The celebration dinner on Friday evening at the Community Center will take on a real local flair as Mexico City is catering the affair with their wonderful fajita dinner. Cross Plains claim Class A Bi-District baseball title

Cross Plains High School's varsity baseball team claimed the Class A Bi-District championship with an 11-3 victory over Eula in a one game playoff held Thursday, May 6th at Blackburn Field on the campus of Abilene High School.

The Buffaloes scored early to take the lead and added six runs in the top of the sixth inning to put the game away.

Cross Plains junior pitcher Taylor Savell pitched all seven innings for the Buffaloes, allowing three runs on just three hits. He walked six batters, hit one batter and struck out twelve batters.

The Buffaloes scored four runs in the top of the first inning to take the early 4-0 lead. The Pirates scored all three runs in the first three innings, while the Buffaloes added one run in the top of the second inning to go up 5-1.

Three Cross Plains batters were hit by pitches in the top of the

first inning. The Buffaloes scored four runs in the inning on just two hits and the Pirates committed one error in the inning.

Leading 4-1 in the top of the second inning, Allan Wheeler would single to center field to drive in Cody Ford to give the Buffaloes the 5-1 lead.

Leading 5-3 in the top of the sixth inning, the Buffaloes would score six runs in the inning to take the commanding 11-3 lead. In the inning, Cody Ford would single to drive in Justin Golson to give the Buffaloes the 6-3 lead. Allan Wheeler would then single to plate both Ryder Foster and Cody Ford to give Cross Plains the 8-3 advantage. Pat Border would single to drive in Allan Wheeler to put Cross Plains up 9-3. Then Nick Adams would double to the left field fence to drive in Pat Border for the 10-3 lead. Jerrad Eisenbach would reach base on a Eula error, with

Nick Adams scoring for the 11-3 lead.

Some incomplete offensive at-bats for Cross Plains included: Allan Wheeler, 2 for 4 at the plate with two singles, one run scored and three RBI's; Reese Allen, 1 for 4 with one single; Cody Ford, 2 for 4, two singles, reached base on an error, two runs scored and one RBI; Ryder Foster, 1 for 2 at the plate, one single, hit by a pitch and one run scored; Pat Border, 2 for 4 at the plate with two singles, one run scored and one RBI; Taylor Savell, 0 for 3; Nick Adams, 1 for 3, one double, one run scored and one RBI; Jerrad Eisenbach, 0 for 3, reached on an error and one RBI; Justin Golson, 0 for 3, reached base on an error; and Blake Hutchins, 0 for 1, reached base on an error.

Past and Present Texas Rangers at "Meet the Author"

Did you know the oldest State Policing agency in the U.S., established in 1823, is the Texas Rangers? At "Meet the Author," last Tuesday, Bob Favor told us things have changed quite a bit with the Texas Rangers since the days when they would provide an allotment for hay and oats, but you had to furnish your own horse.

When Bob started with the Texas Rangers in December of 1967, there were 62 rangers. Of those, 6 were Sergeants and 6 were Captains leaving 50 Rangers to cover all 254 Texas counties. They were issued a rifle, a handgun, a shotgun, leg irons and

handcuffs. If they need to call in to headquarters, they would have to go find a phone and make the call. No tax money was spent on the Rangers because all the money they needed was raised from selling things confiscated in drug raids.

Now there are 150 Rangers including 31 attached to the Home Land Security (HLS) detail. They have everything from cell phones, computers and printers in the vehicles, powerful weapons and the HLS detail even has full camouflage and Black Hawk helicopters.

Bob told us the story of a

grocery supplier in Junction that got "tied up" in a mess when he was made an offer he couldn't (or didn't) refuse. Favor told of his adventures catching the crooks and an embarrassing incident that happened when he brought one of the crooks back to the local police. There was a great crowd out to listen to Mr. Favor and if you weren't there, I'll just say you missed a good story.

Bob sold and signed copies of his book, *My Rangering Days*. If you didn't get one, come on by the library and check it out!

Three 3-year Cross Plains I.S.D. Board of Trustee positions were filled in the recent election. Incumbents Tommy Ames and Hoyt Foster were re-elected and John Fred McWilliams was elected to the third place.

McWilliams had been appointed to replace Vicki Dillard following her resignation from the board.

Election results were as follows:

Mark Ring - 9

Current trustees include Jim Cook, Donnie Dillard, Bryan Bennett and Michael Cowan.

The city council seats of Cassle and Kirkham and Mayor Purvis expired this year, but an election was not necessary as no one challenged the incumbents.

Cross Plains City Council members include Jerry Cassle, Peg Terrell, Bob Kirkham, Lewis Fortune, Colby Walker and Mayor Ray Purvis. Walker was appointed to replace Karen Lenz who has moved out of the city limits and is no longer eligible for the position.

Turnout for the election was very light, as indicated by the number of votes cast.

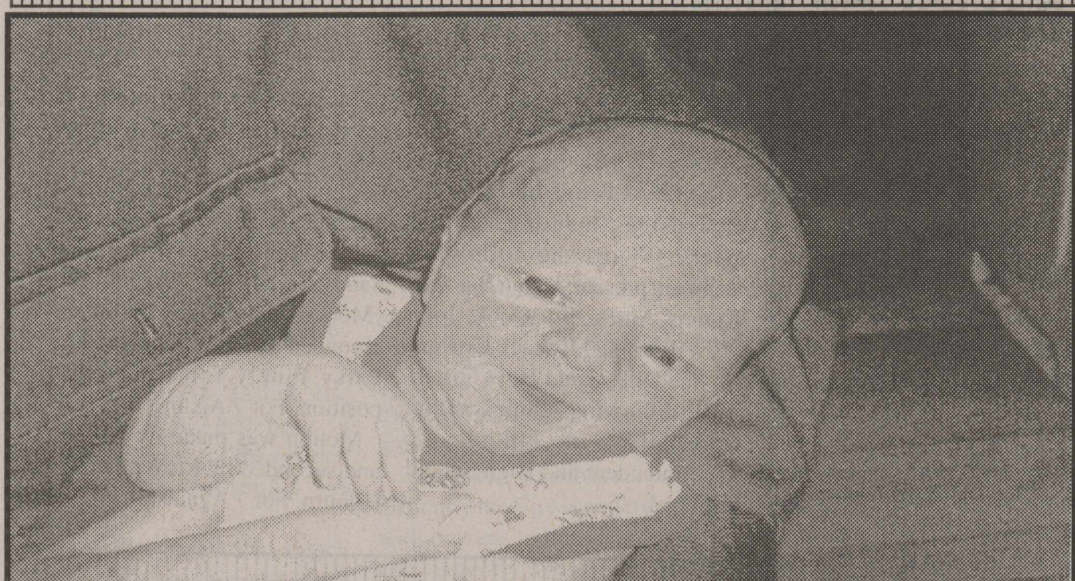

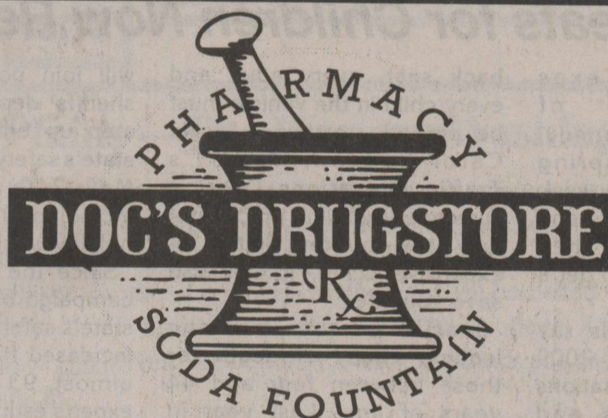

TxDOT Kicks Off Click It or Ticket with New Laws to Protect More Texans Safety Belts for Back Seat Passengers & Booster Seats for Children Now Required

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Transportation's 9th annual Click It or Ticket spring campaign kicks off this week with a warning to drivers and passengers to fasten their safety belts or expect to get a ticket.

Transportation officials say state laws enacted in 2009 could result in more citations this year if drivers and passengers fail to heed new safety belt requirements. For the first time, all passengers in the back seat now must be buckled up, and children younger than 8 years old have to ride in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Fines range from \$25 to \$250 plus court costs.

"Whether you're the driver or a passenger in the front or

back seat, every adult and every child in the vehicle must be properly restrained," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division Director. "Buckling up can not only save you from getting an expensive ticket, it can also save your life."

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for those between four and 44 years of age. Last year in Texas, more than 3,400 people died in fatal collisions on Texas streets and highways. In 2008, half of all pickup truck drivers killed in traffic crashes were not buckled up. Wearing a safety belt increases the odds of surviving a crash by more than 50 percent, and in pickups, that number increases to 80 percent.

Thousands of state troopers

will join police officers and sheriffs' deputies statewide to step up enforcement of the state's safety belt laws between May 24th and June 6th, including the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Since the Click It or Ticket campaign began in 2002, the state's safety belt use rate has increased from 76 percent to almost 93 percent. Safety experts estimate the rise in the numbers of motorists who now buckle up has resulted in 2,400 fewer traffic fatalities and prevented more than 56,300 injuries. According to the Texas Transportation Institute, motorists least likely to buckle up continue to include men, teenage boys and pickup drivers and passengers. 5-Cross Plains Review May 13, 2010

December 8, 2009

This is a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Member present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Lewis Fortune, Bob Kirkham, Jerry Cassle, Karen Lenz and Peg Terrell.

Employees present were Jan Yeager, Teresa Kennedy, Doug Dugger, Jarrod Potter, Don Gosnell and Debbie Gosnell. Members of the public meeting were Era Lee Hanke, David Estes and Kerry Mann.

Mayor Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

By general consent the council approved the minutes as presented.

By general consent the council approved the police and judge's report as presented.

Karen Lenz moved to pay the bills. Bob Kirkham seconded and motion carried.

First item on the agenda was the discussion of the additional acreage at the sewer farm for irrigation purposes. Gosnell informed the council that Shawn Bullock could not be present for meeting due to ballgames. The council tabled the discussion until a meeting could be set up to discuss the matter with Mr. Bullock.

Gosnell discussed two code enforcement project that are currently being worked on. She advised the council that she had sent out two letters, one to Carl Sohn, Jr. and one to Johnny Floyd. She reported that Mrs. Sohns has been in contact with her on several occasions and agrees that the property is in need of cleaning. He has asked that he be given a two month extension and will have the property cleaned by then. She also reported that she has no contact with Mr. Floyd. By general consent the council agreed to give Mr. Sohns an extension with a deadline of March 1, 2010. They also agreed to have Gosnell contract someone to clean Mr. Floyd's property and to attach a lien for collection.

Kerry Mann, Planning Commission Chairman, met with the council to ask for final approval for the following zoning changes: The specific zoning changes

being recommended are:

- 1) Expand the I-1 zone to include the following: Blocks 1-4 and Block 8; Old Town Addition; and Block 3 & 4, 13, 14, 19 & 20: Steele Addition; and
- 2) To expand the C-2 zone to include the following: Blocks 5,6,7 & 10; Old Town Addition; and Blocks 5,6, 11, 12, 21 & 22 of the Steele Addition.

A map highlighting the proposed changes is attached to and made a part of these minutes.

Jerry Cassle moved to accept the changes presented. Peg Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Gosnell explained some difficulty the City is experiencing with citizens building or fencing City Property. On several of the locations there are city and other utilities in the alley making it difficult to work on or get to meters, etc. Gosnell asked permission to have a couple of alleys surveyed in order to know exactly where the city property was. Peg Terrell moved to allow Gosnell to get a quote on surveying as many alleys as possible up to \$3,000.00. Bob Kirkham seconded and motion carried.

By general consent the council approved payment of the following Comp Time: Doug Dugger 125 hours, Stuart Sowell 109 hours, and Don Gosnell 118 hours.

Gosnell reported that the City Yard was broken into and several gallons of gasoline were stolen. Gosnell is to check on surveillance system for the City Yard.

Karen Lenz moved to adjourn. Bob Kirkham seconded and motion carried.

This is a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Lewis Fortune, Bob Kirkham and Peg Terrell.

Employees present were Doug Dugger, Stuart Sowell and Debbie Gosnell.

Members of the public meeting were Era Lee Hanke and David

Estes.

Mayor Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

By general consent the council approved the minutes as presented.

By general consent the council approved the police and judge's report as presented.

Terrell moved to pay the bills. Fortune seconded and motion carried.

First item on the agenda was the discussion of the additional acreage at the sewer farm for irrigation purposes. Gosnell informed the council that Shawn Bullock could not be present for the meeting due to ballgames and had planned on submitting a proposal for the use of the additional acreage but apparently was not able to get it together before meeting time. After lengthy discussion the council agreed that there was nothing but a few mesquite saplings that needed to be cleared and that if Mr. Bullock would like to sprig the additional acreage and harvest the hay which he would be allowed to do so at his cost. No adjustment would be made against the annual lease and the full amount which is due in January would need to be paid as usual.

Gosnell informed the council that Grantworks has contacted her concerning the planning grant and asked that they be allowed to present the Comprehensive Plan in two Volumes. Their part of the plan would be completed in April 2010 and Jacob & Martin's part of the plan would be submitted in late August 2010. By general consent the council agreed that the plan could be submitted in two volumes.

Gosnell presented the council with the final payment for the pivot system and asked for approval of the payment. Kirkham moved to approve the full payment for the pivot system to Leonard Irrigation in the amount of \$78,579.00. Fortune seconded the motion carried.

By general consent the council agreed to take bids for the old wheel move irrigation system.

Gosnell reported that she had four alley/streets surveyed but has

not received the completed survey report. The council tabled the discussion of the survey until the next regular meeting.

Gosnell informed the council that the property under enforcement this month is owned by Shawn Bullock and located at 648 NW 5th Street. Legal description as follow: Block 5; Old Town Addition. By general consent the council agreed that Gosnell send a letter to Mr. Bullock giving him a deadline of March 15, 2010 to have the property cleaned and all debris removed. If this deadline is not met, Gosnell is to have the property cleaned at City expense and attach a lien to the property.

Gosnell discussed the new phone system and informed the council that several weeks ago the system quit working and "House Calls" was called and Mr. Lambert came down to work on the system. He was not able to repair the system and was to order new parts. Since that time, she has not heard from him and cannot get him to return phone calls or emails. She informed the council that she spoke with Xavier, also with House Calls and they assured her that they would have the system back up and working by the end of this week. By general consent the council agreed that if the system is not working by January 15, 2010, Gosnell is to contact the City Attorney to discuss their options.

By general consent the council set up a special meeting for the purpose of having Employee Evaluations and to begin working on the City's annual budget. Meeting is scheduled for January 25, 2010 at 5:00 p.m.

Kirkham moved to adjourn. Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Cross Plains —The Western Washington D.C.

Over the last several weeks I have read with growing interest James Nichols' letters of concern with complaint of actions by City Hall and the responses of neighbor Mark Norris, a city employee. Though I live just outside the city limits, I know both of these men and they are my neighbors. Further, I am likewise increasingly burdened with the multitude of local taxes and fees for the local school district, the area college, bridges, telephone use, trash and sales taxes and private use of public assets. My funds and assets are limited. I also have to make choices.

I believe it correct to say most Americans want to be left alone, enjoy tranquility and under the Constitution have reasonable legal and traditional moral expectations that elected officials, paid government employees and volunteers are honest, diligent, fair and accountable. No secrets! No favoritisms! Government is not the private property of local or other politicians! Further, since governments have great tax and police power, a clear and decent respect for traditional right and wrong, private property, the honorable expectations and future of the people and openness in conduct and decisions are expected and required. As in Chicago, opposition or repression to questions of conduct or decisions leads to suspicion of contempt and corruption.

As I read James' letter, he has earnestly complained that the actions of the City Council are arbitrary, unresponsive to the people of Cross Plains, secretive and inequitable with many favors passed out to or allowed for selective family members or a favored few. Employment opportunities in City Hall, the Police Department and who knows what else are granted in secret. The commencement of the new Cross Plains property tax was particularly vexing as a huge added expense burden with no public notice, justification or discussion allowed or given to or by our citizens, elderly or otherwise. More recently, a dollar a month item was arbitrarily slipped in to the trash bill for improvements on a local park. (A tiny note on the back of the bill did state that it was voluntary.) One person told me that if she had wanted to give \$12 a year to that project, she would, but not this way.

Mark's attitude and snide response not only did not address James' issues but were twistingly personal, cutting, mocking and mostly the snickering contempt we have become accustomed to from the elite Washington masters. These idolize the departed Ted Kennedy for spending for people, especially other people's children with other people's money. Mark Norris represents the City Council, Administrator and himself as people full of love and charity and hard workers with the Plantation ownership attitude and actions of "We know what's best for you; shut up, pay up and get used to it. There won't be any changes." This seems to be the situation and attitude that James writes about. They truly imagine Cross Plains is their plantation.

Finally, it is notable that after these several weeks, there has not been a single response or correction from City Hall. None! Thus, I am to assume Mark Norris expresses City Hall's will and attitude and that such deeds, attitudes, taxing, spending and favors shall continue. Meanwhile another City Hall family relative expands his building of a corral and animal shed on City property and has a dead tree removed by the City. Another has regularly obtained hundreds of City water for his farm animals. I can only conclude each at taxpayers expense. Contrariwise, most of my neighbors pay their own water bills, budget for the new City tax, rent or buy the land they need and dutiful pay their other many taxes and expenses.

In conclusion, it seems James has many points and calls for the peaceful American solution. For with these Plantation attitudes and deeds of City Hall, identification, discussion and the election of a different kind of Council members are the American answers.

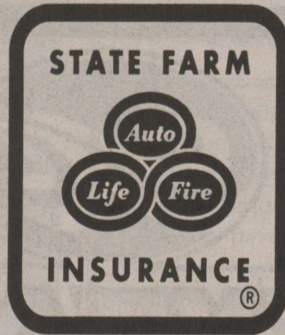

Davis said events will be held throughout both days on Friday and Saturday.

The event organizer said the City of Clyde is planning to have its annual festival on two-days every year from now on. He said when a July 4th holiday falls earlier in the week, the Festival at Clyde Lake event will be on a Friday and Saturday on the Fourth of July weekend.

Davis also said the City of Clyde has contracted with Thrills of America Carnival, who will have games, rides and food booths at this year's event. He said Thrills of America Carnival will have three carnival rides and seven booths setup both Friday and Saturday, July 2nd and July 3rd. Davis said two of the booths will be food booths with hot dogs at one booth and sweet treats at the second booth. Davis said Thrills of America Carnival will be selling tickets during this year's event for the rides and games, and said festival attendees will be able to purchase arm bands to ride all the games they want on both days of this year's festival. Davis said he will inform the public when more information about the games and rides

are available.

The City of Clyde has also scheduled other food and merchandise vendors to setup at this year's festival.

The city festival organizer said unfortunately, because of the low water level at Clyde Lake, this year's bass tournament has been cancelled. He said because the lake level is so low, boats can not launch from the lake's boat ramp.

Davis said on Friday, July 2nd, the Festival at Clyde Lake cook-off will take place. He said entry deadline is at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, July 2nd and awards will be announced at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 3rd.
