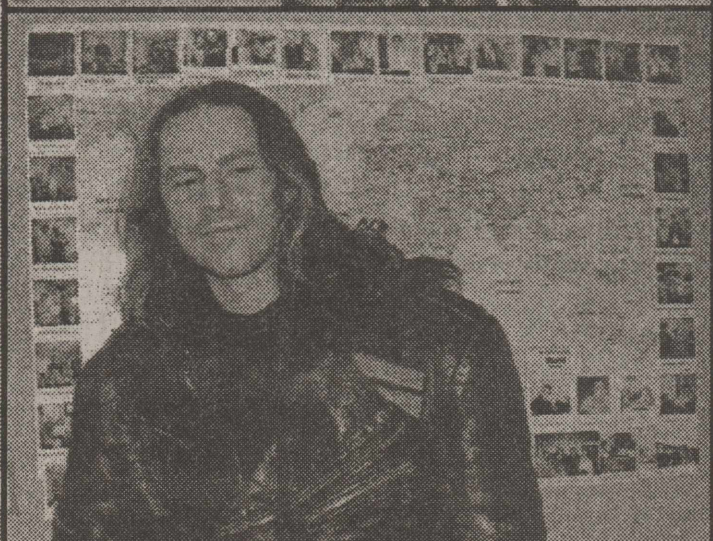

When the motorcycle with a foreign flag flying from the back pulled into City Hall last week, the natural assumption was that he was looking for the Robert E. Howard Museum. A quick call to Project Pride members confirmed the fact that Kosta Atanasov from Bulgaria had indeed scheduled a tour of the local attraction and they were just awaiting his arrival.

The outgoing young man is on a journey around the world on his trusty Kawasaki, writing a blog as he goes. It will take him 3-4 months to complete the trip, which has thus far taken him from Bulgaria to Japan, across the ocean to San Francisco and into Cross Plains.

Having been a fan of Howard's writings since he was a young boy, he was pretty much overcome to visit the Museum and to be allowed to actually sit at the desk and touch the typewriter in Howard's room. And having his picture taken at the desk was even more memorable.

Although the furnishings in Howard's room are not the actual pieces that belonged to the writer, it doesn't take much imagination to visualize Howard working in that small room, pounding out thousands of words on that old 1928 Underwood typewriter.

Kosta's parents were both born in the Ukraine, and his mother taught him the proficient English that he speaks, as well as fluent Russian, Spanish and his native Bulgarian. In his "real world," Kosta is a graphic artist, developing fantasy drawings and models for the gaming industry.

## Texas Unemployment Rate Remained at 8.2 Percent for February

AUSTIN —The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady at 8.2 percent in February, unchanged from 8.2 percent in January 2010, and continuing to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for February of 9.7 percent. Now at more than 12.1 million workers, the Texas Civilian Labor Force grew by another 40,200 workers in February.

Total nonagricultural employment in Texas decreased by 13,000 positions in February, offsetting the revised January gain of 12,600 jobs. Four industries added jobs including Professional and Business Services employment, which increased by 9,000 jobs, which is the largest monthly gain since January 2008.

"The Texas unemployment rate remained at 8.2 percent for the fourth month in a row," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "Although this serious national recession continues to have a negative impact here in Texas, the unemployment rate appears to have stabilized."

Other industries adding jobs in February included Manufacturing, which added 2,900 jobs, Mining and Logging, which increased by 1,200 jobs and Information employment, which increased by 200 jobs.

"While it is encouraging to see job gains in February across several major employment

sectors, our job market remains tight for those seeking new opportunities in the Lone Star State," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "TWC and the 28 workforce boards are committed to assisting Texas job seekers and connecting them with available jobs."

In February, Leisure and Hospitality employment recorded a loss of 4,300, Education and Health Services decreased by 3,000 jobs and Financial Activities employment was down by 3,200 jobs. Construction posted a loss of 4,600 jobs, and Trade, Transportation, and Utilities also decreased by 7,700 jobs.

"Although we sustained overall job losses in February, we experienced job gains in critical industries such as Manufacturing and Professional and Business Services," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "Texans searching for work can look to TWC for assistance at workforce centers across the state and search for jobs on WorkInTexas.com."

The Amarillo Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) experienced the lowest unemployment rate in the state at 5.7 percent (not seasonally adjusted), followed by the Midland MSA with 5.8 percent, and third lowest was the Lubbock MSA and College Station-Bryan MSA, each at 6.0 percent.

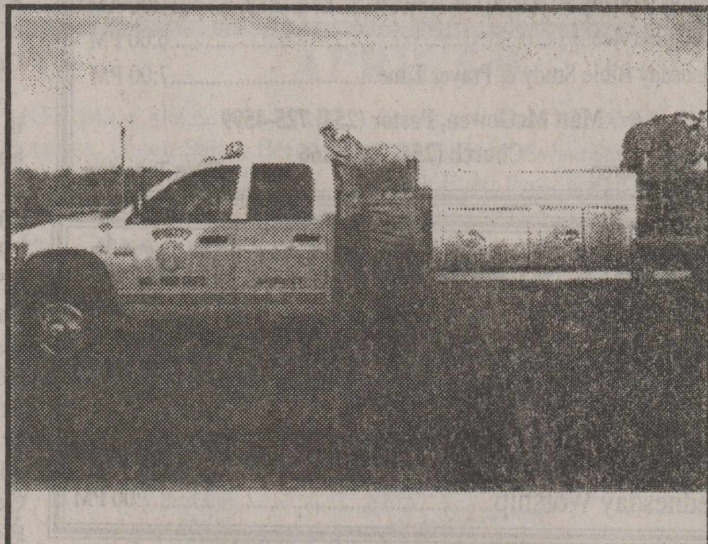
## Oplin Bi-Annual Homecoming and Community-Wide Dinner Set for Saturday, June 5

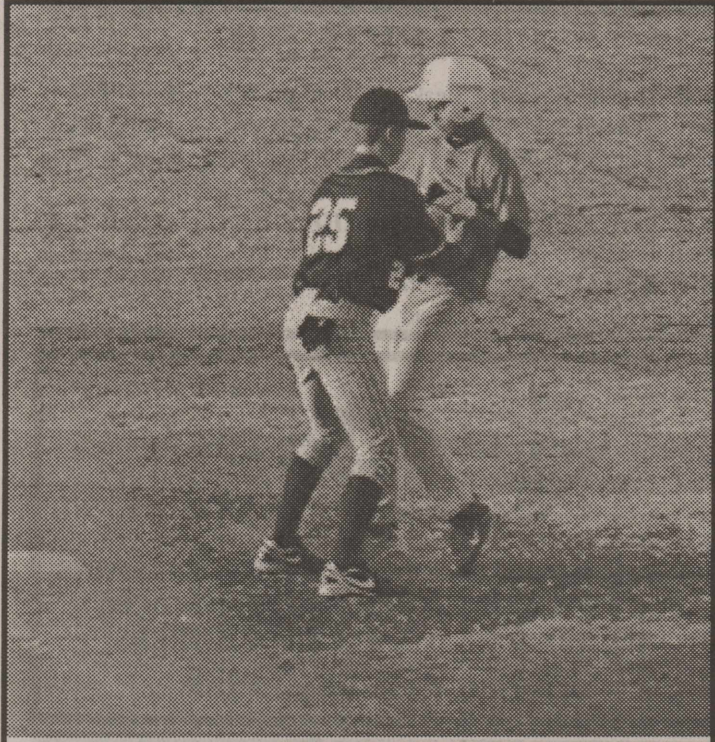

## Texas Continues To Phase In Minimum State Vaccine Requirements For Students

The Abilene Care Van and the Caring for Children Foundation of Texas will be offering required vaccinations FREE at the Medical Care Mission, 1857 Pine, Abilene, TX 79601 on April 1, 2010, from 5-7 PM. Parents are encouraged to be proactive by immunizing their children now before the back to school rush to adhere to the state vaccine requirements.

Vaccine requirements incorporated in Title 25 Health Services, 97.61-97.72 of the Texas Administrative Code (TAC) continues to be phased in by grades. Texas immunization requirements were revised in March 2009 to closely match the recommendations by the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices.

In addition, as of January 1, 2010 Texas Education Code, section 51.9192, Subchapter Z established the requirement for students entering college, including transfer students who will be residing on campus housing to have received the

meningococcal vaccine. Beginning school year (SY) 2010-11, students entering Kindergarten, 1st, 7th and 8th grade will be affected by the following changes:

**Meningococcal Vaccine** - Beginning SY 2010-11, 7-8th grade requirement

Graduating seniors are encouraged to receive the meningococcal vaccine now while they are still in school and may be eligible for FREE or low cost vaccine.

**Varicella Vaccine** - Beginning SY 2010-11, 2 dose of Varicella for K-1<sup>st</sup>, 7-8<sup>th</sup> grade

**Tdap Vaccine** - Beginning SY 2010-11, a booster dose of Tdap for 7-8<sup>th</sup> grade

**MMR Vaccine** - Beginning SY 2010-11, 2 dose of MMR vaccine for K-1<sup>st</sup> grade

**Hepatitis A Vaccine** - Beginning SY 2010-11, 2 dose of Hepatitis A K-1<sup>st</sup> grade

Parents or guardians are asked to please bring child's immunization record. Children 17 and under must be accompanied by parent or guardian. VFC eligible.

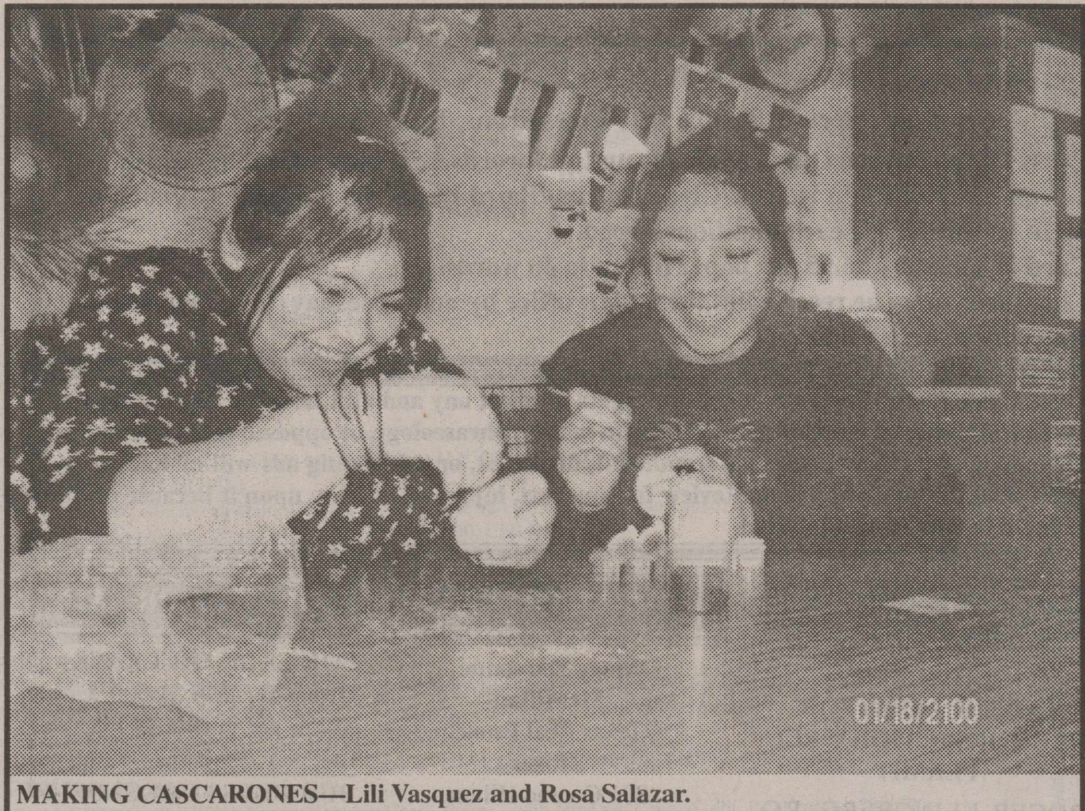

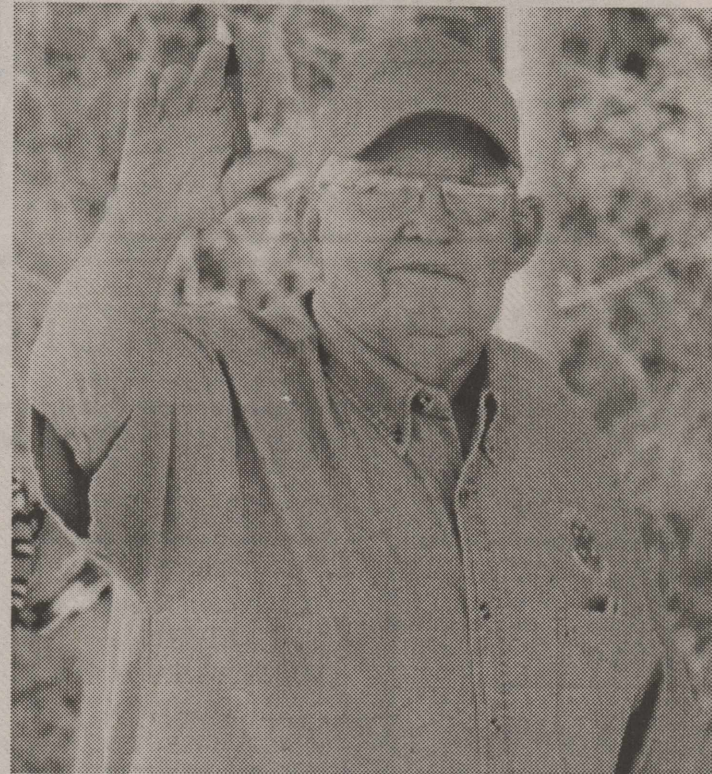
## Callahan County 4-H Shooting Sports to host 3rd annual Charlie Greenway Silhouette Match

# County Burn Ban reinstated by Commissioners Monday

The Callahan County Commissioners voted to reinstate the countywide outdoor burn ban effective immediately.

The commissioners' court took the action at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, March 29th during the commissioners' court emergency meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by Judge Roger Com. Those present included Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, and County Clerk Donna Bell. Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham was absent from the meeting.

After some discussion, Commissioner Farmer made a motion to reinstate the Burn Ban. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Windham and the motion carried with a 4-0 vote.

Commissioner Farmer made a motion to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting at 2:04 p.m. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion, which then carried with a 4-0 vote.

The Burn Ban order follows:

## CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED that the following regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas.

(1) Action prohibited:  
A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly burns any

combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others.

B. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such activities by others.

(2) Enforcement:  
A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor. B. This order may be enforced by any duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan County

(3) This order is effective and enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below.

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations, or, harvesting of agriculture crops.

(5) Further, a person is not in violation if prior to the setting of any outdoor fire, he or she first obtains the permission of the appropriate volunteer Fire Chief. In this instance the Fire Chief will have the authority to set the conditions, restrictions, and/or precautions which must be observed.

(6) See Attachment A for welding precautions and Attachment B for grilling precautions.

ATTACHMENT A

Due to high fire danger and dry foliage these restrictions were put in place for the protection of the Citizens and their property in Callahan County. It was not intended to take away a person's livelihood.

WELDING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THE PROPER PRECAUTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN.

1. The individual welding must have a spotter.
2. Two wet fire extinguishers must be available.
3. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all times.
4. Must have water sprayer available for use.
5. Must wet down sufficient area (and re-wet as often as necessary).

These safety precautions must be taken and also, please use common sense and good judgement if the conditions are windy. If the job is not an emergency put it off until another date.

Violators will be charged with a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$500.00. An individual, or individuals, could be liable for damages, if fire occurs. If there is a fatality, one could face possible felony charges.

## ATTACHMENT B

Due to high fire danger and dry foliage these restrictions were put in place for the protection of the Citizens and their property in Callahan County.

OUTDOOR GRILLING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THESE PRECAUTIONS ARE TAKEN.

1. Individuals grilling must attend the grill at all times.
2. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all times.
3. Cooking must be done in an enclosed cooker.

Violators will be charged with a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$500.00. An individual, or individuals, could be liable for damages, if fire occurs. If there is a fatality, one could face possible felony charges.

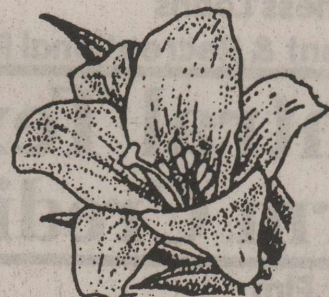

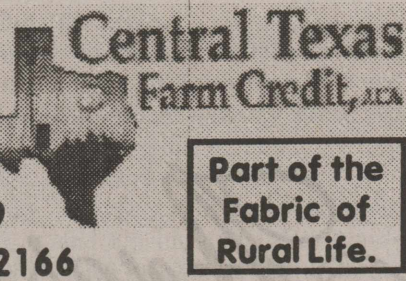

## Commissioners discuss Community Clean-Up grant with West Central Texas Council of Governments

Paul McCarthy and Wendy Patterson with the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) met with the Callahan County Commissioners' Court Monday, March 22nd to discuss a United States Department of Agriculture Solid Waste Management Technical Assistant Grant.

The commissioners' court met with McCarthy and Patterson at the Commissioners' Courtroom at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird.

The two reported the USDA Solid Waste Management Technical Assistance Grant was awarded to the WCTCOG to be used for those communities in the Region with a population under 10,000. The grant will be used to provide training and technical assistance to county, city, and school staff for a Community Clean-Up.

Patterson also spoke to the commissioners' court about the Safe Room/Storm Shelter Rebate Program.

According to a WCTCOG press release submitted by Patterson, last year, the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) and Stephens County submitted applications for Safe Room Rebate program funding to the Governor's Division of Emergency Management (GDEM). GDEM is responsible for administering the program in Texas but the funding actually originates with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The Safe Room program is one of the grants available under FEMA's family of Mitigation Grant Programs.

WCTCOG has grant monies available for the Safe Room Program will provide funding to single-family home owners to cover one-half the cost of installing tornado shelters/safe rooms in new or existing homes up to a maximum rebate amount of \$3,000 per unit installed. Other requirements are that each installed unit has been certified as meeting the standards set for tornado shelters by the National Storm Shelter Association (NSSA) before the rebate can be paid.

The WCTCOG has received enough funding to support the cost of installing approximately 100 shelters in homes throughout the 19-county region. These units are intended for homes

within the West Central Texas region.

No action was taken by the commissioners' court following the representatives presentations.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the regular commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. Those present included Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham, County Treasurer Dianne Gunter, and County Clerk Donna Bell. Also attending the commissioners' court meeting was Bill Richardson.

—The minutes of the previous commissioners' court meeting were signed.

—Under public comments, there were none.

—Callahan County Sheriff John Windham and Jailer Desma Cantine spoke to the commissioners' court and answered questions about the recent Callahan County Jail inspection by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. After the discussion, Commissioner Hicks made a motion to approve the Callahan County Jail inspection. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote. The commissioners' court congratulated the Sheriff and his staff on the successful inspection.

—The commissioners' court discussed the program on the road construction being done through the O.R.C.A. grant. No action was taken.

—Judge Corn made a motion to sign a Proclamation proclaiming April 2010 as Census Month in Callahan County. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote. The Proclamation follows:

**A Proclamation of the County of Callahan April 2010 - Census Month**

WHEREAS an accurate census count is vital to our community and residents' well-being by helping planners determine where to locate schools, day care centers, roads and public

transportation, hospitals and other facilities, and achieving an accurate and complete count of the nation's growing and changing population;

WHEREAS more than \$400 billion per year in federal and state funding is allocated to states and communities based, in part, on census data;

WHEREAS census data help determine how many seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives and often is used for the redistricting of state legislatures, county and city councils and voting districts;

WHEREAS the 2010 Census creates jobs that stimulate economic growth and increase employment;

WHEREAS the information collected by the census is confidential and protected by law;

Now, therefore, we PROCLAIM that Callahan County is committed to partnering with the U.S. Census Bureau to help ensure a full and accurate count in 2010.

As a 2010 Census partner, we will, in the month of April:

1. Support the goals and ideals for the 2010 Census and disseminate 2010 Census information to encourage those in our community to participate.

2. Encourage people in our community to place an emphasis on the 2010 Census and participate in events and initiatives that will raise overall awareness and ensure a full and accurate census.

3. Support census takers as they help our community complete an accurate count.

4. Create or seek opportunities to collaborate with other like-minded groups in our community by participating in Complete Count Committees and/or utilizing high-profile, trusted voices to advocate on behalf of the 2010 Census.

5. Proclaim April 2010 as "Census Month."

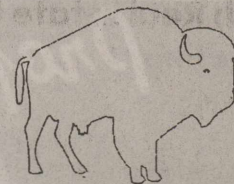

## Summer Forage Fertilization Webinar to Take Place in Abilene, Baird and Anson

Dr. Larry Redmon, State Extension Forage Specialist will be presenting a Summer Forage Fertilization Webinar at 6:00pm on April 6th simultaneously at three different locations. The webinar will be broadcast live at the Taylor County Extension Office located on the grounds of the Taylor County Expo Center, the Callahan County Extension Office located in the county courthouse in Baird and the Anson High School Agriculture building located in Anson.

Fertilizer management is an important part of crop production. Several specific nutrients are required for

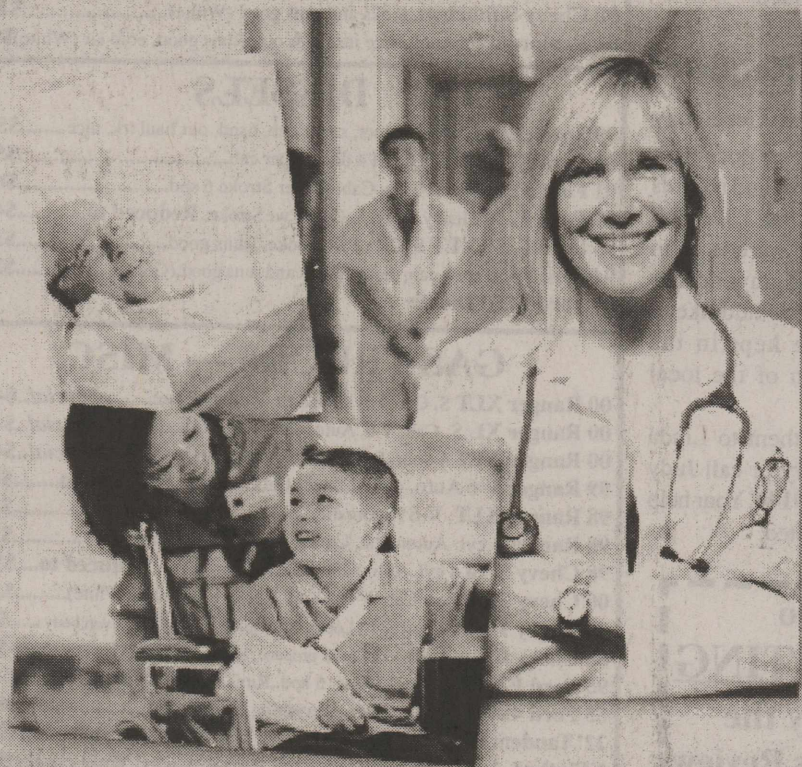
adequate growth of forages. Nitrogen fertilizer provides growth and additional crude protein and is the most limiting factor to growth after moisture. Nitrogen should be applied based on yield goals of forage grasses. Phosphorous and potassium are additional nutrients required by plants in relatively large quantities. If phosphorous and/or potassium are deficient, the expected response of grasses to N fertilizer will not be realized. The availability of these nutrients, or soil fertility status, varies from site to site because of differences in

differences in parent materials of various soils and past cropping history. Producers must also consider fertilizer cost when making their decisions. Fertilizer still remains one of the major inputs in forage production systems. Dealing with fertilizer prices requires aggressive management by growers to maximize production while at the same time minimizing their input costs. But, there are several steps that can be taken when making fertilization decisions. This webinar is planned to help producers with these decisions.

1. Soil Testing / Interpretation
  2. Fertilizer Selection to Optimize Production
  3. Keys to Timing of Fertilizer Applications

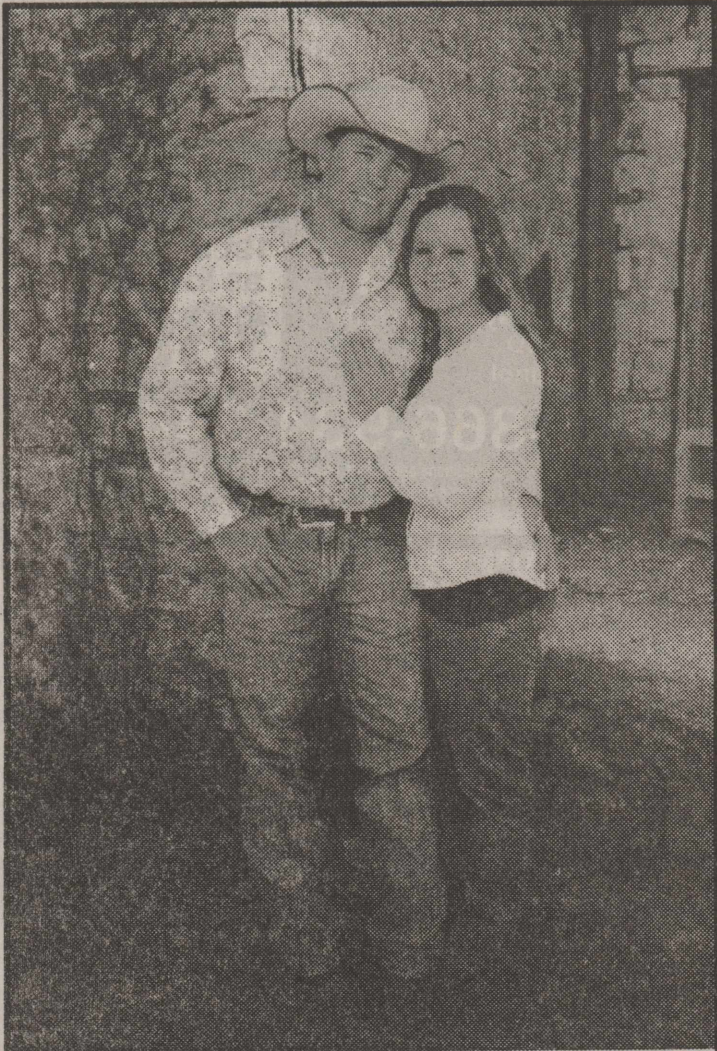

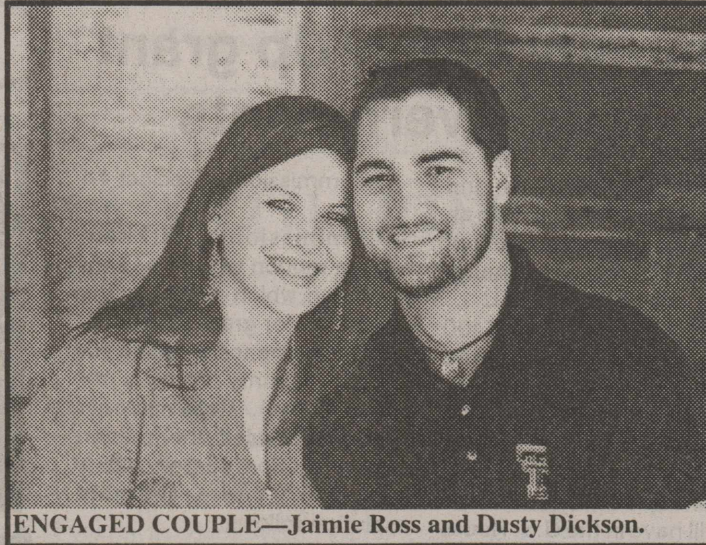

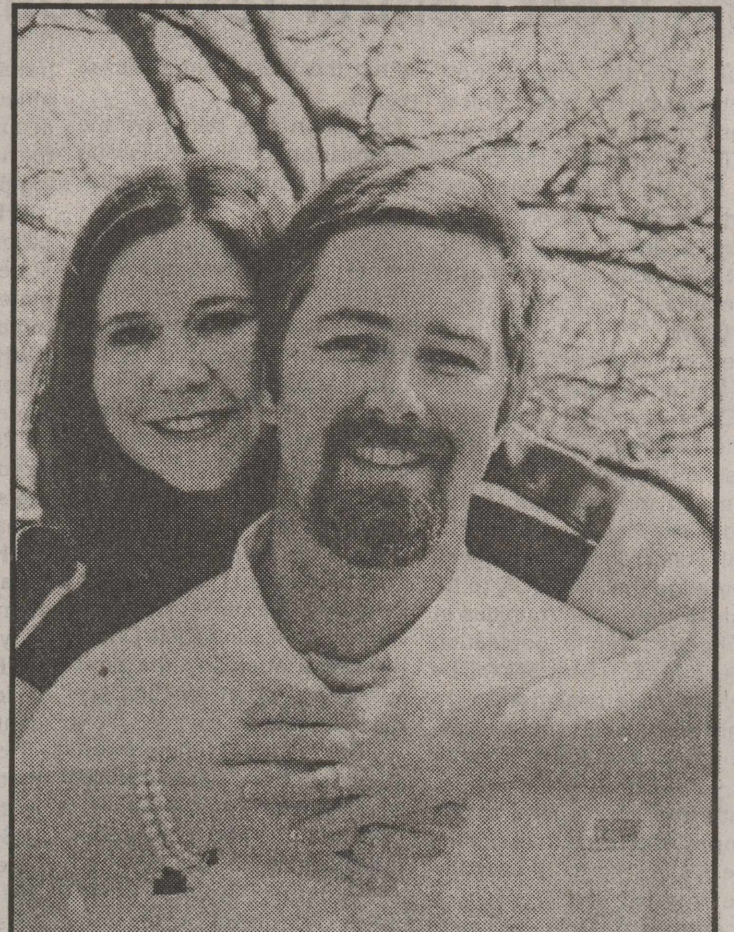
