SNYDER WINS ONE-ACT PLAY IN FINE FIELD

Ineligibility Discovered By Fluvanna On the Day Of Dramas

In as strong a field of one-act plays as one is likely to find in any county in Texas, Snyder's "Unferential Kindness" won the judges' decision in Fluvanna school auditorium Monday night. Fluvanna's "Sparkin'" given unofficial first place in the preliminary judging, was found to be ineligible on the day of the contest. "Sparkin'" was presented in the state finals last year, but the school did not learn that the play could not be used this year until shortly before the cast went on the stage Monday afternoon. Hermleigh Second. Second in the official judging was Hermleigh's "The Mountain Wedding," which was close behind Snyder in the judges' opinion. Ira's "Revenge" was third. Pyron was eliminated in the afternoon, all the other plays being given Monday night. Dunn did not present its play. During the night finals, Norris Scott of Ira was defeated by Weidon Longbotham of Hermleigh in the senior boys' declamation elimination, which last week resulted in a tie for first place. Fluvanna and Ira presented several vocal and piano numbers between plays. Headlining the winning Snyder cast was Charley Dunn as Cyril, mischievous school boy. He was declared the best boy actor in official and unofficial votes. Ruby Reeves as Susan in Fluvanna's play was first among the girls, unofficially, while Jane Falls of Ira as Isabel was first officially. Daisy Nell Gavin of Fluvanna as Leslie was third unofficially. SNYDER EASILY TAKES FIRST PLACE IN TRACK

Snyder easily took first place in the senior track and field and the grammar school track and field meet here last Friday. Hermleigh was easy winner of the high school junior division of the interscholastic League's annual athletic trials.

The meet was postponed from the previous Saturday, when rain came down in torrents. Last Friday was fairly windy, but the meet was run off according to schedule, reports W. W. (Red) Hill, of Snyder, general athletic director.

No outstanding records were set during the meet, but interest was keen and entries were as numerous as average.

Sorrells High Pointer. Sorrells of Snyder was senior high point man with 19 tallies, going first in the javelin throw, first in the high jump, second in the high hurdles, the pole vault, and the broad jump. Taylor of Snyder came in second, winning first in both short dashes and in the mile run for a total of 15 points.

Dunn ranked second in the senior division, with 43 5-6, compared with Snyder's 68 1-2 points. This ranking gave Dunn first Class B place. Other point winners were: Fluvanna, 22 1-3; Hermleigh, 15 1-3; Pyron, 3.

Casey of Hermleigh led the pack in the high school junior division, with 12 2-4 points, while Mobley of Hermleigh made 12 1-4 tallies. Points were scored as follows: Hermleigh, 30 1-2; Dunn, 9 1-2; Canyon, 9; Snyder, 8; Fluvanna, 5; Ira, 2.

Grammar School Event. In the grammar school division, Snyder made 39 points, Dunn 11, Fluvanna 9, Ira 3, Plainview, Pyron 1, Hermleigh 1/2. Wills of Snyder, with 15 1-4 points, and Biggs of Snyder, with 14 1-4, were high pointers.

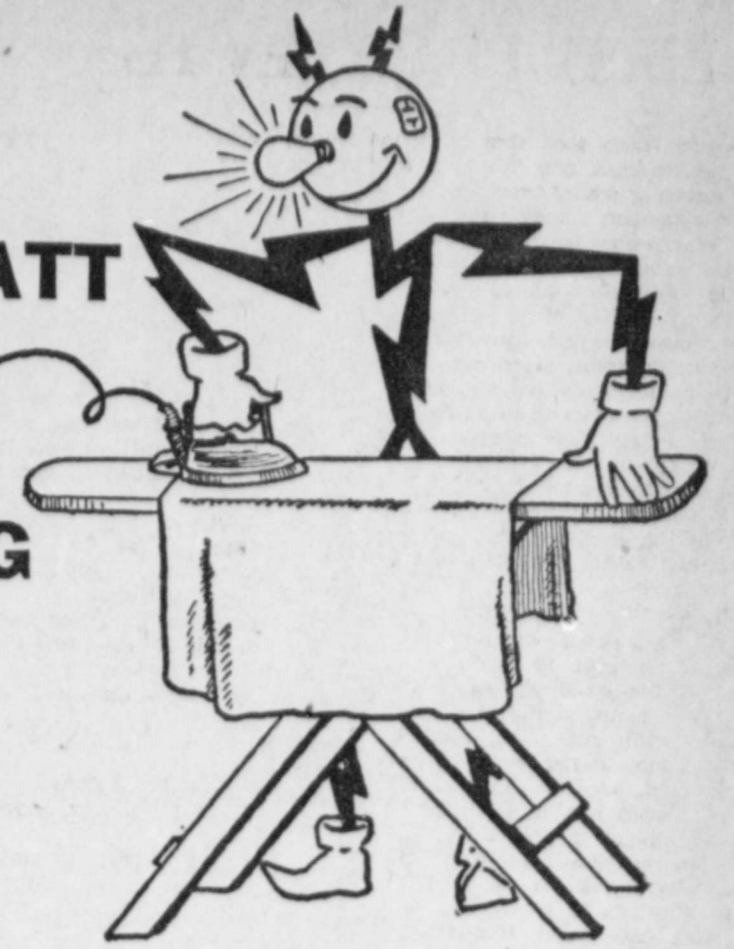
