## NO Election Needed for City Council 4 File for Cross Plains I.S.D. Trustee Election with 3 Terms Up for Grabs

Incumbents Mayor Ray Purvis and Councilmen Jerry Cassle and Bob Kirkham will start new two-year terms for the City of Cross Plains. With no other candidates filing for the positions by March 8, 2010, an official election will not be necessary.

The Cross Plains City Council currently consists of Peg Terrell, Lewis Fortune, Karen Lenz, Jerry Cassle and Bob Kirkham.

Incumbents Tommy Ames, Hoyt Foster and John Fred McWilliams have filed for re-election. Mark Ring has filed an application for election to the Cross Plains I.S.D. School Board of Trustee.

The 3-year terms of school board trustees, Tommy Ames, Hoyt McWilliams and John Fred McWilliams are expiring. McWilliams was appointed to

complete Vicki Dillard's term following her resignation.

Trustees currently serving the Cross Plains I.S.D. are Jim Cook, Donnie Dillard, Bryan Bennett Michael Cowan, Tommy Ames, Hoyt Foster and John Fred McWilliams.

The general election will be held May 8, 2010. The location and other details will be published at a later date.

## Tiffany Holland Sets New Personal Best at Regional Power Lifting Meet

A lot of hard work and dedication goes into preparation for a power lifting meet. All of that dedication and hard work paid off for Tiffany Holland at the Region 1 Girls Power Lifting Meet last Saturday in Monahans.

A power lifting meet consists of a squat, bench and dead lift in which you compete against other girls in your weight class.

Tiffany attended several meets throughout the 2010 power

lifting season where she excelled in every aspect of the meet. Every meet she went to she walked away with new personal bests and, on several occasions, a medal to show for it.

Going into the regional meet Tiffany had a combined total of 645 pounds, over four and half times her own body weight. At the regional meet she squatted 235, benched 155 and dead lifted 265 for a grand total of 655 pounds!

That total ranked her as the third strongest 1A lifter in all of Region 1. Just to give you an idea of the size of the region, it goes as far west as El Paso, as far north as Perryton, as far east as Rising Star and as far south as Big Lake.

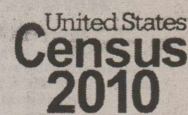

# Don't Mess with Texas Scholarship Program

## Texas Brigades summer camp registration continues

And I believe those same sentiments apply to each and every one of the 100 or so volunteers who assist with the various camps.

"A lot of high school students aspire to find a career in wildlife management, but the field has always been highly competitive. Participation in the Brigades camps offers them a chance to get not only a taste for such careers, but also to develop a network of contacts who can help them achieve their career goals. The Brigades network is one big family."

- 11th Battalion South Texas Buckskin Brigade - Carrizo Springs, June 13-17.

- 18th Battalion Rolling Plains Bobwhite Brigade - Coleman, June 19-23.

Parents love the program, said Helen Holdsworth, San Antonio-based Texas Brigades Executive Director.

"We receive many positive reports back from cadets and parents about the Brigades. One father sent a letter recently thanking us for having such an influence on his daughter," Holdsworth said.

The father wrote, "Her development, manifested by her newly-heightened initiative, competitiveness and motivation, is in large part to be attributed to her Brigade journey."

A young man, who attended both the Bobwhite and Buckskin Brigades, is attending the University of Alabama at Birmingham majoring in political science, Holdsworth said.

"He received a 4.0 last semester and credits many of the lessons he learned at camp in helping him be successful in college. We are not just educating Texas youth about wildlife," she said. "We are

developing the future leaders of Texas and the nation."

The camps are a partnership effort of the Texas Wildlife Association, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service, several universities, conservation groups, local soil and water conservation districts, private businesses and individuals with an interest in wildlife and youth leadership development. Tuition is \$300 per cadet per camp, but sponsors are available to provide financial aid when needed, Rollins said.

"We're also always looking for highly motivated adults from 20 to 60 years of age who are willing to serve as 'covey,' 'school' or 'herd' leaders," Rollins said. "They'll get a one-of-a-kind intensive workshop in the game species they choose. But even better, they'll get a full helping of appreciation and optimism about today's youth and what a powerful impact they can have on conservation."

## Texas Employers Add 30,300 Jobs in January

Texas job growth data released today by Labor Department after weather delay

AUSTIN — Total nonagricultural employment in Texas increased by 30,300 jobs in January. Texas has gained nearly 38,000 jobs in the last four months, while the nation lost 295,000 over the same four-month period.

"Texas employers have added jobs in three of the last four months across a wide variety of industries," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Meanwhile, the nation as a whole lost jobs in January."

Texas recorded job gains in six of the 11 major industries in January. Professional and Business Services added 20,900 jobs in January, and Leisure and Hospitality employment increased by 6,300 jobs.

"Job gains over the past several months can offer more opportunities to the many Texans still out of work," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "TWC's online job-matching Web site, WorkInTexas.com, can help connect Texas job seekers with available jobs."

In January, Trade,

Transportation, and Utilities gained 5,200 jobs, and Education and Health Services employment increased by 3,000, for a total of 54,300 jobs over the year. Manufacturing employment registered a monthly increase for the first time in 19 months by gaining 1,800 jobs in January.

"For the first time in more than a year, the Manufacturing industry recorded job gains, which is encouraging," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "Education and Health Services employment continued to increase in January, adding jobs in 11 of the past 12 months."

**Texas Unemployment Rate Data Released on Thursday, March 4, 2010 Unchanged by Weather Delay**

The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained at 8.2 percent in January, unchanged from a revised 8.2 percent in December 2009, and continued to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 9.7 percent. The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for January 2009 was 6.4 percent.

## TEXAS Unemployment Rate Stands at 8.2 Percent in January

AUSTIN —The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained at 8.2 percent in January, unchanged from a revised 8.2 percent in December 2009, and continued to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 9.7 percent. The Texas Civilian Labor Force continued to grow in January, reaching its highest level ever at 12.1 million workers.

"The Texas unemployment rate held steady over the past two months at 8.2 percent and remained lower than the national rate of 9.7 percent," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken.

In January, the Amarillo Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) experienced the lowest unemployment rate in the state at 6.0 percent (not seasonally adjusted), followed by the Lubbock MSA and the Midland MSA, both with 6.2 percent. The unemployment rate stood at 6.4 percent in the College Station-Bryan MSA.

**Labor Department Delays Job Growth Data Release Due to Inclement East Coast Weather**

The U.S. Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics has informed TWC Labor Market and Career Information of a delay in the release of the seasonally adjusted Current Employment Statistics (CES) due to inclement weather on the eastern coast of the United States. CES data provide information on job growth in Texas and in each major Texas industry. At this time, TWC has not been notified of a time estimate when the data will be available.

## Callahan County's jobless rate rises in January to 6.4%

The unemployment rate in Callahan County rose six-tenths of one percent to 6.4 percent in January 2010, according to jobless figures released Friday, March 5th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County in December 2009 was 5.8 percent.

Of the 7,251 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,786 were employed during January 2010, and 465 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 6.4%. The county's unemployment rate one year ago in January 2009 was 4.9%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 5.8% in December 2009. Of the 7,214 civilian labor force in the county during December, 6,798 had jobs while 416 or 5.8% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 5.9% in November 2009, 6.4% in October, 6.3% in September, 6.1% in August, 6.7% in July, 6.7% in June, 5.7% in May, 4.9% in April, 5.0% in March, and 4.9% in February, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for January 2010 include: Brown, 7.6%; Coleman, 7.7%; Eastland, 8.5%; Jones, 8.6%; Runnels, 9.9%; Shackelford, 5.3%; Stephens, 7.8%; and Taylor County, 6.5%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 6.7% in January 2010, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. Abilene's Combined Labor Force is 83,800. There were 78,200 employed during January 2010, while 5,600 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 6.7%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 83,300 in December 2009, with total employment of 78,300 in December, while 5,000 were unemployed in December.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for January 2009 was 5.2%, with the total workforce at 81,800, with 77,600 employed and 4,200 unemployed in January 2009.

for the month of January 2010 was 8.6 percent. Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 8.0 percent. The state's unemployment rate in January of 2009 was 6.8 percent.

The United States unemployment rate for January 2010 was 10.6 percent. The nation's unemployment rate for the previous month of December 2009 was 9.7%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in January 2009 was 8.5%.

### Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate increased six-tenths of a percentage point to 8.6 percent for January 2010. This was recorded as the third highest January unemployment rate since 1976. This year's December-to-January change was five-tenths of a percentage point lower than last year's change and was more in line with the 10-year-average December-to-January change. Since January 2009, the rate moved upwards by 1.8 percentage points. The national unemployment rate surpassed the Texas unemployment rate's over-the-month change by three-tenths of a percentage point for a rate of 10.6 percent. This made 31 consecutive months that the Texas unemployment rate remained below the national rate.

The Civilian Labor Force expanded by 66,500 persons for an estimate of 12,094,200 in January. This month's Civilian Labor Force was ranked as the

highest recorded since 1976. Since January 2009, Texas has added 356,100 persons into the Civilian Labor Force.

The number of jobholders in January 2010 was estimated to be 11,049,800, a decrease of 20,100 persons from December 2009. The 10-year-average December-to-January change was a loss of 83,800 persons. Since last January, Texas has added 112,300 Texans into the ranks of the employed population. The number of unemployed in January increased by 86,600 from month-ago levels for an estimate of 1,044,400. The previous January, Texas added 126,000 people into the ranks of the unemployed population. This marked the first time that the number of unemployed persons was recorded above one million persons.

The number of those receiving unemployment insurance benefits declined by 3,600, totaling 207,800 persons. In the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), 16 experienced a decline in continued claim activity, eight MSAs increased, and one remained unchanged. The Midland MSA had the largest decline in persons continuing to receive unemployment benefits at -9.6 percent from December to January.

The Amarillo MSA unemployment rate was recorded as the lowest among the MSAs at 6.0 percent for January 2010. The highest unemployment rate was in the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission MSA with a January estimate of 12.2 percent.

## Unemployed Texans Will Not Face Gap in Benefits

Claimants Should Continue to Request Benefits As Usual

AUSTIN—The deadline for jobless Texans to file for emergency unemployment benefits has been extended from February 27 to April 3, 2010, the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) announced today. This new filing deadline allows long-term claimants to continue receiving unemployment benefits.

Congress approved this deadline extension before qualified claimants faced a gap in receiving benefits. Claimants should continue to request unemployment benefit payments on their scheduled day.

Claimants who are currently receiving emergency

unemployment benefits may find updated information on their claims at <http://ui.texasworkforce.org>, or by calling UI Tele-Serv at 1-800-558-8321 and pressing option 2. There is no need to call TWC to qualify for this extension unless claimants receive a letter telling them to call.

Emergency unemployment benefits are entirely federally funded, so Texas employers will not be charged for any claims paid on this extension. Currently, approximately 385,000 Texans who would have lost their emergency unemployment benefits are eligible for continuation of emergency benefits without delay.

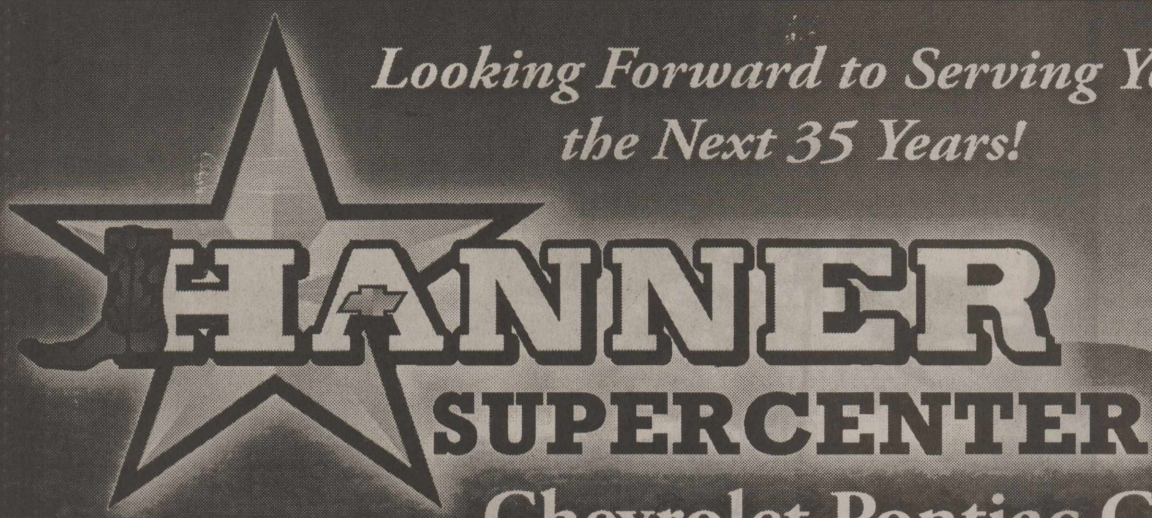

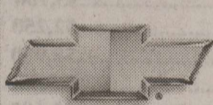
