## Ernest Goule At Convention In Memphis

Ernest Goule, Sherman County Agricultural Agent, was awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents at its 36th annual convention held in Memphis, Tennessee this week. Presentation was made by Horace Abbott, County Agent, Indianapolis, Indiana, and chairman of NACAA's Distinguished Service Committee. The awarding of the Distinguished Service certificate was a feature of the banquet program Wednesday evening.

Nominations for the Distinguished Service Award are made by State or Region County Agent Associations which are affiliated with the National Association. Final approval on all nominations is given by the National Association Committee. State Associations are limited in their nominations to 3% of their membership in any one year.

To be eligible the nominee should have served a total of ten years as a county agent or assistant county agent. Mr. Goule has served as a county agent since 1934.

County agents who are nominated must be actively interested in the improvement of the profession of county agricultural agents. He should participate in the affairs of his local association and constructively support its program. Another qualification is that the nominee shall have pursued some definite means to improve his ability to do the job as County Agent.

Mrs. Flemings injuries were the most serious. The car is considered a total loss.

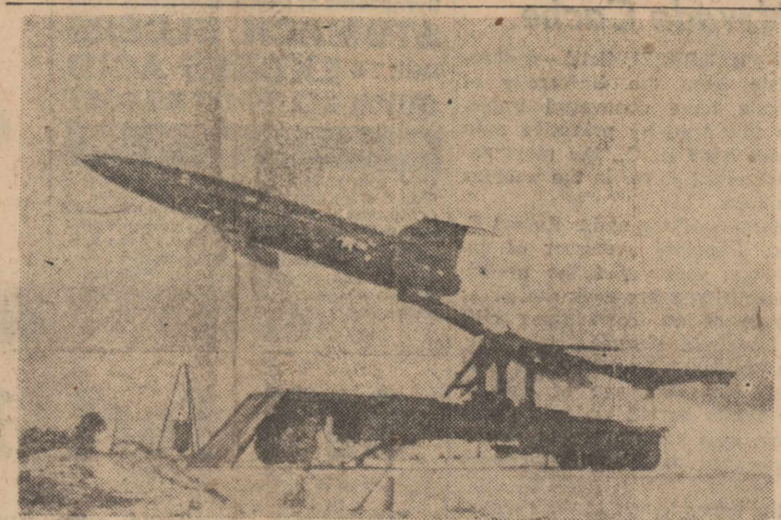
## Wheat Belt Receives Moisture

Youths from 67,732 farm homes and 21,146 non-farm homes participated in 4-H club work last year. Valuable contributions to community improvement were made by 2,308 4-H clubs in Texas.

Plans for observing 4-H achievement week include luncheons, banquets and other special county events at which 4-H club members and local leaders will be guests and speakers. Service clubs, farm organizations and other adult groups are planning events at which young people and local leaders will tell of their club's programs and accomplishments.

In addition to regular demonstrations, Texas 4-H boys and girls received training in fire and accident prevention, forestry, health, recreation and leadership, wildlife conservation and other worthwhile activities, reports Lynch.

Clothing, field crops, food preservation and preparation, forestry, garden and orchard management, home grounds beautification, home management and improvement, livestock and poultry were included in 4-H demonstration.

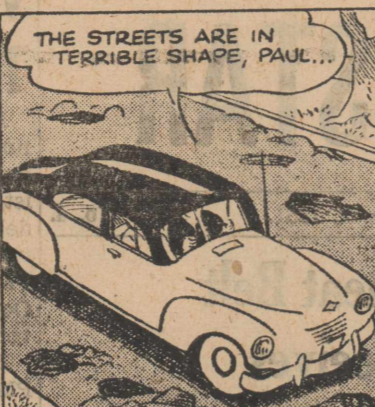

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### 7,000-Year-Old Spear Discovered In Nevada Cache

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif.—Anthropologists from the University of California have uncovered implements fashioned by primitive man in about 5,000 B. C., the most ancient reported so far in the western hemisphere.

Students working under Robert F. Heizer, associate professor of anthropology, discovered the prehistoric cache in a dry dock shelter at the base of an overhanging cliff near Lovelock, Nevada.

The "carbon 14" method was used to determine the age of wooden spear shafts buried under deposits of rock, dust and bat guano. Their age was fixed at 7,300 to 9,000 years old.

In the upper layers at the excavation site, the archeologists found basket and arrow fragments of relatively recent origin, dating back from about 2,500 years.

Lake gravels at the bottom of the site were estimated to be 25,000 years old.

From these findings and a survey of other sites in the area, scientists now believe that most of western Nevada was once covered by a fresh glacial lake about 600 feet deep.

Heizer said the area was first occupied by man between 7,000 and 9,000 years ago after the lake had receded and then was abandoned because of a dry weather cycle.

The evidence shows that the section was not occupied again until 2,500 or 3,000 years ago, Heizer said. He said the inhabitants who lived in the area during the later period were ancestors of the Piute Indians, but the identity of the earliest group was not known.

Oysters nine inches long were common along the American coast at the time the Pilgrims first settled. Some that size are still found but they are usually of the wild type rather than the cultivated oyster developed by "farming" underwater. In taste appeal they are both tops.

### Science Discovers Oldest Known Village in World

CHICAGO, Ill.—Science has discovered the oldest known village site in the world.

It is a block square village site in northeastern Iraq that is little more than a mound of dirt—called Jarmo. Chicago scientists, who tested samples from the village on their atomic calendar report it is about 7,000 years old—the oldest known village site.

An expedition from the University of Chicago's oriental institute will go there this winter to search for evidence of "the first great economic revolution in human history."

Robert J. Braidwood, associate professor of old world pre-history and anthropology, said diggers expect to find evidence of town planning—the first row houses and walls known to history.

A representative of the Iran government stumbled onto the site in 1948. Scientists made a preliminary examination of the site three years ago, finding wheat and barley grains, utensils for grinding them, flint tools and snail shells.

Chemical analysis of the amount of radioactive carbon 14 in the snail shells fixed the age of the site. All living things absorb radioactive carbon from the atmosphere in the growing and living process. This halts when the plant or creature dies and the carbon 14 then starts losing its radioactivity at a known rate.

Railroad workers are represented by 23 standard unions. By mutual agreement, 20 of these unions—comprising about 1,200,000 men, or more than 90%—are working under wages and rules agreed to by them and the railroads. But leaders of three unions—with only about 130,000 men, or less than 10%—still refuse, after more than a year of negotiations, to accept similar wage and rules agreements. These are even more favorable than the terms recommended by the Emergency Board appointed by the President.

**Yes, it certainly seems to be finally about time that the leaders of the three unions stop their delaying tactics—their quibbling. But the leaders of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors continue to refuse. They continue a course of dillying and dallying. It is definitely time to**

# END THIS QUIBBLING!

On June 15, 1950, an Emergency Board appointed by the President under the terms of the Railway Labor Act—an Act largely fathered by the unions themselves—made its recommendations on certain wage and working conditions ("rules" in railroad language) which had been in dispute between employees and the railroads.

**More Than 90% of Employees Accept**

Since then, terms equal to or better than the Board recommendations have been accepted by about 1,200,000 railroad employees—more than 90% of the total of all workers. They are represented by 20 of the 23 standard railroad unions.

**Less Than 10% Refuse**

But three unions—with about 130,000 men, or less than 10% of the total—have refused to accept, even after months of negotiations. These three unions are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors. These are three of the so-called "operating" unions. Already the highest paid men in the industry, their leaders demand still further advantages over other workers.

In all, there are about 270,000 operating employees. But not all of them, by any means, are represented by BLE, BLF&E, or ORC. As a matter of fact, less than half—132,000 to be exact—are in these three unions. More than half—about 140,000—are in other unions, principally the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. What makes the whole situation so hard to understand is that these 140,000 operating employees are working under wages and rules which the leaders of the other 130,000 say they cannot agree to.

**What Do the Railroads Offer?**

They offer these three unions the same settlement which was contained in a Memorandum of Agreement signed at the White House on December 21, 1950, by four brotherhoods and the railroads. Later these brotherhoods sought to repudiate this agreement. But on May 25, 1951, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen signed a complete agreement carrying out the

principles of the Memorandum Agreement of December 21. They have been working under this agreement since May 25.

**What About Wages?**

Under the terms of the agreement, yard engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving a wage increase of \$.34 an hour (\$2.72 a day) and road engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving an increase of 19 1/2 cents an hour (\$1.56 per day). Large sums of retroactive pay have already accrued and if the agreement is carried out, will be paid promptly.

**What About "Cost of Living" Increases?**

The White House Agreement includes an "escalator" clause under which wages will be geared to changes in the Government's cost-of-living index. Two such increases—April and July, 1951—have already been paid to the 90% of railroad employees covered by signed agreements.

**What About the 40-Hour Week?**

The White House Agreement calls for the establishment of the 40-hour week in principle, for employees in yard service. The employees can have it any time after January 1, 1952, provided the manpower situation is such that the railroads can get enough men to perform the work with reasonable regularity at straight time rates. If the parties do not agree on the question of availability of manpower, the White House Agreement provides arbitration by a referee appointed by the President.

**What Else Do the Union Leaders Demand?**

The continued quibbling of the leaders of the three unions has to do principally with

rules changes, which have already been agreed to by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. Of these, the principal one seems to be that having to do with so-called "interdivisional service"—runs which take in two or more seniority districts.

The union leaders would bar progress and efficiency in the industry, and better service to the public, by maintaining a situation where they can arbitrarily stop a railroad from establishing such interdivisional runs. The carriers propose that if a railroad wishes to set up an interdivisional run, the railroad and the unions should try to agree on such run and the conditions which should surround its establishment, and if the railroad and the unions can't agree, the matter will be submitted to arbitration.

But the three union leaders still refuse.

**Rules Can Be Arbitrated**

The railroads have not only offered these three unions the same rules agreed to by the BRT and covered by the White House Agreement, but have even agreed to submit such rules to arbitration.

**The Industry Pattern Is Fixed**

With the pattern so firmly established in the railroad industry, it seems fair to suggest that the leaders of BLE, BLF&E, and ORC stop their quibbling and take action to make the railroad labor picture 100% complete. Certainly today's economic and international situation calls for a united front. And certainly no good reason has been advanced why these three unions should be preferred over all other railroad employees.

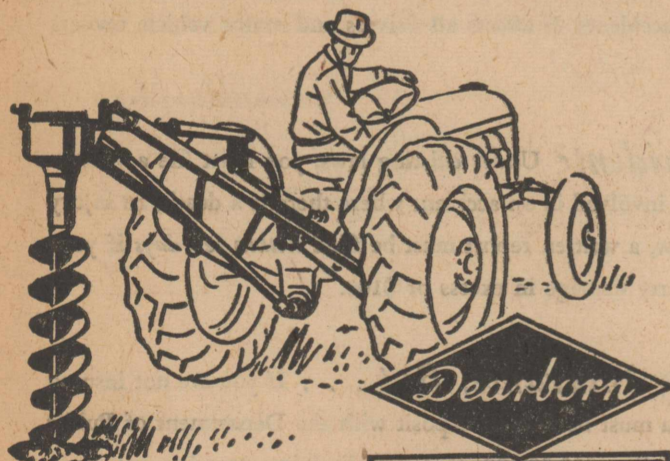

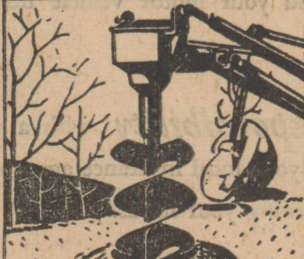

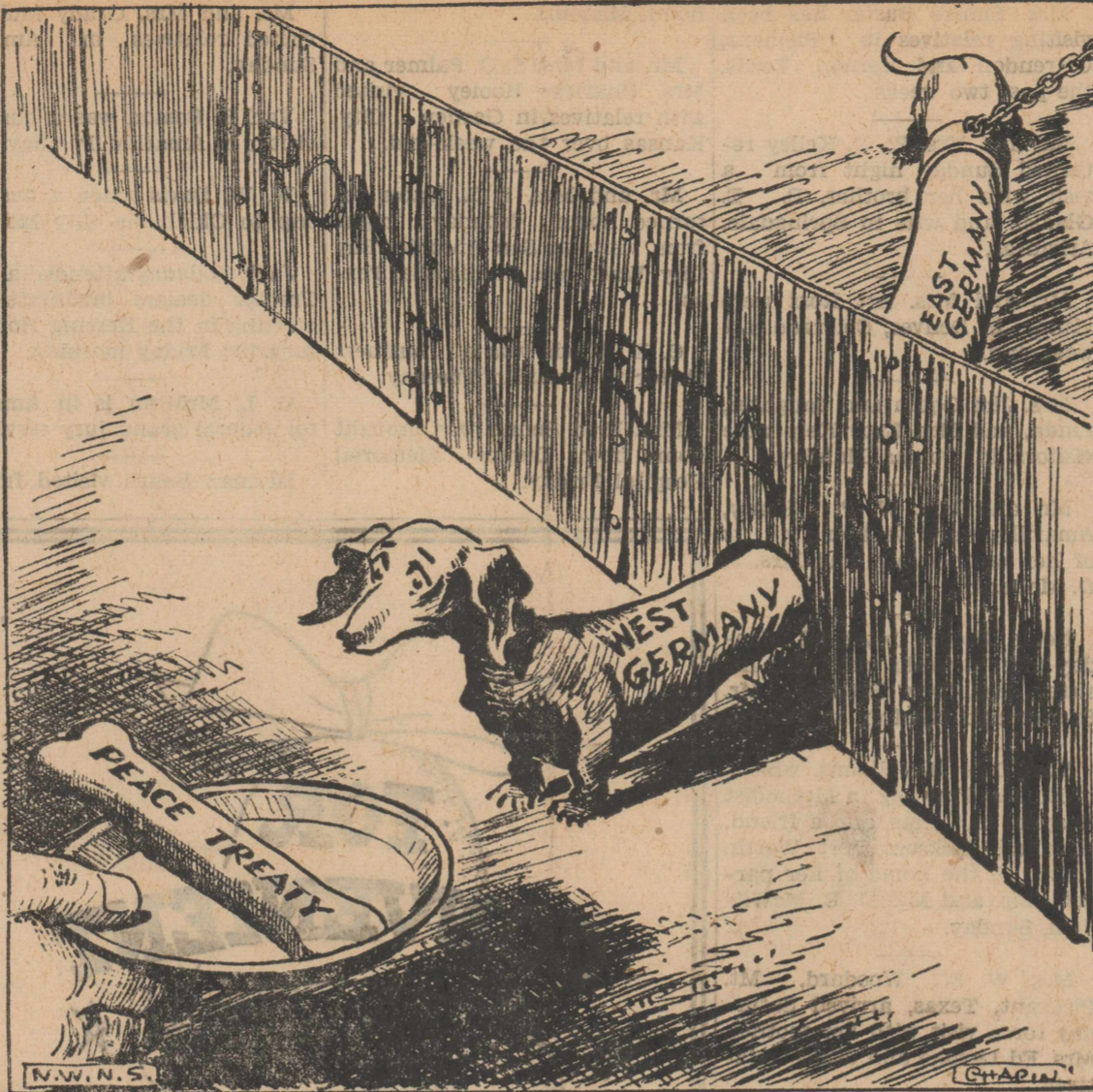

## Oklahoma City Police Let Violators Charge Tickets

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. — It sounds crazy, but the Oklahoma City police department has opened charge accounts for some of its most frequent parking law violators. The new system is not for the ordinary automobile driver, however. The system is for commercial vehicle fleets. At the end of each month the companies pay the accumulated fines by check.

Companies that wish to open charge accounts supply the department with a list of their license numbers. The department keeps a ledger for each company and lists violations with tag numbers so employers can tell which driver is breaking the law.

The plan has proved popular with both delivery services and car rental companies, which no longer find their cars impounded for tickets they didn't know they had received.

As one manager remarked, "I'd rather pay an occasional dollar than have my drivers waste a lot of time hunting for parking places."

Traffic Lt. Tom Simpson said the service is run "on a strictly business basis." "It's no crime to get a parking ticket," he explained. "Some of the best people get them. We figure they may as well pay for them like the public pays for other things—on credit."

## Bushman, Famous Gorilla, Dies At Chicago Zoo

CHICAGO, Ill. — Bushman, the most famous gorilla in the world, died recently at Lincoln park zoo in Chicago. He had been the single biggest attraction at any Chicago zoo for the last 20 years.

He came to the zoo when he was two and weighed 38 pounds. He had been captured in French Cameroon country of West Africa. The zoo paid \$3,500 for him.

Zoo officials said the big animal was a showman, that he liked crowds and they seemed to stimulate him. He weighed 550 pounds and was six feet, two inches tall when he died.

Some three million persons a year went to see Bushman. He was as widely known—some would say better known—in Chicago than the mayor or any other citizen.

Zoo veterinarians said the great ape died of a heart attack.

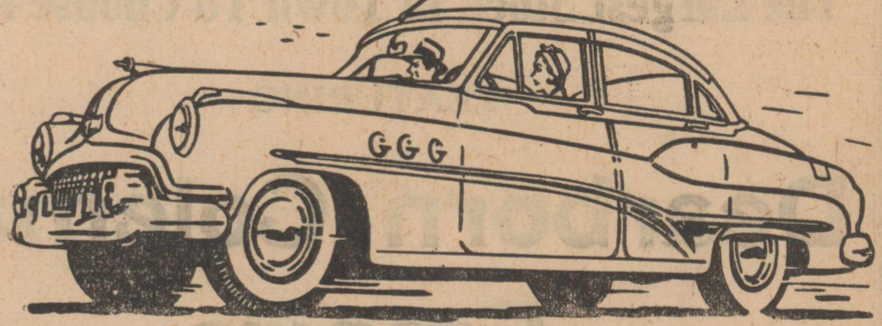

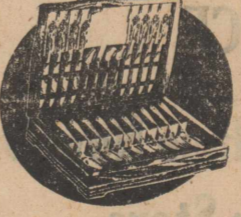

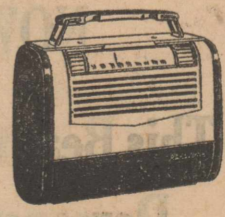

**Devotional Gems**

(By N. D. Carter)  
 "Jesus, when he had cried again with a loud voice, yielded up the ghost. And behold, the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom." (Matthew 27: 50-51).  
 First let us notice how the veil

was torn (rent). It was not from the bottom to the top, but from the top to the bottom which meant that man could not have torn it, but that God had torn it for the top of the veil was too high for a man to reach. When it was torn, it was the same as opening a door to a room. The veil was the inner curtain which divided the holy place from the holy of holies. According to the Law of Moses, there was only one who could enter into the holy of holies. This was the high priest and he went in to make the blood sacrifice which was the atonement

for the souls of Israel. Through this manner did the high priest come into the presence of God for all Israel. The blood offering was a picture of the bloodshed of Christ. The holy of holies was the picture of God's presence. And the ark of the covenant and the mercy seat which was inside the holy of holies was a picture of Christ. The action of the priest was the picture of salvation. So when Christ Jesus died and fulfilled the law, the veil was rent and the door was opened so that every man was then responsible for himself. There is not a priest nor anyone else that can bring us into the presence of God today. The door to his presence has been opened and every person must attend to his own salvation. It is not mothers' prayers, nor atonement nor intervention by priesthood, but the blood of Christ that can bring us before the presence of God. Christ made eternal atonement and all we have to do is accept it as sufficient for ourselves.

**Minute Meditation**

(By Ferguson C. Pollycutt)  
 One of the most exquisite pieces of writing in our New Testament is that little book of Philemon. It is a short letter, beautiful in its simplicity and completeness, written by Paul during his imprisonment in Rome.

The main interest of the letter concerns a run-away slave of Philemon, by the name of Onesimus. Philemon had become a Christian while Paul had visited in his home at Collosae. It was there that this slave had waited upon Paul; and had come to love him. And now that Paul was in prison, Onesimus had run away from his master; and had journeyed to Rome to be of service to him.

Paul, knowing how serious was the offence of violating the code governing slaves in any detail, was stirred to the bottom of his heart. There were intense personal values at stake. He loved this slave; and yet he hesitated to send him back to be beaten and perhaps killed. But, at the same time, he also loved the slaves master, Philemon; and he had no right to interfere with his slave. And so he wrote this letter; and sent Onesimus back home to his master with it.

Paul asked Philemon, because of love for himself and Christ, not to inflict the penalty for run-away slaves; but to receive Onesimus with forgiveness and love. Paul really put Philemon's newly-acquired faith to the test in suggesting that he even take him back as a brother!

Paul realized that it is impossible to make a man good. He knew that an imposed goodness is not real goodness. Even so long ago, that great Apostle of our Lord was cognizant of the truth we understand only too well today, that the imposition of authority subtracts from personality!

Paul is saying to Philemon, and herein lies our thought for today, "I want to make your faith effectual!" "I want your faith to accomplish something!" And that is the "Essence of Faith", that it works! This is

the acid test of faith! We confess so readily our belief in "The Brotherhood of Man;" and yet our belief is exhibited or disproved by the way we put our faith into action! Our faith demands a total response. We do not do anything unless the whole man does it!  
 Do you have faith in Christ? If your answer is in the affirmative, then you will do what He says!  
 Is your faith "showing" today?

Kaesong Once Center Of Korean Power

Kaesong, the site accepted for truce talks between UN and Red Chinese-Korean leaders, is in line to pick up again a long lost historic spotlight.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS International Uniform Sunday School Lessons BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

God and a Man

Lesson for November 4, 1951

WHEN God created this world he did it by himself. Since that time, where affairs of this planet are concerned, when God wants to do something for mankind or for a man, he seldom does it alone. When God wants to feed a city he feeds it by the innumerable hands of farmers, merchants, carriers of cargo the world around. When God wants children cured of diphtheria he does so—with the help of the men who discovered and perfected diphtheria anti-toxin.



Doubtless God could work alone; but just as doubtless, he seldom does. Even when God wants to split a granite cliff in the wilderness, he does not use a magic axe; he uses things we can see: the frost-crystals and the sunshine. . . .

God's Man for God's Work

THIS is also the story the Bible tells. Centuries ago there were some thousands of slaves in Egypt, Hebrew slaves, descended from the free man Abraham. God, we are told, wanted those slaves set free. How would you have expected God to do it? If God is all-powerful, if he can do just anything he wants to do, and he wants these men set free, how will he do it? Will he reach down a mighty hand and lift them as you might lift a handful of the smallest ants, and set them down on some bit of free soil far away from Egypt? Will he send an army of angels to batter down the fortresses of Egypt, destroy her armed forces and set his people free?

Let us waste no time arguing whether God could or could not do such things. Let us assume that he could. The point is: he did not. He called a man, a man named Moses. Already Moses had gone through a long life, and perhaps he thought of himself as at the end of his trail. If Moses had been asked, he might even have said that all his life's experiences had gone for nothing. But God knew better. God knew that everything that had formed Moses' mind and character—his family, his training and education, even the long lonely years as scout and shepherd at the back of beyond,—everything in his past life was to be useful in the most important part of his life that still lay ahead. For God's work, Moses was God's man. . . .

Moses Has Many Opposite Numbers

JUST as Moses was God's personal agent in liberating the slaves from Egypt, so down through the centuries Moses has had his "opposite numbers"—men and women who have brought to pass what (religious persons find reason to believe) God intends to bring to pass. God wanted the good news about Jesus to be spread throughout the world. But this has come to pass only as Paul and a long line of missionaries have gone through one country after another with the message of God. God wanted the records of Jesus' life, or at least some facts about Jesus and his teachings, put down in writing and not left to men's memories. . . .

But he did not write the Gospels—he inspired certain men to write them. God wanted the Christian world, in our time, to awake to the "open sore of Africa" and to send missionaries to that dark continent. . . .

But he chose a man, David Livingstone, to do this for him. Wilberforce was God's agent for freeing the slaves of Great Britain, as Lincoln and many another were in America. . . .

God's Ways Are Not Always Understood

IT is easier to say these things 17 years or centuries after the event than at the time they happen. Moses at first could not believe he was the man God wanted; tried in fact to talk God out of it. Jeremiah doubted whether he should ever have been a prophet. Lincoln often had moods of the blackest. John Calvin sat up half the night in a Geneva boarding house giving Pastor Farel all the good reasons why he, Calvin, could never be a suitable man for the very job in which he became a famous hero. . . . Even God's own man sometimes does not realize his greatness. But God knows! And in time we all do. 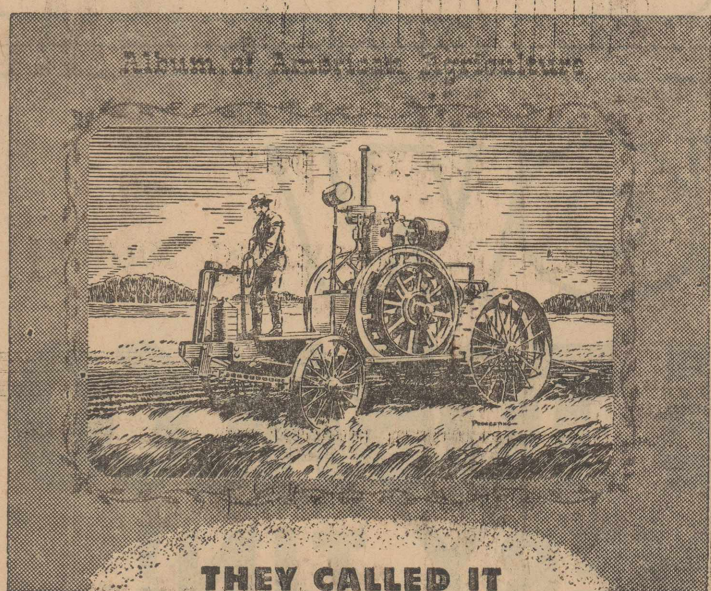
