New Headache For Farmers In Tax Exemptions

Texas farmers will be faced with a new headache in filing their gasoline tax exemptions for refunds after September 1. In recent years wholesale gasoline dealers have for the most part kept records and assisted their customers in making out their gasoline tax exemptions. The first of September dealers will no longer be allowed to make out gasoline tax exemptions. Neither will they be allowed to keep records which might aid farmers in compiling their gasoline tax exemptions for more than seven days.

The new law which effects practically every farmer in this trade territory reads:

"It shall be unlawful for any refund dealer, or any employee thereof, to prepare or notarize any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said dealer, or to act in any capacity as agent or employee of any claimant for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by keeping his books, records, refund claim forms or other documents to be used or intended for use by said claimant in the preparation of his tax refund claim, and the Comptroller shall not approve the payment of any tax refund claim, in whole or in part, in which the claimant has permitted the seller of the motor fuel upon which tax refund is claimed, or any employee of said seller, to prepare, notarize or file his claim for tax refund, or to keep any books, records or documents used in the preparation or filing of said claim. Provided that the Comptroller may, after proper hearing as herein provided, cancel, suspend, or refuse the issuance or reinstatement of the license of any refund dealer who shall prepare or notarize, or who shall permit any employee to prepare or notarize, any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer, or who shall keep, or permit any employee to keep, any duplicate invoice of exemption for more than seven days after it has been duly issued to a purchaser of refund motor fuel.

Any person entitled to file claim for tax refund under the terms of this Article shall file such claim with the Comptroller on a form prescribed by the Comptroller within six months from the date the motor fuel was delivered to him, or from the date the motor fuel was lost, exported or sold to the United States Government, and no refund of tax shall ever be made where it appears from the invoice of exemption, or from the affidavits or other evidence submitted, that the sale or delivery of the motor fuel was made more than six months prior to the date of the refund claim was actually received in the Comptroller's office. The refund claim, with all duplicate invoices of exemption required by law to be issued with the sale of refund motor fuel included as a part of said claim, shall be verified by affidavit of the claimant, or a duly authorized agent of the claimant, and shall show the quantity of refund motor fuel acquired and on hand at the beginning and closing dates of the period covered in the refund claim filed."

"If any claimant was not present when the motor fuel was used for any purpose, except in machines operated upon stationary rails or tracks, the Comptroller may require such additional affidavits as he may deem necessary to prove the correctness of the claim, from persons who were present and used or supervised the using of the refund motor fuel. The claim for tax refund shall include a statement that the information shown in each duplicate invoice of exemption attached to the tax refund claim is true and correct, and that deductions have been made from the tax refund for all motor fuel used on the public highway of Texas and for all motor fuel used or otherwise disposed of in any manner in which a tax refund is not authorized herein. If upon examination and such other investigation as may be deemed necessary, the Comptroller finds that the claim filed for tax refund is just, and that the taxes claimed have actually been paid by the claimant, then he shall issue warrant due the claimant but no greater amount shall be refunded than has been paid into the State Treasury on any motor fuel, and no warrant shall be paid by the State Treasury unless presented for payment within two years from the close of the fiscal year in which such warrant was issued, but claim for the payment of such warrant may be presented to the Legislature for appropriation to be made from which said warrant may be paid."

If the refund motor fuel for which tax refund is claimed was used on a farm or ranch or for any agricultural purpose, the claim shall show the make, model, and year of manufacture of each tractor, combine and other vehicle in which any refund motor fuel included in the claim was used and the actual work performed, showing the different kinds of crops planted and the

Miss Beall To Receive Nurse's Cap

Miss Irene Beall, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Beall, will be among those receiving her Nurse's cap at Baylor University Wednesday night of next week. White organly caps will be placed on the heads of 27 young women students at Baylor University Wednesday night of next week as the first milestone in their chosen career as nurses.

The class is the first to receive their caps in Baylor's new collegiate nurse training program, President W. R. White announces.

Each of the girls will be wearing blue and white checked nurses uniforms with white aprons for the first time when they march across a Baylor Union building platform to receive their caps. The caps will serve as their passport to two years of intensive clinical experience in associated hospitals.

Under the training program launched last September by Baylor School of Nursing, the nursing candidates begin their training with a year of pre-clinical instruction in Baylor laboratories and classrooms. They are a part of the regular student body. Then come the two years of hospital training from which they emerge as registered nurses.

Authorities consider the Baylor collegiate nurse training program as an improvement over the traditional plan in which the student received all her training in a hospital. The revised plan gives the student a broader education both in the sciences and in human understanding.

Baylor's program includes an optional fourth year, taken on the Baylor campus at the close of the hospital period. The nurse, already possessing an R. N., takes advanced work qualifying her for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Mrs. Ruth A. Maxson, chairman of the Administration committee of the Baylor School of Nursing, said that the girls awarded caps will go immediately to receive clinical training at Baylor Hospital in Dallas and Hillcrest Hospital in Waco. They will gain specialized experience also at the Dallas Children's Medical Center, the psychiatric division of John Sealy Hospital in Galveston, and in public health units.

President White will be the speaker at the capping ceremony. Consulting Dean Zora M. Fielder will award the caps and lead the new nurses in the Nightingale Pledge.

Accepting Funds For Families In Flood Zone

Arthur Ross, Chester Guthrie and Mrs. F. L. Yates are accepting contributions from those who wish to contribute to the Red Cross Disaster fund to aid families stricken in the Kansas and Missouri floods.

More than 26,600 families have registered for Red Cross assistance. The rehabilitation phase of this disaster will take several months. The assistance is given on an individual family basis determined by the existing need. The amount of aid given is whatever is found necessary to fill the gap between what a family can do for itself and what can be done to restore that family to normal living. The findings are reviewed by a committee of local citizens. All aid given is an outright gift of the American people and is not a loan. Aid is not given in cash but by direct payment to merchants and to contractors for goods and services necessary to rehabilitate the family.

acreage used or set aside for crop, during the period of the refund claim, and showing complete information of all other work performed by each such tractor, combine or other vehicle used by the claimant during the period of the claim. The claim shall likewise show the make, kind and horse-power of each stationary engine or motor in which refund motor fuel was used by the claimant and the purpose for which it was used, and if any of the motor fuel included in the claim was used other than in the operation of motors or engines, the claim shall show complete information as to the manner of use and the purpose for which the motor fuel was used. The claim shall also state the number of automobile, trucks, pick-ups and other licensed vehicles operated regularly by the claimant or his employees, on or in connection with the farm, ranch or other agricultural project, and shall show name and address of the dealer or dealers from whom taxable motor fuel was purchased during the period of the claim.

Small Grain Dealers Fight Diseases



An educational program to fight diseases of small grains is being conducted this fall in Texas by agricultural leaders. The objective of the campaign is to reduce the annual losses which small grain producers suffer because of seed borne disease and from planting seed that is mixed with weeds or other undesirable plants.

Proper seed treatment with a seed disinfectant can reduce the effects of seed borne diseases. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is taking an active part in the campaign and your local county agent can supply information on how best to do the seed treating job. In view

of the great need for the continued high production of all grain crops and the shortage of manpower on the farms of the state, it is highly important that all known steps be taken that can mean yields with the least amount of labor. Planting clean and treated seed will help.

Proposed Tax Would Boost Car Prices

If Congress enacts into law the proposed increase in excise taxes on new cars, passed by the House last month, the price of automobiles will rise about \$50, O. L. McMinn, area chairman of the National Automobile Dealers association states. The bill lowers non-automotive tax levies and raises automotive levies 7 to 10 per cent.

In order to raise treasury revenues by \$412 million car and truck owners would be taxed an additional \$502 million more annually than under current rates. Car dealers do not object to the reduction in manufacturer's excises on non-automotive products but object to increasing the obviously discriminatory excises which will be paid by car buyers.

It is estimated that taxes take from 24 to 28 cents of every automobile dollar and, in the case of gasoline, amount to about one-third of the retail price.

Olaf Lee Woods, charged with theft of wheat from the Riffe elevator at Stevens in November of 1947, was brought to Stratford from Denver, Colorado by Sheriff A. L. Wilson Thursday of last week.

Woods served three years and twenty-seven days in the penitentiary at Canon City, Colorado on charges of wheat thefts in Colorado. Sheriff Wilson picked up Woods when he was paroled and took him to Denver, Colorado where an extradition hearing was conducted.

The Family Farm's Future

A County wide meeting of all farmers, businessmen and representatives of civic organizations, churches and schools has been called by the Sherman County Agricultural Mobilization Committee. This meeting will be held in the courthouse at Stratford on Wednesday, August 22nd at 2:00 P. M. The purpose of this meeting is to present the various agricultural programs, such as Cooperative Extension Service, Production and Marketing Administration, Soil Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration, Rural Electrification Administration and others, for discussion of changes necessary to make the program more attractive for family farming. The family farm is defined in the following paragraph:

"A family farm or ranch is one which provides the main source of income for the farm family, on which the farm operator (owner or tenant) or members of his family make more of the management decisions, participate regularly in farm work, and normally supply a substantial part of the labor needed to operate the farm."

This should not be interpreted to mean that the family farm or ranch would be restricted to a certain number of acres of farming altogether, but that particular farm from which the operator places his main interest and derives his main source of income. Measured in acreage, family farms or ranches differ in size, even within a farming area, influenced by the crops and livestock produced and the productivity of the land. In fact, one characteristic of family farming is its adaptability to changing patterns of production. Another is that the home activities of the family are combined operation of the farm. The family farm builds strong communities, communities where tolerance cooperation, self-reliance and a love of freedom thrive. Much of the national emphasis on family farming has been directed toward increasing the opportunities for farm families to operate successful family farms. It is felt that this type of farming is what is necessary to strengthen agriculture in America.

Constructive criticism of any part of the farm program in general is invited and recommendations will be received from all who attend this meeting who wish to revise the farm programs to accomplish the purpose outlined above in strengthening of the farm programs.

The mobilization committee, composed of PMA committees: R. C. Buckles, H. O. Folsom and The Oldaker County Agent E. Goule, Home Demonstration Agent Dorothy Dixon, SCS Representative E. L. Seitz, FHA Representative J. R. Roan, Jr., Vocational Agricultural Teacher Duard Lamb, and Veterans Agricultural teacher Richard Wilson, would appreciate constructive criticism and recommendations prior to the meeting to be held the 22nd. This information is being requested by the Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan and it is believed that all recommendations will be given full consideration by the various departments in revision of their programs.

There will be no "brass-hats" at this meeting, just a group of farmers and "hired hands." It is the sincere intention of the Secretary of Agriculture that this meeting be held in the atmosphere of the "Main Street Bench Warmers Meeting" usually held just after a meeting where businessmen, farmers and the man on the street discuss in detail the farm program and make their recommendations or remedies to strengthen the program, but without any official action recorded. This is the farmer's program and they must be conscious of their responsibility during this National effort to increase farm production. This is your opportunity to talk over these problems and give sound and practical advice in making the farm program operate economically in the national effort to reach maximum efficiency in agricultural production.



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3

proposing an amendment to Section 48-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. The Section III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 48-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.
"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

FOR the Amendment to Section 48-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

AGAINST the Amendment to Section 48-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result, and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties

shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said

election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system

for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor there-

of.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37
proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the state of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:
"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution"; and
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

New Texas Tax Law

Effective September 1st

Will Make It Unlawful for Gasoline Dealers To Keep Any Tax Exemption Papers Longer than 7 Days, Or To Make Out

Gasoline Tax Claims

For Their Customers

If Exemptions are not signed and picked up, dealers will be forced to mail them to their customers.

The New Law Reads:

"It shall be unlawful for any refund dealer, or any employee thereof, to prepare or notarize any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer, or to act in any capacity as agent or employee of any claimant for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by keeping his books, records, refund claim forms or other documents to be used or intended for use by said claimant in the preparation of his tax refund claim, and the Comptroller shall not approve the payment of any tax refund claim, in whole or in part, in which the claimant has permitted the seller of the motor fuel upon which tax refund is claimed, or any employee of said seller, to prepare, notarize, or file his claim for tax refund, or to keep any books, records or documents used in the preparation or filing of said claim. Provided that the Comptroller may, after proper hearing as herein provided, cancel, suspend, or refuse the issuance or reinstatement of the license of any refund dealer who shall prepare or notarize, or who shall permit any employee to prepare or notarize, any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by the claimant thereof, or who shall keep, or permit any employee to keep, any duplicate invoice of exemption for more than seven (7) days after it has been duly issued to a purchaser of refund motor fuel."



Christians and Law

Lesson for August 19, 1951

AMERICANS are not noted for their respect for law. Sometimes big business is the reason. In a certain southern state there are two countries through which run some main highways. But tourists are well advised to stay away from there, because the roads have been pounded into a mass of potholes by overloaded coal trucks operating at high speeds and often on the wrong side of the road. Now the state has laws against overloading trucks; it has laws against speeding. There is an honest state police department. But although various arrests have been made, the head of the police department reports that in those two counties they never yet have been able to secure a single conviction in the courts. Why?

Who Is to Blame? SOMETIMES politics is to blame. That is to say, a man wants to get, or to hold, office, so eagerly that he will ignore or defy the law in order to keep his little place in the sun.

There is another county where a policeman shot a law-breaker resisting arrest and attempting to shoot the officer. The county judge tried to make three successive grand juries indict the policeman, but after looking into the facts they all refused.

Here was the interesting spectacle of a judge on the bench (elected there) trying to make the law work against itself, trying to force a grand jury to indict an innocent man. The thing was, the policeman was from out of the county, but the man he killed, being a bootlegger, had many friends who were also friends of the judge.

We Get What We Deserve BUT we can't blame big business, or mean politics, for the lawlessness of America. If individuals respected the law, if every man respected the law just as he wants others to respect it, we could handle business and we could get rid of dishonest politicians.

An official high in federal circles, who had had plenty of opportunity to observe, remarked last spring, speaking of controls, that every one wants the other man controlled, everybody wants to control somebody else, but nobody wants to be controlled.

That's just the trouble. We can make all the laws we please, but so long as we are the kind of people who will not respect a law if it cramps our own style, then we need not be surprised at the sort of thing a senate crime committee digs up.

No Government Is Perfect MANY of us try to excuse ourselves by saying that the government is inefficient or even crooked, and that the laws are unfair. Christians, certainly, can see very easily the failings of both government and law. But Christians ought to be the very persons to set the example of respect for law and government.

Consider the New Testament. Hardly a single Christian mentioned in that book had the least thing to do with making the laws of those times. The government was from the top down, the exact opposite of democratic. None of the early Christians could vote or hold office.

The government, whether in Palestine or in Rome, was in non-Christian hands. The laws lacked a good deal of being wholly just and fair. Nevertheless, Jesus and Paul and Peter, all of whom suffered from the laws of their times, urged men to pay tribute (taxes) to Caesar, to support the magistrates, to obey the laws. Even a selfish, money-hungry and often cruel government like that of Rome deserved support. Jesus and Paul alike remind us that we rely on government for protection; that government, in spite of all exceptions, is on the side of good men, not against them.

If we had no government we should miss it and want it. St. Peter, writing to Christians who were actually being persecuted by the government, urged them nevertheless to be loyal to the authorities. There may come times—indeed, human nature being what it is, such times are bound to come—when a government proves so corrupt and unjust that it deserves to fall; but even then the way out is not the way of lawlessness. Reforms come best from the law-abiding, not the law-defying.





Real Estate Bargains Awaited Early Settlers

Soaring real estate prices serve to remind Americans that the early bird gets the bargain.

Peter Minuit's famous \$24 purchase of Manhattan Island is only one example of the good "buys" available when the country was young.

Director Minuit's successor, Wouter Van Twiller, also got his money's worth when he gave a band of Indians about \$1.65 worth of presents in exchange for 172-acre Governor's Island in New York Harbor. Staten Island, too was bought from Indians in 1631 for "certain parcels of goods."

Christopher Columbus started it all with an investment in ships estimated by various authorities at from \$16,000 to \$75,000, of which Columbus himself is said to have contributed the equivalent of 2,000.

William Penn received in 1681 most all of the present state of Pennsylvania as payment for a loan of 16,000 British pounds made by his father, Admiral Sir William Penn, to King Charles II of England. At current exchange rates, this sum amounts to \$44,000. In later years his descendants were paid eight times that much by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for their interests and were permitted to keep their private estates. Penn also was required to pay the king two beaver skins on January 1 each year, plus one-fifth of all gold and silver ore found within his territory.

For the province of Maryland, Lord Baltimore had to deliver

two Indian arrows yearly to Windsor Castle, plus a fifth of gold and silver ores.

Early transactions shifted ownership of the present state of New Jersey several times. Charles II originally granted the area to his brother, the Duke of York, who decided it to John Lord Berkeley and Sir George Carteret as joint proprietors. In 1674 Berkeley sold West Jersey for 1,000 pounds (\$2,800) to two Quakers named John Fenwick and Edward Byltings. The executors of Carteret's will sold East Jersey at public auction in 1682 to William Penn and a number of associates for

3,400 pounds (\$9,520).

Half interest in the state of Maine, as represented by a royal grant to Sir Ferdinando Gorges, was bought from his heirs by the state of Massachusetts in 1677 for 1,250 pounds (\$3,500).

When the United States bought Louisiana Territory from Napoleon in 1803, the country got a lot for its money. The price of \$15,000,000 averaged out to less than three cents an acre for the 827,000 square miles. Subsequently, the Federal Government paid nearly a billion dollars to compensate Indian tribes for their lands in the territory.




