooded, and as Gordzelik commented, "to this day, I find electronic payloads hanging from pear trees, and it confuses the heck out of the wild hogs."

Jim Burkett, from Burkett Texas, offered land he owns without trees last year, and from a launch site perspective, it was perfect. Few trees, no hogs, just wide open spaces. Rocket Nirvana, so to speak.

Spectators are welcome. Launch date is June 8, and the launch location is located 12 miles south of the 206/279 intersection south of Cross Plains on HWY 206. Look for the big top tents.

"Robert E. Howard in the Comics"

About 130 people have registered to be a part of the REH Days this weekend. Some will attend the Friday night silent auction and dinner at the Community Center, some will join the tours of the Museum and of Howard's historic Cross Plains, Burkett and Cross Cut days, some will take advantage of the special postal cancellation all day Friday at the Post Office, some will participate in the Swap Meet on both Friday and Saturday and most will attend the panel discussions at the library.

The overall theme this year is "Robert E. Howard in the Comics" with panels led by various authorities on the workings of the comic book industry that has grown up around the memorable stories that Howard wrote. He pounded out the stories on the old Underwood typewriter in the little white house on the west edge of town, never dreaming that his "yarns" would go around the world and back several times.

On Friday at 11:00 in the library, Timothy Truman, as guest of honor, will be joined by Mark Finn, Jeff Shanks and Al Harron as they discuss the theme of the weekend and its effect on all the readers of Howard's stories that have been adapted to the comics.

At 1:30, Truman will lead a discussion on the process of scripting comic books and graphic novels. He is also a talented artist, which adds another dimension to his work.

A totally different panel at 2:30 will feature Rob Roehm and his father, Bob, as they share their research dedicated to all the places Howard ever visited in the state. Rob is the scholar and photographer and Bob is the technical end of the team. The documentation of their findings is

even more fascinating since they live in Lancaster, CA and travel half way across the country in their never-ending search of Howard's travels.

Then at 6:30, Truman will deliver the key-note address at the celebration dinner. As Truman said in some advance biographical information, his title of "Life and Adventures with Bob: the Challenges of Adapting REH's Characters for Other Media" definitely does get at the meat of his speech. "Even though it really is a mouthful" he quipped.

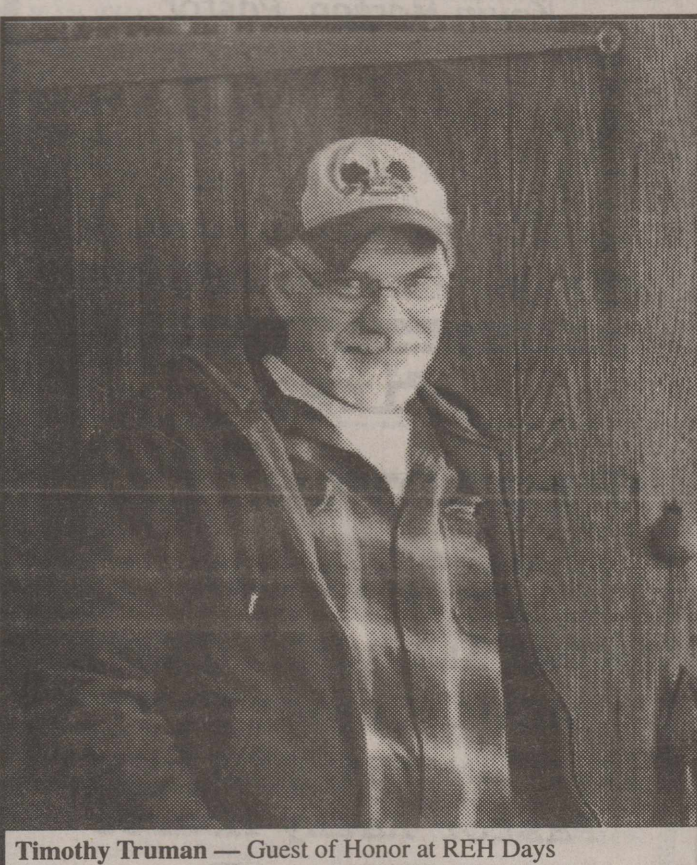
Saturday, 10:30 will find the folks back at the library participating with Truman and others as they discuss Howard's stories as developed and published by the Dark Horse Comics.

The last panel at the library will be at 2:00 and will feature our true Texas friends, Mark Finn, Paul Herman, Damon Sasser and one misplaced Texan, Rusty Burke from DC, as they discuss "REH and Texas."

Finally, gathering at the Pavilion at 3:30, the panel will conclude with Rusty and Paul discussing what is going on with the entire REH movement.

The public is invited to sit in on all these discussions at no charge. The swap meet at the pavilion is totally free, but is restricted to Howard and/or the fantasy realm.

All in all it will be an interesting two days as many, many other folks will take the free tours through the Museum on both days. The Museum will be open from 9 to 4 each day and will be fully staffed with volunteer docents. The gift shop has a wide selection of Howard and Cross Plains related items for sale from books to mugs to T-shirts to caps to horny toads AND the May issue of *Texas Highways* with its

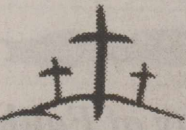

Texas Military forces to be affected by federal furlough policy

CAMP MABRY, Texas—Members of the Texas Military Forces remain committed to supporting the state of Texas, if called into service by Gov. Perry, despite a May 14, 2013, Department of Defense (DoD) announcement mandating furloughs for the federal civil service workforce.

"The Department of Defense has directed the Texas Army and Air National Guard to institute furloughs for both military technicians and non-military technicians who are employed to prepare the Texas National Guard for state and federal missions," said Col. Amy F. Cook, state public affairs officer. "Notices are being distributed today to affected employees, and furlough days are expected to begin in early July, unless Congress overrides the sequestration provision in the federal budget or provides local, budget-management flexibility."

"The affected employees will be in an unpaid, furlough status for 11 non-consecutive days between July and September," Cook said. "Effectively, a 20 percent reduction in pay through the

end of the current federal fiscal year."

Together, the Texas Army and Air National Guard have more than 22,000 members, ten percent of whom are full-time employees. More than half of the Texas National Guard's full-time members are expected to be furloughed, which may result in degraded maintenance and curtailment of critical training, including aviation readiness, which could negatively affect essential capabilities that state officials and first responders rely on in disaster situations.

"The components of the Texas Military Forces operate in a fiscally responsible fashion - with both our state and federal resources," said Maj. Gen. John F. Nichols, The Adjutant General of Texas. "Regardless of personnel constraints imposed at the national-level, we stand ready to support the Governor of Texas during any time of need."

The DoD-mandated furlough is not expected to impact traditional members of the National Guard, who typically drill one weekend per month and two weeks a year.

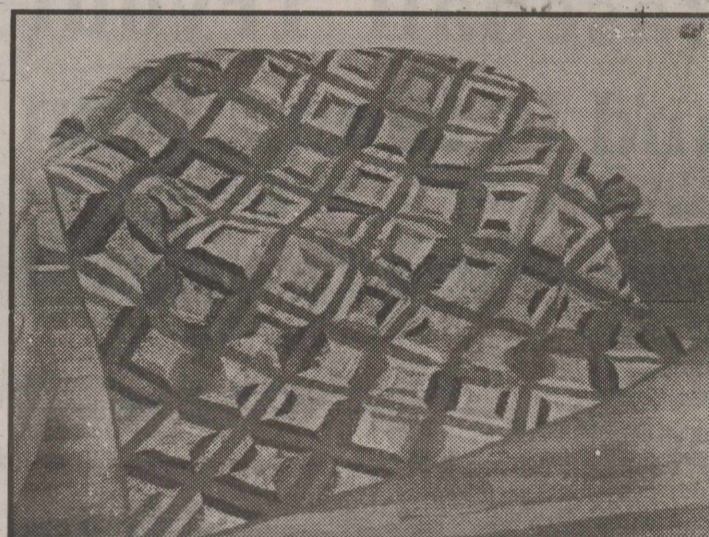

Bill's passage increases transparency for public pension funds in Texas

AUSTIN—Today, May 31, 2013, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs praised the passage of House Bill 13, which was signed by Governor Rick Perry and increases transparency for all public pension funds in Texas.
In the past, it has been difficult for taxpayers to determine the financial health of public pension funds in our state. House Bill 13, authored by State Representative Bill Callegari and State Senator Robert Duncan, will require all public pension systems to post financial information online so it is readily available and easy for taxpayers to find.

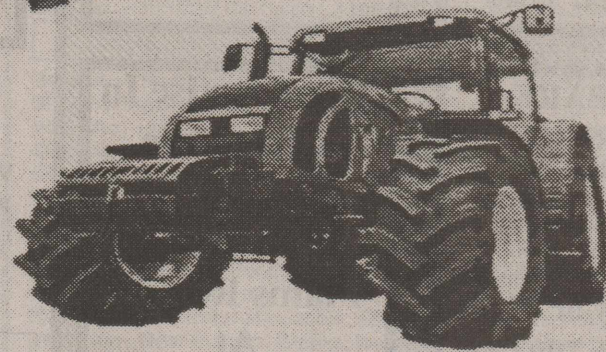
The new law also requires administrators of public pension funds in Texas to undergo critical training that will assist them in making informed decisions regarding taxpayer dollars.
"This is a huge win for Texas

taxpayers," Combs said. "If a public pension fund is underfunded, it is another form of debt that taxpayers are responsible for. When taxpayers are paying the freight, they need to know how much they owe."
Combs has been at the forefront of government transparency measures throughout her time as Texas Comptroller. Last year she held 40 town halls across Texas, talking with concerned citizens about government debt. Later, the Comptroller's office provided a series of reports called *Texas, It's Your Money*, which offered Texans a clear picture of who is taxing them, how their money is being spent, how public debt is growing, as well as a detailed look at state and local pension programs. Each of the reports focused on financial obligations of taxpayers and provided suggestions on how government should provide more transparency regarding those obligations.

A sober driver is the most valuable person (MVP) at your summer party

TxDOT urges Texans to line up a P.A.S.S. to avoid arrest, injury or death

AUSTIN—Whether attending a backyard barbecue, going to an outdoor concert or enjoying a lazy day on the river, Texans are planning for summer fun. As plans are made, more thought must also go into planning for a sober driver if drinking is involved.
Over the past five summers, alcohol-related fatalities increased by more than 10 percent in Texas. To curb this trend and help reduce drinking and driving, the Texas Department of Transportation is reminding Texans to obtain a Summer P.A.S.S. (Person Appointed to Stay Sober) and make a sober driver an essential part of their summer plans.
"We're reminding people that drinking and driving can land them in jail or worse," said TxDOT Executive Director Phil Wilson. "Don't drink and drive. You can't afford a DWI and it could very well get you and others killed."

According to a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration survey, 40 percent of drivers who consumed alcohol felt it would be safe to have three or more drinks within a two-hour period before driving. A portion of that 40 percent believed they could have five or more drinks. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Numerous studies have shown that consuming as little as one drink can impair your ability to safely operate a vehicle.

In the summer of 2012 (June 1 – Aug. 31), there were 6,576 alcohol-related traffic crashes in Texas, resulting in 2,486 serious injuries and 302 fatalities.

Final Pushing the Limits Held at Local Library

The Cross Plains Public Library's fourth and final Pushing the Limits program was held last week in the library's conference room. The library was chosen as one of twenty libraries nationwide to participate in this pilot program sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

The book *The Land of Painted Caves* by Jean Auel was chosen as the Knowledge portion of the project to explore ways for all of us to push the limits using science and technology. Bob Childress, our science facilitator, led a thoughtful and lively discussion on the topic and brought out interesting details of evidences

and creative writing in Auel's story taking place in the Neanderthal and Cro-Magnon age. Auel's research took her to many of the caves in France and Spain where paintings from that era still exist. She joined the creative knowledge of the people in with her fictional character Ayla. Besides the art, the book also brought out the knowledge of weapons, medicinal methods, and ways and means of travel, shelters, and food preparation.

The participants watched a video interview of the author and a human interest story showing a well known chef and his philosophy of food and food

preparation by reviving heirloom crops, recovering rare livestock, and applying his knowledge of molecular gastronomy in his recipes.

The library appreciates the opportunity it had to present a new approach of programming to our community using Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math, and is very pleased with the attendance and participation it generated. We thank the National Science Foundation, Dartmouth College, the Association for Rural and Small Libraries, the Califa Group, Dawson Media Group, and Oregon State University.

Prior to joining O'Melveny & Myers in 2007, Steptoe was senior correspondent, bureau chief and deputy news director for Time magazine, based in Los Angeles. She joined the magazine in 2002 and interviewed and profiled such newsmakers as Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the Rev. Billy Graham, Pastor Rick Warren, Microsoft founder Bill Gates, Walt Disney Company CEO Bob Iger and filmmaker Tyler Perry, among others. She also co-wrote cover stories on education issues and lifestyle trends. Her essay on the racial, political and economic conditions in New Orleans before Hurricane Katrina was part of the package of Time stories on the storm honored with two 2006 National Magazine Awards.

Steptoe also worked at People magazine, where she was a senior editor, handling human affairs and

investigations. Steptoe was a staff writer and, later, a senior editor at Sports Illustrated from 1990 to 2001, overseeing the development of a variety of stories and profiles. Her sports journalism experience also includes broadcasting work. From 1995 to 2001, Steptoe was a correspondent on HBO's "RealSports with Bryant Gumbel" magazine show, where she investigated East Germany's systematic doping of Olympic athletes - a report for which she received an Emmy Award in 1999 from the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences for Outstanding Sports Journalism. Her broadcasting experience also includes a three-year stint as national correspondent for the CNN/NI sports network.

Steptoe earned a law degree from Duke University after receiving degrees in economics and journalism from the University of Missouri.

Commissioner approve redesign of Sheriff's Office Dispatch, 911 changes

The Callahan County Commissioners' Court approved a redesign of the Callahan County Sheriff's Office Dispatch offices and 911 Public Safety Answering Point during the commissioners' court meeting held Friday, May 24th at the County Courthouse in Baird.

Before approving the items, commissioners met with Sam Goldsmith of Goldsmith Solutions and Joe Rogers and Rhonda Vestal with the West Texas Council of Governments to discuss the redesign of the Sheriff's Office Dispatch and the 911 Public Safety Answering Point.

The current Sheriff's Office dispatch has a lack of space. The current location is approximately 72 square feet and requires 2-3 employees at all times. The redesign will expand the available space from 72 square feet to 280 square feet, while simultaneously allowing the modernization of the Dispatch and 911 operations. Because the space would be moved, it would allow for a new Dispatch center to be completed without interrupting current day-to-day operations.

The redesign will include new furniture, doors/windows, flooring, construction, electrical, voice/data, technology, 911 move support IT project support, IT move support and contingency costs.

Currently funding is available through the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) to pay for a majority of the costs of the project.

The total cost of the redesign is \$52,464. WCTCOG will cover \$38,714 (74 percent) of the total cost, while Callahan County will pay \$13,750 (26 percent) of the total cost of the redesign.

After some discussion, a motion was made by Commissioner Bryan Farmer to approve the project and a second was made by Commissioner Harold Hicks. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court meeting included:

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:31 a.m. with Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, and Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham present. Also present at the meeting was Donna Bell, County Clerk, and County Treasurer Dianne Gunter. Matt Stubbs was also attending the meeting.

—Minutes of the previous commissioners' court meeting were reviewed and signed.

—Under public comments, there was none.

—Cactus Schroeder came before the commissioners' court to discuss with the commissioners, particularly Commissioner Kirkham, county road maintenance. No action was taken.

—No action was taken on the Countywide Burn Ban. The Burn Ban remains lifted.

—Sam Goldsmith with Goldsmith Solutions presented an IT report to the commissioners' court on projects implemented, issues experienced, projects currently being implemented or evaluated, and issues that need addressing in the next twelve months. Commissioner Windham made a motion to approve the report and Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Sam Goldsmith presented the proposed Windstream contracts for telephone and Internet services for the County Courthouse complex, Justice of the Peace Precinct #1 (Clyde) and Justice of the Peace Precinct #4 (Cross Plains).

The current monthly expenses for Callahan County Courthouse Complex are \$1,018.14. The new contract will provide the monthly expenses for

\$1,113.50.

The new contract will increase Internet Bandwidth from 5Mbps to 10Mbps, and moves Long Distance from Pay-Per-Minute to 10,000 minute block of time (current usage approximately 2,500 minutes per month).

The Clyde Justice of the Peace contract with Windstream will go from \$416.52 per month to \$485.10.

The Cross Plains Justice of the Peace contract with Windstream will increase from \$408.52 per month to \$485.10 per month.

Commissioner Hicks made a motion to approve the contracts. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion passed with a 5-0 vote.

—Sheriff Joy presented the Courthouse Security Policy. After some discussion, Commissioner Farmer made a motion to accept the policy. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion. The motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Sheriff Joy also presented the Sheriff's Monthly Report for April 26th through May 20th. Commissioner Windham made a motion to accept the Sheriff's Report. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a vote of 5-0.

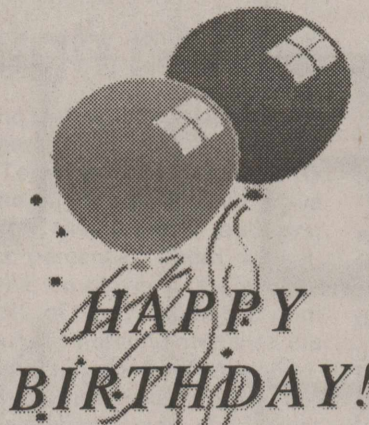

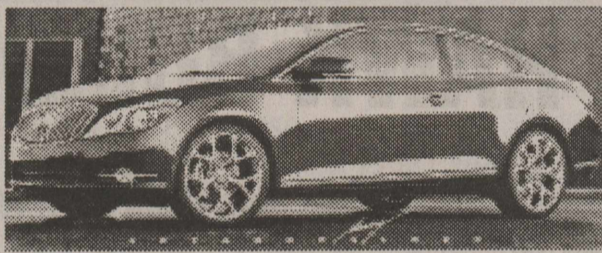
