# April Snow Breaks Up **Signs Of Early Spring**

## **ONE OF AREA'S** LATEST WHITE SPELLS TODAY

#### County Blanketed on Heels Of Worst Sandstorm For This Season

A two-inch snow late Wednesday night and early Thursday morning halted Scurry County's early celebration of spring's arrival.

The white blanket came on the heels of a Wednesday afternoon and early Thursday night sandstorm that was the most furious and uncomfortable of the season.

Wednesday night temperature was downed to 25 degrees, in marked contrast to the high of 82 degrees that was reached during the day. Friday temperature was also low, 29 degrees having been recorded on the government gauge kept by Mrs. B. G. Johnson.

#### Moisture .27 of an Inch.

The snow brought moisture totaling .27 of an inch. It was the first wetness of April.
