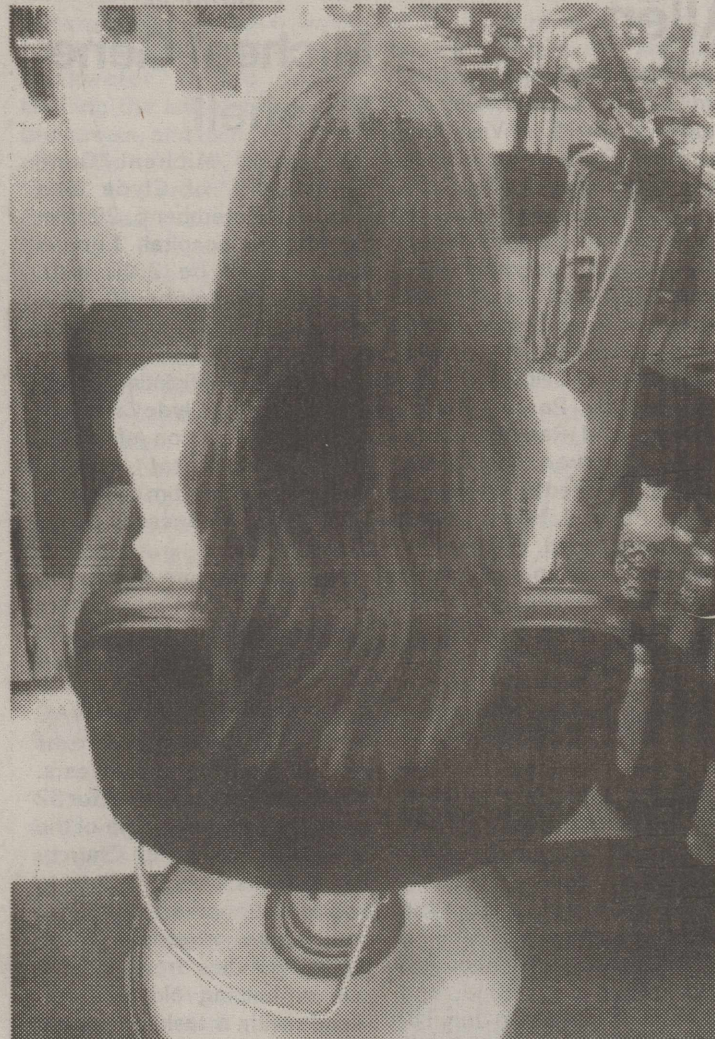

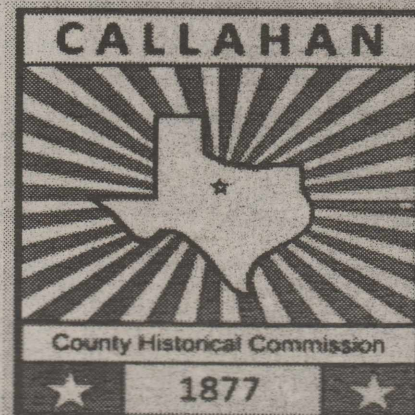

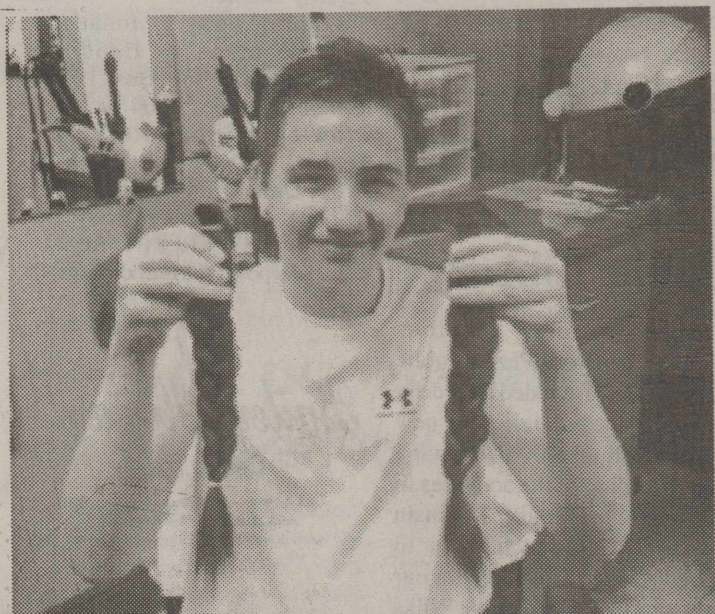


## Local Youth proudly donates to a worthy cause

CPVFD Firehouse

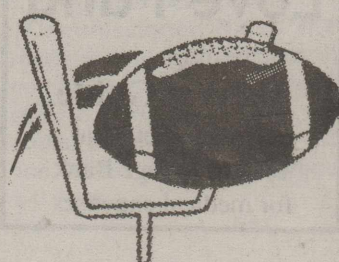
## TOUR THE NEW CPVFD FIREHOUSE ON SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 19TH

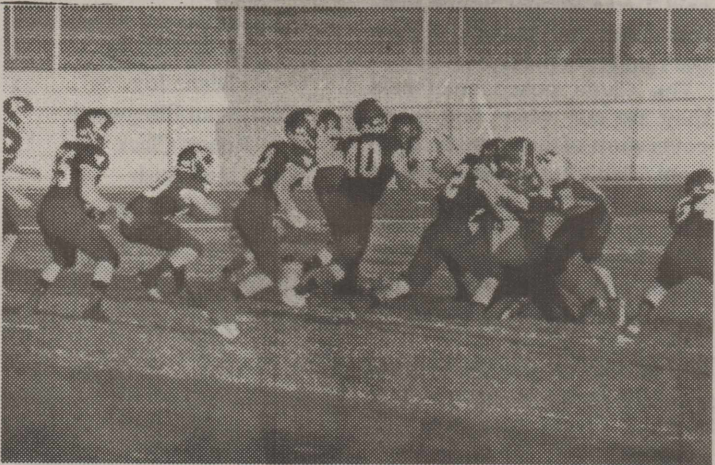

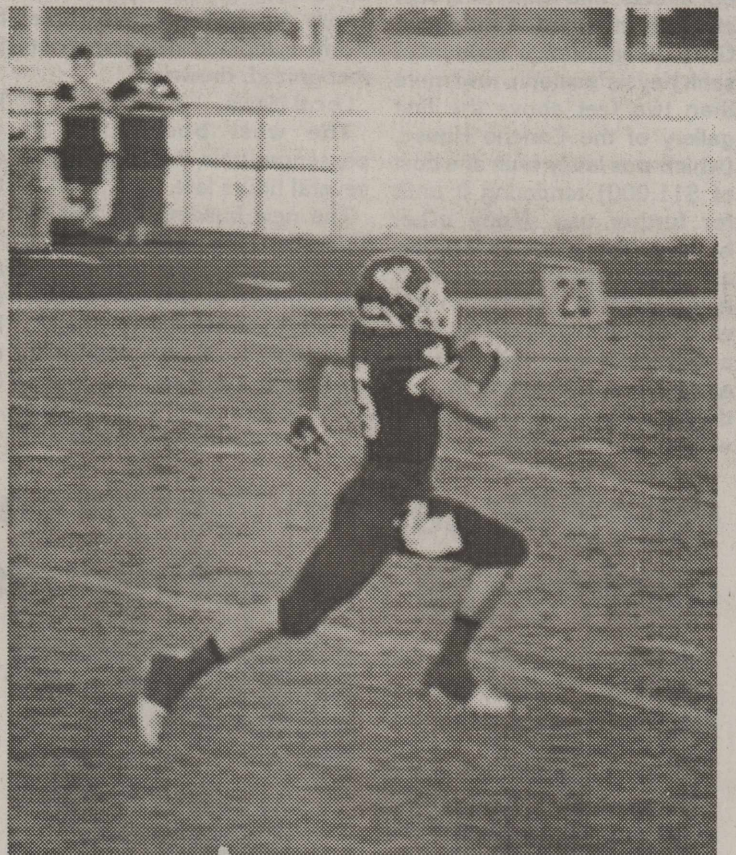
#### GAME NOTES:

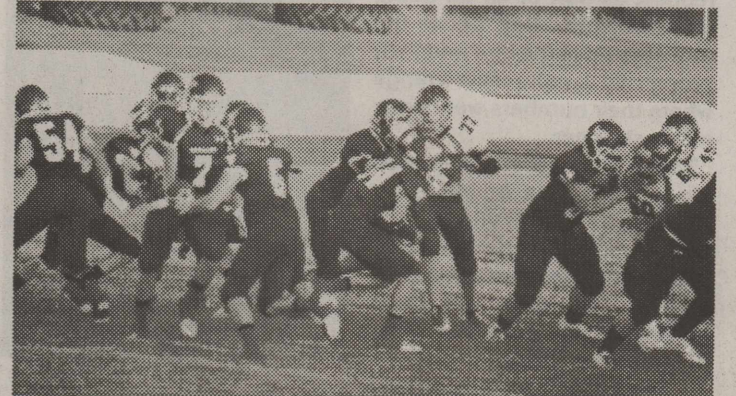

The Buffaloes travel to De Leon this Friday for a 7:30 kickoff against the 0-2 Bearcats.

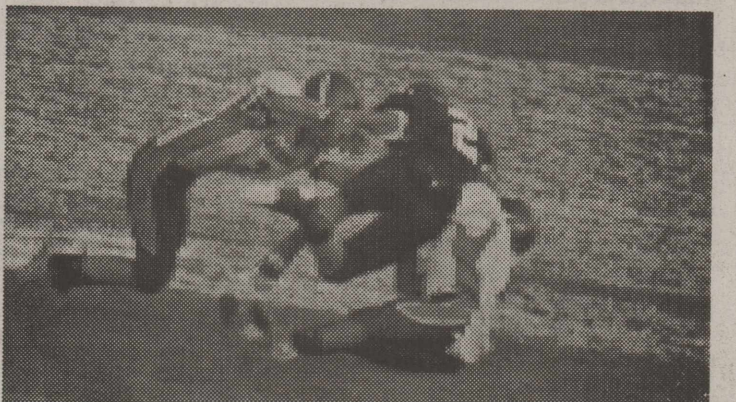

## Buffaloes Dominate in home opener

The Buffaloes ran for 332 yards on 28 carries in the 59-0 shutout of Fort Worth Calvary last Friday night at Buffalo Stadium. A large crowd was in attendance for the first home game. The Buffs made 15 first downs compared to 4 for Ft. Worth Calvary and totaled 139 passing yards, including an 89 yard touchdown pass from senior quarterback Holden Senclair to senior running back Rylan Laminack. The Buffalo defense held the Cavaliers to 47 yards rushing and 0 yards passing.

In first quarter action, Rylan Laminack scored on an 11 yard run; the point after was good. Laminack also scored on an 89 yard pass from Senclair and also ran in the 2 point conversion to bring the score to 15-0. Second quarter scoring saw Laminack take the ball in from the 15 yard line; the extra point attempt was good. Sophomore Creed Goode scored

on a 63 yard run; the extra point was good, and Sophomore Kaiden Petree scored on a 7 yard run to bring the score to 35-0. The Buffaloes continued to score in the third quarter. Kaiden Petree scored on a 44 yard pass from Senclair, the point after failed. Senclair scored from the 3 yard line and the extra point was good. The Buffs also forced a 2 point safety. This brought the score to 50-0 at the end of the third quarter. The Buffs capped off the fourth quarter with another 2 point safety and a 35 yard rushing touchdown by sophomore Joe Crockett. The extra point was good, which brought the final score to 59-0 in favor of the Buffaloes.

The Buffaloes will be on the road Friday night as they take on the DeLeon Bearcats. Kickoff is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Make the short drive and come out and support the Buffs!

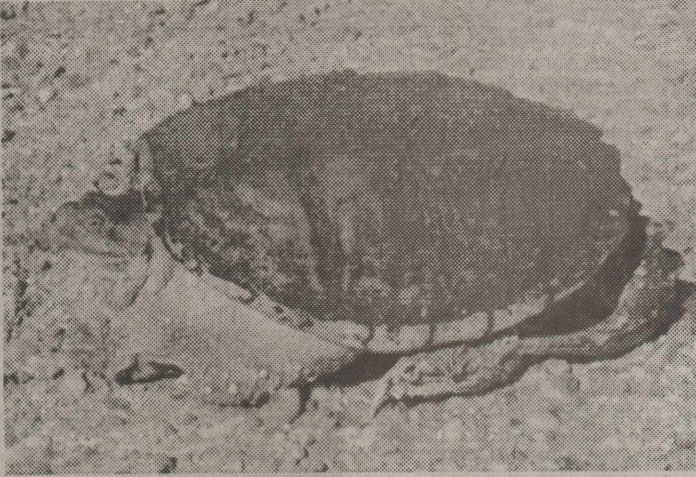

**Common Snapping Turtle**

Many animals, particularly reptiles and various other "creepy-crawlies", suffer persecution for what they do, but for what they are perceived to do. One such creature is the typically benign Snapping Turtle.



Common Snapping Turtle (*Chelydra serpentina*)

The Common Snapping Turtle (*Chelydra serpentina*) occurs in just about every area of this state, save the more arid areas of the Trans-Pecos and Rio Grande Valley eco-regions. From here, they range northward to southern Canada and eastward to southern Georgia, where another subspecies takes over. Generally speaking, Snappers are an almost totally aquatic species that thrive in just about any slow moving or quiet body of water that has ample vegetation to provide camouflage.

Snappers are large turtles, with wild adult males capable of achieving weights of over thirty-five pounds. In the throngs of protected captivity, where they are often overfed, adult males can weigh an astounded sixty pounds or more. The carapace, or top shell, can be up to just over nineteen inches in length.

turtles, the plastron is the same size or slightly smaller than the carapace. Again, the Snapper is an exception to this. The plastron of the Snapper is small, T-shaped in appearance, and is very soft. It is connected to the carapace at just two points along the side of the body.

This species' coloration undergoes a change as the turtle matures. The coloration of the carapace of juveniles is dark brown to chestnut and is extremely keeled. However, adults have a much smoother shell, and it is typically more olive in coloration. Many adults have prominent algae growth on their shells, giving them the appearance of being bright green. The back edge of the carapace is highly serrated. The nose is slightly pointed, and the head and long neck are both covered in rounded tubercles.

Mating in this species occurs in the spring, and females are often seen on land as they trek to find a suitable nesting area. Up to fifty eggs are laid in a nest that has been dug out by the female, and hatching occurs in about two and one-half months. The young are small, having a carapace length of approximately one inch.

As the common name implies, the most striking characteristic of this species is the savage defensive behavior. This behavior is truly a "Dr. Jeckyl & Mr. Hyde" performance. Unbeknownst to most people, while in the water the Snapping Turtle is usually quiet and inoffensive. However, when encountered on land, it can be horrendously aggressive, surprisingly fast and agile in its attempts to bite whatever it feels to be a threat. While it is not a turtle that should be approached carelessly as it has powerful jaws capable of delivering a painful bite, it should not be teased and molested either.

There are two diagnostic characteristics that can be used to separate this species from other native turtles. The first is the length of the tail. Every other species of native turtle (aquatic or not) has a short, stubby tail. Not so with the Snapping Turtle. The tail of the Snapper is as long, if not slightly longer, than the length of the carapace. The tail also has a thin serrated crest along the top of it.

The diet of this aquatic turtle is primarily fish, although other aquatic vertebrate animals such as frogs, snakes, and other turtles are occasionally eaten. Contrary to popular belief among fisherman, the Snapping Turtle

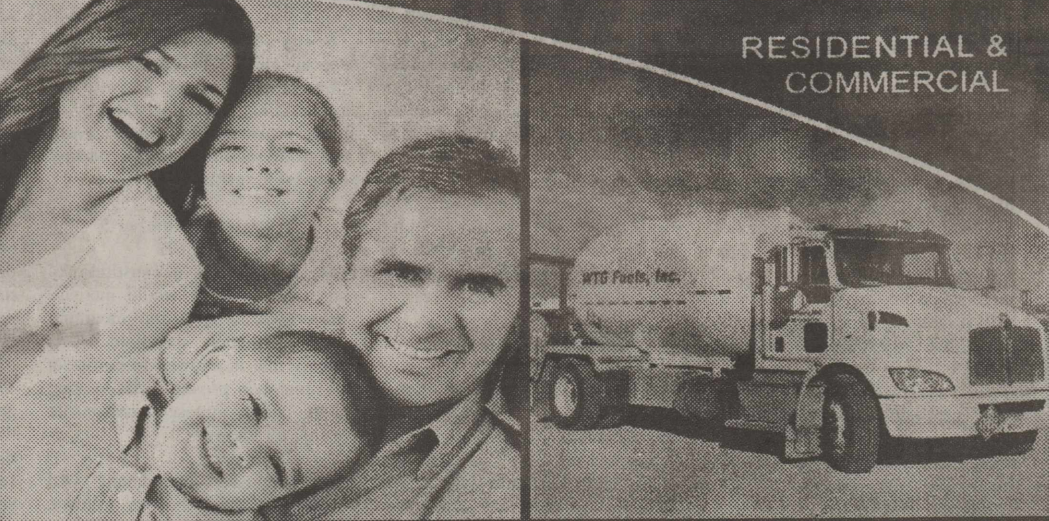

## Candidate for State Representative Mike Lang makes stop in Clyde Tuesday

Mike Lang, candidate for District 60 State Representative, which includes Callahan County, stopped by in Clyde today, Tuesday, September 8th for an informal visit.

Approximately 25 Baird and Clyde residents stopped by to hear from him and ask ques-

tions. Mr. Lang, a retired law enforcement officer, is a Conservative Republican and is actively seeking election to this office.

As your state representative he wants to: put border security at the top of the priority list; defend our constitutional rights

(especially the 2nd amendment); preserve traditional marriage; defund taxpayer subsidies to illegal immigrants; advance free marketing principles; protect the unborn, disabled and elderly; promote local control of our rural public schools; and eliminate the business franchise

tax. He was quoted as saying, "The future of our families and the State of Texas are at stake in this election. I've spent over 30 years of my life dedicated to law enforcement and public service. We need our laws to be enforced by true public servants."

Explanatory Statements for the November 3, 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 - Current law provides an exemption of \$15,000 from the ad valorem taxation for public school purposes of a residence homestead. The proposed amendment would increase this exemption to \$25,000, starting in the tax year beginning January 1, 2015. In order to reflect the increased exemption on the homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or a disabled person, the proposed amendment would provide a reduction to the current limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes. The proposed amendment would protect school districts from all or part of the revenue loss by authorizing an appropriation of funds according to formulas set by the legislature. In addition, the proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision from reducing or repealing a homestead exemption adopted by the political subdivision. Finally, the proposed amendment would prohibit the imposition of a tax on the conveyance of real property, but would not prohibit the imposition of a business tax measured by business activity, a tax on the production of minerals, a tax on the issuance of title insurance, or a change in the rate of a tax in existence on January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption amount, authorizing the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from reducing the amount of or repealing the

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 75)

HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value of the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried. The amendment did not apply to surviving spouses of veterans who died before 2011. This amendment would extend the exemption in such cases. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)

SJR 52 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office. This amendment would not apply to the residency requirement for the Governor.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 73)

HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable raffles to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses. Any law enacted by this provision only applies to entities defined as professional sports team charitable foundations on January 1, 2016. Additionally, any law enacted by this provision may only allow charitable raffles to be conducted at games hosted at the home venue of the professional sports team associated with a professional sports team charitable foundation.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)

SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife, including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of safety.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5)

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain, or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related debt.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."

## LTC Dyess Awarded the Texas Medal of Honor

AUSTIN—Today, Wednesday, August 26, 2015, the Texas Legislative Medal of Honor, the highest military commendation for the State of Texas, was posthumously awarded to Lt. Colonel William Edwin Dyess. State Senator Troy Fraser along with State Representatives Susan King nominated Lt. Colonel Dyess for the Texas Legislative Medal of Honor during the 84th Regular Session.

Lt. Colonel Dyess served in the U.S. Army Air Forces during World War II in the South Pacific. After the defeat at the Battle of Bataan, Lt. Colonel Dyess refused to abandon his squadron and was subsequently captured by Japanese forces on April 9, 1942. Despite the horrible conditions and inhumane treatment he experienced during the Bataan Death March, Lt. Colonel Dyess survived, and later managed to escape from a Japanese POW camp. He returned to the United States, where he recuperated and continued training in preparation for a return to combat. He was tragically killed, however, when his plane crashed during an emergency landing on December 22, 1943. He received both the Distinguished Service Cross and the Distinguished Flying Cross for his actions. In 1957, Abilene Army Airfield was renamed Dyess Air Force Base in recognition of his great service to our nation.

sented the decoration to Elizabeth "Nell" Denman, Lt. Colonel Dyess' sister in a special ceremony at the Governor's Mansion in Austin.

"Having continuously demonstrated the highest regard for the lives of his countrymen,

showing little regard for his own, Lieutenant Colonel Ed Dyess is most assuredly deserving of this state's supreme military award," Senator Fraser said. "It was a privilege to nominate him for this decoration."

The Texas Legislative Medal of

Honor is the state's highest military commendation given to only two recipients each session: one for service pre-1956 and one for service post-1955. This award is a tribute to Lt. Colonel Dyess, the people of Abilene and the base that bears his name.

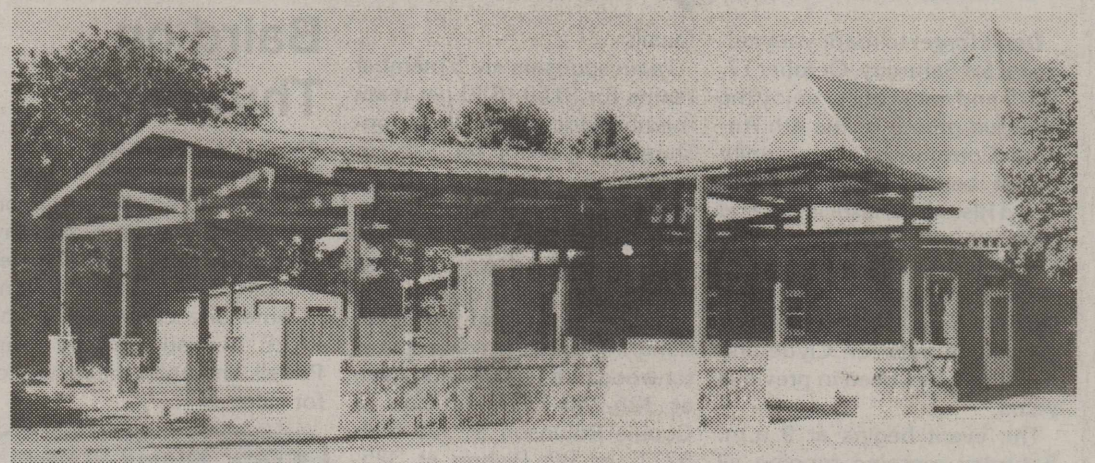

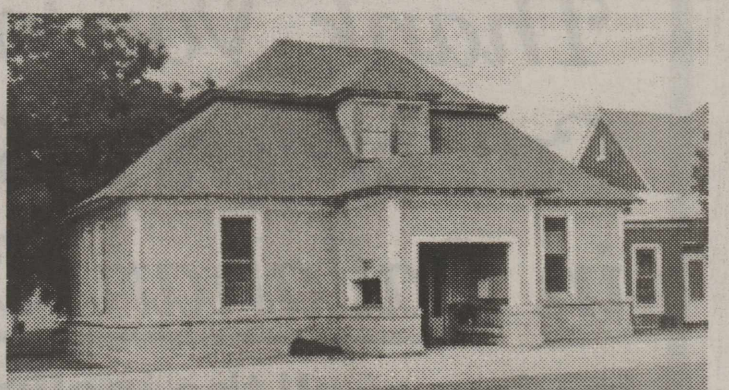
First Presbyterian Church of Baird open air pavilion is now available for community events.

This year we have implemented a ground trapping program that has proven to be

The Board of Directors would like to see this program continued as we have received feedback from landowners and hunters that the turkey and quail seem to be making a comeback during the past year. We feel that part of this is due to the success in removing at least a number of the feral hog population in the county.

One of our own, Derek Hamlin, a 2005 CPISD graduate, will not only be in attendance at the Forth Worth Alliance Air Show, but will also be maintaining the various aircraft. Hamlin joined the Navy the summer after he graduated from Cross Plains High School, and has served his country for the last 10 years. As an Aviation Machinist's Mate, Hamlin's duties include: maintaining and servicing aircraft engines, fuel systems and lubricating systems, complete turboprop/turboshaft repair, diagnosing engine degradation via spectrometric oil analysis, evaluating jet performance, as well as helicopter maintenance and repair. To become an Aviation Machinist Mate, Derek had to prove that he was able to do very detailed work with little supervision, keep accurate records, have an excellent memory, work closely with others and be a team player.

When most civilians think of

the Blue Angels, they think only of the pilots. But, of the approximately 16 service men and women involved in the program, only a small percentage are the actual pilots (6-7). The remainder of the team is made up of career officers who have specialized training in maintenance, administration, aviation medicine, public affairs and supplies. Each officer in the squadron has gone through a selection process that looks at each team member as a direct reflection of their department. All must reflect professionalism, military bearing and be adept communicators. These officers serve 2-3 years with the Blue Angels squadron before returning to their assigned fleet and duties.

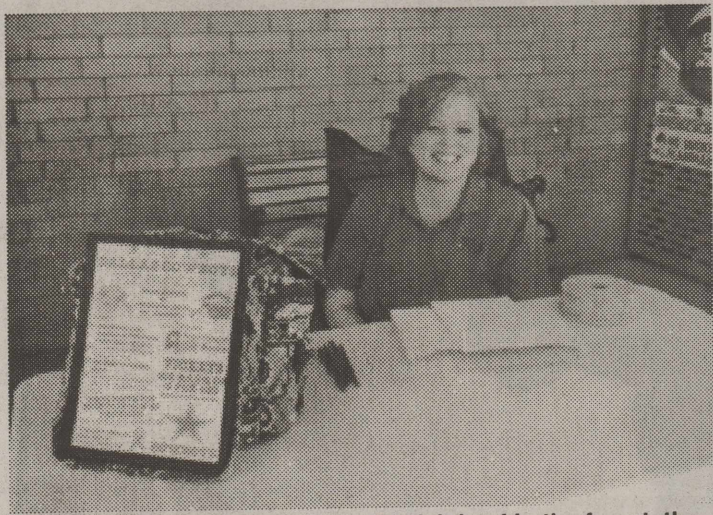

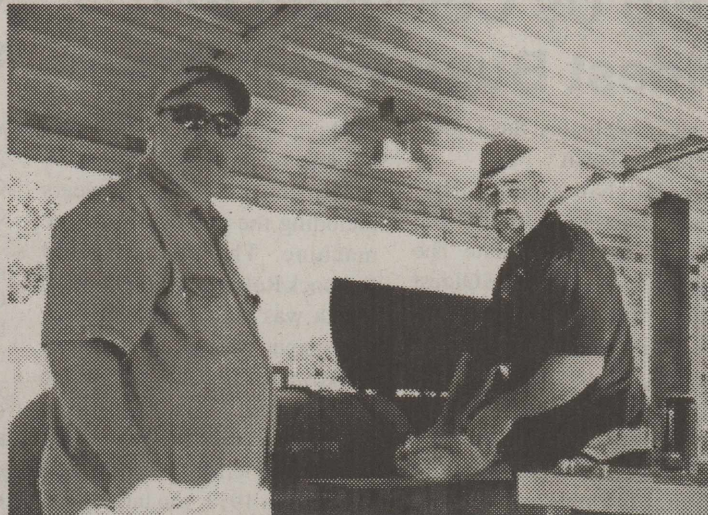

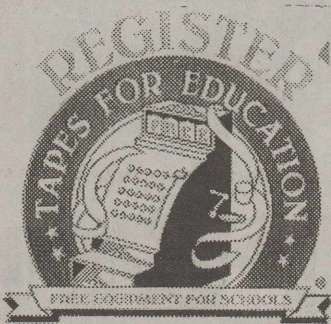

## The Bankhead Highway is Studied at "Meet the Author"

Cross Plains Public Library's "Meet the Author" will host Dan L. Smith, author of *The Bankhead Highway in Texas*, on Sept. 22 at 6:30 p.m. at the Cross Plains Senior Citizen's Center.

The author was born in Miami, Florida. After graduation from Florida State University he began a forty year career with the National Weather Service. He is a Fellow of the American Meteorological Society. Retired in 2005, he lives with his wife in Fort Worth and now devotes time to subjects of historical interest.

His first encounter with the Bankhead Highway occurred while bicycling on back roads in Parker County near Aledo. The narrow country road seemed to belie the nearby street sign which identified it as the Old Bankhead Highway. Few seemed to know much about the old road, and even less was known about the Bankhead Highway. Years later the author began his

research which soon revealed the historical significance of the unassuming road. Originally referred to as Kuteman's Cutoff, the over-grown country lane he encountered had once been part of Texas Highway No. 1 and was a link in the nation's first all-weather transcontinental highway. Travelers in the 1920s and 1930s also knew it as part of the "Broadway of America" and U.S. 80.

The Bankhead Highway in Texas adds to the documentation of one of America's most significant early highways. It also provides a guide to the earliest Bankhead route across the state. All along the way are remarkable stories yet to be told about the people who built and traveled the long road.

Terrible Flood in Tom Green County (continued)

At San Angela the scene was exciting. The North Concho was not affected save by the backwater. But for this circumstance our town would have perished. Yet the backwater ruined many, sending the still elements into our streets, and rising forty feet above the river bed. It embraced G. W. Westbrook's residence, sank Keyser's saloon, rose more than two feet above the first gallery of the Concho House, (which was lately built at a cost of \$11,000) rendering it unfit for further use. Many other houses were destroyed, and not a Mexican habitation on the river now remains. The loss to this city will probably reach \$50,000, a low estimate. The country around has suffered terribly, and the loss of life is great. A Mexican woman and five children were

lost just opposite Ben Ficklin. Twenty persons are missing from, W. S. Kelley's ranch, on Spring Creek, and ten from Tankersley's.

Three at David McCarthy's are lost, and all his sheep are gone. Dr. Owens and child, living on Levy's ranch, are drowned. Mrs. H. K. Mathis was swept from her home with a child in her arms. Not fewer than one hundred lives were lost in this county.

Following are some of the parties lost: Mrs. Metcalf and daughter Zemula, Mrs. B. Taylor, Geo. Roinson, infant son of H. K. Mathis, Anselino, a Mexican, Red Evans and five Mexicans. Mr. Charles Lackey, wife and children are reported drowned. Mr. Stonehouse and family, reported drowned. Three women whose remains were not recognized, drowned.

### Local News

The west bound No. 1 passenger train this morning is several hours late.

The new building in front of Robert's Delmonico restaurant is fast nearing completion.

A number of our cattle men were in town Wednesday night, and started off on a cow hunt early next morning.

The stream of sheep coming into this county still continues

to flow, and the demand for the fleecy animals still continues active.

Mr. McCamie finished fencing his section of land north of town some time since. He has now a splendid pasture.

Coppins & Ross have some fine weathers to trade for ewes. Passengers on the east bound train now take lunch here. E. Sigal serves it to them.

We are informed that Mr. J. B. Cutbirth has sold his entire stock of cattle to J. D. Merchant.

Work on moving the large building onto Market street had to be suspended last Thursday on account of the rain.

Messrs. Seay & Reeves are building an addition to the rear of their now capacious saloon building; the place is much improved and will be better still.

Rain to the amount of 3.33 inches fell here on Wednesday of last week. No wonder the streams went up and floods were the result in some of our neighboring counties.

Mr. John Skinner, after buying a car load of mules from J. D. Merchant, left for his home in Pilot Point last Thursday evening, he having heard that his daughter was sick at home.

## Quail Research Ranch seeks assistance in locating missing birds

Wildlife watchers and hunters in the Texas Rolling Plains are asked to be on the lookout for leg banded or radio collared scaled quail this fall. Dale Rollins, director of the Rolling Plains Quail Research Ranch (RPQR) near Roby, Texas makes the request as part of an on-going research study that tracks the movements of the bird and their propensity to repopulate a range where their numbers were once much stronger.

The study, called *Operation Transfusion*, is a multi-county research effort designed to relocate scaled quail to habitat where they've long been extirpated. A total of 120 scaled (or blue) quail were relocated to the Matador Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Cottle County and an additional site in Nolan County.

The goal of *Operation Transfusion* is to gather data to evaluate the efficacy of translocating wild-trapped quail into recently vacated ranges as a means of "jump-starting" otherwise faltering populations. Some of the released birds are radio collared and their movements and survival are monitored.

Scaled quail were historically common across the western Rolling Plains but their abundance declined sharply around 1988 and has remained at only remnant levels since that time. The cause for the decline is poorly understood, but may in-



clude disease or habitat change. For whatever reason, scaled quail have failed to recolonize former habitats and their abundance has remained well below the long-term mean.

RPQR researchers are attempting to stem the tide on the decline.

Dale Rollins says that the early reports from the Matador WMA release site are encouraging. "Of the 86 scaled quail we released there, 14 are missing," he says. "Of those, we know that eight of the 14 missing birds were still alive as of August 21st near the Matador WMA."

As such, people from the Roll-

ing Plains are asked to report scaled quail where they haven't seen them in the past five years so that their population expansions can be tracked. In addition, Rollins says that for research sake, they'd love to have information on any bird that his team has tagged and released.

"We'd like to have information on any leg-banded birds someone may shoot," says Rollins. "No, they're not in trouble. We just need a report of where the bird was killed to supplement our data on movements. Of course, we'd like the transmitter back if any radio collared birds are found."

### About the Ranch

The Rolling Plains Quail Research Ranch is a 4,720-acre ranch in Fisher County, Texas. The ranch's aim is to provide land managers, and other stakeholders, with timely, relevant technology and management schemes for enhancing quail populations in the Rolling Plains of Texas. In doing so, the ranch hopes to sustain the "quail dynasty" that has supported hunters, ranchers, local economies, hunters, and the quails themselves.

## Cottonwood News by Beverly Brown

Thursday (that's today for many of you) at 5:30 P.M., a Texas Historical Marker will be dedicated at the Cross Plains Review, Cross Plains oldest continuous business. The Review got its start in 1909, well over a hundred years ago. Many of you will remember Jack Scott publishing the Review. I can still remember Benny Glover working at the big typesetting machines in the back of the office.

The Cottonwood News has been in the Cross Plains Review since about 1928. It started at a time when there were columns from Rowden, Pioneer, Cross Cut, Atwell, Burkett, Sabanno - small communities surrounding Cross Plains. Over the years Mrs. F. E. Mitchell, Mrs. S. B. Strahan, Miss Hazel Respass, Alice Champion and others have written the Cottonwood News over the years.

I started writing "the News" in the early 1970's and continued until around 2000 when Wallace Bennett took over. Then, I started writing the column again when Wallace retired.

One of my favorite columns from about 1973 or 1974 involves the "Caddo Critter", a mysterious large animal with red glowing eyes that was spotted just north of Cottonwood by a carload of high school boys. It isn't known whether or not the "Caddo Critter" existed, but that group of boys were definitely believers.

## Two suspects arrested in death of Abilene police officer Don Allen

ABILENE, Texas --An Abilene couple has been arrested for the murder of an Abilene police officer. Violet Walter, 30, and Phillip Walter, 29, were taken into custody in the 1000 block of South Clack about 6 p.m. Thursday, September 3rd, in connection with the homicide of officer Don Russell Allen, according to Abilene Police Chief Stan Standridge.

The Walters, who are husband and wife, were charged with first-degree felony murder, and punishment ranges from 5-99 years to life in prison. Standridge said that charges could be added, pending further investigation. Bond has been set at \$500,000 each.

Allen was found dead in his residence on Yucca Drive in Clyde on Monday evening, August 31st.

"We were able to link the suspects to property taken from Don Allen's residence," Standridge said. "Additionally, physical evidence recovered at the scene has linked the suspects to the crime. While I cannot discuss the specifics, we are confident that we have taken the correct people into custody. We do not believe there are any other suspects."

The family was informed of the arrests by Standridge at Beltway Park Church.

Standridge added that Allen still needs to be buried, but he said that all of the money needed for Allen's funeral has been raised. Allen's funeral was Friday at 10 a.m. with a procession and burial in Clyde following.

Clyde Police Chief Robert Dalton said Monday, September 7th, the preliminary autopsy from the Tarrant County Medical Examiner's Office has been completed and only said Allen's death was a homicide. Dalton said the autopsy was ordered by

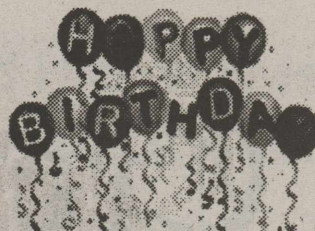
Chief Dalton said the suspects remain in jail, but he believed they were being housed in Taylor County.

The Clyde police chief said they are still attempting to recover some of the property taken from Allen's home, including his service revolver, as well as his missing officer's belt. Dalton said the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) is assisting in the case due to Allen's missing service revolver.

Chief Dalton said he believes all of the stolen property is "outside of Clyde, most likely in Abilene."

## Sheriff's Corner

A Callahan County resident and businessman came into the Callahan County Courthouse and wanted to donate \$600.00 to the Sheriff's Office. After looking into this to determine if it was legal and ethical I called him and thanked him for his thoughtfulness and generosity. I also explained to him that he wouldn't be issued a "get out of jail card" or get any special privileges for the donation. He said he knew that we were always short of funds and just wanted to help and didn't want anything in return. I thankfully told him to make the check out to the Callahan County Sheriff's Office and bring it by. He said he would and did the next Monday.

A couple of weeks later another person wanted to donate \$500 dollars on a worthy cause for the Sheriff's Department. This person knew that a "get out of jail card" or any special privileges of any kind would not be forth coming as a result of the donation. This person delivered the \$500 check to the County Treasurer.

The Sheriff's Department has been in need of a computer program called "Leads Online". Leads Online is the nation's largest online investigation system for law enforcement, providing rapid electronic access to transactions from thousands of reporting businesses include scrap metal processors, secondhand stores, internet drop-off stores, and pawn shops across the country, as well as criminal information from eBay listings for criminal investigations.

Up until now the Callahan County Sheriff's Department has had to borrow other law en-

forcement entities leads online. Our investigator, retired Abilene Police Officer Frank Weise, still has good contacts with the Abilene Police Department's investigators and can use their Leads Online. The Baird Marshal's office also has Leads Online. While both of these law enforcement entities are thoughtful and helpful to us they are busy with their own investigations. It takes time to enter stolen items into the system and time is valuable for all of us as theft crimes increase everywhere.

This program costs \$1,068.00 a year. Counting the \$600.00 and \$500.00 donation we will have \$1,100 which will give us enough money to purchase this badly needed law enforcement tool. This will save us valuable time by not having to go through another law enforcement agency. The Callahan County Sheriff's Department continues to update and improve its capabilities while striving to answer all calls from the public.

I want to thank all those who help in any way they can to stop drug and alcohol abuse. Drug addition not only leads to thefts to support their habit but also drug and alcohol abuse leads to major family violence. Many times young children are caught in the middle of family violence. A person addicted to drugs will steal from his or her own grandmother to support their habit. If they stay on drugs long enough, especially meth, their mental capacity will permanently be affected.

I also want to thank all of our Chaplains who faithfully come to the jail to teach and share Biblical Scripture with the inmates. I know this helps because occasionally one will lis-

ten and change their life for the better. Saturday morning a nice looking young man came into the front door of the jail especially to see me. He was smiling and he asked me if I remembered him. I look at him closely and said, "I think I do." "You were a trustee here a couple of years ago." He told me I was correct and that I had called him into my office at the jail one day while he was a trustee here and talked to him. He said I simply asked him why he didn't "quit quitting and just quit" using drugs. He told me he had been off drugs for a year and a half now and had a good job in construction in Fort Worth. He look healthy and happy. I gave him more positive encouragement. Incidents like these fill me with pride and hope for the future.

As of August 3rd, we had a total of 38 inmates in jails including our jail, Shackelford County Jail, Taylor County Jail, Comanche County Jail, and most recently Jones County Jail. Of those 38 inmates 19 are felony drug charges, one misdemeanor drug charge, and three felony DWI's. The rest have multiple felony charges including 5 murder charges. Saturday, September the 5th there were a total of 35 inmates incarcerated in jails we contract with and this jail. As of Thursday, September 3rd the number of inmates we have in Taylor County Jail for murder increased by 2, from 5 to a total of 7. Two inmates (Butler and Covington) that are charged with the murder of Pennington have pled guilty and are waiting to go to prison. These numbers fluctuate but the trend has been a steady increase in calls, arrests, and long term jail sentences.

## One Month Left to Apply for SBA Disaster Loans

SACRAMENTO, Calif. - Director Tanya N. Garfield of the U.S. Small Business Administration's (SBA) Disaster Field Operations Center - West today reminded small, nonfarm businesses in 150 Texas counties and neighboring counties in New Mexico and Oklahoma of the October 5, 2015, deadline to apply for an SBA federal disaster loan for economic injury. These low-interest loans are to offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by the drought in the following primary counties that began on November 1, 2014.

According to Garfield, small nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size may apply for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$2 million to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. "EIDLs may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that cannot be paid because of the disaster's impact," said Garfield.

"SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the

disaster. EIDL assistance is available regardless of whether the applicant suffered any property damage," Garfield added.

The interest rate is 4 percent for businesses and 2.625 percent for private nonprofit organizations with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency about the U.S. Department of Agriculture assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance in drought disasters.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at <https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela>.

### Cottonwood Country Musical set for September 26th

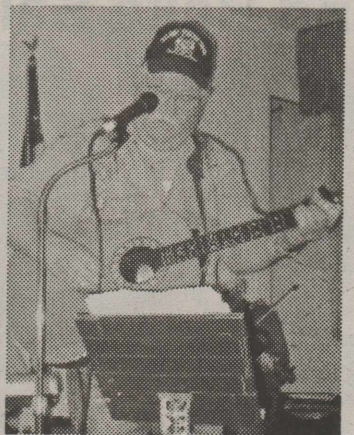
The Cottonwood Country Musical is Friday, September 25, 2015 at the Cottonwood Community Center, Cottonwood, Texas!
