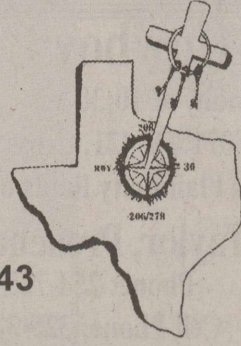

Early voting will take place at the Callahan County Courthouse Basement located at 100 West 4th Street in Baird, the Clyde Justice of the Peace Office located at 208 Oak Street in Clyde and the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office located at 424 South Main Street in Cross Plains.

Early voting hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. beginning Monday, October 22nd through Friday,

November 2nd. Early voting extended hours will be from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. on Tuesdays.

On Election Day Tuesday, November 6th the voting locations include at 100 West 4th Street in Baird, the Clyde Justice of the Peace Office located at 208 Oak Street in Clyde and the Cross Plains Community Center located at 108 Beech Street in Cross Plains, and the Eula School located at 60450 FM 603 in Eula.

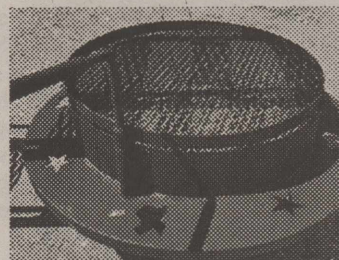

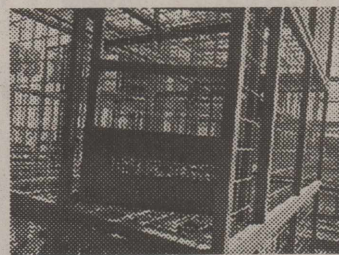

# Buffaloes Go To the Air to Beat Haskell 19-14

A 52-yard pass from Sean Hernandez to Caleb Hernandez with 18 seconds left in the third quarter provided Cross Plains with the winning score as the Buffaloes edged Haskell 19-14 in the District 7-2A Division II football opener in Haskell.

The win improved Cross Plains' record to 5-1 overall and 1-0 in district play, while Haskell fell to 1-4 and 0-1.

The two teams were tied 7-7 at halftime, but Cross Plains went in front 13-7 on the opening possession of the third quarter on a 1-yard sneak by Sean Hernandez.

Haskell regained the lead 14-13 with 58 seconds to go in the third quarter on a 23-yard run by Aaron Skiles. It took Cross Plains only 40 seconds to respond, however, going 71 yards in just three plays. Caleb Hernandez's 52-yard touchdown reception put the Buffaloes back in front.

Cross Plains' defense, which turned in another stellar performance, held off the Indians in the fourth quarter. Theron Allen's interception with 4:41 remaining ended Haskell's final scoring opportunity. Cross Plains was able to run the clock down before having to punt with just seven seconds left.

That was just the second game this year in which the Cross Plains defense has allowed more than seven

points.

Although Haskell outgained the Buffaloes 173-123 on the ground, Cross Plains had 191 yards passing compared to just 44 yards in the air for Haskell. Sean Hernandez completed 15 of 20 passes for 191 yards for Cross Plains. Caleb Hernandez, who has been playing quarterback, moved to wide receiver and caught five passes for 79 yards. Allen had six receptions for 87 yards.

The Hernandez-to-Hernandez connection also produced the Buffaloes' first score on a 6-yard scoring strike in the second quarter. Sterling Switzer was Cross Plains' leading rusher with 75 yards on 15 carries.

The Buffaloes don't have a game Friday, but its junior varsity will play at Roby on Thursday. Roby elected last summer to not play a district schedule because of the low numbers in its football program.

Callahan Divide Soil & Water Conservation District is now taking orders for evergreen and hardwood seedlings. Landowners are encouraged to purchase these one-year-old seedlings for windbreak plantings before preferred stock is sold out.

Each year thousands of regionally adapted seedlings are grown from seed by West Texas Nursery-Texas A&M Forest Service in Idalou. The agency's primary objective is to produce and sell quality seedlings at an affordable price for landowners, allowing them to plant large quantities of trees for windbreaks.

You may be asking yourself, "What is a windbreak"? A windbreak consists of trees and shrubs systematically planted adjacent to fields, homesteads, or feedlots as a barrier to reduce erosion, and increase land value and aesthetics. They are established where production ends and homesteads begin and they also act as protection for a residence, which increases the heating and cooling efficiency of a homestead.

Farmstead windbreaks block the hot, dry winds of summer and the cold gusts of winter. Multiple row windbreaks add natural beauty, privacy and value to a homestead and act as a sound barrier to highway or farm road traffic, as well as protect the soil, increase land value and enhance crop yields.

Livestock windbreaks are very beneficial during the winter and summer months. Cattle hidden in an "L" or "U" shaped multiple row windbreak are allowed to utilize their energy to continue gaining weight rather than use it to keep warm, as a result, the amount of feed afforded by the producer is reduced. These windbreaks also reduce the risk of mortality during harsh winter months, such as Winter Storm Goliath in 2015. They also provide shade during the hot summer months and help keep the dust down when used around feedlots.

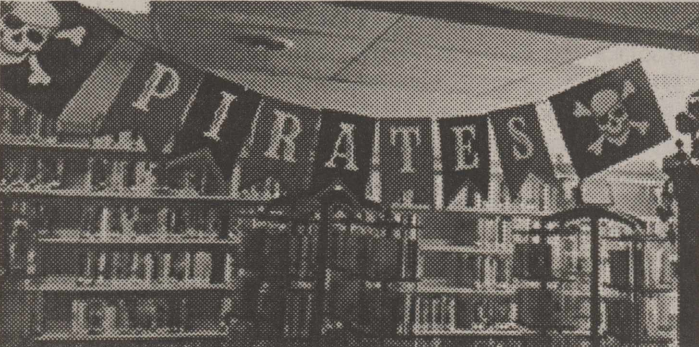
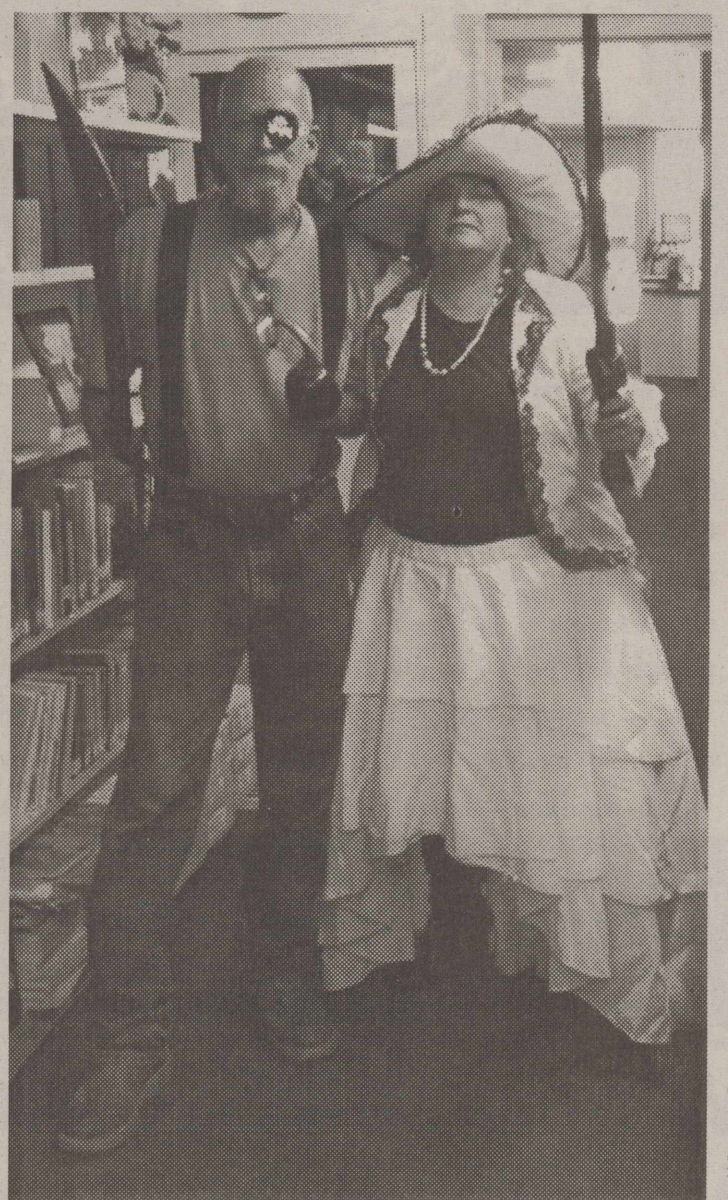
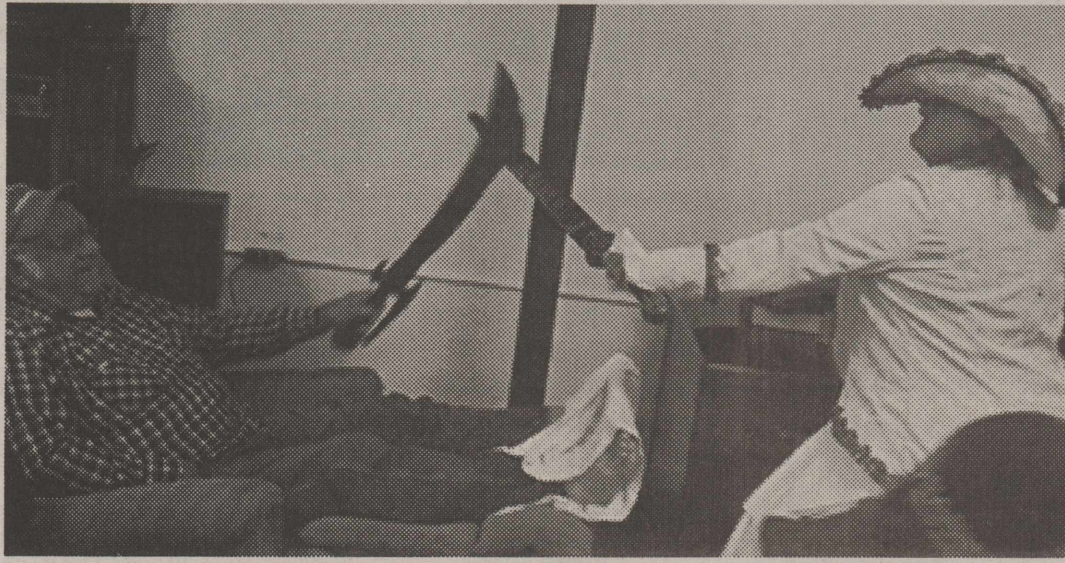
September 19th was National Talk like a Pirate Day and the Cross Plains Public Library participated and had so much fun.

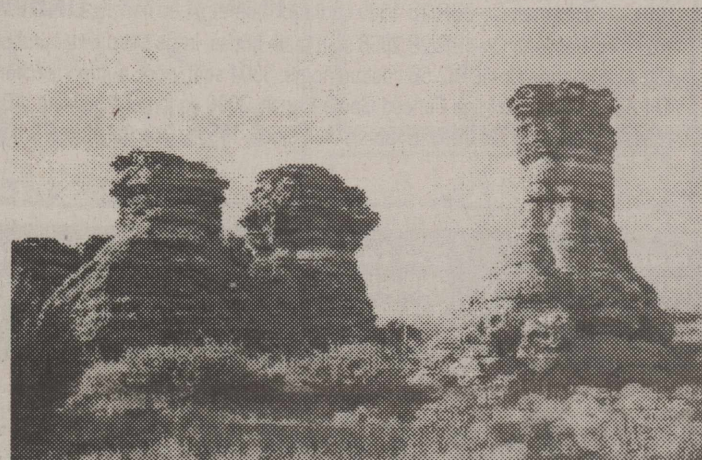
### OFF the BEATEN PATH

Half the fun in outdoor adventure is just getting there. In route to what would be my first successful deer hunt, accompanied by three favorite grad school classmates, we motored up Highway 71 in my '55 Chevy, near Packsaddle Mountain. We'd seen a number of deer - mostly does. Bruce Monroe let out a yell, "Did you see that buck? He was tremendous!"

Not fully understanding the rules of the road to a deer hunt, I hit the brakes, made a U-turn and went back to see the buck that sounded like the model for the Hartford Insurance deer. We got to where we thought Monroe had seen the buck and stopped. There he was. A nice Hill Country eight-pointer, but nothing to drive around the courthouse with in the bed of your pickup on opening day. Two of the others laughed. Monroe muttered, "Can't even exaggerate a buck's antlers without Jefferson calling your bluff." I was branded.

Another time, stopping for breakfast somewhere south of Telluride, Colorado one morning at dawn, we were the first customers in a small café that had only a screen door. I ate the best waffle of my life and can still taste it.

But one of my favorite memories was on an unpaved shortcut through the Oklahoma Panhandle. We were heading to Colorado and had gone past the few good campsites in the Texas Panhandle. My wife found Black Mesa State Park on the Oklahoma map near the New Mexico line, so we adventured on north of Dalhart. Arriving at the sparsely occupied park after dark, we camped in our van under a large cottonwood tree. They have both tent and RV sites. At daylight, a hatch of white moths erupted right above us, filling the van. We

found them in our gear the next three days. I even fished a while unsuccessfully. No, wait -- the fishing was successful; just the catching wasn't! When we went to the park office that morning to pay, not wanting to backtrack into Texas, we asked the park ranger if there was a shorter route to Colorado.

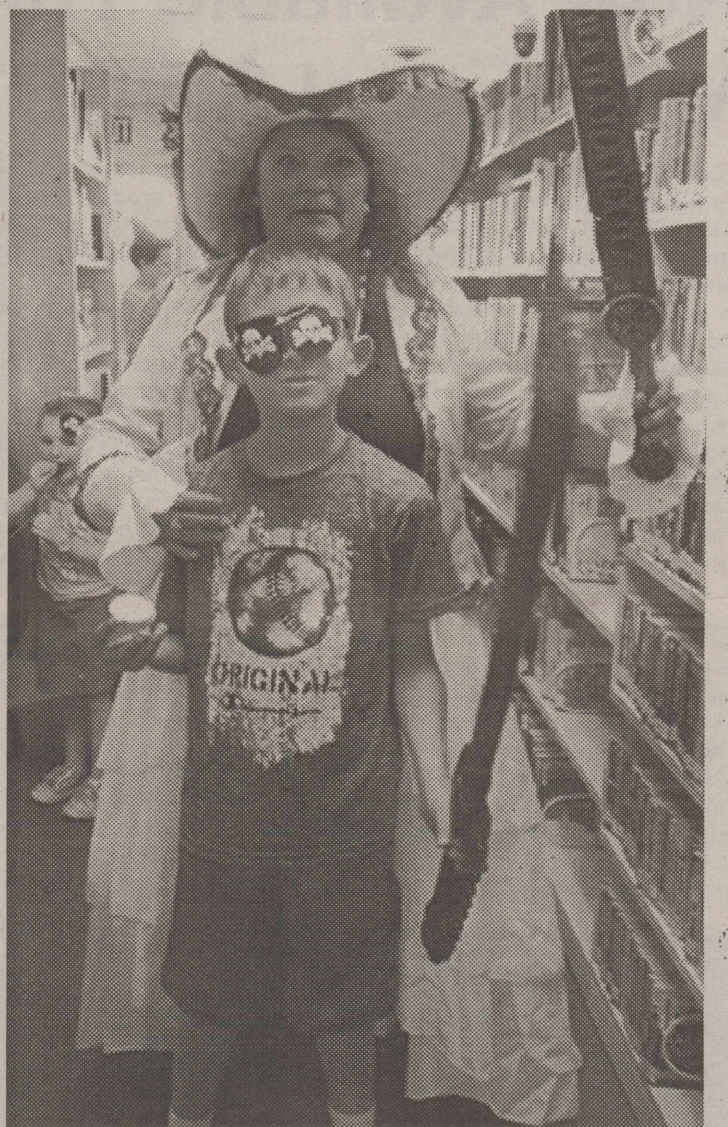
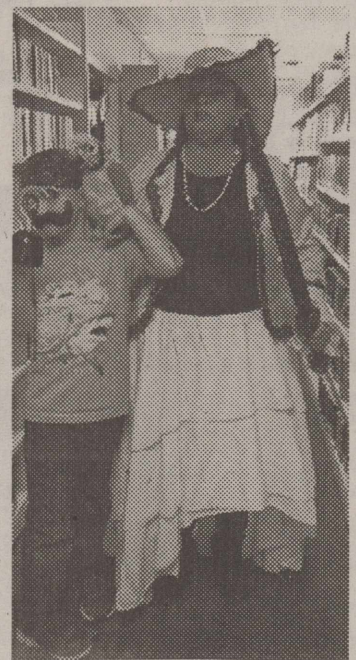
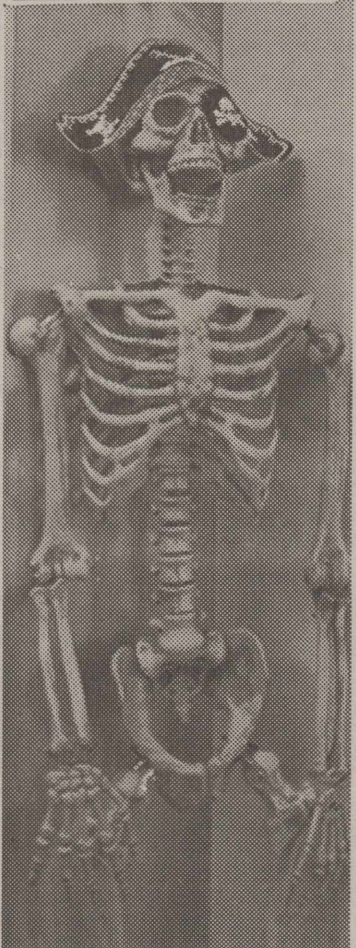
"There is," he said, "but it's a good ways down an unpaved road." Somehow, 30 miles of bad road seemed like a worthy challenge. We drove north to Kenton and headed west on Highway 456 through unfenced ranching country toward New Mexico.

We only met two vehicles; both drivers stared at us. But what a

surprise! We drove through what has to be Oklahoma's answer to Monument Valley, although on a much smaller scale. Stone outcroppings 106 million years-old from the Jurassic period that dinosaurs probably rubbed up against rose upward from the desert floor. Tracks and bones are still there. Shockingly, ruggedly, beautiful. Totally unexpected. A year later, I returned that way to make sure I hadn't just imagined it. I'd never heard of it before, nor since. You have to be going there to see it.

But it is a unique was to get to Colorado.

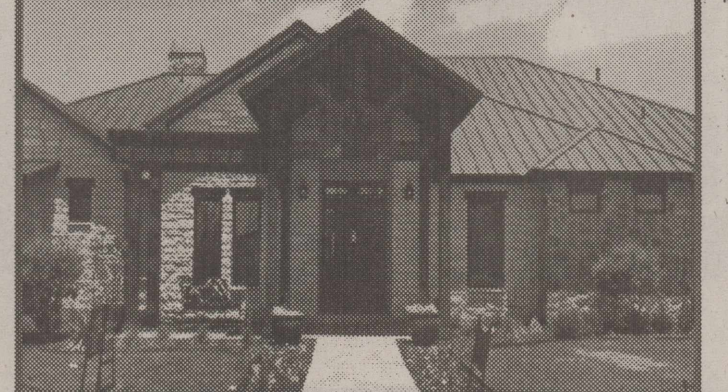

Hope you have the November 10th date on your calendar and can keep it clear all day in order to enjoy the full range of activities at the annual Lord's Acre.

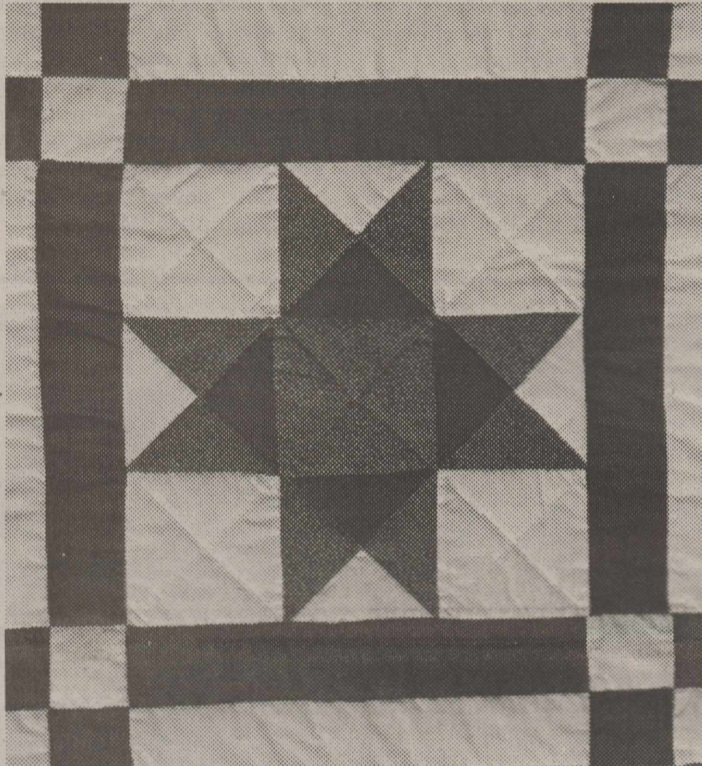

# Cross Plains' 2018 Retail Sales Up 5% from 2017

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2018 are just over five percent higher than 2017, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, October 10th.

Cross Plains' 2018 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$220,217.23, which is 5.32 percent higher than the \$209,139.34 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2017.

The payment to the city for October 2018 was \$25,051.97, which is 39.22 percent below the payment of \$41,219.73 in October 2017.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, October 10th he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$735.9 million in local sales tax allocations for October, 11.4 percent more than in October 2017. These allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

Hegar reported \$474.7 million allocated to Texas cities in October 2018, which is 10.3 percent higher than October 2017, and 8.2 percent higher year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$159.7 million in October 2018 sales tax allocations, which is 10.2 percent higher than October 2017 and higher by 7.2 percent year-to-date.

He reported \$48.3 million in October 2018 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 16.6 percent compared to October 2017 and higher by 14.7 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$53.2 million in October 2018 allocations, which is 22.1 percent higher than October 2017 and higher by 18.7 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$735.9 million in October 2018, which is 11.4 percent higher than October 2017 and higher by 9.1 percent year-to-date.

For details on October sales tax allocations to individual cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts, visit the Comptroller's Monthly Sales Tax Allocation Comparison Summary Reports.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments for this month include:

—The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 2018 started the year 1.92 percent higher than the 2017 payments. The city has received \$264,612.66 in 2018, while the 2017 tax payments to the city totaled \$259,602.86.

Baird's monthly payment for October 2018 was \$27,386.00, which is 18.56 percent lower than the October 2017 payment of \$33,627.25.

—The 2018 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 2.49 percent higher than the payments made to the city in 2017. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$599,975.55 in 2018. The 2017 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$585,385.32.

The City of Clyde's monthly payment for October 2018 was

\$54,055.62, which is 27.45 percent lower than the payment of \$74,509.27 made in October 2017.

—The City of Putnam reported the 2018 payments to the town totaled \$8,329.03, which is higher by 25.02 percent from the 2017 payments to the city in the amount of \$6,661.06.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of October 2018 was \$850.18, which is 82.21 percent higher than the October 2017 payment of \$466.59.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

Clyde businesses collect 2.00%, including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one per-

cent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department).

Cross Plains collects 2.00% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 1.00% is allocated for economic development in the town.

Baird collects 2.00% in local sales tax of which 1.00% is allocated to the city, 0.50% is allocated to the community's economic development corporation and 0.50% of one percent to reduce property taxes.

Putnam collects 1.00% in local sales tax of which all 1.00 percent is allocated to the city.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, the Comptroller said. Some cities use up to an additional one percent of city sales tax to help fund local economic development and to reduce property taxes.

## The Texas History Minute Sponsored by: HANNER CHEVROLET

### Ben Milam and The Texas Revolution

Ben Milam was an average man who traveled the early frontier. But the course of events would place him in the middle of the fight for Texas independence and into legend. Milam's decisive actions made him one of the early heroes of the Texas Revolution.

Benjamin Rush Milam was born in 1788 in Frankfort, then just a tiny village on the Kentucky River in what was not yet Kentucky. His life was defined by the early frontier. He had very little formal education, as almost no schools were available.

As a young man, he was mostly interesting in trade and bartering. Struck by wanderlust, he drifted from one adventure to the next. In 1812, he enlisted in the Kentucky militia and served honorably as a lieutenant in the War of 1812.

Milam made his first, brief foray into Texas in 1818. By the next year, he found himself in New Orleans, caught up in the excitement of a potential raid into Texas to seize it for the United States from Spain. In what became known as the Long Expedition, James Long made Milam a colonel and led his rag-tag army into Spanish Texas. They quickly took Nacogdoches and declared Texas independent of Spain. When the Spanish Army arrived, the Long Expedition fell apart.

Milam and Long attempted to reorganize at Galveston in 1820, but the effort quickly faltered. Milam then went to Veracruz and on to Mexico City. Instead of finding the cities defended by monarchists, he and his party found that the rebels had already taken the cities. He and the dozens of men with him were thrown in prison. An American diplomat later arranged their release.

He returned to Mexico in 1824 in the aftermath of yet another revolution, one that established Mexico as a republic. And with

a new government came a new attitude. All was forgiven, and Milam was made a colonel the Mexican Army as well as a citizen. Times were good for Milam. He soon teamed up with a British immigrant, Gen. Arthur G. Wavell, and started a silver mine in Nuevo Leon, a northern Mexican state adjacent to Texas. In 1825, they also gained empresario grants in Texas - land grants that allowed them to sell or lease lands in order to attract residents to what was still a lightly-populated region.

Events, however, soon turned sour for Milam. The Nuevo Leon mine started to falter, and he and Wavell soon leased out a mine to a British company. In the meantime, Mexican officials grew increasingly concerned about American designs on Texas in light of offers by the United States government to buy Texas and raids such as the Long Expedition. In 1830, the Law of April 6 banned all immigration from the United States into Texas and expressly forbade the introduction of new slaves into the area even though Mexico had officially banned slavery the year before. This imperiled Milam's empresario contract.

Agustin Viesca became governor of Coahuila y Texas in 1835. Ben Milam believed he could work with him to secure new land titles for Texas settlers. On his visit to the new governor, he found a willing audience in his attempt to secure legal protections for their lands. However, Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna had overthrown the elected government. His officials arrested Viesca and Milam both. Milam, however, was able to talk their way out of jail thanks to Viesca's political allies. Milam reached Texas in October and joined George Collinsworth's column as they marched to take Goliad on October 10.

After Goliad, Collinsworth's forces met with other armed

Texans marching toward San Antonio. Gen. Martin Perfecto de Cos held the city for Santa Anna. Mexico had a large armed force occupying the city. It was now December 4. With the weather growing cold, many Texans considered holding up for the winter, building their forces, and preparing for an attack in the spring.

Milam recognized that point was the time to try to consolidate their gains and was determined to lead the charge himself. With the permission of his superiors, he made an impassioned plea and declared to the troops, "Who will go with old Ben Milam into San Antonio?" Three hundred men stepped forward and marched into the lion's den. They attacked at dawn the next morning.

After two days of fighting, Milam's forces were making progress. On the morning of December 7, they were charging steadily forward for the third day. Milam stood at the fore of the battlefield, eyeing the positions of their attackers. A chance shot rang out. He was then struck in the head by the rifle fire and collapsed into the arms of his friends. He died at the scene at the age of 47 just as the Texas Revolution was heating up. Texas forces took the city two days later.

Milam was widely honored in the years after his death. In addition to streets, schools, and parks, a memorial site stands in San Antonio. Residents of the Sabine County community of Red Mound renamed their city after Milam in 1836. The Texas Republic established Milam County in Central Texas in 1837 and is now boasts nearly 25,000 residents.

## The Recipe Corner

### Texas Stew

Prep Time: 15 minutes Cooking Time: 6 Hours

**Ingredients:**

- \* 1-1/2 pounds ground beef
- \* 1 medium onion, chopped
- \* 1 can (15-1/2 ounces) hominy, drained
- \* 1 can (15-1/4 ounces) whole kernel corn, drained
- \* 1 can (15 ounces) sliced carrots, drained
- \* 1 can (15 ounces) sliced potatoes, drained
- \* 1 can (16 ounces) Ranch Style beans (pinto beans in seasoned tomato-sauce)
- \* 1 can (14-1/2 ounces) diced tomatoes, undrained
- \* 1 cup water
- \* 1 teaspoon beef bouillon granules
- \* 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- \* Chili powder to taste
- \* Dash Worcestershire sauce
- \* Dash hot pepper sauce

**Directions**

1. In a large skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Transfer to a 5-qt. slow cooker. Stir in the remaining ingredients.
2. Cover and cook on low for 6-8 hours or until heated through.
3. If your family doesn't care for hominy, you can use a 15-ounce can of green beans (drained) instead.. Makes 12 Servings.

# History of the Baird - Cross Plains Rivalry

The Baird-Cross Plains rivalry is not only considered one of the biggest rivalries in school history, but across the Big Country was well. The two Callahan schools in the 86th between the two teams that has lasted over 94 years, and contested over playoffs spots, district championships, and county bragging rights.

This year's bout between the old Callahan rivals will be for a playoff spot in a tough District featuring Albany, Hamlin, Haskell, and Roscoe. The Bears will also be looking for revenge after 52-0 loss last year, the largest blowout victory by Cross Plains in the rivalry's history.

But to discover how the rivalry became so fierce and heated, one must travel back to the early 1920s.

The Baird-Cross Plains rivalry has its origins all the way back in 1924. In the first ever meeting between the two teams, the Buffaloes emerged victorious in a 13-3 win. The game would be played four more times during the 1920s with the Buffaloes tying both games in 1925 (7-7 and 0-0) and in 1927 with Cross Plains winning 29-13 and 13-0.

During the 1930s, Cross Plains and Baird would five times against each other from 1930 to 1935. Cross Plains would win three straight games from 1930-1933 while the Bears would win two from 1934-1935. The series was then stopped as Cross Plains was sent into a district with the following teams Bangs, Ballinger, Coleman, Mozelle, Rising Star, Santa Anna, and Winters. Baird would be sent with Caddo, Moran, Clyde, Olden, and Putnam.

The series was then reunited in 1940 and went uninterrupted until 1968. The two teams would play as non-district rivals and only being paired in the same district eight times during this period.

One of the most memorable moments in the rivalry came in 1945. Cross Plains would defeat the Bears 18-7 during district play. However due to a lose to Clyde, Cross Plains and Baird were tied in the standings. In order to determine a district winner, as tiebreakers didn't count, the two teams played again at the end of the regular season. Baird would get their revenge as they defeated the Buffaloes 7-0 to win district.

From 1940-1968 the two teams played a total of thirty times against each other with Cross Plains leading the series 25-15-3. Even though they were not in District, the Buffaloes and the Bears battled in highly contested football games during the 50s and 60s. In many of the games, both teams had winning records and clinched district championships in their respective districts.

The two teams were scheduled to play again during the 1969

season, but heavy rains force the game to be canceled. The two teams were set play during the 1970, and thus began the "Curse of the Rainstorm".

From 1970-2005, Baird would take complete control of the series winning 32 out of the 33 games played between the two teams. After Cross Plains was beaten the Bears 55-16 and 61-6 in the 1970 and 1971 seasons, the Buffaloes wouldn't play Baird for another two seasons. The rivalry then resumed for the 1974 season and would remain uninterrupted until 1994.

The Bears would enjoy fifteen straight wins over the Buffs from 1970 to 1986. Like from 1940-1968 games, the rivalry was a non-district affair. In the 1987 season Cross Plains would defeat the Bears in 28-6 victory. The win would be the first over Baird since 1968 and would lead into one of most famous highlights of the rivalry.

Coming into the 1988 season, both Baird and Cross Plains came highly ranked during the pre-season. With the Bears winning the District Championship and the Buffaloes coming off a 7-3 season during their last stint in 2A, an early non-district game between the two teams became highly touted.

However, the Bears would thump the Buffaloes in a 33-0 blowout victory. Following the loss, Cross Plains would rebound and win seven straight games on route to a 7-3 record and a playoff berth for the first time since 1956. Baird would continue to perfect record of 10-0.

The two teams would win their respective playoff games with Baird beating Tolar 49-0 and Cross Plains beating Menard 20-14 setting up the first ever playoff meeting between the teams.

With the two teams playing in Breckenridge that Friday Night, the two teams squared off in the heated rematch. Cross Plains would take a two-touchdown lead at the end of the 1st quarter but a blocked extra point and a failed two-point conversion left the game at 12-0. The Bears would take back the lead 14-12 by halftime and were able to hold on the lead for the entire game giving them victory.

While it seemed Baird won the battle, in the end Cross Plains won the war. The Bears victory came at a cost as several key players were injured during the hard-hitting game. With injuries too much to overcome, Baird would lose to Lindsey 12-0.

As if to exact revenge from the playoff game, Bears would decimate the Buffaloes winning 74-0 the next season. This still remains the biggest blowout by any team in the series. When the rivalry made its way into the 1990s, the game made another twist.

For the 1990 season, Baird and Cross Plains would become district bunkmates for the first

time 1965. County bragging rights soon turned into a battle for district championships. The Bears continued their winning streak over from 1990-1993 winning on an average of 36-15. The rivalry was again discontinued as Baird was bumped up from 1A to 2A.

During the 1996 season, the Bears dropped down from 2A to 1A and were again placed in the same district as the Buffaloes. However, the rivalry was about to take another sharp turn.

By the end of the 1996 season Cross Plains and Baird stood as the two top teams in the district. With Baird sitting at 8-1 and Cross Plains at 7-0-1, the two teams set to battle for the district championship for the first time since 1945.

The game turnout to be one of finest in the series. After a scoreless first quarter, Bears would lead the Buffaloes 6-3 at halftime. After another scoreless quarter, Baird would score two answered touchdowns to take the 20-3 lead. However, the Buffaloes wouldn't give up responding with two touchdowns of their own. Unfortunately, it wasn't enough for Cross Plains as the Bears would win 20-17.

During the Bi-District round, the Bears would fall to the Sterling City Eagles in an upset 24-23 while the Buffaloes would defeat the Bronte Longhorns 12-0.

Much like the 1996 season, the 1997 season turned out to be another District Championship deciding game between the two teams. While the Bears were at 6-3 prior to the game, Cross Plains had the best start in school history with a 9-0 season. Being state ranked through the entire season, the Buffaloes were ready to seize their first district championship since 1994.

Much like their game last season, it was another hard-hitting affair between the Buffaloes and Bears. However, for the Buffaloes the result as much of the same. The Bears would stun Cross Plains in the Bear Den to secure a second District Championship and ruin a perfect season for the Buffs.

Both teams would win their Bi-District playoff games, Baird getting revenge on Sterling City 24-0 and Cross Plains winning its second consecutive playoff game over Irion County 21-0. The two teams would fall in the regional round of the playoffs.

Cross Plains would fall off the slope during the 1998 and 1999 seasons while the Bears would continue to surge forward. Baird would continue the dominance of the Buffaloes winning 42-19 and 42-0. By the turn of the millennium, the Buffs and Bears were set to battle for another District Championship.

When Cross Plains and Baird were set to battle at the end of the 2000 season, the Buffs were ready to end the curse. Cross Plains started with the best record since the 1997 season at 9-0. Knowing how the past teams came up short against the Baird, the Buffaloes were determined to end the losing streak against the 6-3 Bears.

But the Cross Plains, it was the same old story. In another tough battle with the Bears, Cross Plains would fall short once again losing 28-12 as Baird celebrated their fourth district championship in five years. Both teams would fall in the area with the Buffaloes

losing 29-0 to Roscoe and Baird losing to Rotan 41-14.

Next season Baird and Cross Plains again battled for the district championship. Cross Plains again was having one of the best records in school history at 8-1 while the Bears were sitting at 6-3 again. Even though the Buffs had the better record, the team would be blown out by Baird 44-7 for the Bears fifth District Title in six years.

Cross Plains would take a turn for the worst after the 2001 season. From 2002-2007 the Buffaloes would go 8-52 through the five year stretch. Bears would continue its dominance going to playoffs three more times from 2002-2005. During the 2002-2005 seasons, the Bears would beat the Buffaloes an average of 37 to 5.

The series would take a two-year break in 2006 and 2007 with both teams hitting their low points. Cross Plains would go 0-10 in both seasons with the Bears would go 1-9 in theirs. With the rivalry starting back up in 2008, the series would finally turn in the Buffaloes favor.

The 2008 season continued to be a low point for both teams. While the two teams improved their win totals, Cross Plains at 2-7 and Baird at 3-6, both teams had been eliminated from the playoffs. In the season finale for both teams, bragging rights were on the table. The Bears would soon overwhelm the Buffs in a 33-6 victory.

2009 was a big turning point for the Buffaloes leading up their game with the Bears. Cross Plains was having its best since 2003 with 3-6 record. With Baird also sitting at 3-6, the rivalry game between the would see who was the fourth best team in the district.

The Buffaloes would rush out to dominating start and would never look back to give Cross Plains it's long awaited victory over Bears 45-28 snapping an 18-game losing streak.

From 2008-2017, series between the old Callahan rivals would become much even and more heated. After splitting the first two games, the 2010 matchup would see the two programs going in opposite directions.

The Bears would rebound from their 3-7 season to a 6-1 start, while the Buffaloes fall to a 0-7. With a playoff spot already clinched, Bears would dominate the Buffs 55-22 on route to a district championship finishing the season at 8-2 while Cross Plains would fall to another 0-10 season.

During the 2011 season, both teams found themselves battling for the final playoff spot. Cross Plains had seemed to rebound from their 0-10 season while the Bears fall off their 8-2 season. In one of the most heat games since 2001, the Buffaloes defeated Bears 39-21 to clinch their first playoff berth since 2001 season.

From 2012-2015, Baird and Cross Plains would split their next four games. Cross Plains would win two games in 2012 and 2013. The 2012 game would be the first time the Buffaloes would beat Baird in the Bears Den since 1967. The Bears would win the 2014 and 2015 matchups, with 2014 game clinching a playoff berth over the Buffs. With series being split at 4-4 since the renewal of the game in 2008, the rubber match would be played on the biggest stage yet.

2016 was a highly touted game during the pre-season. Both teams had made the playoffs the previous season, and the winner of the district opening game would have the best shot at getting a higher playoff seed.

Coming into the game, Baird had starting off the season at 4-1 while Cross Plains started 3-2. While the game didn't need any more hype as it did, levels of excitement and intensity was wrenched up significantly.

The Abilene Reporter News announced that the Big Country Game of the Week was going to feature Baird and Cross Plains. Now the game was in the spotlight for the entire Big Country to see. With all eyes on the game, the fans were treated to one of the best games in the rivalry.

It was a back and forth affair between the two teams. With every Bear touchdown, the Buffaloes would soon respond

But this turned out to be a different story. Cross Plains responded with three unanswered touchdowns to take a 40-32 lead late in the fourth quarter. The Bears would drive all they way down to the Cross Plains 35-yard line with a minute left in the game. But the Buffaloes made a 4th down stop win the game.



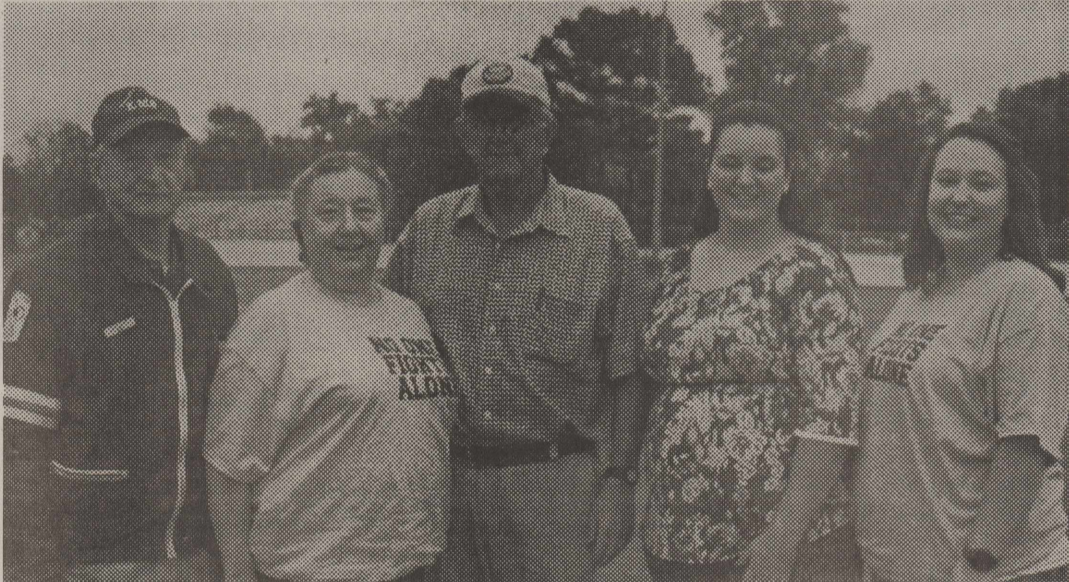
An all to familiar occurrence took place in Cottonwood. Two little cute puppies showed up along the road, obviously
