
Makayla Cowan Named to Dean's Honor Roll

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
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California Sister Butterfly

Many species of butterflies inhabit west Texas, and many are considered to be drab in coloration. However, there is a species that is found here that many naturalists consider to be one of the most beautifully marked species in the entire southwestern United States, the California

The California Sister (Adelpha bredowii) is one of the most common and yet unnoticed butterflies that inhabit west Texas. It thrives along rocky hillsides and washes where it patrols for food and water sources. Oftentimes, it will fly much higher than other species of butterflies as it glides along, utilizing the west Texas wind to propel it. Therefore, it is generally not forced to flap its wings as it moves from "point A" to "point B". Outside of Texas, it occurs from southern Utah and Colorado southward through California, Arizona, and New Mexico. From there it inhabits the appro-Madre Occidental in western

This species of butterfly has a particularly odd taste, feeding on flowers of honeydew plants, other fruit trees, and animal dung. It utilizes an appendage known as a proboscis to feed on these items. The proboscis is long and almost threadlike, and in times of non-use is curled up

under the head of the butterfly. California Sisters, like other butterfly species, undergo a fourstage life cycle that can be described as nothing short of miraculous. In the beginning stage, their life begins as an egg, which hatches after a few short

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met on Friday, June 5, 2015 at the home of Larry and Judy Killgo for a garden tour.

The Killgo's warmly welcomed Garden Club members Diana Miller, Russ Miller, Carlene Howard, Johnny Howard, Sarah Stone, Debbie Endy and additional guest Cher Ptacek into their lovely home for an informal discussion prior to beginning the garden tour. This was the Garden Club's second year to tour the Killgo's garden and the following includes last year's as well as this year's additional tips from Larry who enjoys all types of gardening; his lifelong passion is raising vegetable gardens.

Larry began by saving it has been a tough year for vegetable gardening with the cool, cloudy and wet weather. He had to take his potatoes out early. Larry recommends adding plenty of organic matter to the soil. This includes leaves, manure and all unused vegetable parts "green manure". When adding other composted materials he avoids any that include Bermuda grass hay. Larry also adds wood ash to his soil but cautions that it will change soil from acidic to alkaline so you will want to test your soil ph after a heavy or repeated application. Larry typically rototills his garden in early spring to loosen the soil and get rid of winter weeds. He'll till again just prior to planting to remove newly germinating weeds.

Production of flavorful tomatoes is probably his favorite ongoing gardening experiment. He's found that he most enjoys Sun Gold thus far - slightly larger than a cherry tomato and gold in color. Last year he began planting several varieties in addition to Sun Gold including heirloom.

Larry's tomato planting tips begin with digging a 2' hole for each desired plant then adding to the soil a mixture of compost and small amounts of zinc sulphate, super phosphorus, Miracle Grow for tomatoes, and Epsom salts. He cuts the bottom out of 5 gallon containers and places them over the plants to protect them from the wind. To protect the plants from frost, Larry covers the top of the containers with saran wrap secured with duct tape creating a green house environment. His plants get the

applying a tomato fertilizer every week or two and his tomatoes are watered every other day. Becareful not to over water tomatoes. Wait until they are "stressed" before watering. If you get volunteers growing up during the middle of the summer, leave them because as others die out, they will give you tomatoes lasting into the fall. Tip: Plant tomatoes the first of April.

Some tomatoes may show a calcium deficiency or blossom end rot. A spray may be applied, however, Larry finds that crushed egg shells or powdered sheet rock (gypsum) prevents blossom end rot. Another tip: some gardeners may not realize that if tomato or okra plants grow too high they can be sheared off to stimulate inside growth and making harvesting easier. If your large tomato plant is not producing, give it a haircut all

When selecting tomatoes Larry suggested that we be aware of the difference between determinate varieties and indeterminate varieties. Determinate are generally desired by canners and supermarket, producing large crops in early season. Indeterminate crops will produce all season right up until the first

In addition to tomatoes, other favorites include Pecos cantaloupe, cucumber, honeydew, okra and watermelon. Prior to Larry and Judy's move to Cross Plains nine years ago, they lived in the arid dry climate of New Mexico. Larry noted that cantaloupe and tomatoes are more flavorful in that environment.

Onions are a must for everyone's garden and they generally tolerate our late winter weather. Larry recommends selecting short day onions as opposed to mid day or long day. He finds that short day are slower to bloom allowing the onions to grow larger. He generally sets his onions in February and says to buy them as soon as they come out in the stores as the first ones out have the best roots.

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
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



Student CANSAT Competition Returns to Burkett and Abilene, Texas June 12-14, 2014

The eleventh annual Design/ Launch/Build Student CanSat Competition will be held June 12-14 in Burkett and Abilene, Texas. Forty-six college and university teams from the United States, Canada, Mexico, Turkey, India, Poland, Iran and Italy will each launch a payload the approximate size of a large soda can via rocket to an altitude of 650 meters. Each CanSat must carry one large raw hen's egg intact from launch in a payload which is released from a re-entry container before landing. During the flight and descent, GPS position and telemetry shall be displayed, in real-time, on a team-developed ground control station. In addition, each team must select one of four optional requirements, such as measuring the force of impact or capturing video of the descent and landing.

The mission simulates a science vehicle traveling through a planetary atmosphere sampling the atmospheric composition during descent and its requirements are designed to reflect key aspects of real world missions, including telemetry requirements, communications and autonomous operations. The goal is for all teams to experience, on a small scale, a typical aerospace program from preliminary design review to post-mission debrief.

This year's competition is sponsored by the American Astronautical Society and the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, with financial and volunteer support from the Naval Research Laboratory, NASA Goddard Space Flight Center and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

In addition to gaining valuable experience, the top five teams will be receive special recognition awards. And, based on the experiences of holding this competition in Texas the past eight years, students will return to their homes with an appreciation of Texas hospitality, good chuckwagon food, and how far a small object can potentially land from its launch site in a large open field!

Spectators are welcome to observe the rocket launches on Saturday, June 13. They will start off around 10 AM on the Jim Burkett Ranch a few miles south of Burkett off Highway 206. Look for the large white tents on the west side of 206. As always, catering will be done by Bubba's Smokehouse of Cross Plains, and bbq plates will be offered for \$15 each.

All Brazos River Authority System Reservoirs removed from Drought status

WACO, Texas (June 1, 2015) - Continued rain events throughout the Brazos River basin have allowed the Brazos River Authority to remove drought status designations from all reservoirs within the BRA System. The removal of drought designations allows BRA customers to change or remove restrictions they currently have in place for water supply use.

Following over four years of drought conditions, rain events from March through May raised the levels of all System reservoirs above drought trigger levels. On March 1st, available water stored in the System held at 68 percent of capacity. As of May 27th, the BRA storage in the System had risen to 99 percent full with many of the Corps of Engineers reservoirs well over 100 percent full and into their flood pools.

The entire BRA system of reservoirs had been under a Stage 1 Drought Watch since November, 2012, and individual reservoirs had received separate drought stage declarations ranging from Stage 1 - 4 in line with the BRA Drought Contingency

The BRA is required by the state to plan and implement a Drought Contingency Plan.

This plan outlines steps to extend the supply and availability of water during times of drought. The Drought Contingency Plan includes four stages. Each stage is marked by trigger points measured either by a lake level or by the water storage capacity.

The Brazos River Authority continues to pass flood waters from reservoirs within the BRA system. All reservoirs are expected to be at their full elevations once flood operations cease. Drought declarations under the BRA's Drought Contingency Plan have been lifted, but the BRA encourages all of its customers to use water wisely and employ water conservation measures at all times

About the Brazos River Authority

The Brazos River Authority, with headquarters in Waco, is the oldest river authority in Texas. Created by the Texas Legislature in 1929, the

mile territory includes all or part of 70 counties; extending from the Texas-New Mexico border west of Lubbock to the Gulf of Mexico near Freeport. The BRA built, owns, and operates three reservoirs

Authority's 42,000 square-

(Lakes Possum Kingdom, Granbury, and Limestone). In addition to these water supply reservoirs, the BRA contracts with the US Army Corps of Engineers for the water supply storage space at eight federal multi-purpose flood control and water conservation reservoirs (Lakes Whitney, Belton, Proctor, Somerville, Stillhouse Hollow, Granger, Georgetown and Aquilla). The Brazos River Authority

operates a regional wastewater system for the cities of Temple-Belton and wastewater treatment plants for the cities of Clute-Richwood, Sugar Land, and Hutto. The BRA owns and operates a regional water treatment system for the cities of at East Williamson County for the City of Taylor.

The BRA engages in water quality monitoring activities throughout the Brazos River basin. As a member of the Texas Clean River Program, the Authority samples and tests water from more than 100 locations throughout the basin on either a monthly, quarterly or annual basis.

lance and participation. There will always be those seeking to subvert the Constitution in order


