Abilene Police detective killed in crash on I-20 Sunday evening

ABILENE, Texas - A 33-year-old Abilene police detective was killed and two others injured Sunday during a crash on at Clyde Sunday evening, August 6th near the 299 mile marker exit of Interstate 20.

During a news conference Sunday night, Police Chief Stan Standridge said Elise Ybarra died in the crash. Injured in the accident were detectives Chris Milliom and Robert Collins, Standridge said.

Milliom and Collins didn't have life-threatening injuries, Standridge said. Milliom and Collins were taken to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

Ybarra, Milliom, and Collins were on their way to the Crimes Against Children Conference in Dallas when the wreck occurred about 6:15 p.m. on eastbound I-20 at mile marker 296.

"They encountered traffic moving at a slow pace, as there had been a vehicle crash ahead," Standridge said. "Ybarra, who was driving an unmarked detective's vehicle, entered a line of slow-moving traffic. A short time later, an eastbound white Chevrolet pickup came upon the line of traffic that was slowed and collided with the detectives' vehicle."

The driver of the pickup was also listed with incapacitating injuries at Hendrick Medical Center, the Texas Department of Public Safety said in a news release. The DPS release also said the truck failed to control



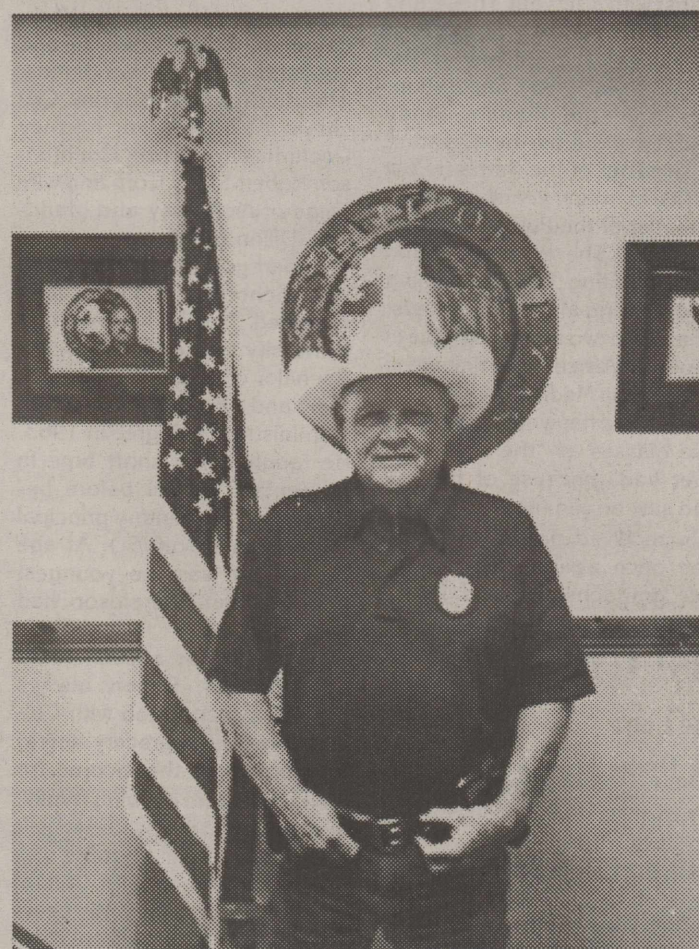

its speed. Standridge said Ybarra began her law enforcement career with the Sedalia Police Department in Missouri. She started her career with the Abilene Police Department on June 2, 2014. After graduating from the Abilene Police Academy, she was sworn in as an Abilene Police Officer on Nov. 21, 2014, he said.

According to Standridge, she served as a patrol officer for two years and then transferred to the Special Victims' Unit as a child abuse investigator on Dec. 14, 2016.

She is survived by her husband of eight years, Adam Ybarra, and their 10-month-old daughter.

DPS is investigating the crash.

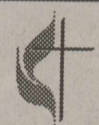

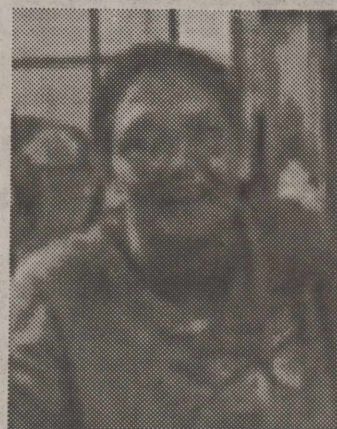

deeply. She was loved by many and will be missed by all who knew her.

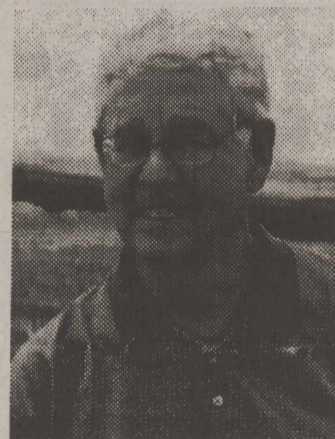

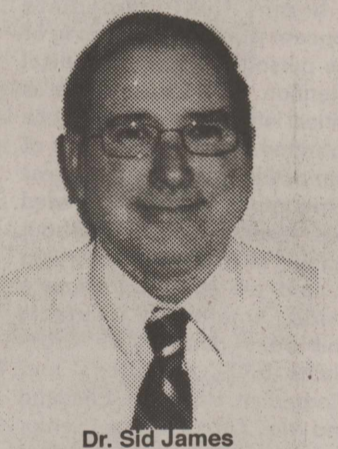

Velvet Ant

As I have written on numerous occasions, the common names of animals often describe things such as coloration, habitats, or even type of animal that it is quite thoroughly. However, there are times that even the common name can be misleading, and in one particular case of a colorful insect that is found here in Texas, the common name doesn't even accurately describe what type of animal it is. That insect is the Velvet Ant.

Velvet Ants belong to a large and very diverse family known as the Mutillidae family. This family is represented by well over 3,000 species that can be found worldwide. Members of this family prefer to dwell in temperate climates, and while some species favor a more tropical-type habitat, there are several species that have selected Texas as their home. The most common species in Texas (*Dasymutilla* sp.) lives in semi-arid to arid areas, particularly areas with sandy and/or loose soils.

Despite being labeled as an ant, this unique insect is in actuality a variety of wasp. And to make identification more confusing, only the males have wings. In fact, in many species, the males and females are colored quite differently from each other! At least the first half of the common name (the "velvet" portion) is accurate as the exoskeleton (the insects protective "outer-shell") is covered with a thick layer of hair that has the feel of velvet to the touch.

This hair is regularly brightly colored and more often than not this bright coloration is some variation of orange or red. The most common coloration exhibited, in Texas specimens anyway, is a myriad of combinations of black and orange. In the most commonly seen species, the head and thorax are both black while the abdomen is red/orange. Patterns of other species include having orange along the entire upper-side with black underneath as well as some where the head and the thorax are red/orange and the

abdomen is banded with black and red/orange. Whatever the coloration, the Velvet Ant has three body parts like all other insects; the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. It also has 6 legs, elongated antennae, mouthparts that are adapted to its preferred food source, nectar. It is also surprisingly large; adult females can achieve a total length of nearly an inch.

The life cycle of this fascinating and solitary-living species parallels that of many other parasitic species of insects. Males, who have been granted with the gift of flight, will search for females. Once a suitable partner is discovered and mating has taken place, the female will then begin a quest to find the underground nest of a closely related wasp or occasionally a bee such as the Bumble Bee. Once this nest has been revealed, the female will then chew open the cocoon and deposit her own egg on the inside. Once this egg has hatched, the white grub-looking larvae will then feed on the host larvae as it undergoes several stages of growth, maturing into a pupa then an adult.

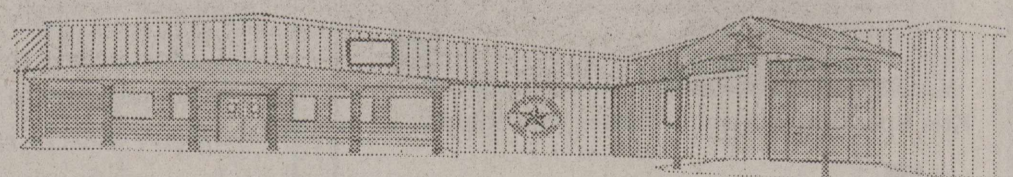
While males may have the gift of flight, they have no ability to sting to defend themselves. Females on the other hand, have the ability to inflict sever

pain on a perceived threatening object. Many outdoorsman, as well as farm and ranchhands, have made the unenviable mistake of either grabbing or picking up a female Velvet Ant. The female wasp has an unusually lengthy and navigable stinger that injects a powerful venom that has been consistently rated as one of the most painful insect stings in numerous indoor magazines. In fact, the pain is so intense that this species of wasp has taken the name "Cow Killer" in many areas of the country. However, the cattle industry is quite safe; "Cow Killers" have not even been documented to sting cattle! This name is derived from the fact that the painful sting is said to be able to knock down something even as large as a bovine.

Thankfully, however, this species of wasp is rather benign in nature and only stings after much duress and agitation. And while the sting is powerful, there is no immediate danger nor any long-term ill effects. So, when observing the females of this colorful insect, give her a good amount of space, but don't fret; she is more than happy to along her merry way without defending herself against you

There was a great turnout for "Splash in the Park" and all the

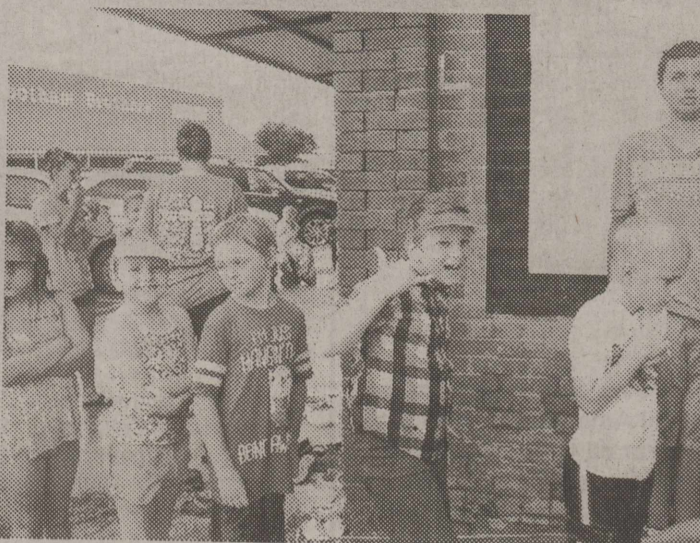
kids left with smiles on their faces.

To all the volunteers, I could not have pulled this off without all of you.

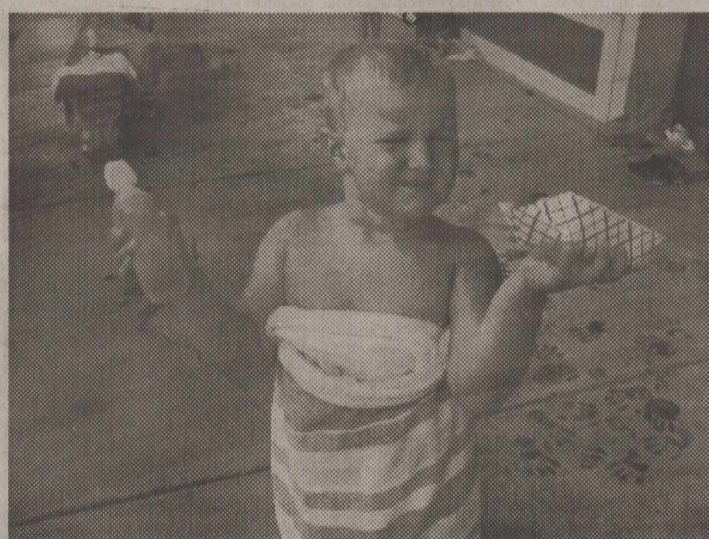
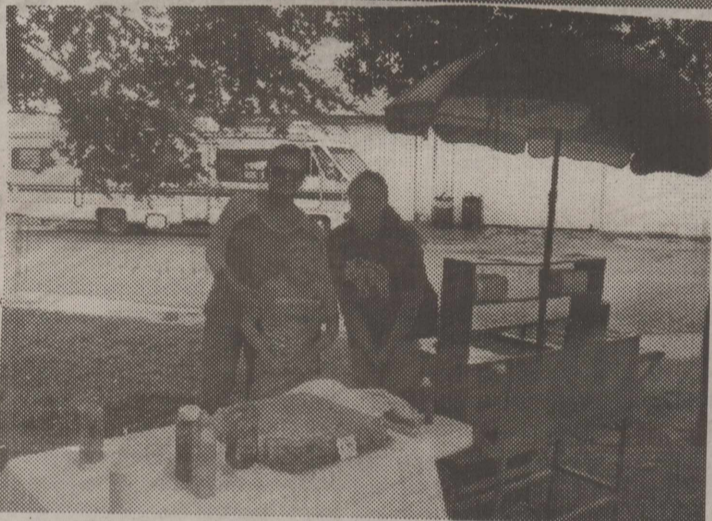

The High School Football Season starts on August 8th with a scrimmage at Hamilton. The Buffaloes are already hard at practice morning and night, as two a days started on Monday.

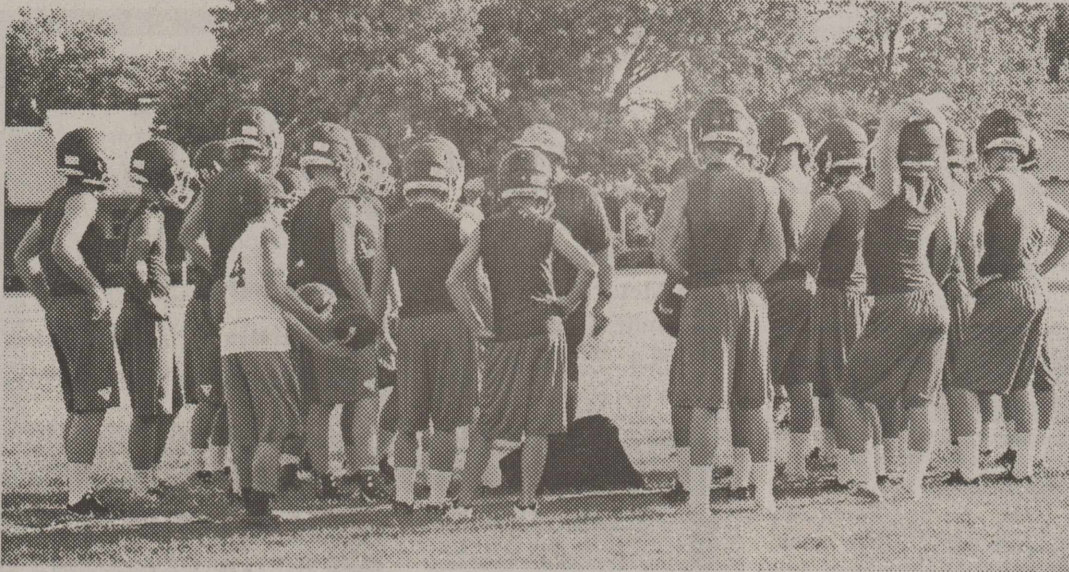
Look for Cross Plains to have a powerhouse of a team as this new herd of Buffaloes take the field.

The Texas History Minute

Senator Tom Connally helped create the UN and NATO

The twentieth century transformed the United States from a moderate power only loosely involved in world affairs into a superpower where most questions of foreign relations revolved around American goals and intentions. Much of this transition began taking place during the period just before and just after World War II. Numerous treaties were ratified, planning was required, and many discussions took place in the U. S. Senate. An important part of this work in creating a global role for the United States came from a one-time, small-town attorney from McLennan County, Texas.

Thomas Terry Connally was born on a farm near the small community of Hewitt in McLennan County in August 1877, just after the end of Reconstruction. He graduated from Baylor University in 1896 at age 19 and earned a law degree from the University of Texas in 1898. Immediately after graduation, he enlisted in the army to fight in the Spanish-American War. He believed in the role that America must play in world affairs, but in the meantime, moved to Marlin in Falls County to set up a law practice.

After respected terms in the state legislature and as Falls County Prosecuting Attorney, he was elected to Congress in 1916. America entered World War I in 1917, and Connally, at age 40, briefly resigned from Congress to join the army once again. After his return, he was put on the House Foreign Affairs Committee where he actively supported President Woodrow Wilson's leadership on the world stage and plans for American entry into the League of Nations, an organization dedicated to world peace founded by Wilson. Because of bitterly divisions over the League, American entry failed.

Connally was elected to the U. S. Senate in 1928. He eventually came to serve on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, becoming its chair in 1941. He supported President Franklin D. Roosevelt's efforts to help arm the Allies as they fought against the Axis Powers. America could not afford to shy away from the demands of a dangerous world. Connally's role as Foreign Relations Chair proved to be invaluable as the nation worked with nations across the globe during World War II.

As World War II neared an end, Connally supported new American leadership in world affairs following the war. Roosevelt himself had supported the American entry into the League of Nations years before and now

supported a new organization similarly dedicated to peace and justice among the nations of the world. Roosevelt had referred to the Allies as "the United Nations" since the United Nations Declaration in 1942 and pushed for the creation of a formal organization that united the world's countries.

Connally was a natural choice to serve as a delegate, one of 850 from 51 nations. He met with delegates gathering in San Francisco, California, from other nations to form the United Nations in April 1945. He was named vice-chairman of the Conference on International Organization that formally created the UN. He served as a representative to the first UN conference in London later that year and the second UN conference in 1946 in New York, which later became its permanent headquarters. He also helped the UN begin expanding beyond the initial World War II allies in 1946 by securing the admission of Afghanistan, Iceland, and Sweden to the assembly.

Connally won re-election in 1946. Nationally, the Democrats lost their majority in the Senate in light of President Harry S. Truman's unpopularity. Connally lost his chairmanship of the Foreign Relations Committee but stayed on the Committee. He took back the chairmanship when Democrats regained the Senate in 1948. With the Cold War with the Soviet Union deteriorating, a new treaty appeared before the committee that would

also have lasting repercussions.

The North Atlantic Treaty allied the United States and eleven other nations into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Connally pushed its approval through committee, and it was ratified in the Senate in July 1949 by a vote of 82 to 13. NATO would be the first permanent alliance that the United States had entered into since it allied with France during the American Revolution. NATO became the cornerstone of America's defense against any communist expansion in Europe during the decades-long Cold War.

America's commitments abroad faced another test with the outbreak of the Korean War in 1950. Connally's committee helped provide Truman with the congressional support he needed in organizing for the latest war. Connally also openly defended Truman's controversial firing of Gen. Douglas MacArthur in 1951 for publicly criticizing him.

Connally decided not to seek re-election in 1952. After his retirement, he remained in Washington; and though 75 years old, he opened a law firm. He died in October 1963. He died in a world that now looked to America for leadership to defend the free world.

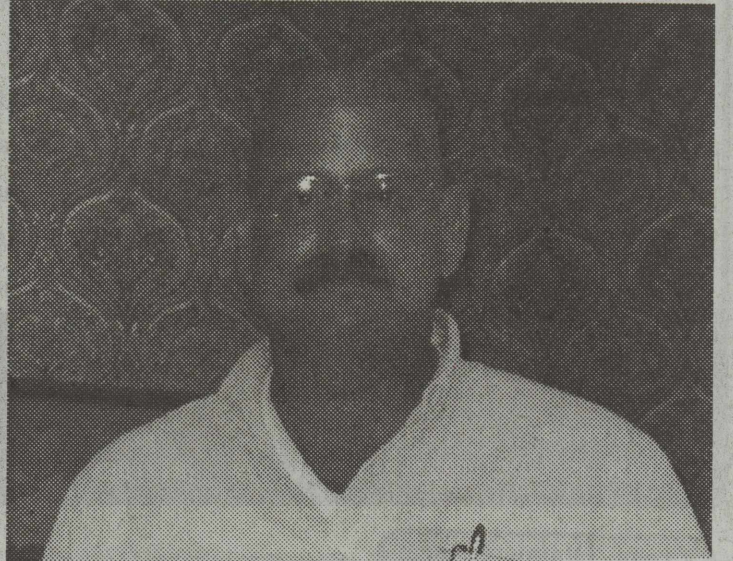

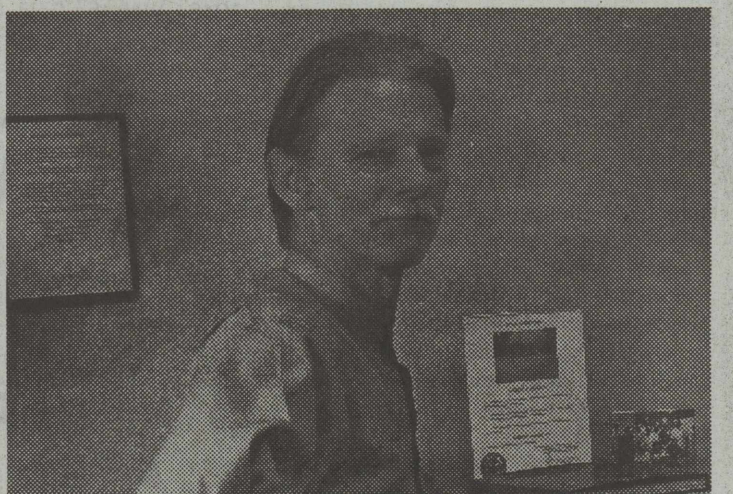
uniformed forces of the USA who are Masons and have been brought together into chapters for the purpose of developing true Patriotism and Americanism.

Dr. Kay Baker is retired from the Marines and is a probation counselor at the Central Texas Treatment Center in Georgetown.

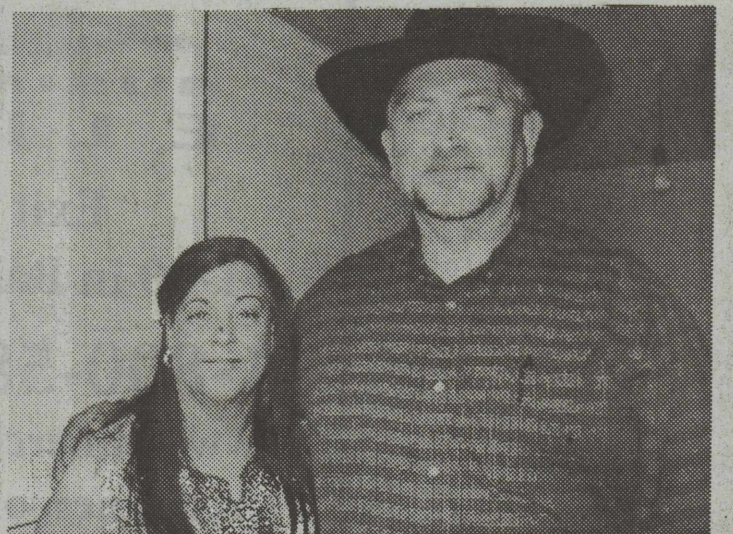
Both Ron and Lee Mottern are the Howard fans, having a wide variety of Howard books and not really having a favorite in their libraries.

At that time, all required documents will be completed for your child's enrollment. Please make sure all of their immunizations are current and that we have a current copy for our records in the office.

If you are enrolling as a new student or if you participated in the Pre-K and Kindergarten Roundup in the spring please

remember it is mandatory that we have a copy of your child's birth certificate, social security card and immunizations before they can start school.

You may leave medication in the school office for your child to take during the year. It must be in the original box or bottle with their name on it. You will also have to fill out a medical form.

If you ordered a PTO school supply packet they will be available for pick up during registration. We do have a few extras of each grade, just ask about them when you come in to register.

The Tax Ratification Election early voting will begin on Wednesday, August 9th, from 8am - 4pm in the Superintendent's office. Don't forget to bring your driver's license or voter registration card.

We are looking forward to a great 2017-2018 school year.

Sheriff's Corner

I recently attended the Sheriff's Association of Texas 139th Annual Training Conference in Grapevine, Texas, July 29th-August 1, 2017. Over 1,500 were in attendance. There were over 240 exhibits at the Expo where attendees could get familiar with the latest technology and products offered to the Law Enforcement and Corrections Community.

The first Sheriff's Association of Texas Conference was in 1878. Held annually in various cities across the state, this event allows Sheriffs, deputies, federal, state, and city law enforcement officers to network and discuss different issues that affect law enforcement across the state and nation. This year, participants received training on a variety of topics including: State Agency Updates, Social Media Education, Parole Warrants, Mail Fraud, Immigration Issues, Mental Health Issues in Jails, New Forensic Techniques used in investigations, Court Security, Texas Public Safety Broadband Program, Border Initiatives, and Securing Our Communities.

The Sheriff's Association of Texas (SAT) is a 502c3 non-

profit organization dedicated to increasing the effectiveness of local law enforcement in Texas. Through the support of their members, SAT provides training, legal/technical information, and other critical resources to Peace Officers in Texas. SAT also offers college scholarships to Peace Officers and their children who wish to continue their education. In addition, they honor Fallen Officers with their Lost Lawman Memorial. While attending the Sheriff's Conference in Grapevine I had the honor of being present with the other Texas Sheriff's while Governor Greg Abbott delivered a speech to all of us. After hearing his speech I can assure you that he is definitely pro law enforcement. The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety talked to all the Texas Sheriffs and the good news is that our local State Troopers will be working at home more now instead of going to the border. That was good news because Sunday afternoon and evening there were six wrecks in Callahan County, and one

was a fatality.

All the Texas Sheriffs got together for a group picture and the rest of the time was spent in training sessions. The training started off with "Legislative Updates". The Texas Legislature has mandated more training for law enforcement officers and jailers and dispatchers. Most of the training will cover jail security, mental health issues, and courtroom security. There will be more regulations and control from the Texas Commission of Jail Standards or TCJS and the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement or TCOLE.

I had the opportunity to visit with my neighboring Sheriffs. The Sheriff of Coleman County promised me some jail space from the new jail Coleman County is going to build. He said it would possibly be completed by 2018 near the livestock auction north of Coleman. That is good news for us. At the time of this writing we had a total of 25 inmates in our jail space.

I returned to work Wednesday to find my deputies, jailers, and dispatchers very busy. There are many sexual assault and family violence cases being investigated in Callahan County.

Cross Plains ISD Needing a New Band Hall and Cafeteria Renovation

The Cross Plains ISD Board of Trustees is asking for a tax increase to fund school improvements to include a new band hall and a cafeteria renovation. The 13 cent tax increase will provide an additional \$359,000 per year for the school. The increase will cost the average home owner approximately \$32.50 per year. (The average home owner owns a \$50,000 home and receives a \$25,000 homestead exemption.) Citizens that rent their home will not pay taxes on the home, and over 65 year old citizens will not see an increase.

Voters are asked to consider the tax increase on Saturday, August 26 from 7:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. in the Cross Plains Community Center. Early Voting will be in the Cross Plains ISD Board Room from 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. (Monday - Friday) beginning on August 9 and ending on August 22. Additional Early Voting will be available in the evening on August 14, 15, and 17 from 5:45 p.m. - 8:15 p.m. also in the School Board Room. Joyce McCoy is the Early Voting Clerk.

Clyde man among two killed in Nolan County two-vehicle accident

A Clyde man was among two people killed in an automobile accident in Nolan County on Sunday, July 30th. Stephen Joshua Arndt, 34, of Clyde was pronounced dead at the scene of a two-vehicle crash at 6:25 a.m. on Sunday, July 30th on US 84, near Roscoe in Nolan County. Also killed in the accident was Bobby Mack Moody, 85, of Abilene. According to the DPS, Moody was traveling southbound on US 84 in a 2013 Dodge Caravan

while Arndt was driving a 2015 Subaru Impreza traveling northbound on US 84. The vehicle driven by Moody veered into the northbound lane and crashed head-on into the Arndt vehicle.

Both men were wearing seat belts and both the bodies were taken to McCoy's Funeral Home in Sweetwater.

The road conditions were clear. The crash is under investigation.

Ryan and Andrew Carey Show Quarter Horses at Oklahoma Horse Show

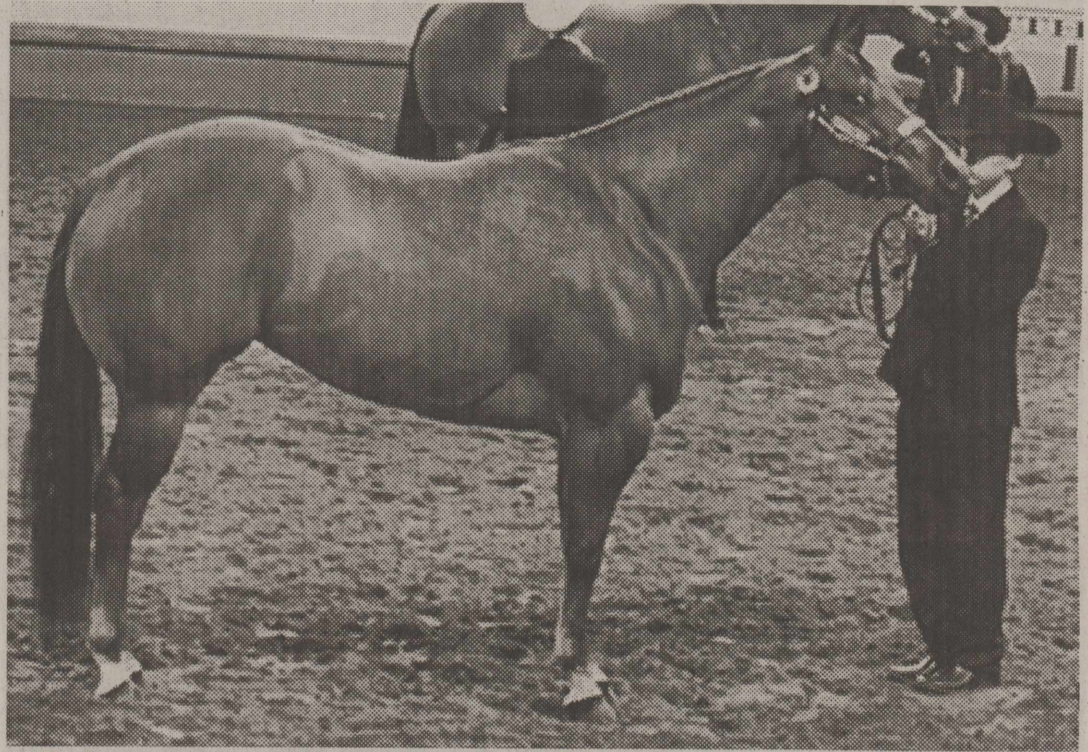

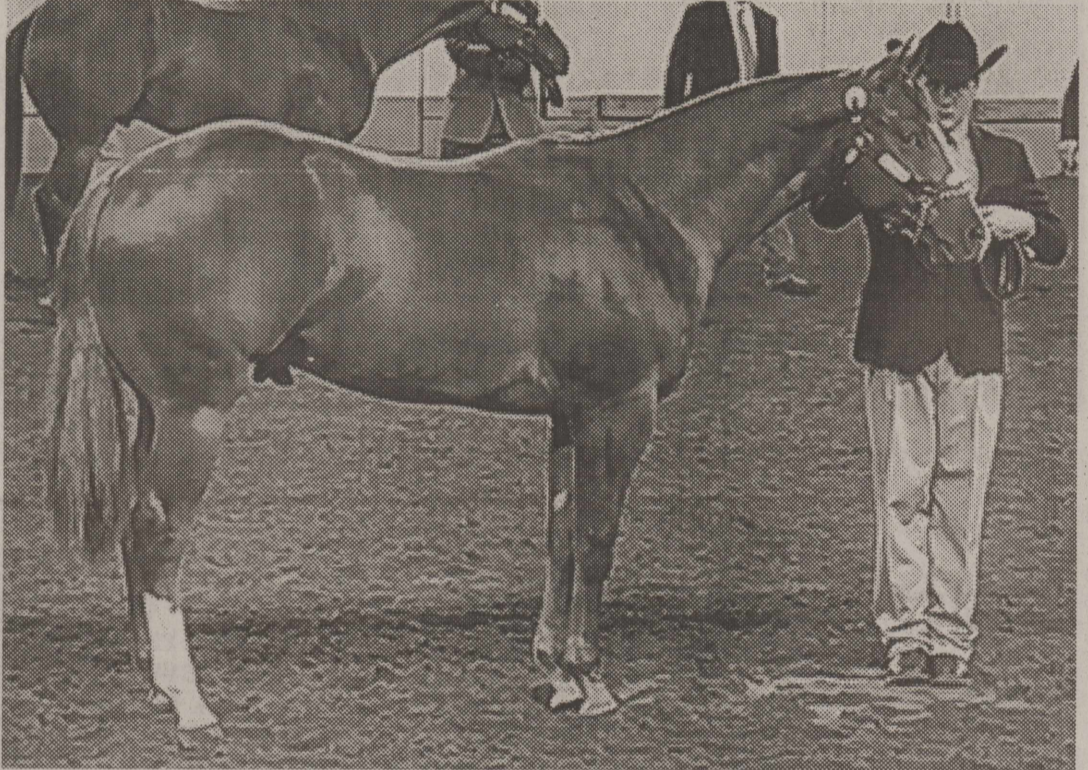
His brother, Andrew Carey, placed 8th in the Yearling Gelding Class at the show with his horse TNR Divine Intention who he calls "Dee".

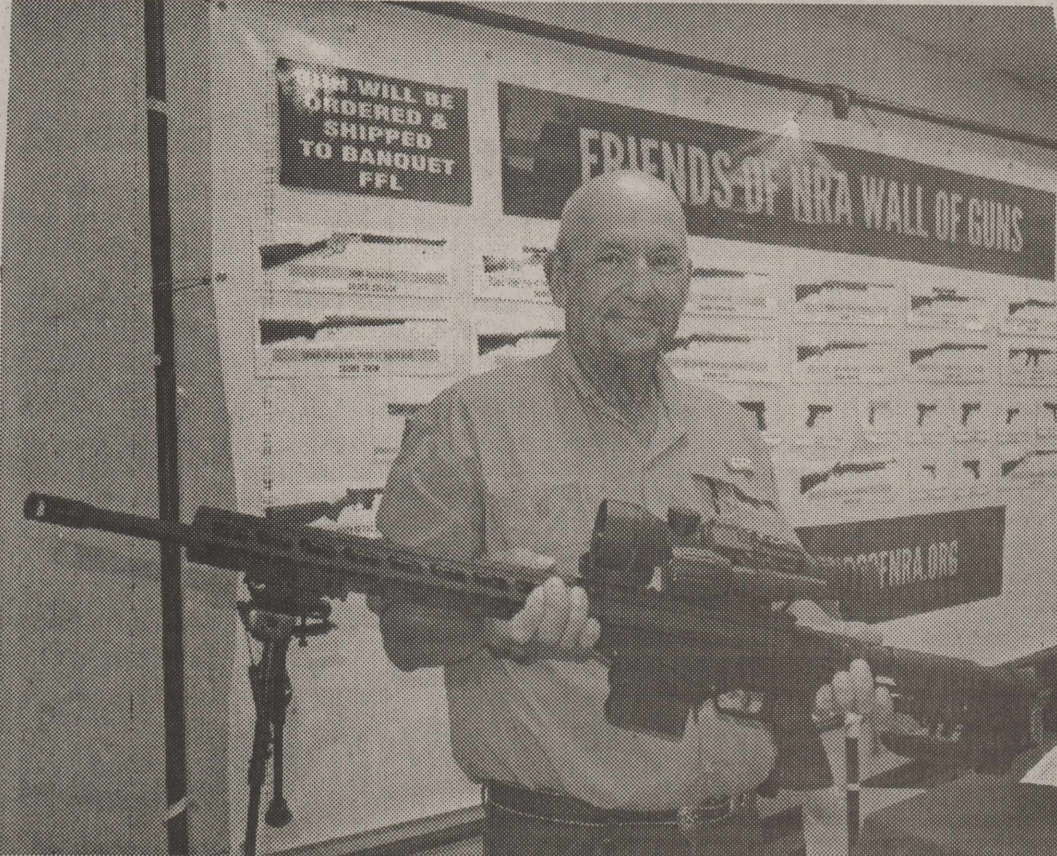

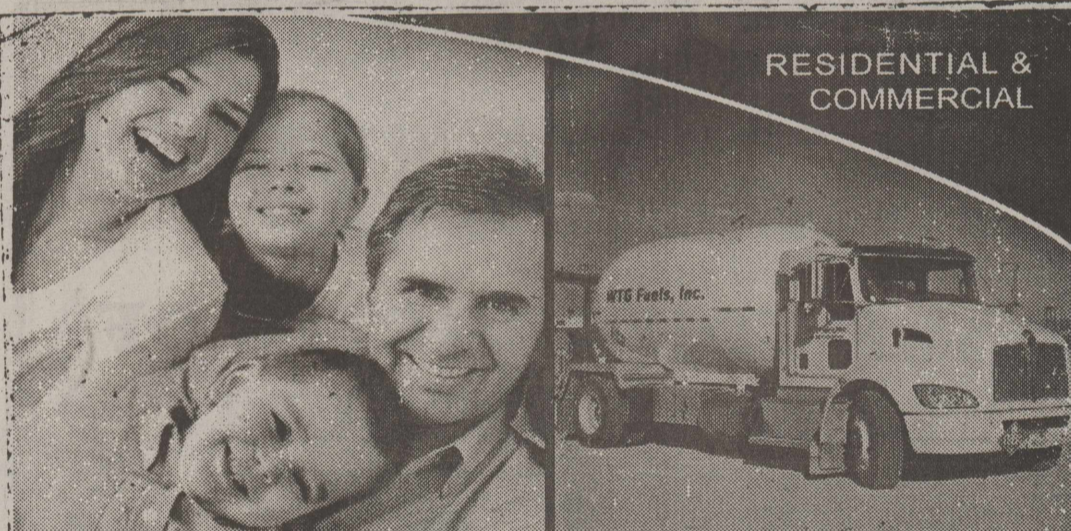

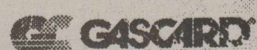

New Driver Course to Combat Distracted Driving Required for drivers 18 and older starting Sept. 1st

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) today announced a new one-hour driving course to educate drivers on the dangers of distracted driving. The Impact Texas Young Drivers (ITYD) course will be required for certain drivers beginning Sept. 1, 2017.

"Driving is one of the most dangerous things we do on a daily basis, and it should command our undivided attention," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "This new component of the department's distracted driving initiative uses research and compelling true stories to highlight the many risks facing drivers. This important program is designed

to provide Texas drivers with critical information to help keep their focus on driving - and to ultimately save lives on Texas roadways."

Starting Sept. 1, all skills examination applicants 18 and older must complete the free ITYD course, and obtain proof of course completion prior to taking the driving skills examination. In addition, drivers 18 to 24 must complete the 6-hour adult driver education course prior to the skills examination.

ITYD is the second course* offered through the Impact Texas Driver (ITD) program, which was developed by DPS in 2015 to help save lives through awareness and education

related to distracted driving. The first course launched under the ITD program was Impact Texas Teen Drivers, which drivers ages 16 and 17 are required to complete. (For additional information on ITD and ITYD, you can also visit <http://www.dps.texas.gov/DriverLicense/ITD.htm>.)

Calling 811 Reduces Risk of Damaged Utility Lines by 99 Percent

Did you know that, before you dig, it is required by law to call 811 to have all buried utility lines located and marked? Atmos Energy wants to thank homeowners and excavators alike for observing the law and keeping our communities safe by always calling 811 before digging.

State sales tax revenue totaled \$2.6 billion in July

(AUSTIN) - Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said today that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.56 billion in July, 7.9 percent more than in July 2016.

"Sales tax receipts from all major economic sectors were up compared to last year," Hegar said. "The most notable increases were from oil- and gas-related industries, as spending on well development continues to rebound. Despite the recent uptick, sales tax revenue remains in line with recent estimates from my office."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in July 2017 is up 7.3 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue

is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 56 percent of all tax collections. Motor vehicle sales and rental taxes, motor fuel taxes and oil and natural gas production taxes also are large revenue sources for the state.

In July 2017, Texas collected the following revenue from those taxes:

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes - \$384.7 million, down 7.3 percent from July 2016;
- motor fuel taxes - \$308.2 million, up 3.7 percent from July 2016; and
- oil and natural gas production taxes - \$251.5 million, up 24.6 percent from July 2016.



- * 1 can (14-1/2 ounces) diced tomatoes, undrained
- * 1-1/2 cups water
- * 1/4 cup chili sauce
- * 1/4 teaspoon salt
- * 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- * 4 Bacon strips, cooked and crumbled



Directions

1. In a large skillet, cook and crumble beef with green pepper and onion over medium heat until no longer pink, 5-7 minutes; drain.
2. Stir in noodles, tomatoes, water, chili sauce, salt and pepper; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, until noodles are tender, 15-20 minutes, stirring frequently. Top with bacon. Yield: 4 servings.
