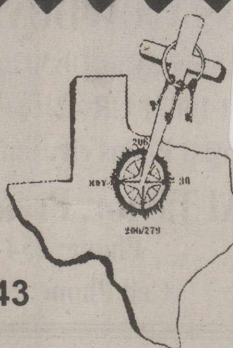

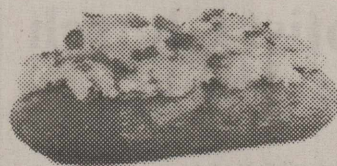

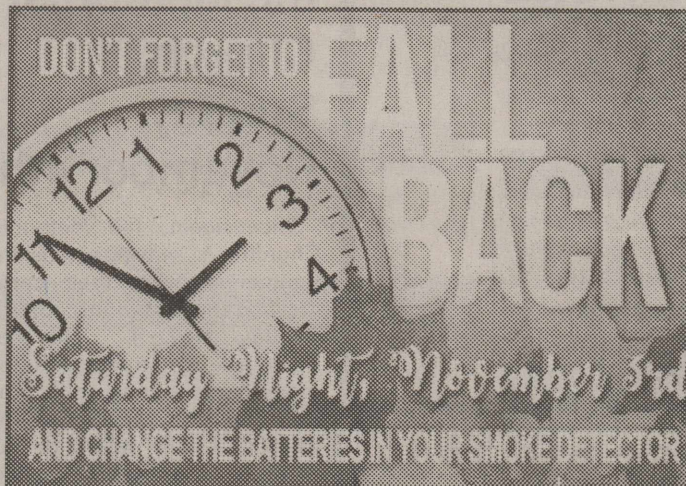

Taken too soon, Joe passed peacefully with his family by his side after a brief but courageous battle with cancer. He was born on April 16, 1947 in Temple, Tx to Silas Albert York Jr. and Maude Louise Jenkins. A native Texan, Joe graduated from Belton High School in 1965 where he excelled as a football athlete

achieving All State recognition and earned an athletic scholarship to University of Texas at Arlington. He could often be found racing his 56 Chevy at Little River Dragway and out in the countryside.

Joe began his career in the polyurethane foam industry at ER-Carpenter in Temple. He and his family relocated to Brenham, TX where he began his employment at Texas Fibers on May 1, 1977. Shortly thereafter, he was promoted to Vice President in charge of the Foam Division of Texas Fibers. In September 1982, Texas Fibers was acquired by MPI and Joe was named Vice President of all MPI Foam Products. In December of 1985, he and his family relocated to Arlington, TX where Joe worked in the corporate office in Fort Worth. Leggett and Platt, Inc. acquired MPI on May 18, 1986. He was promoted to Executive Vice President of Operations, Leggett & Platt Urethane Group. During his tenure, the L & P Urethane Group grew to approximately 31 operations. Joe retired on January 1, 2012 after 35 years of outstanding service to the company. His fondest memories were his years of vast travels across the world, golf outings, running, fishing and enjoying new adventures with his colleagues. He enjoyed every day of his retirement working outdoors on his son's ranch near Cottonwood, TX and immersing himself in the sports and activities of his three granddaughters who filled him with much love and kept his heart youthful. Joe was a true gentleman and will most be remembered for his character, loyalty, grit, and endless dedication to his children and granddaughters. Joe was a competitive runner for many years in the DFW Metroplex and reached the pinnacle of his career completing the Minneapolis Marathon in 2013. He remained true to his passion of exercise programs, long walks, and a healthy lifestyle. Joe loved to travel and especially enjoyed annual Christmas ski trips with his family and long runs along the beaches of Southern California and Destin Florida. In 1966, he married his wife, Judith Ann Bode and later became a proud father of two daughters and a son. He was preceded in death by his father and mother and was adored and is survived by daughter Julie Annette Drake and son-in-law Kevin Drake of Thrall, TX, daughter Jill Dannelle York-Dombroski and son-in-law Jack Dombroski of Edina, MN and his son, Joe Bradley York and fiancée Cathy Dodson of Cross Plains, TX, three granddaughters Reagan Drake (22), Jade Dombroski (17), Jordan Dombroski (17), sister Janice McClung and husband Jerry McClung of Moffatt, Tx, and brother Jack York and wife Rebecca of Wichita Falls, Tx., and many nieces and nephews. 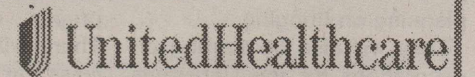

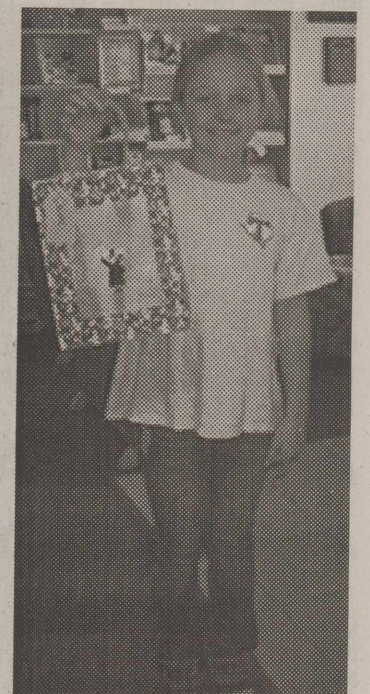

Albany Holds off Buffaloes 18-10

Albany's defense limited Cross Plains to just 155 yards total offense Friday night in Albany as the Lions edged the Buffaloes 18-10 in a battle for first place in District 7-2A Division II.

Albany (3-5, 3-0) is tied with Hamlin (8-0, 3-0) for first place in the district standings, while Cross Plains (6-2,

2-1) slipped into third place, a game behind the leaders. The Buffaloes play at unbeaten Hamlin at 7 p.m. Friday.

Ryan Hill caught two TD passes and returned an interception for a touchdown to account for all 18 points for Albany.

Hill's 10-yard reception from Ben West produced a first-quarter score for Albany. But the Lions fumbled the two-point conversion try, and Caleb Hernandez scooped it up and returned it 95 yards for a safety, leaving Albany in front 6-2.

The Lions added a touchdown in the second quarter on a 24-

yard pass from West to Hill, and Hill intercepted a pass and returned it 30 yards for a score in the third quarter, stretching Albany's lead to 18-2.

Cross Plains responded with an 8-play, 63-yard scoring drive, capped by Jevon

Tillery's 26-yard reception from Caleb Hernandez. The Buffaloes also completed the two-point conversion on a halfback pass from

Theron Allen to Corey Proctor to cut the deficit to 18-10.

Neither team scored in the fourth quarter, however, as Albany held on for the win.

Cross Plains' defense played well again, forcing five turnovers. Tillery intercepted two passes and Cason Allen had one interception. Cody McWilliams and Cedar Jones each recovered a fumble for the Buffaloes.

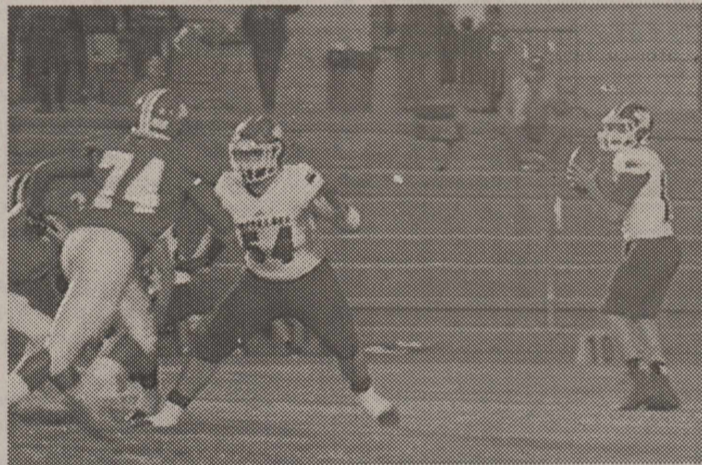
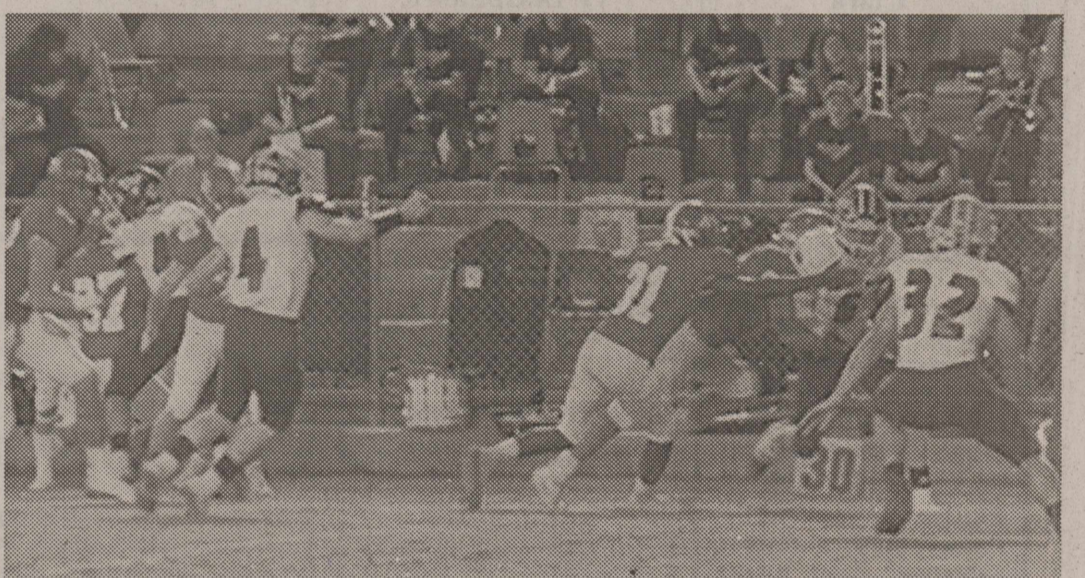
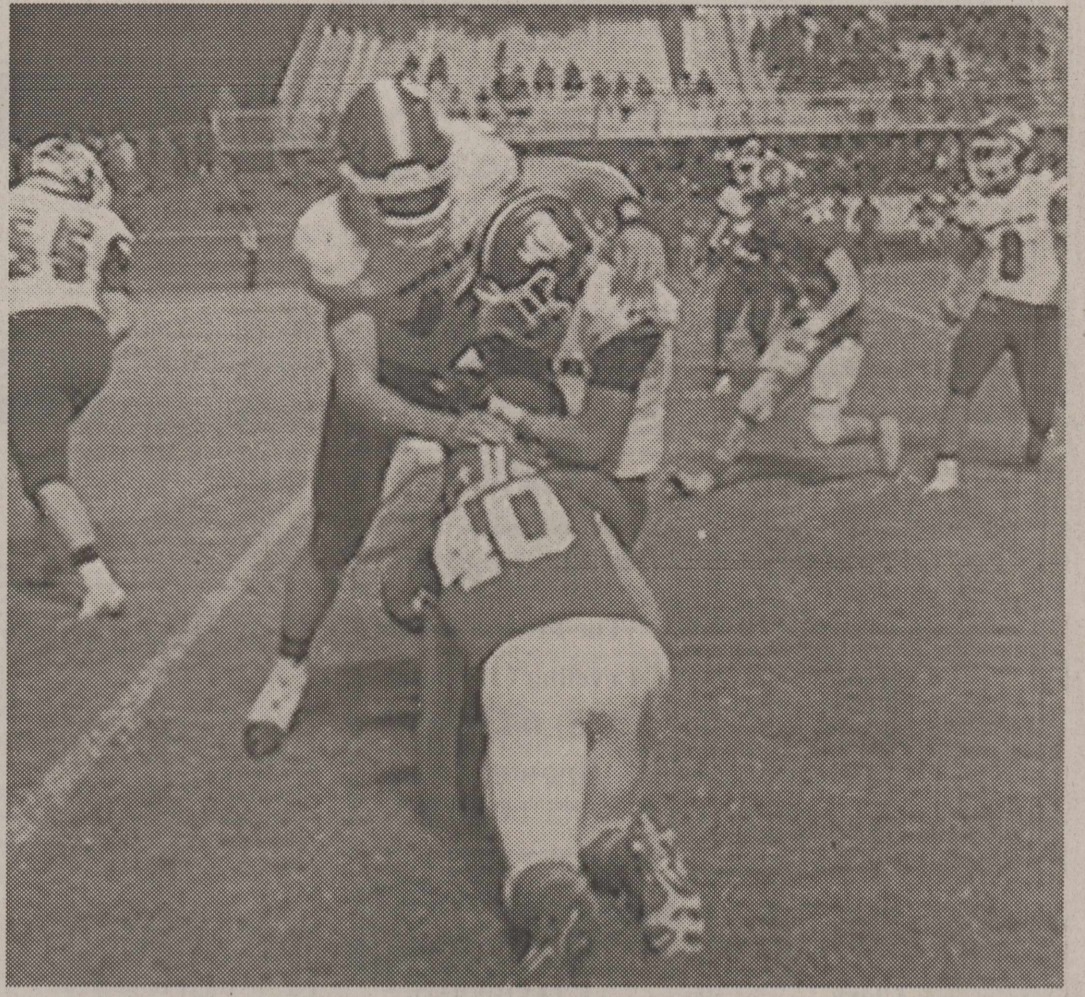

Texas Book Festival Grant Update

As we reported back in April, the Cross Plains Public Library received a grant from the Texas Book Festival. We were one of only 48 libraries in Texas to receive the grant for 2018. The money from this grant has allowed us to enhance the library's collection of large print fiction, audio books and Bluebonnet Award winners.

The new large print titles include popular authors David Baldacci, James Patterson, Danielle Steele, Debbie Macomber, Mary Higgins Clark and many others.

The new adult audio books include authors Sandra Brown, John Grisham, James Patterson, Tom Hanks among others.

The Texas Bluebonnet Award is given one time per year to an author who has written a book for 3rd-6th grades.

Ten nominees are voted on by students in January and the winner is announced in February. This award has been given since 1981 and our library now has all 38 titles. Since the Texas Book Festival's founding by former First Lady Laura Bush and others in 1995, part of its mission has been to promote Texas libraries and literacy. Each year, proceeds raised at the annual Festival fund their Texas Library Grants. Over \$3 million has been awarded to more than 800 libraries across Texas. The 2018 Texas Book Festival Weekend will take place on October 27 & 28 on the grounds of the state capitol in Austin.

We feel very fortunate to have received this grant. Come visit the library and check out all the new titles available!

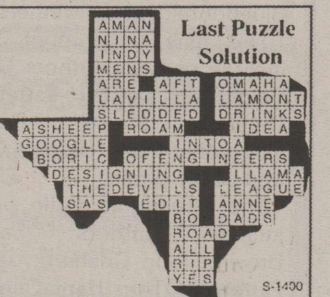

Texas has Experienced 27 Consecutive Months of Employment Growth

AUSTIN — Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 3.8 percent, down from 3.9 percent in August 2018 and setting a new record for the lowest unemployment rate recorded in four decades. The Texas economy added 15,600 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in September, marking 27 consecutive months of annual growth.

"Texas employers continue to contribute to our state's success with private-sector employers adding 16,700 jobs in September and accounting for an impressive 402,500 jobs over the year," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chair Ruth Ruggiero Hughs. "Texas' continued addition of jobs over a twenty-seven month period demonstrates the competitive advantage and market opportunities available to our Texas employers and world-class workforce."

September's annual growth in the state's Goods Producing industries was strong at 6.9 percent. Over the month, Construction added 3,000 jobs, followed by the Manufacturing industry with 2,800 positions,

while Mining and Logging employment expanded by 2,600 positions.

In Texas' Service Providing sector, Financial Activities added 5,800 positions over the month, and led all industries in job growth for September. Also within this sector, Professional and Business Services added 2,500 jobs, followed by Trade, Transportation, and Utilities which added 2,100.

"Texas' labor force is made up of hard-working individuals who are eager to obtain the skills that our employers need," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Julian Alvarez. "I encourage all job seekers to contact their local Workforce Solutions office for assistance with job training and placement."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) recorded the month's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.2 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA and the Odessa MSA which had the second lowest with a rate of 2.7 percent. The Austin-Round Rock and College Station-Bryan MSAs recorded the third

lowest rate of 2.9 percent for September.

"Texas continues to flourish thanks to the outstanding efforts and talents of individuals and employers in communities around the state," said TWC Commissioner Representing the Public Robert D. Thomas. "TWC will continue to promote innovative workforce and economic development strategies in collaboration with our education partners, local leaders, and industry to preserve our competitive edge in the best place to work in the world."

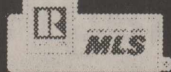

Farmstead windbreaks block the hot, dry winds of summer and the cold gusts of winter. Multiple row windbreaks add natural beauty, privacy and value to a homestead and act as a sound barrier to highway or farm road traffic, as well as protect the soil, increase land value and enhance crop yields. Livestock windbreaks are very beneficial during the winter and summer months. Cattle hidden in an "L" or "U" shaped multiple row windbreak are allowed to utilize their energy to continue gaining weight rather than use

it to keep warm, as a result, the amount of feed afforded by the producer is reduced. These windbreaks also reduce the risk of mortality during harsh winter months, such as Winter Storm Goliath in 2015. They also provide shade during the hot summer months and help keep the dust down when used around feedlots.

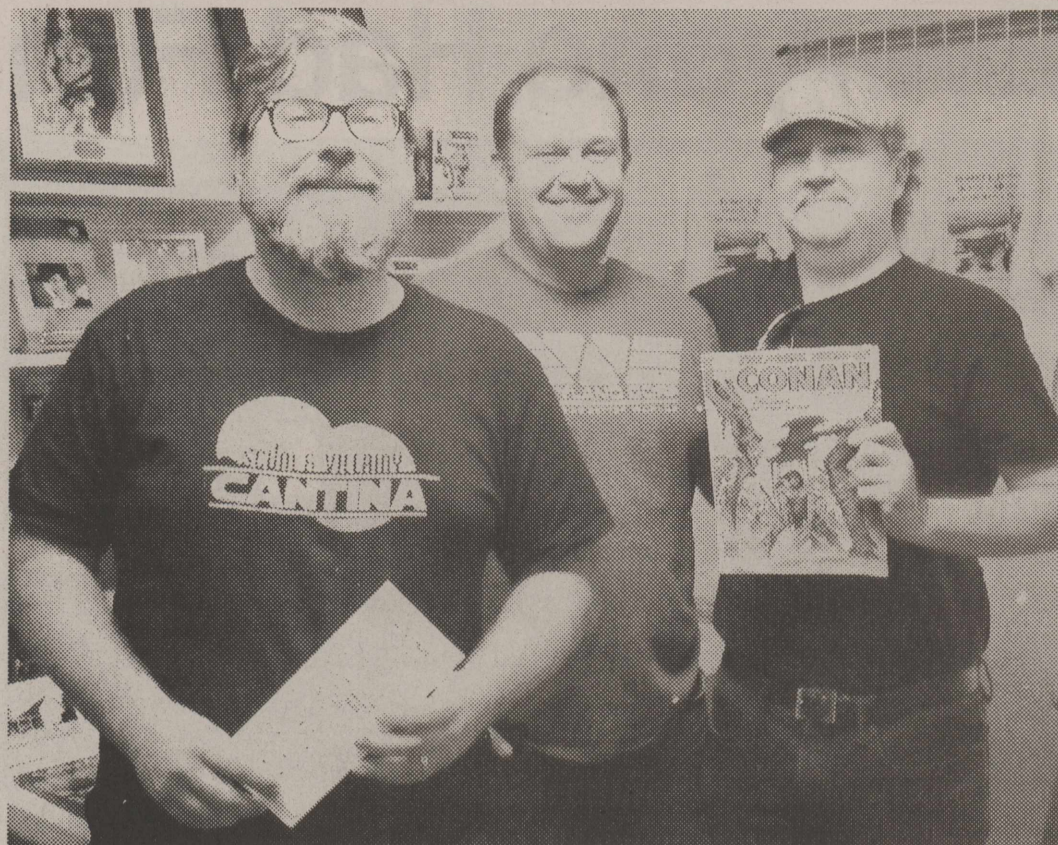
Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce wants to remind you that there are lodging facilities right here in town that can meet your needs.

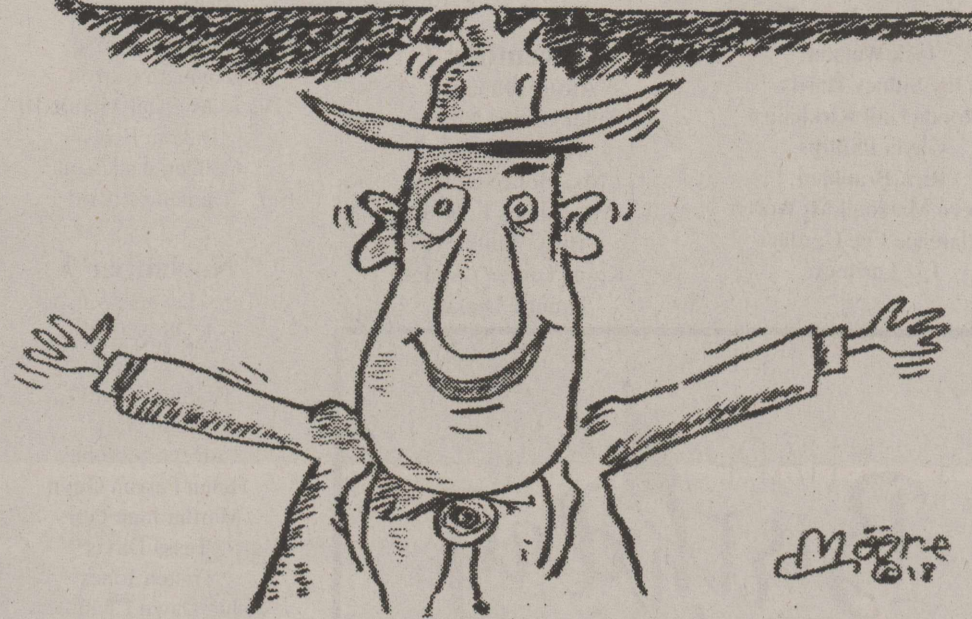

Ingredients:

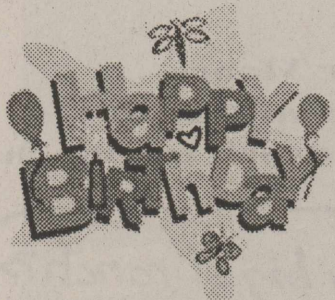
- * 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar

LIKE DUCKS TAKE TO WATER

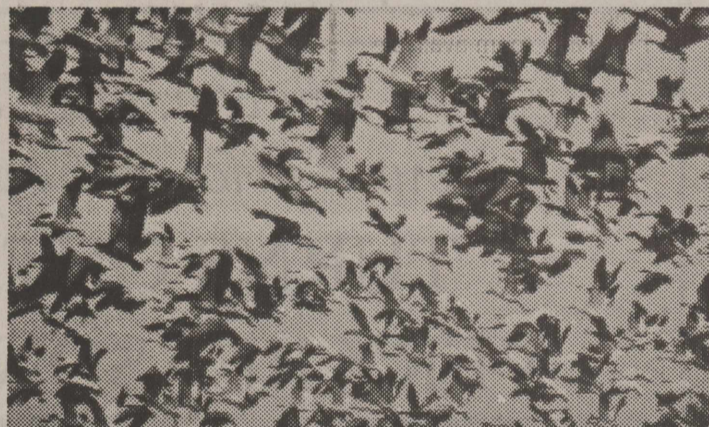
If a commonly used metaphor compares obvious things to "like ducks take to water", this ought to be a successful waterfowl season in Texas.

The state has abundant water for ducks this year in the sloughs, bayous, canals, ponds, rice fields, rivers, lakes, and bays all across the middle two-thirds of the state. From Beaumont to Baffin Bay, there's abundant water. And feed. Prime waterfowl habitat isn't confined to the coastal area, either. There's welcoming habitat for ducks and geese all over Texas. September and October were wet. The rains came, and water is awaiting the birds' arrival.

Texas is the end of the line in the United States for waterfowl migrating down the Central Flyway from Canada and the prairie pothole country of our northern states in route to a more hospitable place to spend the winter. Except during rare storms, our waters and feeding grounds remain unfrozen.

A record number of ducks is heading our way. Many are already here! Some will remain until time to head back north; some will pass on through to Mexico and Latin America. Enough will remain to make it a trophy season. TPWD's Migratory Program Leader, Kevin Kraai, reported that the season looks extremely positive.

"As a duck biologist," Kraai said, "things in Texas for this time of year could not look better." He justified his outlook by referring to the conditions mentioned above. "This scenario is excellent for attracting ducks to winter in Texas," he added, "and for them to have a successful breeding period finding a good mate, staying fat, and hopefully having a successful breeding season that will send more ducks



to Texas next year." Although duck season prospects are promising, goose season may not be as successful since there won't be many young birds coming south this year. Both East and West Goose Zone seasons open Nov. 3. See the Texas Parks and Wildlife Outdoor Annual for duck and goose zones. Photo by John Jefferson.

Kraai says last year's breeding population was one of the best on record. Most species were unchanged from the previous year. Only pintails and scaups declined significantly. He says we are going to see a lot of ducks this year. But does that mean hunters will limit out?

The vast habitat could actually be a drawback to successful shooting. As Kraai puts it, "Simply, more options (exist) for the birds on the landscape to avoid hunters." We saw that on our deer lease. We had muchos ducks on our 41-acre lake - we estimated sometimes a thousand! But there was a similar size lake on a ranch across the fence. We'd get set up around the lake, and, when

the first flight came close enough, we opened fire. After a volley or two, the ducks were gone. I mentioned it to the adjoining rancher and he said the same thing happened on his lake. Kraai added, "Ducks learn very quickly and they are patterning us humans just like we are trying to pattern them."

Reports from the Arctic goose breeding grounds, though, are bleak. Production was a bust. Expect only mature geese. Some of them have been coming to Texas for 30 years and have learned how to survive. Hunting will be hard.

The South Zone duck season opens on Nov.3; North Zone Nov. 10.

Confederate General John Magruder

He was called "Prince John," but he was far from royalty. He was part of two losing wars but was popular among his troops. Gen. John Magruder, a Virginia-born Confederate general, took charge of Texas defenses from late 1862 onward, and led a series of colorful adventures along the way.

John Bankhead Magruder was born in 1807 in Port Royal, Virginia, a small port city not far from Washington, DC. His father was a planter and attorney, but he fell into bankruptcy and lost everything by 1820. He began attending the University of Virginia in 1825 and soon received an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point.

He enrolled at West Point in 1826. Magruder was an able cadet, graduating fifteenth out of forty-two in his class in 1830. The newly commissioned lieutenant was then assigned to the 7th Infantry and soon transferred into artillery. It was a quiet time for the army, and he went from post to post. He found time to study law and became a licensed attorney. In 1845, he was transferred to General Zachary Taylor's forces in Corpus Christi as the United States prepared for the admission of Texas into the Union and to enforce American claims on the Rio Grande. War with Mexico erupted a few months later, and Magruder served ably in the Mexican War, and slightly wounded in 1847. He served alongside many other officers who would lead armies in the Civil War some fifteen years later.

After the war ended in 1848, he was assigned to a post in California where he managed to also become a popular attorney, real estate speculator, saloon owner, and also ran a railroad while still tending to his army duties.

As Abraham Lincoln assumed the presidency in 1861, Magruder was assigned to a post in Washington, DC. When Virginia seceded in April, Magruder chose to defend Virginia and

joined the Confederate army as a colonel. Given his extensive knowledge of military defenses in the area, he was put in charge of the Arm of the Peninsula east of Richmond. Popular among his troops, it was said by one friend, "he could fight all day and dance all night." With successful efforts against Union incursions into the area, Magruder was rewarded with promotion to major general later that summer.

By spring 1862, Gen. George McClellan attacked the eastern peninsula of Virginia. Magruder was outnumbered nine-to-one, but managed to use the bogs and thick forests to his advantage. He managed to fool McClellan into believing Confederate forces were stronger than they were, and delayed the Union advances for several critical days. However, as Robert E. Lee took command and attempted to reorganize Confederate forces into a counter-offensive by late June, Magruder was bogged down by poor communication and poor coordination. He was accused of being drunk, and faced the charge without resorting to character attacks against his critics. In the end, the charges never stuck.

He was transferred to command the District of Texas, New Mexico, and Arizona in October 1862. By this point, the Union Navy had just seized Galveston. He organized a counterattack of artillery and Confederate gunboats. Magruder attacked on New Year's Eve. By the next day, he had captured three Union ships and forced the rest to flee. Galveston remained in Confederate hands for the remainder of the war.

Magruder maintained his headquarters in Houston while directing officers throughout Texas to enforce the draft and maintain order. Working with Confederate units in Louisiana and Arkansas, he managed to keep Union forces from invading Texas. After Lee surrendered in Virginia in April 1865, Magruder, along with Gen. Kirby Smith,

tried to hold out against Union forces but realized all was lost. On June 2, they formally surrendered. But he understood how leaders in the losing side of uprisings and civil wars had been treated historically. Fearing for his life, as did many other Confederate officers and officials, Magruder fled to Mexico.

Magruder offered his services to Emperor Maximilian, the puppet king installed by the French after they seized control of Mexico in 1862. France had used the pretense of Mexico's immense foreign debt owed to France as a pretense for invasion and the distraction of the American Civil War as a cover. The ever-unpopular Maximilian found himself the target of increased uprisings in 1865 and welcomed the services of a respected general.

But Magruder soon realized just how perilously close to the abyss that Maximilian had become. The United States had made it quite clear that French intervention in Mexico would not be tolerated. With unrest growing, the French pulled their army out of Mexico in 1866 and urged their puppet king to leave as well. Convinced he was beloved by the people, he decided to stay instead. As rebel armies advanced and Maximilian's armies crumbled, Magruder read the writing on the wall. He fled back to the United States in early 1867. Not long afterward, Maximilian was overthrown, captured, and executed by firing squad.

The one-time Confederate soldier and Mexican advisor found a general amnesty for Confederate officers in the United States and capitalized on his wartime adventures. He spent the next several years off-and-on the lecture circuit making a tidy living regaling audiences with his tales. Magruder died at his home in Houston in 1871.
