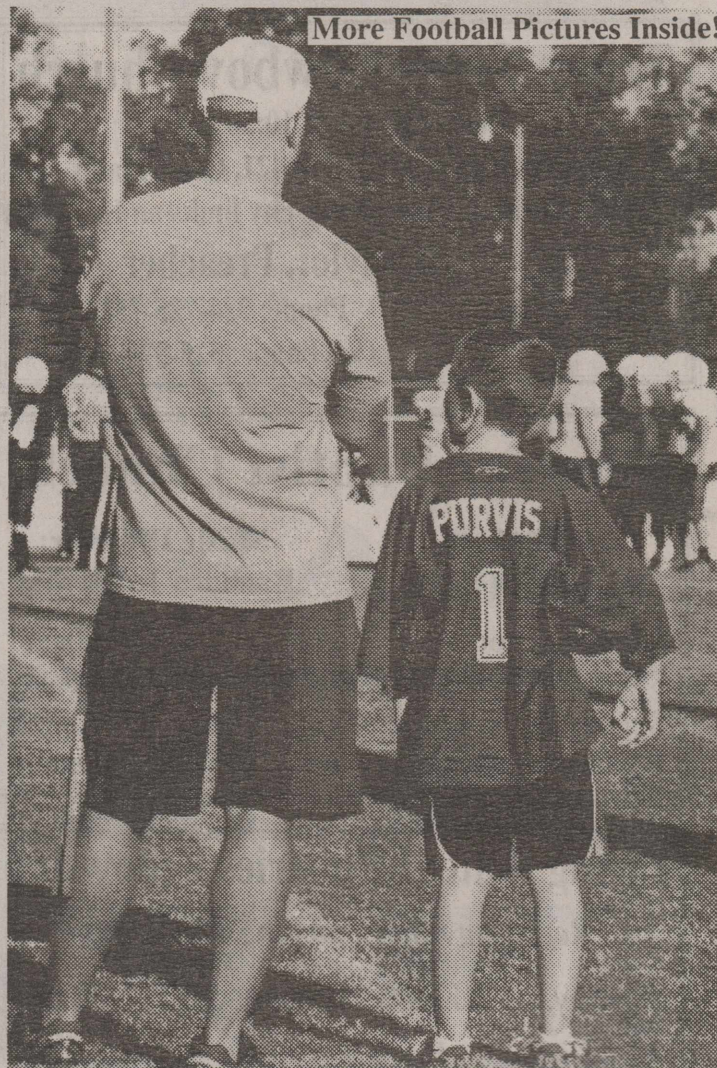

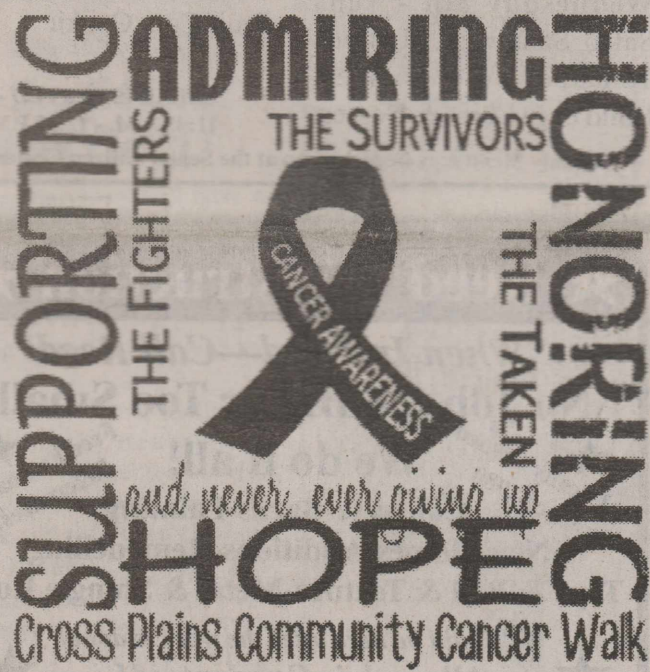
COMMUNITY WIDE SALE OFFERS "HUNTING SEASON" THIS SATURDAY

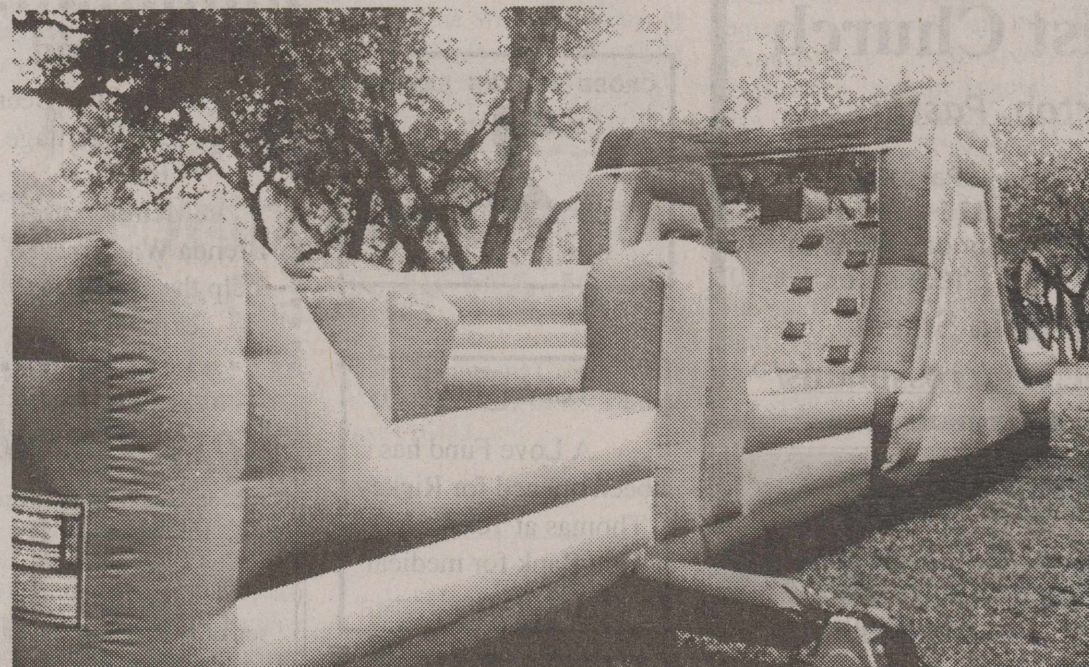

Next Saturday Night October 11

Next Saturday, October 11th the Cross Plains ISD Football Field will be transformed into "Hollywood Lights - A Night of Stars" for the Annual Cross Plains Community Cancer Fund's Cancer Walk. The event starts at 5 p.m.

Booths and teams will be decorated as their favorite movie and TV stars, movie sets and other colorful "Hollywood" ideas. Many local organizations, including the Church of Christ, Baptist Men's Group, Rowden Baptist Church, Methodist Church, Cottonwood Baptist and the Masonic Lodge will have food booths selling hot dogs, popcorn, Frito pie, and other food favorites. The Chamber of Commerce will have soft drinks and water.

Kids can enjoy a variety of kids games including Balloon Pop, Duck Pond and Ring Toss, as well as climbing, jumping, crawling and sliding on a 40 ft. inflatable obstacle course manned by the Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department.

New this year is the "Miss-ter Relay" Contest. Many local gentlemen will be donning dresses in support of the Cancer Fund. You won't want to miss: Ronnette, Davida, Reggina, Erika, Donna Dean, Jacolyn, Wendella, Jamie, Kevalina, Frannie and MitChella.

The Cancer Walk kicks off with the 2014 5K Run presented by the CPHS National Honor

Society. Registration runs from 4 p.m. to 4:45 p.m., with the run starting promptly at 5:15. The \$25.00 entry fee includes a t-shirt. All proceeds from the run are donated to the Cancer Fund.

The Cross Plains American Legion will raise the American Flag at the opening of the Cancer Walk. Ricky Thomas will emcee the event.

The first walk of the evening is the "Survivors and Care Givers Lap". All cancer survivors and their caregivers are encouraged to join in the walk. Next up is the "Team Lap" spotlighting all of the walking teams that have signed up for the Cancer Walk. Team photographs will be taken following the Team Lap.

Live Music at the event features: 4His Glory, the First Baptist Church Children's Choir, Thomas Estes and Meagan Gooding.

The Hairstream Trailer will be landing at the Cancer Walk, too. Rohni Shea Childers, who styled hair for the show Grim, will be cutting hair, with the proceeds

going to the Cancer Fund.

Ashley's Twist and Paint will be doing facepainting and making balloon animals. The Cross Plains Garden Club will have plants for sale at their booth. Care Improvement Plus by United Health Care, Warriors Against Cancer, Rafter G Boutique and BJ's Busy Hands will also have booths at the event.

Everyone will enjoy Bingo and the Cake/Prize walk.

Prize drawings will be held throughout the evening for many raffle items, including a wooden rocker and a Texas-shaped bird bath from Meghann's Market. 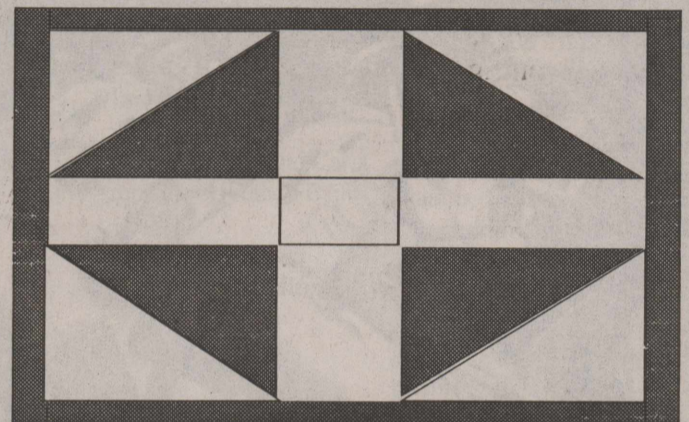
At The Cancer Walk

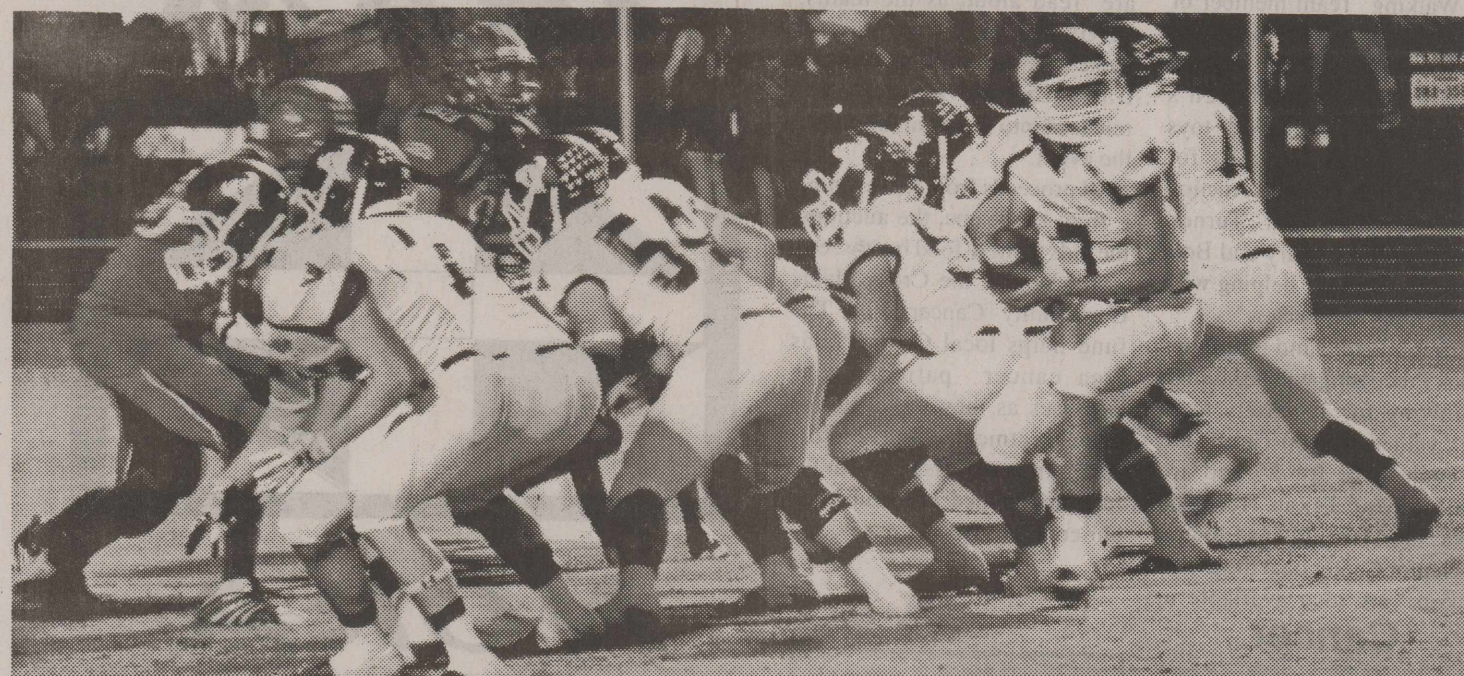

During the beginning of the first quarter, Senclair made a 48 yard run to score a touchdown

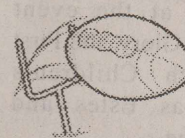

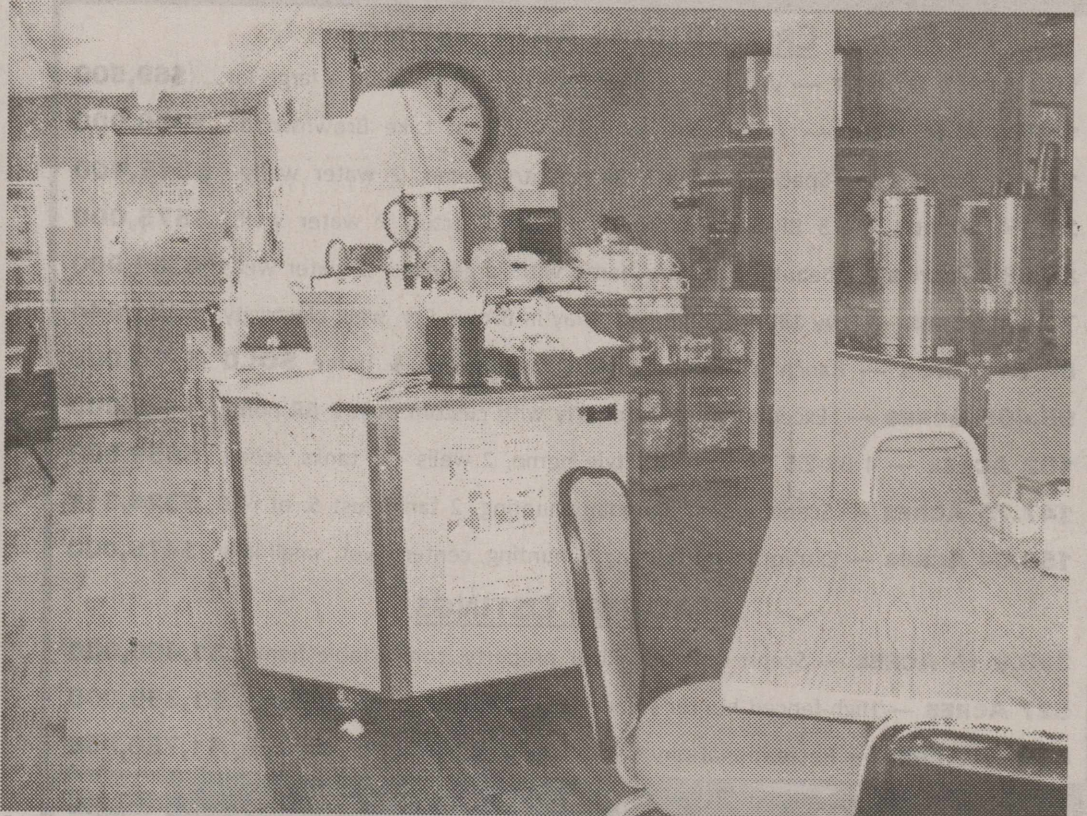

know they are on." The hoods of the dryers also come down lower to accommodate shorter customers.

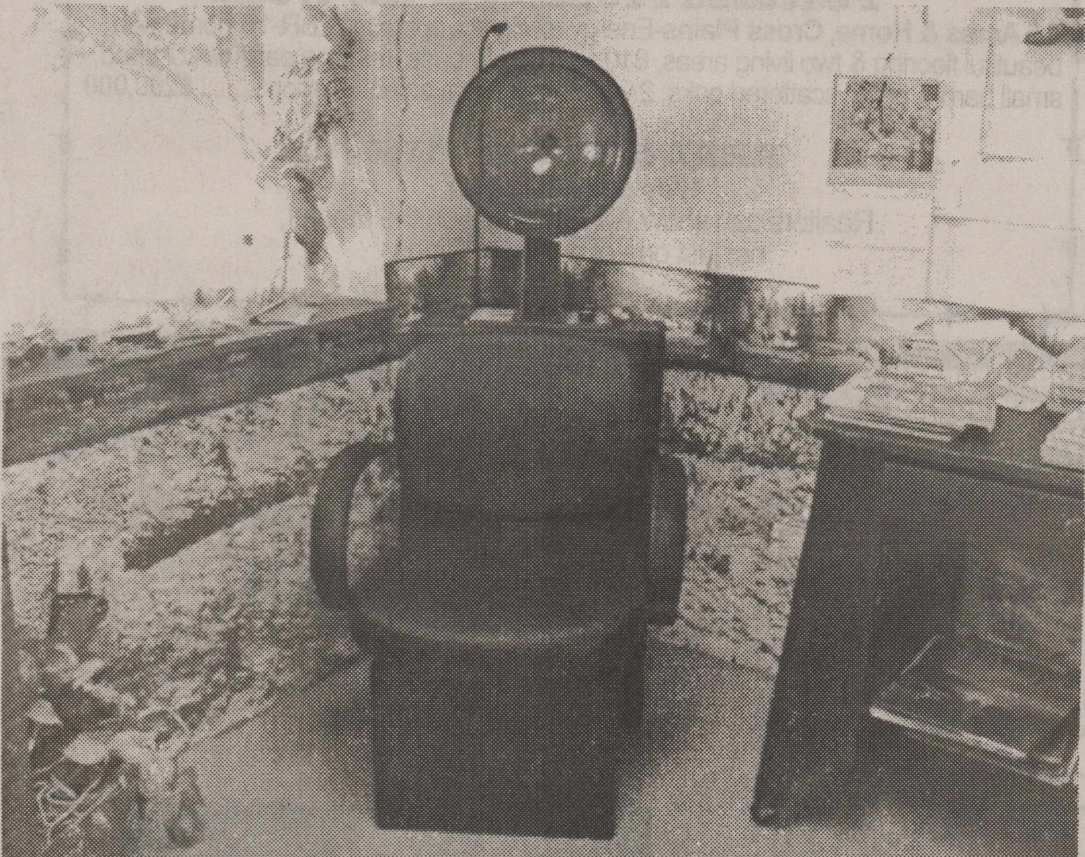

Mourning Dove

Summer is well on its way, and already I am looking forward to some of the sounds that go with it. One such sound is the melancholy ooah-woo-woo-woo that resonates in the air as a male Mourning Dove calls during the summer breeding season.

The Mourning Dove (*Zenaidura macroura*) is a large species of dove whose natural range encompasses more territory of North America than any native dove species. It can be observed from southern Canada southward throughout the continental United States continuing southward to southern Mexico and Central America. Only the non-native and established Rock Dove (or pigeon) has a larger range. It is a permanent resident in the vast majority of this area, including all of Texas. It is a migratory species only in the extreme northern portions of its range.

At first glance, this large species is somewhat drab in coloration, like most other doves. However, it has a beauty that has been described as delicate. The large brown eyes surrounded with a light blue ring combined with the pinkish coloration of the crown of the head and breast only enhance that description. It has grayish brown upper and underparts with a few large black spots on the upper wings. There is also a distinctive black spot on the cheek, and usually another one right behind the eye. It also has smaller, less noticeable white tips on the on the relatively long and pointed tail. The bill is dark, and only slightly curved, while the legs are comparatively short and pink colored. With a body length of about twelve inches and a wingspan that approaches nineteen inches, it is the largest species of native dove that can be encountered in west Texas.

While the Mourning Dove can occasionally be seen in small groups, it is not a gregarious species like its close relative the White-winged Dove. In fact, most male Mourning Doves will aggressively protect their territory. Typically only when feeding at the same field or drinking at the same pond are more than two or three found together. They feed almost exclusively on grains and other seeds. The flight pattern is easily recognizable as it is a direct path, although many times the bird will zig-zag in the air with strong and rapid wingbeats. The strength of the wingbeats is often heard in the sound of whistle as the bird flies

by. This species of bird pairs up during the breeding season, with the male and female remaining monogamous. It has been reported that this species of dove may pair up with a partner for life. The nest is placed either near the ground in various cacti plants or shrubs, or more commonly, in trees up to fifty feet above ground. The saucer-shaped and rather flimsy nest is made up of grasses, sticks and stems. More often than not, the male gathers the materials while the female is charged with the nest building. The two eggs are medium-sized (just over one inch in length) and unmarked and white. These eggs hatch in about two weeks after the male and female alike take turns at incubating them. After hatching, both sexes continue to tend to the helpless young until they leave the nest just two weeks after hatching. During this time, the young are fed with what has been called "pigeons milk". This "milk" is produced in the crop of

the parents and then subsequently regurgitated into the mouths of the hungry offspring. Juveniles are colored similar to the adults, and up to five broods per year have been recorded in Texas.

The Mourning Dove is a common bird whose population numbers appear to be increasing. Like other doves, it has adapted well to habitat changes by humans. The use of bird feeding stations with small seeds such as millet and sunflower seeds will attract this common species of dove to your yard for closer observation.

In thirty-one of the forty-eight continental states where it occurs it is managed as a game species, meaning that it is legal to hunt for short periods of time. It has been estimated that over thirty million individuals are illegally harvested annually by hunters.

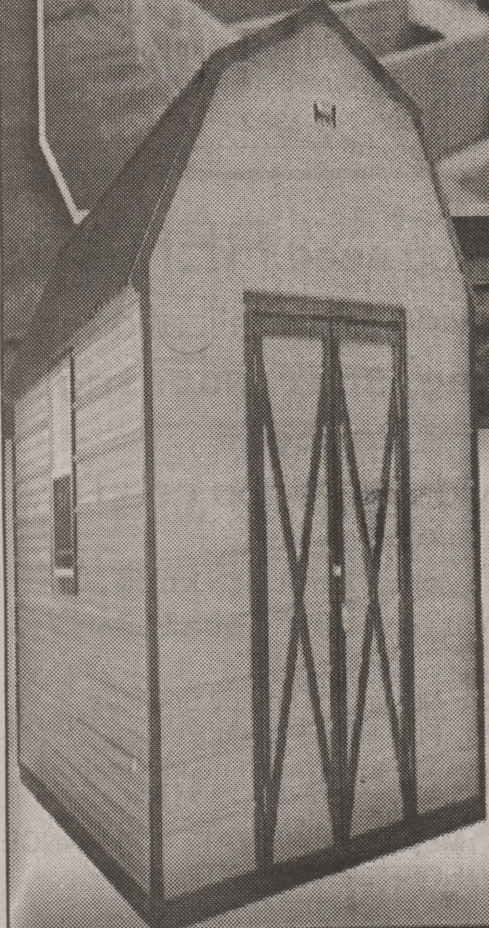
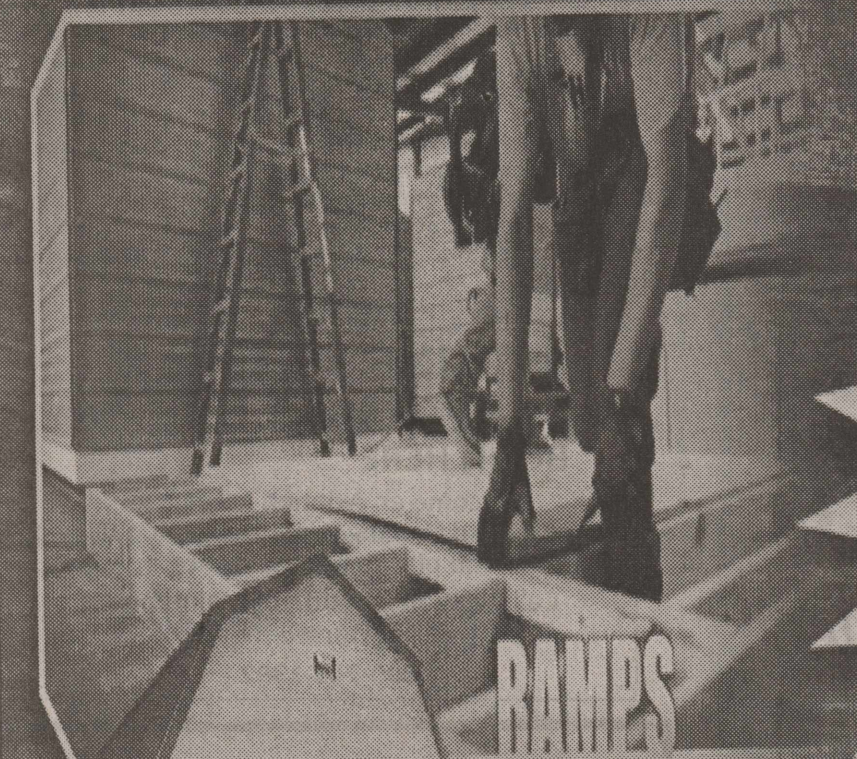

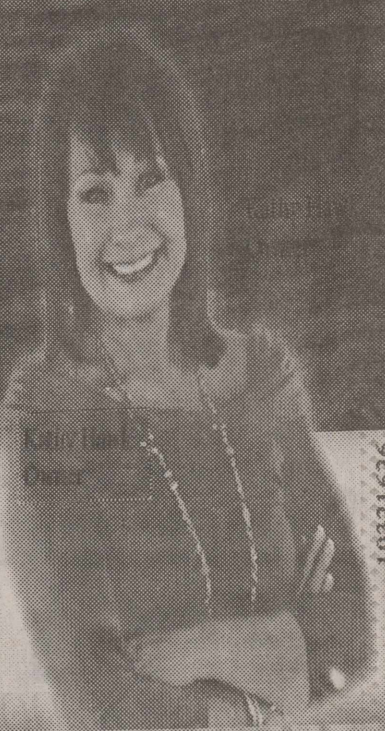
