#### Pennsylvania Discovers **Draft Records of 1777**

HARRISBURG, Pa.-Records of what is believed to be the nation's first draft were found recently by state officials digging into old state records. Auditor General Weldon B. Heyburn said the records are contained in a book entitled "Appeals," dated July 2, 1777, covering mostly Philadelphia draft

The book, of handmade paper and bound in cardboard, contains, in the original handwriting of the appeal agents, the action taken on men who were drafted into the Pennsylvania militia during the Revolutionary War.

Heyburn said draft exemptions in those days were for much the same reasons as today. He said. however, there was one notable exception in draft policy. Men called up for duty could hire sub-



The wild turkey's forbidding countenance and incredibly tender flesh seemed from the start to symbolize the country they found; a country whose stern and forbidding forests, tumbled mountains and endless plains hid richness unsuspected.

For it was a country that beckoned the brave and laughed at the weak — a land that placed great premium on courage and skill — wilderness waiting to be reclaimed only by strength and by steel. By the axe and the plow and the steel rail; the locomotive, the tractor, the machine.

And always with the American went the gun. For as the silent wilderness had concealed the threat of savage and serpent, so the uncovering of its wealth bred new dangers and the need for defense against them; the tyrant in a hundred guises who sought to make the rewards of other men's labor his own. And so the right to keep and bear arms became fundamental to the American. The steel of his tools and of his weapons alike have reflected the bright metal of his own spirit.

These are the symbols of the day we celebrate; of the peculiarly American holiday we call Thanksgiving. These are the symbols of American freedom. Of its inspiration and its attainment; of its rich reward and its price. These are our hallmarks; the tokens of our creed and destiny, the things we stand for: Faith in God. Zeal and achievement. The pot of gold at rainbow's end. Abiding love of country.





He says that he finds the external order achieved is an invaluable help in establishing order and clearing his mind in connection with his problems. Then he takes a walk, gets out in the open and breathes the invigorating fresh air. After that, his mind cleared, he tackles his problems with far greater success than he once could have thought possible through such a simple process.



His second principle of overcoming worry and fear over his affairs is to go mountain climbing. Once he considered a mountain too formidable; even a steep, hilly city discouraged him. Then one day he met a woman in a street in San Francisco, that city of steep hills. She appeared desperate as she stood and gazed upward, contemplating reaching the top by no other means than her own two feet.

Dr. Gabriel went to her and suggested that she practice taking just a few steps at a time, then stopping to breathe deeply and rest for a moment or two. She agreed, and they arrived at the top together with no more acceleration of heartbeats than if they had walked on level ground. You see, it was only one step at a time that they had to take. "And," says Dr. Gabriel, "one step at a time enables anyone to climb the steepest mountain without any greater effort than walking on a level road."















#### Peanut Butter Bait



Here's how: With a sharpened eye pencil, use casual, easy strokes to draw a line just above the lashes to the corner of the eye or a little beyond it.
