Senior Center to Honor Veterans



Sales tax revenue totaled \$2.6 billion in October


(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.6 billion in October, 7.3 percent more than in October 2017.

"Growth in state sales tax revenue continues to be strong, while moderating from the double-digit pace of recent months," Hegar said. "The rate of growth in sales tax collections continues to be highest from oil- and gas-related sectors." Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in October 2018 was up 12.6 percent compared to the same period a year ago. The sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all

tax collections. In October 2018, Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuel and oil and natural gas production:

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$438.4 million, down 2.6 percent from October 2017;
 - motor fuel taxes — \$298 million, down 4.2 percent from October 2017; and
 - oil and natural gas production taxes — \$439.9 million, up 52.4 percent from October 2017.

J. C. Hutson

James C. "J.C." Hutson

James C. ("J.C.") Hutson, age 86, of Sunrise Beach, TX, passed away on October 31, 2018. He is survived by his wife of 67 years Jean Hutson, sons Mark and daughter-in-law Jackie of Austin, TX, and Paul Kirk and son-in-law Rick of Rancho Santa Fe, CA, brother Don Hutson, and many loving grandchildren and friends. He was preceded in death by his son James Wade Hutson. J.C. was a loving father, husband, grandfather, and friend to everyone.

J.C. was born in Rising Star, Texas in 1933. After graduating from Cross Plains High School in 1949, J.C. moved to Austin, where he attended the University of Texas. In Austin, J.C. met and fell in love with Ova Jean McDaniel and they were married in 1951. Shortly after moving to Austin, J.C. was called up by the Naval Reserve and was deployed to the Marshall Islands in the South Pacific. While serving in the South Pacific, J.C.

was part of the U.S. Navy's Seabees program and it was there he learned much about electrical engineering and construction. After he was honorably discharged from the U.S. Navy in 1955 he worked in the electrical contracting industry in Austin for over 40 years. In 1961, Jean and J.C. moved to what was then rural San Leanna Estates, near Manchaca, where they spent the next 30 years raising 3 sons. The day after President Kennedy was assassinated in 1963, J.C. was called upon by President Johnson's Secret Service detail to immediately construct and improve electrical infrastructure at the LBJ Ranch. President and Mrs. Johnson were so pleased

with J.C.'s work they hired him for many other jobs. J.C. also performed the electrical engineering work at many of Austin's high rise buildings. After 43 years in the electrical business, J.C. retired in 1996 and he and Jean moved to Lake LBJ where he enjoyed many beautiful days fishing and socializing with friends. One of his greatest pleasures in retirement was fishing off the side of his pontoon boat with Jean and friends and cold beer.

J.C. was a simple man of faith; he loved family, friends, fishing, and had the ability to fix just about anything. J.C. was always gladly willing to help others and spent long hours on many occasions helping neighbors and friends repair home electrical problems and wouldn't quit until the problem was solved. J.C. and Jean were long-time members of the United Methodist Church and he truly lived its credo of: "Do all the good you can, for all the people you can, in all the ways you can, as long as ever you can." J.C.'s faith in God sustained him in many of the challenges he faced in his life, including surviving pancreatic cancer and the death of his son, Wade.

J.C. inspired those around him with his gentle spirit and kindness. He will be remembered for his selflessness, love of family and love of country. He will be greatly missed. 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





Unbeaten Hamlin Blanks the Buffaloes 47-0

Unbeaten Hamlin was too much for Cross Plains as the Pied Pipers handed the Buffaloes their second straight loss, a 47-0 setback Friday in a District 7-2A Division II football contest.

Hamlin (9-0 overall, 4-0 in district) posted its second straight shutout. The Pied Pipers limited Cross Plains to just 147 yards total offense and intercepted six passes. touchdowns, Austin Lozano scored on a 31-yard run, and Jevon Williams returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown for Hamlin.




Cross Plains (6-3 overall) is currently in third place in the district standings at 2-2, but the Buffaloes, who play host to Roscoe at 7 p.m. Friday in the regular-season finale, still need a win to nail down a playoff spot.

If the Buffaloes win Friday, they will be the third-place team from the district in the Class 2A Division II playoffs.

But a Roscoe win over Cross Plains, combined with a Haskell victory over Baird, would force a three-way tie for third place, necessitating the implementation of a tie-breaker to determine the third- and fourth-place team in the playoffs, based on the margin of victory of the games involving Cross Plains, Roscoe and Haskell.

Hamlin and Albany (4-5, 4-0) will play Friday night in Albany to determine the district champion. Haskell (2-6) and Roscoe (3-6) are tied at 1-3 in district, a game behind Cross Plains, while Baird (4-5, 0-4) is in last place in the district standings.

Caleb Hernandez led Cross Plains offensively against Hamlin with 27 yards rushing, 26 yards passing. Sean Hernandez threw for 83 yards.

The agency's primary objective is to produce and sell quality seedlings at an affordable price for landowners, allowing them to plant large quantities of trees for windbreaks.

You may be asking yourself,

"What is a windbreak"? A windbreak consists of trees and shrubs systematically planted adjacent to fields, homesteads, or feedlots as a barrier to reduce erosion, and increase land value and aesthetics. They are established where production ends and homesteads begin and they also act as protection for a residence, which increases the heating and cooling efficiency of a homestead.

Livestock windbreaks are very beneficial during the winter and summer months. Cattle hidden in an "L" or "U" shaped multiple row windbreak are allowed to utilize their energy to continue gaining weight rather than use

it to keep warm, as a result, the amount of feed afforded by the producer is reduced. These windbreaks also reduce the risk of mortality during harsh winter months, such as Winter Storm Goliath in 2015. They also provide shade during the hot summer months and help keep the dust down when used around feedlots.

After several quiet weeks around Cottonwood, I think I may have collected enough news to write about. The weather has definitely changed to fall. The past few weeks have been quite windy and the leaves went from reds and oranges to gone on several trees. The elms and hackberry trees have given in to the temperature changes the most with nearly all leaves gone. The oaks and pecans are starting to really turn. It looks like this week we may experience some cold nights which will put them into full on fall colors. We are lucky to live in an area that hosts some of the most brilliant colors this time of year. Get out and take a look.

This time of year we get blessed with the added hour of sleep, but the sunset at 6 thing is slightly bothersome to those of us who commute for work late in the evenings. With the great rains we received comes the growth of the grass and weeds alongside the roads. There's places the weeds are taller than my car. This makes driving in the dark a gamble with pigs and deer darting out without warning. As the saying goes, keep your eyes peeled when driving. I can tell you from first hand experience, a 200 pound hog does quite a bit of damage to any vehicle at any speed.

Last week, if it wasn't for the recent rains, we could have had a serious situation in Cottonwood. The past winter ice storms broke several limbs on the north sides of trees as we all know. One of these branches has been hanging for some time now. The wind finally knocked it loose and right into the power lines, causing a shower of sparks and a fireball that ignited the still green leaves of the tree. It was quite a sight to see and the sound was unmistakable. I just so happened to be getting home as it happened. Once I realized what was happening and managed to run down the road to check it out, the fireball had already extinguished itself but the sparks and embers continued to fall. Deer season is in full effect. This brings more traffic to our area, most being people from other areas. They seem to forget we are not in the metroplex with 55-75 mph speed limits. We just have to tolerate them for a few months. Be on the lookout for excessive use of camouflage, big trucks pulling trailers with four wheelers, and the occasional luxury SUV with antlers hanging off the hitch rack. Bear with them, they can't help it.

Italian Hot Dish

Prep Time: 30 minutes Bake Time: 40 Minutes

Ingredients:

- * 1-1/2 cups uncooked multigrain bow tie pasta (about 4 ounces)
- * 1 pound lean ground beef (90% lean)
- * 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms, divided
- * 1/2 cup chopped onion
- * 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- * 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- * 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- * 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
- * 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- * 1 can (15 ounces) tomato sauce
- * 1/2 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese, divided
- * 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese, divided

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350°. Cook pasta according to package directions for al dente; drain.
2. Meanwhile, in a large nonstick skillet coated with cooking spray, cook and crumble beef with 1/2 cup mushrooms, onion and green pepper over medium-high heat until no longer pink, 5-7 minutes. Stir in seasonings and tomato sauce; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, 15 minutes.
3. Place pasta in an 8-in. square baking dish coated with cooking spray. Top with meat sauce and remaining mushrooms. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese and 1 tablespoon Parmesan cheese.
4. Bake, covered, 35 minutes. Uncover; sprinkle with remaining cheeses. Bake until heated through and cheese is melted, 5-10 minutes. **Makes 4 servings.**

The Springfield XDG Black 4" Mod 2, 16 round, striker fire action pistol donated by Wildlife Nutrition Center was won by Dale Ward.







On September 6, 2009, Staff Sergeant Michael C. Murphrey was killed in action while serving in Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan.




BEAT the RAP!

This is a primer on beating game and fish violation raps.

The best way is simple: Just don't do it! Most game violations are avoidable. Some are unintentional, either based on ignorance or carelessness. Some are intentional - like poaching. But that's another matter.

The most common game and fish crime is hunting or fishing without a license. Licenses are mandatory. "Endorsements" for hunting particular game and fishing in freshwater or saltwater are additionally required. A "duck stamp", is required for hunting migratory waterfowl. It's a federal offense to hunt them without one. Once, only available through the Post Office, you can now pay for it when you buy your Texas hunting license and the license will show that you paid for all endorsements including the Federal duck stamp. The endorsements will make you legal until the stamp arrives by mail (or until the expiration date beneath the endorsement). The stamp must be attached to your license when received. It's much easier to be legal now than back then. Licenses are available at all Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) offices and at leading outdoor stores, tackle shops and gun shops.

According to Texas Game Warden Assistant Commander Jarret Barker, 4,195 people were fined last year for not having a freshwater fishing license; 892 for not having a saltwater license. Fines ranged from \$25 to \$500. Hunting without a license is similarly costly. Compared to the \$30 cost of a freshwater fishing license, \$35 for a saltwater license, and \$25 for a hunting license, it's false economy to fish or hunt without a license and run the risk of being one of the nearly 5,000 ticketed each year for those offenses. Odds of getting caught aren't in violators' favor. Wardens undergo extensive training, and they are professionals at what

they do. Combination licenses are also available and are real bargains.

Many other common violations include tagging omissions and exceeding bag limits. Limits for all game and fish are set out in the TPW Outdoor Annual, available where licenses are sold. Lakes have different limits, and hunting limits vary by county. Then, there's civil restitution. The state adds to fines the value of all game and fish illegally taken. Priced by the number of animals taken or the inches of antler, that can run into the thousands. The Outdoor Annual contains information that can save you money - and a lot of grief. Check it out.

Then there are poaching penalties. Killing a mule or white-tailed deer, a pronghorn, or a bighorn without landowner permission is a felony! That messes up your life in innumerable ways including prohibiting possessing a firearm.

One case a warden told me about cost the perp nearly \$100,000 about 20 years ago. He lost his job, forfeited a company car, his wife was fired for her part in covering it up, there were trespassing charges and fines. Gear, equipment, and guns may be confiscated. Jail time is often included.

By comparison, a license and lease fees would have been a bargain!

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Callahan County Historical Commission Meeting

The Callahan County Historical Commission met on Monday, October 29, 2018 at the Clyde Chamber of Commerce. Judy Luter, chairman, welcomed members and minutes of the last meeting were read by secretary, Cookie Robinson. The Executive Director of Texas Forts Trail, Margaret Hoogstra gave an interesting report on the history of the Texas Heritage Trails and its current events. She was assisted by a young lady from Eula, Scarlett Yates, who is doing her internship there. The Texas Heritage Trails Program

was planned to encourage tourism and promote our Texas history and preservation of historic sites. In turn, this program brings more dollars into Texas communities. 7.3 billion dollars is brought in annually by Heritage Trails travelers. The Trails Program was created in 1968 by Governor John Connally and the Texas Highway Department in conjunction with the HemisFair in San Antonio, which was a world-wide celebration that commemorated the 250th Anniversary of the founding of San Antonio. There are 10 Heritage Trails Regions- Texas Brazos Trail, Texas Forest Trail, Texas Forts Trail, Texas Hill Country Trail, Texas Independence Trail, Texas Lakes Trail, Texas Mountain Trail, Texas Pecos Trail, Texas Plains Trail, and Texas Tropical Trail. In October, 2018, to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the 1968 2 day trip led by Governor Connally along the Texas Forts Trail, a re-creation of the trip was made by a caravan of

travelers. The 650 mile trip had stops at eight frontier forts, a Spanish presidio and several sites in between.

During the business portion there was much discussion concerning future historical markers and sites for these. The newest marker for the Callahan County Hospital at Baird has been set for November 29, 2018. Revision for the proposed Callahan County Historical brochure and plans for a Spring Fund Raiser were discussed.

Officers for the new 2019 term

were elected. Chairman-Judi Campbell, Vice-Chairman-Bob Robinson, Secretary-Cookie Robinson, Reporter-Elnora Scott, and Marker Chairman-Felix Manion.

The next meeting will be held at the Oplin Community Center on Thursday, December 6, 2018 at 6:00 pm.

Cowboy Symposium in The Land of the Enchantment

Smoke rose steadily from chuck wagon cooking sites throughout the racetrack infield at Ruidoso Downs for a gathering of cowboys and cowgirls in the scenic Sierra Blanca Mountains of New Mexico. The 29th Annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium had begun at Ruidoso, New Mexico, a favorite destination of West Texans.

New Mexico's Lincoln County was first inhabited by the ancestral Apache people in the 1500s. Fort Stanton, a US Army cavalry post, was established in this area in 1855 to protect settlers from those native Apaches who practiced a zero tolerance policy toward foreign immigrants entering their homeland. It was also the territory where the Lincoln County War (1878-1881) occurred and outlaw William H. Bonney (alias Billy the Kid) gained his notoriety.

Celebrating and carrying on the traditions of our American West is the Symposium's purpose. This iconic event is held for 3 days and nights in October after the horse racing season concludes on Labor Day and before the winter snow season begins. It is highlighted by music performances from nationally known western entertainers, classic chuck wagon cooking, live outdoor demonstrations and creative craft work, all by the finest in their fields who share a common love of the West and its proud heritage (www.cowboysymposium.org).

This fall gathering has been named "Best Cowboy Cultural Event" by the American Cowboy Cultural Association, "Venue of the Year" by the Cowtown Society of Western Music, "Best Chuck Wagon Contest" by True West Magazine and one of "North American's Top 100 Events" by the American Bus Association. It has also been featured on the Food Network's "All American Festivals and Cowboy Challenges".

Three nightly concerts with dancing were headlined by Lee Greenwood, Sawyer Brown, Sweethearts of the Prairie, Moe Bandy, Jody Nix & Texas Cowboys, & the Floyd Domino Trio. Daily performances of western song and music on three continuous stages featured Belinda Gail, Billy Mata & Texas Tradition,

This entertainment was located in and adjacent to the main grandstand building.

The Chuck Wagon Cookoff with prizes totaling \$13,000 included contestants Black Iron Wagon, Camp Cookie, C Bar C Ranch, Cocklebur Camp, Cross Wagon, DT Wagon, Honey Do Spoiler, Lonely Goat Ranch, Moreland Wagon Shop, Shadow Peak, Rancho Hernandez, Rocking MR, Robertson Wagon and Rocking RR Chuckwagon. These chuck wagons also served lunch on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday to patrons who purchased advance tickets. All chuck wagons were camped outdoors on the racetrack's grass infield.

Events taking place on the dirt race track included demonstrations by blacksmiths, horse and mule trainers, cowboy mounted shooters, Spanish dancers, Mescalero Apache war dancers, mountain men and leather crafters. Additionally, there were activities for kids including coloring, drawing, short story and poetry contests plus milk bottle throwing, ring tossing, special archeology digging, bouncy ball bull riding, potato sack racing, stick horse barrel racing and dummy

roping. Food and drink trucks and booths were scattered all over the site along with 146 vendors of quality western products. An added bonus this year consisted of 10 bushels of fresh Ruidoso Valley apples donated by Tully Orchards for the delicious apple cobbler desserts served at the chuck wagons.

My wife, Dolores, and I have been Ruidoso visitors since we were West Texas ranch kids coming with our families. We enjoy lodging in the historic Upper Canyon where the first cabins were built in 1914 along the scenic road following the winding Rio Ruidoso ("Noisy River"). Our favorite is the preeminent Story Book Cabins with many different upscale yet rustic and fully-furnished rental cabins owned and operated by West Texans Alan and Kristen Riches who do a great job of hosting and accommodating guests (www.storybookcabins.com).

The 40th Annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium will be held in October of 2019 at Ruidoso Downs racetrack in a beautiful valley with a grandstand and grounds providing the perfect venue. For those of us who are western history lovers, it is a bucket-list bonus.

Star Trek creator Gene Roddenberry

Texas has been home to many imaginative scientists, artists, and writers. Because of their dreams and determination, they changed how people saw the world. One Texas writer in particular, Gene Roddenberry, created one of the most successful science fiction stories today, Star Trek.

Born Eugene Wesley Roddenberry in El Paso in 1921, he was the eldest child in a Southern Baptist family. In 1923, his father accepted a position at the Los Angeles Police Department, and the family left Texas for California.

As a child, Roddenberry was very imaginative. He loved reading science fiction and had fair grades in school. He considered following in his father's footsteps and began taking criminal justice courses when he later enrolled at Los Angeles City College. However, the approach of World War II shifted his focus.

Increasingly interesting in aviation, he began taking flight lessons through the military's Civilian Pilot Training Program. He earned his pilots license and enlisted in the Army Air Corps less than two weeks after Pearl Harbor. He became a B-17 bomber pilot with the Thirteenth Air Force, based out of Hawaii. He earned a Distinguished Flying Cross and rose to the rank of captain.

After the war, Roddenberry worked for Pan Am Airways as an international pilot. In 1947, his Lockheed L-049 crashed in Syria. He suffered two broken ribs in the crash. As the plane caught fire, he worked to pull as many injured passengers from the wreckage as he could. Fifteen passengers died, but he saved many others, and led the survivors through the desert to find help. He flew for Pan Am for another year before resigning to pursue his dreams of being a writer.

Success did not come easily. Having difficulty earning a living to support his wife and young children, he joined the LAPD in

1949. Using his police experience, he soon became a technical advisor for the early drama Mr. District Attorney, for which he also wrote the occasional episode. He later worked as a writer for Highway Patrol. He was also selling scripts for popular westerns as well. He was doing so well that he resigned from the police force in 1956.

In 1958, he started writing for the popular western Bat Masterson and Have Gun - Will Travel. He won an award from the Writer's Guild of America for an episode of the latter that year. Roddenberry tried to develop several different television series, but he had difficulty selling any to the networks. In 1963, NBC picked up his series The Lieutenant, a drama about the lives of Marines starring Gary Lockwood and Robert Vaughn that ran for only one season.

Roddenberry began developing a new science fiction series in 1964 that ultimately became Star Trek. Networks were hesitant, but Roddenberry pitched it as a futuristic western based on a starship. CBS rejected the series outright, but NBC was interested. The pilot episode that emerged, The Menagerie, starring Jeff Hunter as Captain Pike, Leonard Nimoy as Mr. Spock, and Roddenberry's future wife, Majel Barrett, did not impress the network. Executives feared the theme of aliens, ESP, and an interracial crew would not sit well with audiences. However, they enjoyed the concept of the program and ordered it revamped.

Roddenberry complied, keeping Nimoy and bringing in William Shatner to play Captain

James T. Kirk. The second pilot aired in 1966, and the program immediately developed a steady following of fans. Roddenberry kept the show focused on morality plays and allegories of current events in the 1960s. Overall, he based the series on his idea of a utopian future for humanity, one where war, poverty, crime, and disease had ended and all races worked together as equals.

This hopeful view of the future attracted many fans looking for an escape from the chaotic and violent events of the decade. However, ratings were low; and Roddenberry often clashed with network executives. The series was nearly canceled in 1968, but a letter-writing campaign allowed Star Trek to proceed to a third season.

After the series was canceled in 1969, Roddenberry's personal life was a mess. His marriage had fallen apart, and he had several affairs. He ultimately divorced and remarried. He tried to develop several other science fiction series and movies but none was ever particularly successful.

Star Trek's popularity continued to grow after its cancellation. In 1976, NASA invited the cast to the unveiling of the space shuttle prototype, called Enterprise as the result of a writing campaign. By the late 1970s, he entered discussions to revive Star Trek as a television series, but the unexpected success of Star Wars in 1977 led studio executives to push for a movie version instead. The Star Trek movie premiered in 1979. Three more movies followed in the 1980s, leading to an updated version of the series with a new cast, Star Trek: The Next Generation, in 1987. Four more series would emerge as well as two more currently in development as well as a half dozen more movies.

He died of a heart attack at his doctor's office in Los Angeles in 1991. As a final salute to the science fiction pioneer, a portion of his ashes were flown aboard a flight of the Space Shuttle Co-

lumbia in 1992. Though many of his other works have been largely forgotten, Star Trek has become a billion-dollar franchise from TV shows, merchandising, and movies.



Texas Historical Commission News Briefs

OBSERVE THE NATIONAL TOLLING OF THE BELLS ON 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR
Veterans Day will take on a special meaning this November as the nation commemorates the 100th anniversary of the armistice that ended the world's first global conflict. To celebrate the anniversary, the U.S. World War I Centennial Commission is sponsoring a national Bells of Peace initiative on November 11.

In a recent message, Governor Greg Abbott encouraged Texans to join the national effort honoring the 116,516 American lives lost and 200,000 wounded during the Great War. Schools, churches, organizations, and individuals can participate by tolling their bells 21 times, in five-second intervals, on Sunday, November 11, at 11 a.m. local time. The 21 bell tolls symbolize a 21-gun salute, one of the nation's highest honors. Visit worldwar1centennial.org for more information.

Last year, in honor of the wider observance of the American World War I centennial which began on April 6, 1917, the Texas Historical Commission (THC) released its newest history guide and mobile app tour, *Texas and the Great War*. 


