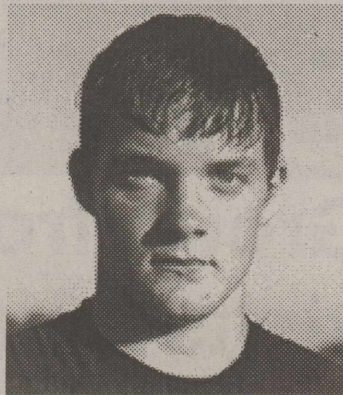

Cross Plains VFD Fish Fry This Friday, April 21st

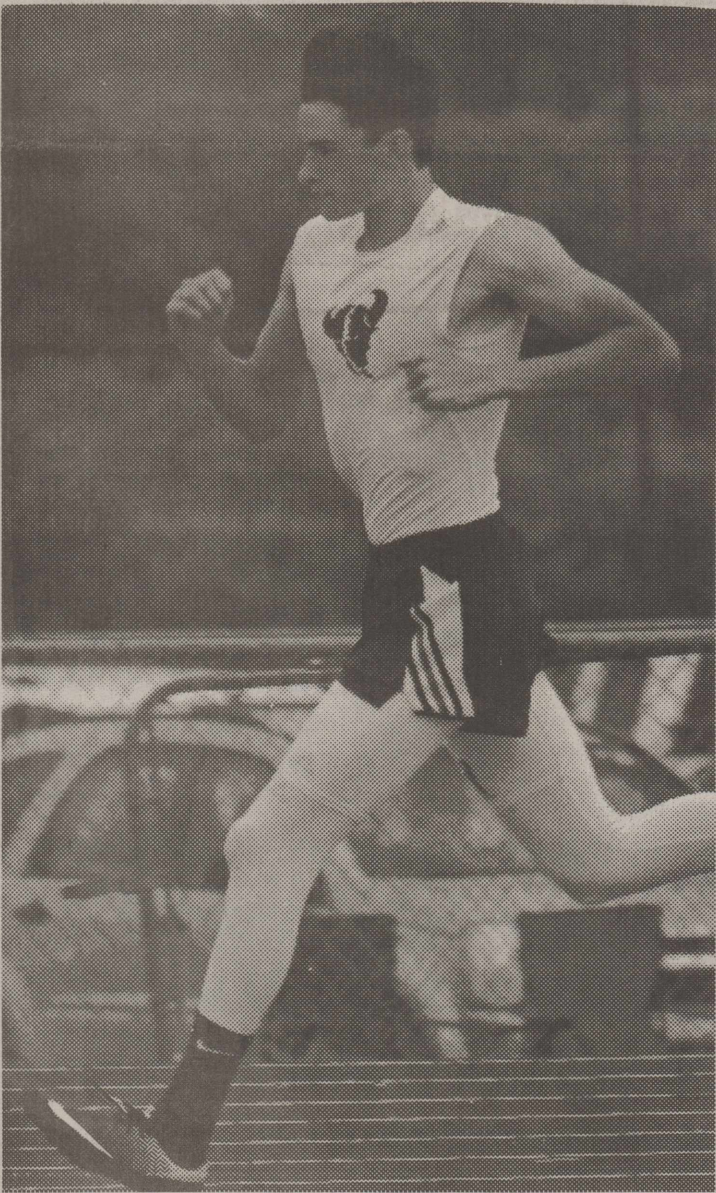

June will be here soon. Plans are being made now for the 19th Annual Barbarian Festival to be held at Treadway Park on Saturday, June 10th.

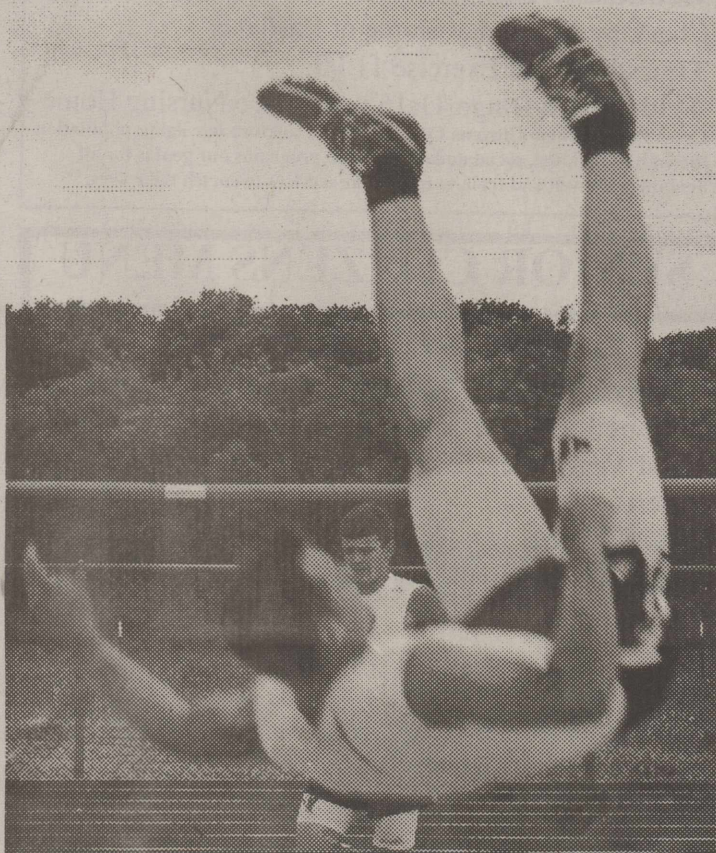
The festival features live music, an Antique and Classic Car and Truck Show, a Tractor Show, a bounce house for the kids, and lots of food, entertainment and booths.

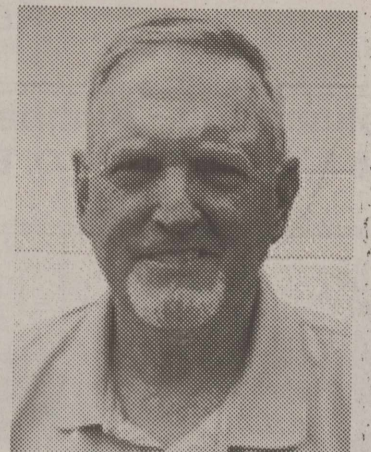

Cross Plains resident and May Basketball Coach Jeff Blackburn was named the All-Big Country Girls Basketball Super Team Coach of the Year. Blackburn, retired from coaching in Cross Plains a few years ago, then returned to the court last year as the basketball coach in May.

Blackburn coached the Lady Tigers to a 23-7 record and the Region II-1A semifinals, where they were eventually upended by O'Donnell, 61-43. His performance at May was enough to earn the veteran coach the title of Super Team Coach of the Year for the 2016-17 season.

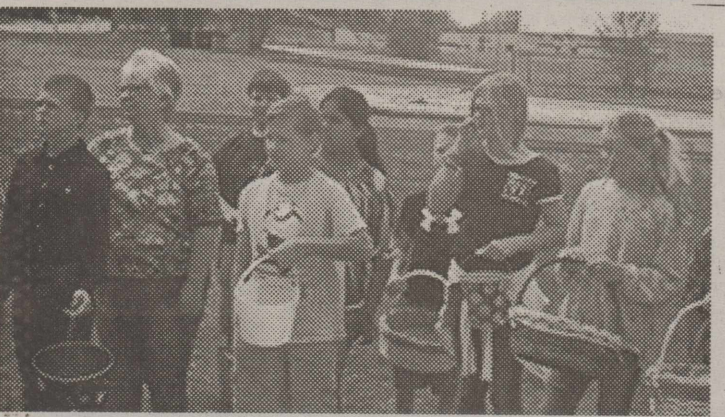

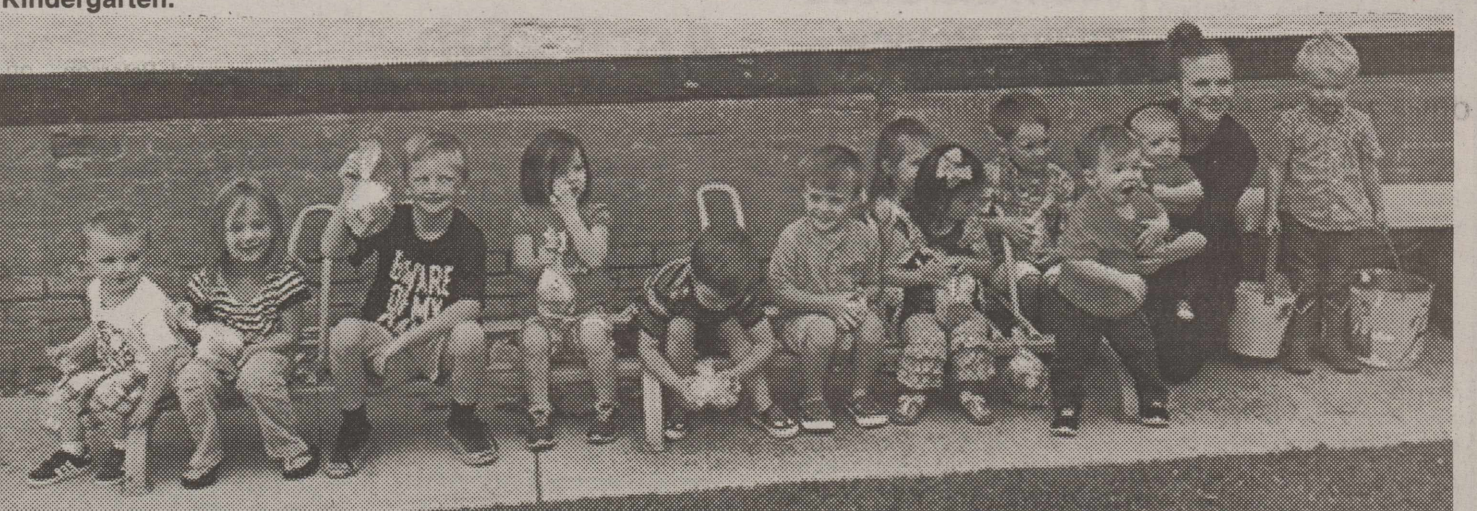

Sales tax holiday on emergency preparation supplies is April 22nd-24th

(AUSTIN) — With the potential for severe weather approaching this spring, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, April 22-24.

"Unfortunately, we can't predict when the next fire, flood or tornado may strike," Hegar said. "But we can be prepared, and this tax holiday helps Texans save money while stocking up for emergency situations before they happen."

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase. These include: batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75;

hurricane shutters and emergency ladders priced at less than \$300; and portable generators priced at less than \$3,000.

Purchases that do not qualify include:

batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles; camping stoves and camping

supplies; chainsaws; plywood; extension ladders and stepladders; and tents

A list of emergency preparation supplies that may be purchased tax free can be found on the Comptroller's website.

The Comptroller's office estimates shoppers will save \$1.5 million in state and local sales taxes during the tax holiday, approved by lawmakers during the 2015 Texas Legislature.

The Texas History Minute Sponsored by: HANNER CHEVROLET Engineer & Inventor Otis Boykin

Persistence makes all the difference, whether in history or science. And it is that persistence that can change the world, in ways both large and subtle. The work of engineer Otis Boykin helped facilitate a revolution in electronics, from the pacemaker to guided missiles.

Boykin was born in Dallas in August 1920. His parents had very modest means but worked very hard. His mother was a maid, and his father was a carpenter. However, his mother's health was weak, and she died of heart failure when Boykin was just a year old. His father struggled on and eventually became a minister.

Boykin proved to be a brilliant and hard-working student. He graduated at the top of his class from the segregated Booker T. Washington High School in Dallas. He won a scholarship to Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee, a respected, historically African-American university. While a student at Fisk, he worked at the university's aeronautics lab, where researchers devised new components and designs for aircraft. He graduated in 1941.

Not long after graduation, he moved to Chicago where he started working for a number of engineering firms. He began working with and developing new electrical systems. By the end of World War II, Boykin decided to move on and start his own company, Boykin-Fruth, Inc., a research and consulting firm. He also decided to expand his educational horizons and began graduate school at the Illinois Institute of Technology in 1946. In spite of his passion for learning, he had to drop out the next year because of high costs.

Boykin began working with and developing new types of resistors, electrical components that regulate the flow of electricity in a circuit. Resistors were a critical part of the electronics revolution that emerged in the 1960s and 1970s as improvements helped make all sorts of electrical devices more durable, more efficient, and cheaper.

In 1959, Boykin received his first of 26 patents for a wire precision resistor. In 1961, he received another patent for a new, inexpensive, and more efficient resistor.

Computer giant IBM quickly became interested in Boykin's new resistors and began incorporating them into their new generation of mainframe computers and experimental computers and circuits. As a result, IBM began to make computers that were smaller and faster. His components also began being used in such products as television sets. Before long, the military became interested and started using his resistors in new guided missile systems.

Perhaps his greatest impact was his work with the pacemaker. The pacemaker itself is a simple device with two components: the pulse generator, which contains a battery that sends the electrical impulses to the heart, which are regulated by Boykin's resistors, and the electrical leads connecting to the heart. The ability to regulate the heartbeat through the resistor makes the pacemaker practical. Pacemakers today are used to treat abnormal heartbeats, heart failure, and a variety of other heart ailments. They

are installed in relatively minor procedures. Pacemakers are sometimes installed temporarily for patients recovering from heart attacks. Thousands of people now have pacemakers, saving countless lives. In the mid-1960s, he left France to continue working as a consultant. The meeting of the Callahan County Commissioners' Court was held at its regular meeting place in the Courthouse on April 17, 2017 A.D. at 9:00 A.M., with the following officers present, to wit: Roger Corn, County Judge; Harold Hicks, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; Bryan Farmer, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; Tom Windham, Commissioner Precinct No. 3; Cliff Kirkham, Commissioner Precinct No. 4; and Donna Bell, County Clerk and ex-Officio member of Commissioners' Court.

The following items of business were transacted:

—The meeting was called to order at 9:05 A.M. by Judge Corn. All Commissioners were present.

—Commissioner Kirkham made a motion to go into executive session. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion and the motion carried 5-0. Court went into executive session at 9:05 A.M.

Court went back into regular session at 9:41 A.M.

American Kestrel

The group of magnificent birds known as raptors are renowned for many things, including their diet, their flight, and their size. The wingspan of most raptors is over 3 feet, and some have wingspans of 7 feet or more. But here in Texas, we happen to have a small raptor who, by very definition, contradicts the "everything is bigger in Texas" mantra, and that bird of prey is known as the American Kestrel.

The American Kestrel is readily spotted along roadways throughout the state, depending on the season, as it perches on high-wires and fences. It seems to prefer rolling plains and grassy areas, although it will utilize just about any open area that is larger than an acre or two. In all but the Rio Grande Valley, where northern populations tend to overwinter, it can be observed year-round throughout the remainder of the state. Outside of Texas it may be seen throughout the continental United States northward as far as trees occur and southward to southern Mexico.

Adult male American Kestrels are quite stunning in coloration. The head is blue-gray with a red-orange cap while the face is white with 2 black vertical bars on either side of the large, black, yellow-rimmed eyes. The breast is buff colored and is spotted with numerous black dots. The back and wings are colored like the head; the back is red-orange and the wings are blue-gray. Both areas are adorned with black barring. The wings are elongated and pointed, tipped with black, and the tail is red-orange and lacks any barring.

Like most animals (other than humans), female Kestrels are not nearly as audacious with its coloring. While the head is colored and patterned similarly as the male, the breast area is pale with brown spots, while the back and wings lack the red-orange and the blue-gray coloration. Whereas most females are simply decorated with a bit less "pizzazz" than their opposite sex counterparts, they are still quite attractive in their own right.

As previously mentioned, this falcon species is small by raptor standards. The body length of large adults barely reaches 1

foot as the wingspan is merely 2 feet across.

The majority of the time, this avian species prefers to live a solitary life, although many individuals will often be seen perching in areas of optimal hunting. It preys primarily on small rodents such as field mice and large insects such as Lubber Grasshoppers. It will occasionally hunt and feed upon small reptiles, amphibians, and even smaller song birds; the latter group makes up an insignificant percentage of its diet.

It is a monogamous species, and the males court potential mates by catching prey items, bringing it to the female and feeding her while she is in mid-flight. Nesting is solitary, and the nest structure is very feeble with little to no nesting materials utilized. Many times, holes in trees, indentations in walls or on bridge support ledges are exploited. The 3-7 eggs vary in coloration from buff white with large brown blotches to light

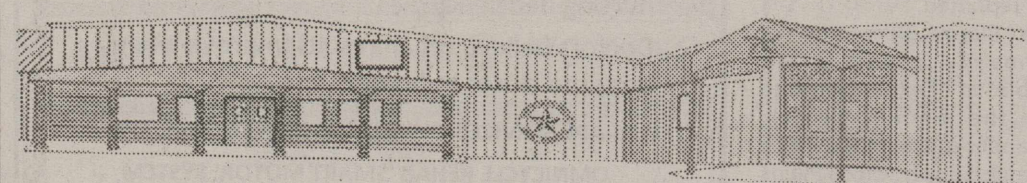

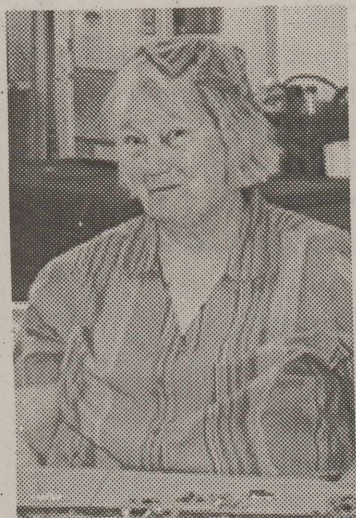

Cross Plains' 2017 retail sales up 5% from 2016

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2017 are just over five percent higher than 2016, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, April 12th.

Cross Plains' 2017 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$74,251.25, which is 5.39 percent higher than the \$70,447.22 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2016.

The payment to the city for April 2017 was \$16,493.64, which is 15.09 percent lower than the \$19,426.00 payment made to the city in April 2016.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, April 12th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$620.2 million in local sales tax allocations for April, 4.9 percent more than in April 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in February by businesses that report tax monthly.

"The cities of Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Austin saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "The cities of Sugar Land, McAllen, Irving and Grand Prairie saw noticeable decreases."

Hegar sent Texas cities \$397.8 million in April 2017, which is higher by 2.8 percent compared to April 2016 and higher by 2.6 percent year-to-date.

He reported \$36.8 million in April 2017 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 4.8 percent compared to April 2016 and higher by 0.1 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$144.1 million in April 2017 sales tax allocations, which is 7.4 percent higher than April 2016 and higher by 3.8 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$41.5 million in April 2017 allocations, which is 18.3 percent higher than April

2016 and higher by 10.4 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$620.2 million in April 2017, which is 4.9 percent higher than April 2016 and higher by 3.2 percent year-to-date.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments for this month include:

—The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 2017 started the year 1.98 percent lower than the 2016 payments. The city has received \$89,303.54 in 2017, while the 2016 tax payments to the city totaled \$91,116.33.

Baird's monthly payment for April 2017 was \$19,952.38, which is 16.42 percent lower than the \$23,873.92 payment made to Baird in April 2016.

—The 2017 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 1.33 percent lower than the payments made to the city in 2016. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$173,199.06 in 2017. The 2016 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$175,548.26.

The City of Clyde's monthly payment for March 2017 was \$42,657.15, which is 15.37 percent lower than the \$50,408.72 payment made to the city in March 2016.

—The City of Putnam reported the 2017 payments to the town totaled \$2,089.07, which is lower by 2.36 percent from the 2016 payments to the city in the amount of \$2,139.66.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of March 2017 was \$545.00, which is 27.52 percent lower than the \$751.98 payment made to Putnam in March 2016.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

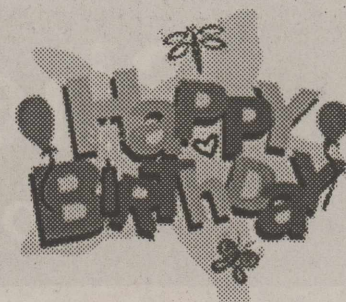
Clyde businesses collect 2.00%, including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one percent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department).

Cross Plains collects 2.00% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 1.00% is allocated for economic development in the town.

Baird collects 2.00% in local sales tax of which 1.00% is allocated to the city, 0.50% is allocated to the community's economic development corporation and 0.50% of one percent to reduce property taxes.

Putnam collects 1.00% in local sales tax of which all 1.00 percent is allocated to the city.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, the Comptroller said. Some cities use up to an additional one percent of city sales tax to help fund local economic development and to reduce property taxes.

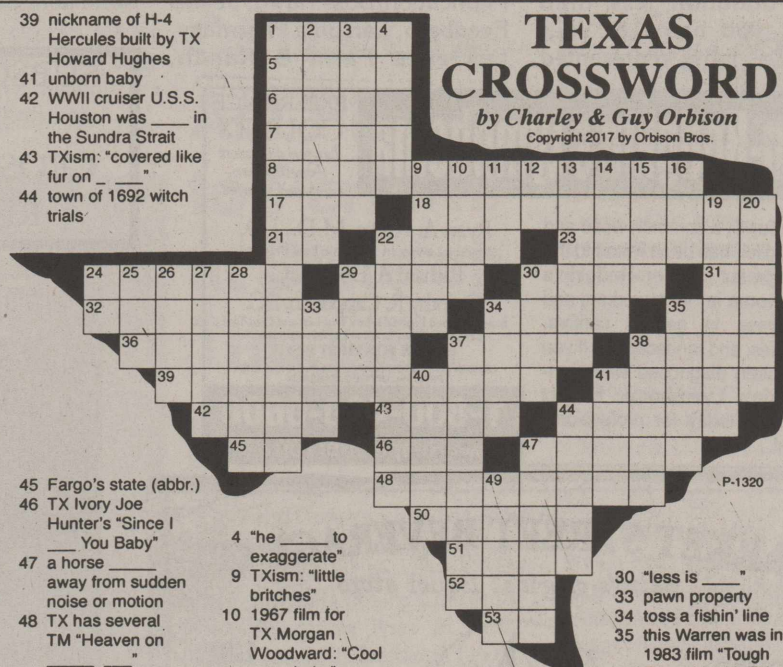

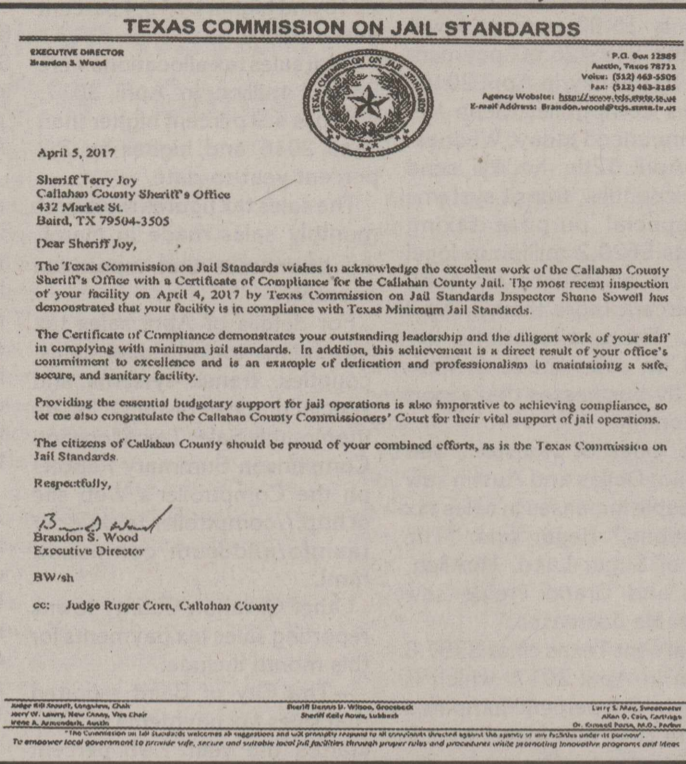
approximately 5PM he told office personnel to call a Callahan County Commissioner or the County Judge.

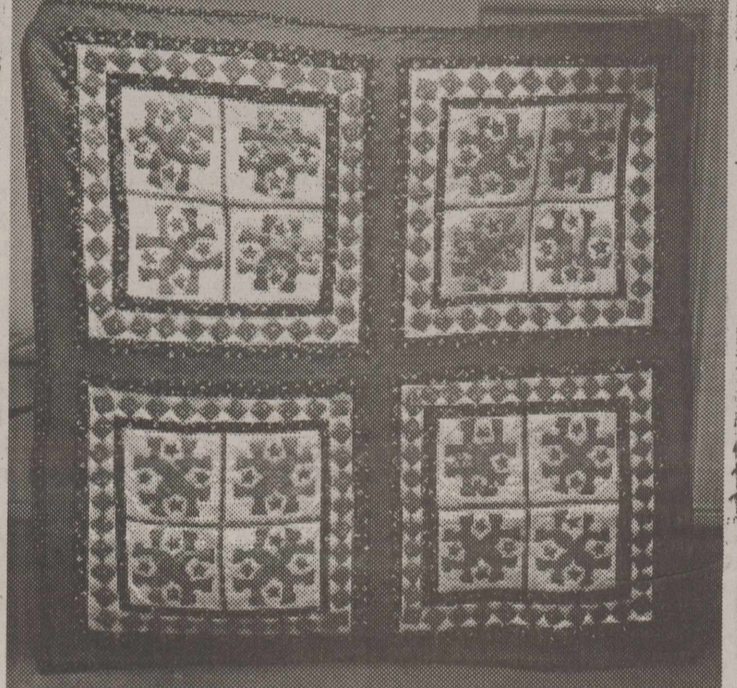

Plano man killed in 3 vehicle accident on I-20

A Plano, Texas semi-tractor driver was killed in a three vehicle accident on Interstate 20 near Putnam at 9:04 a.m. on Friday, April 14th, according to the Department of Public Safety.

Zelalem Yeneneh Eshete, 40, of Plano was pronounced dead at the scene and the body was taken to Parker Funeral Home in Baird.

According to DPS Sergeant Fred Biddle, a 2016 Freightliner truck, towing a semi-trailer, being driven by Paul Elliott Coilton, 52, of Oakland,

California was parked on the north shoulder of I-20 on the westbound side about 500 yards east of Putnam in Callahan County.

Another 2014 U-Haul Truck pulling a semi-trailer, driven by Henry Stephen Peek, 58, of Canyon Lake was traveling west on I-20 and was rear-ended by a 2011 Freightliner truck, towing a semi-trailer, driven by Zelalem Yeneneh Eshete.

There were no other injuries and the crash is still under investigation. All three involved were wearing their seat belts.
