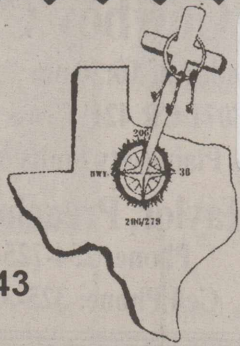

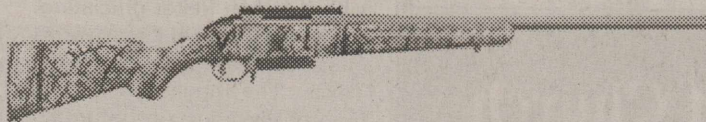
Hunters Feed Set for November 3rd; Buy Your Raffle Tickets Now

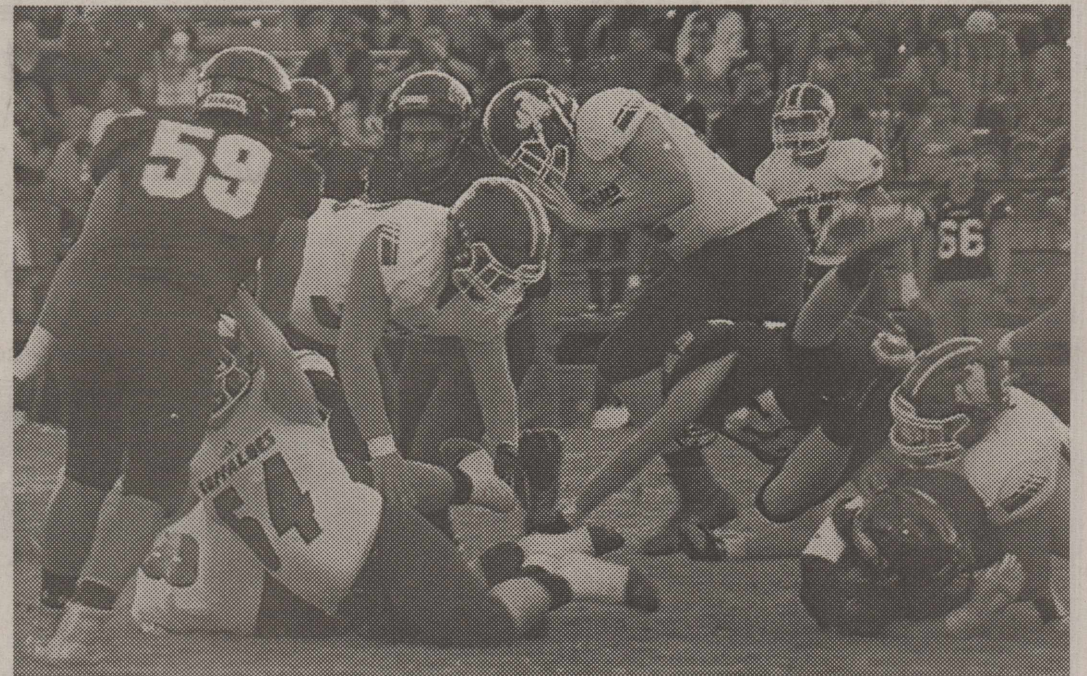
The cost of the class is \$50 per participant and the qualification will take place on the 22nd, weather permitting.

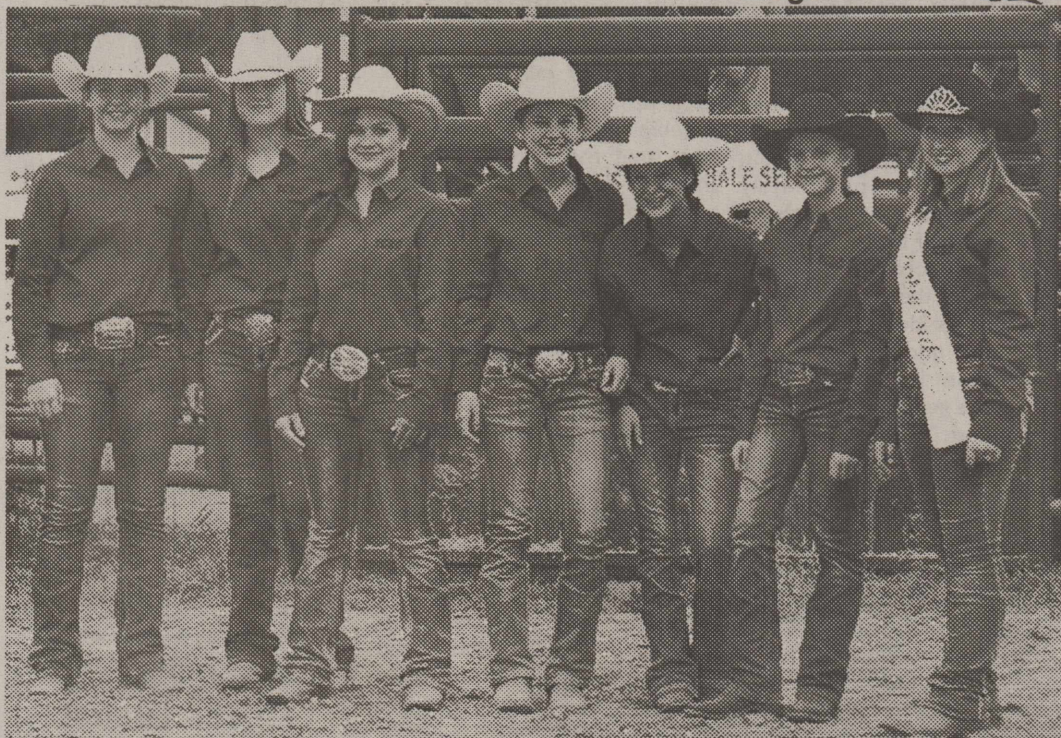

Fourth suspect remains at-large Three of four Cuban nationals arrested in bizarre credit card scam

One Cuban national has been arrested and a second Cuban remains at-large following a bizarre arrest involving an attempted credit card skimmer device placed on a Clyde convenience store late Thursday, September 13th.

Clyde Police Chief Robert Dalton stated the Clyde Police Department received a call from the Thrifty's Food Mart on Cherry Lane and North Access Road of I-20 around 10:00 p.m. Thursday of a couple of suspects accessing one of the gasoline pump dispensers without permission.

Chief Dalton said one officer immediately responded to the call and came into contact with two male subjects had exited their vehicle and attempted to put a credit card skimmer device on one of the gas pump dispensers. When a second officer arrived on the scene, both suspects fled on foot east toward the Whataburger restaurant location. Chief Dalton said that while pursuing the suspects, they were unsuccessful in finding both suspects.

Chief Dalton however said officers impounded their vehicle and while searching the vehicle,

they discovered several credit card readers inside which are used to steal credit card data.

He said the suspects had just finished installing two of the devices onto one of the gas pump dispensers when they were observed by a Thrifty's employee, who immediately called police. "I commend the Thrifty's employee for being observant and immediately notifying authorities something was off," Chief Dalton said.

The police chief said during the search of the vehicle, one of the suspect's identification card was found and through other information in the vehicle's search, the second suspect was determined.

Chief Dalton said on Friday morning, September 14th, the Clyde Police Department was notified of a one-vehicle accident on FM 604 south of Clyde. These two subjects were interviewed and released.

Chief Dalton said a couple of hours after the accident was reported, a witness near the accident scene reported two more subjects were seen near the crash site.

Officers were able to locate one of the suspects, who was

wanted for the attempted credit card skimmer operation at Thrifty's the previous night.

Chief Dalton said he believes the two suspects from the Thrifty's Food Mart attempted theft had contacted two other individuals to come and pick them up since they were without a vehicle.

He said the second suspect involved in the Thrifty's theft was not found and search tracking dogs from the Texas Department of Corrections was notified and attempted to locate the second suspect, but after several hours, the search was called off.

Chief Dalton said the Department of Public Safety, Callahan County Sheriff's Department, Clyde Police and Texas Border Patrol all assisted with the arrests.

In total, three of the four subjects were arrested and booked into the Callahan County Jail. Chief Dalton said all four suspects were Cuban nationals and all four claimed not to speak English.

He said two of the suspects involved in the vehicle accident on FM 604 were charged with making a false report and

hindering apprehension of a suspect.

One Cuban national was charged with evading arrest, credit card abuse, possession of a credit card reader and making a false report to police officers.

Chief Dalton said the attempted credit card skimmer device was the second attempt to obtain credit card data illegally. He said several years ago, another attempted credit card skimmer was confiscated on another Thrifty's Food Mart gas dispenser.

Chief Dalton said the one remaining at-large suspect is known to authorities and the Border Patrol is assisting in attempting to locate this individual.

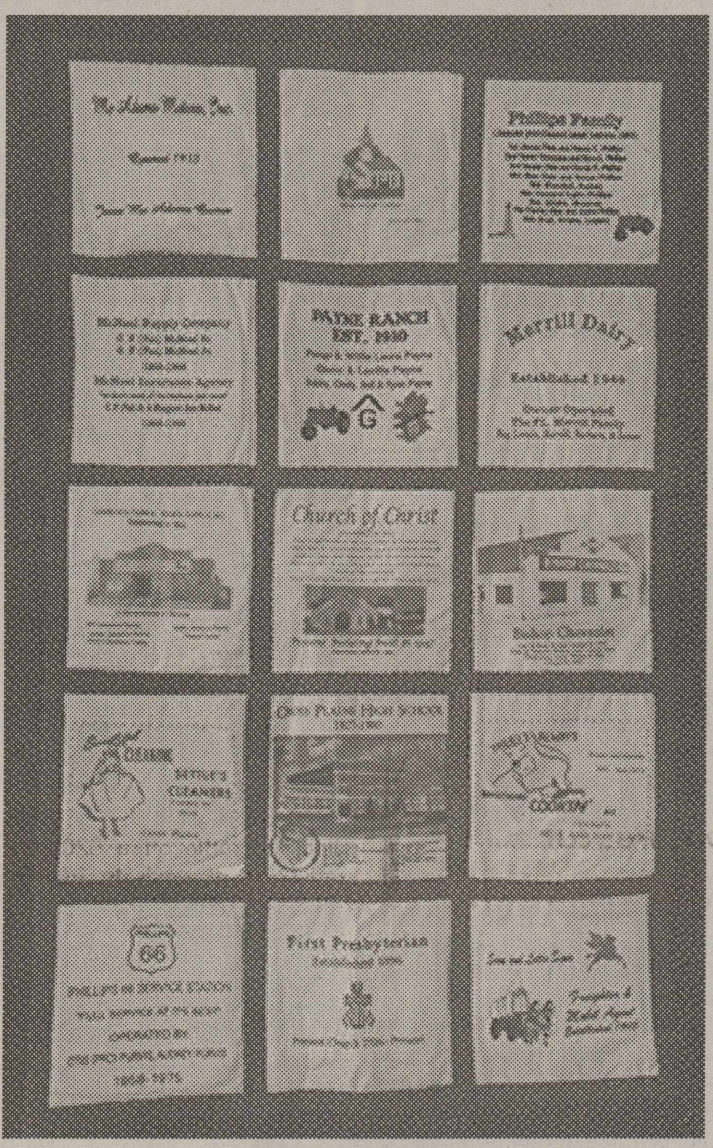
A Live Auction feature cakes from some of the best bakers in the Cross Plains area and many other items.

Buffaloes Shut Out TCLA 40-0

The Cross Plains High School football team posted its second shutout of the season, blanking Texas Leadership Charter Academy 40-0 in a non-district game last Friday in San Angelo to improve its record to 3-0 on the season.

While the Buffaloes' defense was limiting TCLA to just 74 yards total offense and only five first downs, the Cross Plains offense was rolling up 274 yards on the ground and 123 yards more through the air. Quarterback Caleb Hernandez led Cross Plains with 111 yards rushing on 19 carries and also completed 4 of 11 passes for 123 yards and two touchdowns.

Cedar Jones added 86 yards and Ty Tipton 60 yards rushing

for the Buffaloes.

Cross Plains scored on two of its first three possessions to grab a 14-0 first-quarter lead. Theron Allen hauled in a 30-yard touchdown pass from Hernandez and Ty Tipton had a 5-yard TD run. Trent Potter kicked both extra points.

Cason Allen scored on a 2-yard run in the second quarter as the Buffaloes increased its lead to 21-0 at halftime.

In the second half, Cross Plains added touchdown runs of two yards each by Jones and Tipton, and, Caleb Hernandez threw a 38-yard TD pass to Sean Hernandez.

Jevon Tillery and Sterling Switzer intercepted passes for

the Cross Plains defense, and Jacob Collier recovered a fumble.

Cross Plains will go on the road again Friday for a 7:30 p.m. non-district game at Christoval.

GOOD DOG!

I sat next to a stranger at a sportsmen's club luncheon last week. I asked my tablemate if he was a hunter. He readily admitted he was, but then qualified it.

"I'm not a deer hunter," he said. "I prefer squirrel hunting or maybe quail hunting. I grew up in Arkansas and prefer sports where I can move around and hunt with my dog, instead of just sitting in a blind waiting for a feeder to go off."

I understood. Squirrel hunting was my first gun-sport adventure. I had several fox terriers as a kid - great squirrel dogs. I enjoy sitting in a blind on a frosty morning and watching the darkness dissolve into dimness, and ultimately take on a little color as the first rays of the sunrise begin forming in the east. But, walking in the woods or hills with a dog brings out the best in hunting and the almost spiritual nature of man-dog bonding.

Many dog breeds are natural hunters. One son acquired a black Lab pup and brought it to meet me. Wild little critter! But adorable. Danny also showed me his new .22 rifle. I set a can on a fence post to test the gun. A lucky shot knocked it off. The puppy, who had never heard gunfire, dashed out, picked up the can, returned to my son, dropping it at his feet. To Labrador retrievers, fetching a downed bird is a natural instinct; it usually doesn't have to be taught.

Other breeds with "retriever" as a last name are similar- like Golden Retrievers, Chesapeake Bays, and others. Boykin spaniels are eager retrievers, too.

Actually, even poodles can be retrievers, if properly trained. They were used as retrievers in Europe before they came to America and entered a fallen life as purse dogs. When I lived in South Texas, a friend occasionally brought his poodle to retrieve doves for us. He caught a lot of ridicule but enjoyed the surprised comments when the first bird fell and was quickly returned to him.

Quail and pheasant hunters swear by their dogs. Watching

a pointer work is almost art. Trailing and tracking dogs are unique species. Little Roy Hinder ranches south of Jouranton and has raised highly successful deer-trailing dogs. No matter the breed or the quarry, hunting with a dog adds an indescribable element to hunting. The late Gene Hill said it best in his writing.

"Nobody can fully understand the meaning of love unless he's owned a dog. ... I can't think of

anything that brings me closer to tears than when my old dog - completely exhausted from a full and hard day in the field - limps away from her nice spot in front of the fire and comes over to where I'm sitting and puts her head in my lap, a paw on my knee and closes her eyes and goes back to sleep. I don't know what I've done to deserve that kind of friend."

I - tearfully, today - agree. JJ

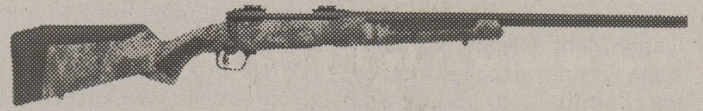

Sheriff's Corner

Friday, September the 4th at about 6:00 a.m. I was at the Shady Oaks Golf Course eating breakfast when Callahan County Sheriff's Department Dispatcher/Jailer Aleta Tennison called me on my county cell phone and told me that there was a one-vehicle rollover on FM 604 and County Road 269 and DPS Trooper Lance Parker was also notified. When I arrived at the scene Trooper Parker, Eula Fire Department and Citizen EMS were already on scene. Lance was trying to talk to the two occupants of the vehicle; but, they could only speak Spanish. Lance worked the accident, B&W Wrecking picked up the wrecked vehicle, and there were no injuries. Lance gave the two occupants of the rollover a ride to Whataburger in Clyde; but, they were later taken to jail.

When the rollover occurred a large fuel tank was dislodged from the 4-door pickup and Don Adkins of B&W Wrecking was going back after it after leaving the wrecked pickup in his wrecking yard. While he was loading the gas tank he noticed two men that had been hiding in the grass. He immediately called Callahan County Dispatch and dispatch immediately notified Lance and me. DPS Trooper Lance Parker got to the scene first grabbed one suspect before he could get across the fence. The other suspect crossed the barb wire fence and kept on running. Don Adkins of B&W Wrecking had crossed the fence and was running after him. I got across the fence and right behind me was Clyde Police Chief Robert Dalton. This young fugitive was desperate to get away from us and he did. He ran right through the cactus and youth was in his favor. I went back to check on Trooper Lance Parker. He had his man handcuffed.

More help arrived including the Border Patrol, landowners in the area were notified, and more DPS Officers arrived at the scene. The Department of Corrections, Robertson Unit, was called and asked to bring out their tracking dogs.

While this man hunt was in progress it was discovered that these subjects were of interest to the Clyde Police Department for allegedly trying to put a skimming device on the gas pumps of a busy gas station and convenience store in Clyde the night before. This device, had they been successful, would have allowed customers credit card numbers to be scanned and stolen and later illegally used. I was told that a clerk in the store saw them acting suspicious at the gas pump and called the Clyde Police Department. The suspects managed to evade Clyde PD but left some of their skimming equipment behind and it is believed that somehow, later that night, they ended up on FM 604 at County Road 269 where FM 604 makes an almost 90 degree curve. They lost control of their vehicle on this curve and rolled it. It is believed that there was 4 suspects involved and three of them were booked into the Callahan County Jail. The prison dogs were unsuccessful in finding the fourth subject; but, enough information has been learned about him that he will be found later.

There were DPS Troopers, Sheriff's Department, Border Patrol, Clyde Police, and Corrections Officers on the scene and some couldn't leave. Chief Deputy Rick Jowers iced down several cases of bottled water and brought it to the scene as it was getting hot. I felt it my duty to find something to eat for the officers on the scene who couldn't leave and I remembered that the First Financial Bank of Clyde was having First Responder

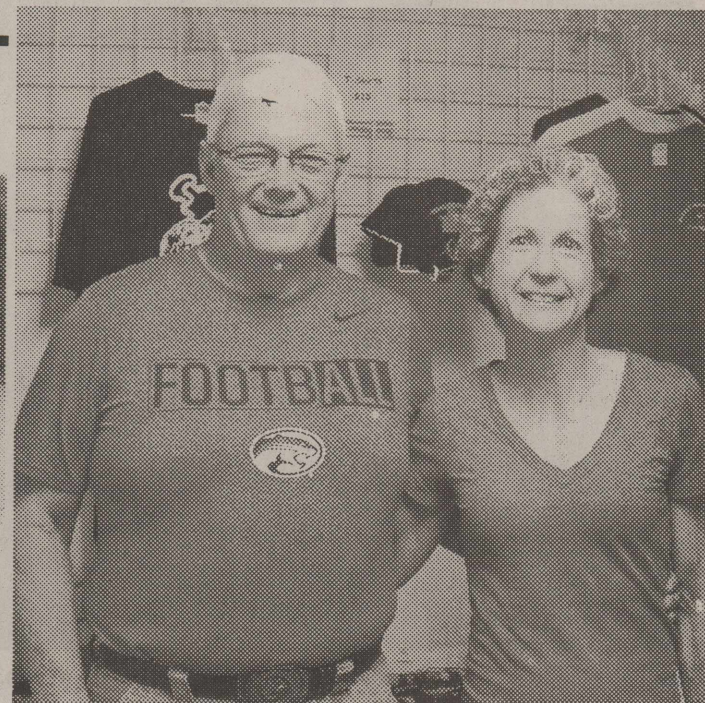
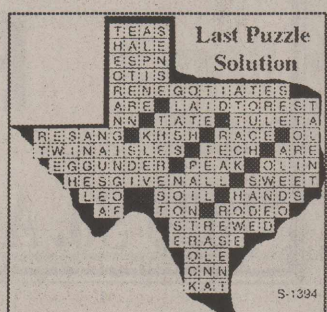

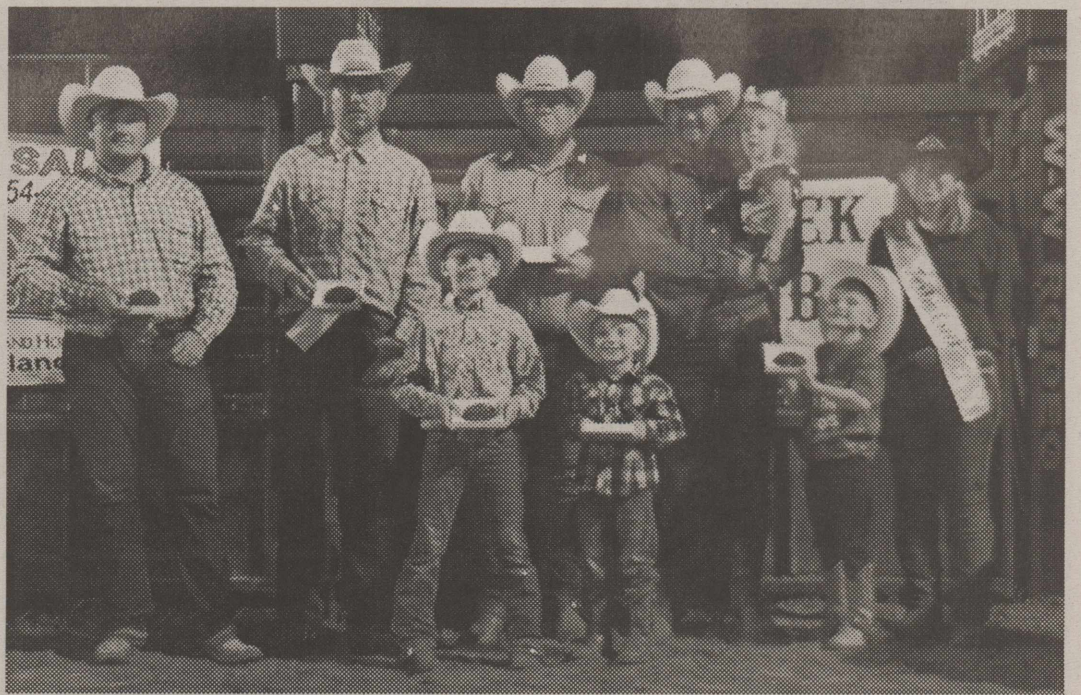
The Shetland Pony Broncs showed everyone that big things come in small packages. Nine riders, three from Cross Plains, climbed on board and

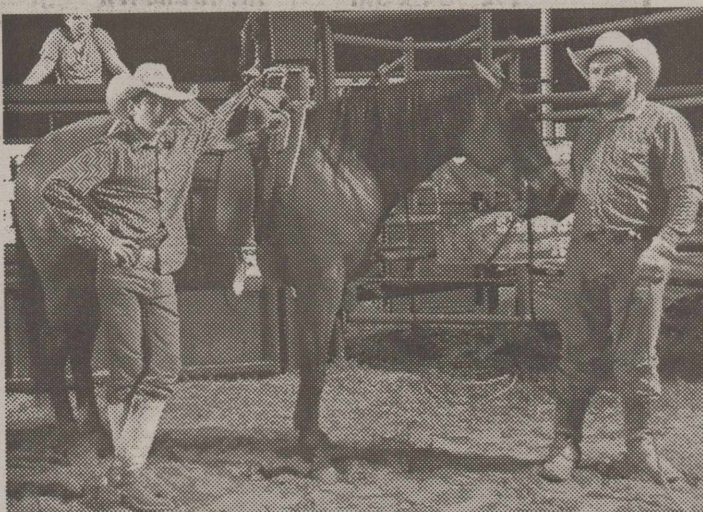

Cross Plains' 2018 retail sales up 16% from 2017

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2018 are just over sixteen percent higher than 2017, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office. Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, September 12th. Cross Plains' 2018 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$195,219.26, which is 16.25 percent higher than the \$167,919.61 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2017.

The payment to the city for September 2018 was \$21,720.77, which is 23.96 percent ahead of the payment of \$17,518.89 in September 2017.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, September 12th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$738.8 million in local sales tax allocations for September, 10.5 percent more than in September 2017. These allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly.

Hegar reported \$475.6 million allocated to Texas cities in September 2018, which is 9.0 percent higher than September 2017, and 8.0 percent higher year-to-date.

He reported \$47.3 million in September 2018 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 17.8 percent compared to September 2017 and higher by 14.5 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$162.5 million in September 2018 sales tax allocations, which is 10.4 percent higher than September 2017 and higher by 6.9 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$53.4 million in September 2018 allocations, which is 20.3 percent higher than September 2017 and higher by 18.3 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$738.8 million in September 2018, which is 10.5 percent higher than September 2017 and higher by 8.8 percent year-to-date.

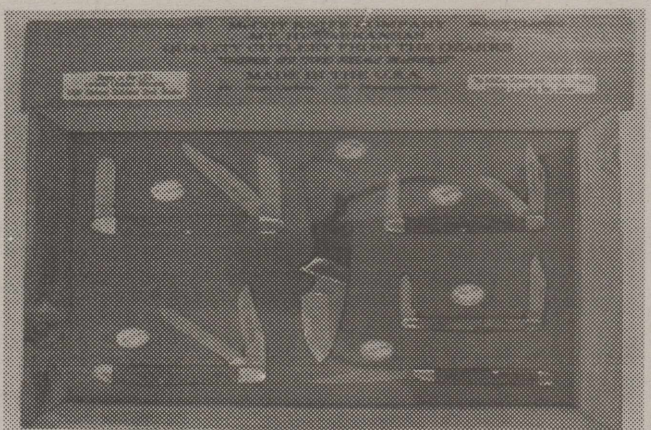
There is no charge for the musical program. The music begins at 5:30 p.m. The musicians always have a good show planned for your enjoyment.

The Texas History Minute

Part II of Texas General Walton Walker

Walton Walker distinguished general who defended the nation in some of its most pressing battles. The native Texan commanded troops during the heated battles of World War II and in the chaos of the Korean War. He liberated countless peoples in the defense of democracy, and his brave stands later prevented the collapse of an ally.

By 1942, Walker, already a general, had been a veteran of World War I and was serving with Gen. George S. Patton training American troops in the Mojave Desert. By February 1944, he was sent to Scotland to prepare his troops for the upcoming invasion of Normandy. Patton assigned Walker's XX Corps to be part of his Third Army assault deep into Nazi-occupied France. A last-minute change put him at Utah Beach during the D-Day invasion on June 6. The commander of the XIX Armored Corps had fallen ill, and Walker was given temporary command. He led his troops on their successful invasion on the beaches of northern France, advancing steadily forward under heavy fire. As he would be throughout the war, Walker was often close to the fighting. He was given a silver star for his actions that day.

Six weeks later, the XX Corps arrived in France, and Walker resumed command. In August, Patton unleashed his aggressive plan to sweep aside Nazi resistance in France, with Walker's men leading the charge. Patton's plan worked perfectly, one that cemented itself into military legend. Walker's XX Corps charged deep into France, retaking hundreds of square miles for the Allies and taking thousands of prisoners in a matter of weeks. They became known as the "Ghost Corps" because the Nazis never knew where they were hitting next, and wartime press restrictions never explicitly identified them in real time. German defenses collapsed in response to the relentless attacks. Patton personally awarded Walker the Distinguished Service Cross for

his leadership under fire.

By February 1945, Walker's forces were in Germany where they assisted in the liberation of the Buchenwald concentration camp. More than 21,000 people were held as slave labor for the Nazis as the Nazis systematically exterminated anyone they deemed undesirable because of their racial or religious heritage. Walker continued to move forward, linking up with Soviet troops in Austria as the Nazis surrendered.

Patton and Walker were very complimentary of each other's leadership in the war. Patton wrote Walker in August 1945, "You pulled a tremendous load in whatever success the Third Army had."

He was next assigned to the Far East, commanding the Eighth Army. He spent months re-training the post-war set of recruits. In June 1950, they faced their greatest test yet when North Korea launched a surprise attack on South Korea. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, commanding American troops in the region, ordered Walker to South Korea to mount a defense while he remained behind in Japan.

Though the United Nations condemned North Korean actions and dozens of nations would support the Allies, Walker's Eighth Army and the disintegrating South Korean forces were essentially on their own in the face of a confusing attack. Outmanned and outgunned, Walker quickly organized a mobile defense to keep the North Koreans off-balance and settled into a defensive position in the southeast by July. Rather than let South Korea fall, Walker gave the command "stand or die" and dug in to rebuild their forces and eventually hit back. The Pusan Perimeter, as it was called, held firm under Walker's leadership despite constant attacks. Because of his actions, South Korea did not fall.

In the meantime, MacArthur planned his daring counteroffensive behind North Korean lines.

MacArthur's September landing at Inchon and quick liberation of the South Korean capital at Seoul stunned North Korean forces. Walker, carefully coordinating with MacArthur punched out of the Pusan Perimeter and raced to meet MacArthur's forces further north. North Korean forces fell back in a panic.

Within two months, Allied forces were preparing to retake all of North Korea. Walker quietly voiced his concerns about China invading North Korea as the Allies approached their border. MacArthur dismissed his concerns. By November, China had invaded, overwhelming the Eighth Army. He steadily pulled back, destroying the industrial infrastructure of North Korea in the process.

The Eighth Army was preparing to regroup when disaster struck. He was riding in a jeep to inspect the front lines and personally give commendations to his troops when he was killed in a head-on collision. He died two days before Christmas 1950 at the age of 61, at a time when the army still needed his leadership.

Though Walker is often overshadowed by other figures of World War II and the Korean War, he has many admirers around the globe. In 1971, a group of Korean War veterans established the General Walton Walker Memorial Foundation to honor his memory. The foundation offers scholarships to descendants of Korean War veterans. In 1987, the South Korean government unveiled a memorial to Walker in Seoul. In May, he was inducted into the Ft. Leavenworth Hall of Fame, joining such generals as MacArthur, Omar Bradley, Dwight Eisenhower, and George Marshall. Today, he is perhaps most well-known to commuters in the Dallas area as the namesake for Walton Walker Boulevard, a portion of Loop 12.

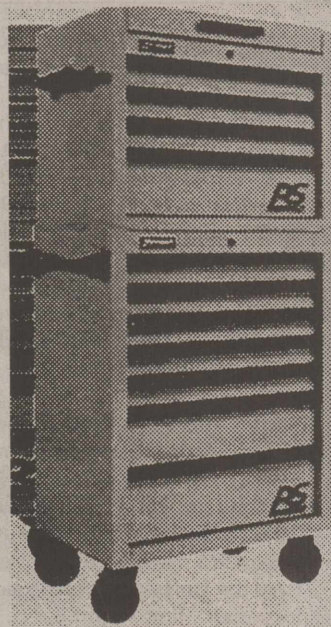

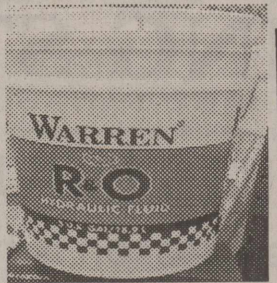

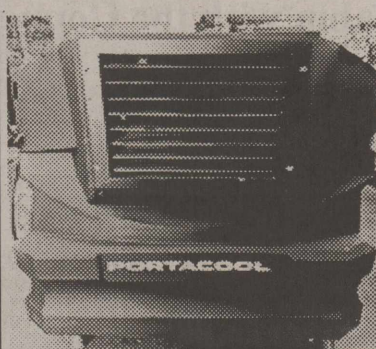

Top Fifteen Football Games in Cross Plains

Being in the middle of football season, it feels appropriate to do another Top Ten List. This time the list will rank the best football games the Buffaloes have played.

The list has been expanded to fifteen because the games on the list have all been important in telling the history of Cross Plains Football.

The games on this list have been ranked according to the following, importance of the game, memorable moments, and the historic of nature of the game being played.

#15 "Ending the Streak"

Coming into the 2008 season, Cross Plains had hit rock bottom. The Buffaloes had lost 26 consecutive games with their last win coming in 2005 over the Eden Bulldogs. It was a dark time to be a Buffalo fan especially when the team had completed two consecutive 0-10 seasons and hadn't won more than one game since 2003. In the middle of one of the worst periods in Cross Plains History, the future wasn't too bright.

To open the 2008 season, the Buffaloes were playing the Ponder Lions. Ponder, a powerhouse basketball school located near the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, was starting its very first football season playing lower level and JV football teams. Unfortunately, no one was giving the Buffaloes a chance to win. However, that night they would prove everyone wrong.

The game was a nail biter as both teams took defensive stands. On the Lions final drive of the game, Ponder would throw a hail-mary but to no avail leading to the Buffaloes first win since 2005. Though this wasn't the end of the dark period, this game showed there was light at the end of the tunnel.

#14 "Beating the Bears Part One"

Cross Plains and Baird is one of the fiercest rivalries not only in the county but in the entire Big Country area. Playing a total of 81 times, it's no wonder these two teams hate each other. But the recent history has told a different story.

From 1970 to 2005 Bears to beat the Buffaloes 33 out of 34 times with their lone loss coming in 1987. From blowouts to close games, Baird seemed to have the Buffs' seeded number in every game.

Coming off of a 33-6 win in 2008, the winning streak was looking to continue. But 2009 signaled the end of that era.

Both teams were sitting at 3-6 at the end of season and were looking to end the season on a high note. The two also had missed the playoffs that year too so the final game was edged on beating their hated rivals.

In their biggest offensive output of the season, the Buffaloes dominated the Bears in route to a 45-28 victory, their first since 1987. It also clinched a 4-6 season, their best since 2003. With the victory, the Buffs showed they were not going to be bullied by the Bears any longer.

#13 "Beating the Bears Part Two"

Prior to 1987, the Bears had dominated the Buffaloes including a 42-19 win over Cross Plains the previous year. The last victory the Buffs had over Baird was in 1968 when Cross Plains hammered the Bears in a 43-6 victory.

Coming into the game the Buffaloes were 2-0 while the Bears were 1-1. With this game being the final one before district, each team needed a win to continue their momentum.

The Bears would strike first on a 25yd pass but the Buffs would respond by scoring on a 34 yd touchdown run to tie the game 7-7. During the second quarter, rivalry between the teams started to escalate.

The highlights of the game were when one of the Baird players was kicked out of the game for unacceptable behavior as was the entire Baird football team who were penalized for un-sportsman like conduct. Cross Plains would then score 21 unanswered points to secure a 28-6 victory, their first win over Baird since 1968.

The Buffaloes win would help them carry their momentum into district to secure their first winning season since 1972. Even though the Buffaloes wouldn't beat Baird again till 2009, Cross Plains showed the Bears that the rivalry between the two wasn't as one sided as people thought.

#12 "The Monsoon Shutout"

The rivalry between Cross Plains and Gorman had reached a fever pitch when 2012 rolled around. Playing in their 43rd meeting between the two, the Buffaloes were looking for their first win over the Panthers since 2001. Gorman

recently defeat the Buffs in 28-20 victory in route to a district championship. After the 2011 season, the Buffaloes were chomping at the bit to get another shot at the Panthers but the UIL threw a wrinkle into their plan.

Roped into a district with Albany, Baird, Hamlin, Ranger Roby, and Roscoe, the first game of the new district was a playoff elimination game between the two rivals that had the entire Big Country watching.

What everyone counted on was a hard-hitting football game, but not everyone counted on the weather. A system of rain storms hit that Friday, and poured non-stop through-out the day. By kickoff time the rain was still pouring leaving the Buffaloes and the Panthers to play in a monsoon.

On the rain-soaked field, the Buffaloes would vanquish their rivals from Eastland County in a stunning shutout 26-0 game that stunned the entire Big Country. With the victory, the Buff would roll through the season and clinch their first winning season since 2001. It also signaled the days of being a perennial loser were over.

#11 "The Comeback"

The 14th meeting of the "Purple Bowl" was the exact opposite of last year's meeting between the Cross Plains and Roscoe. The Buffaloes prevail in a hard-hitting victory over the Plowboys 27-12 for their first victory over Roscoe since 1991. The fans waiting for another defensive slugfest would be disappointed this time around.

After the Plowboys scored on their first drive, the Buffs would respond by throwing a 56-yard touchdown pass to tie the at 7-7. In the second quarter, Roscoe exploded scoring four touchdowns in the process to lead 31-13 at halftime.

At halftime, most of the fans felt Roscoe had won the game and some left the stadium. They would be surprised by the time the second half rolled around.

In an amazing comeback, the Buffaloes would score 42 unanswered points to stun the Plowboys in an 56-31 victory. On the result of big plays and game changing turnovers, the Buffaloes provided one of the greatest comebacks in school history that shocked the Big Country.

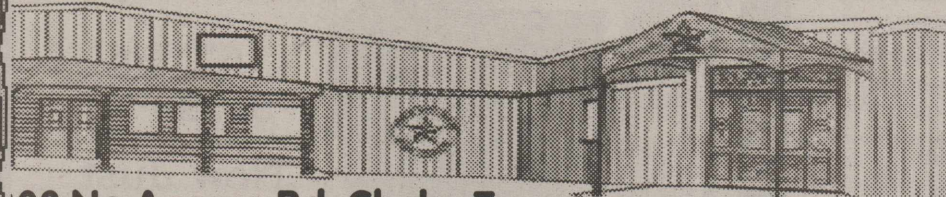
