

Blood Bank Drive Set For November 28

Wednesday, November 28, has been set as the day for Sherman County blood donors to make a mass donation to the Sherman County supply in the Potter County Blood Bank. Sherman County's reserve was exhausted by transfusions about three months ago.

Those who will make a donation of blood are requested to register with Chester Guthrie at the Southwestern Public Service office. According to plans the blood donor delegation will leave the American Legion Hall in Stratford at 8:00 A. M. Wednesday, November 28.

Those desiring to join in the blood donor drive who may not wish to drive to Stratford before going to Amarillo will find the group at the Potter County Blood Bank located at 1409 West Eighth Street in Amarillo.

The Sherman County blood reserve in the Potter County Blood Bank has been maintained through efforts of the Sherman County Post of the American Legion. Blood donations may be made at any time and the proper credit will be given in the blood bank when those taking the blood are informed the donors are from Sherman County.

The blood reserve has proven a great asset to the people of this section in that it has enabled sick and injured to secure blood transfusions without loss of time in securing donors after the blood is needed.

County Civil Defense Work Is Started

Mrs. Oma Ellison, Mrs. I. D. Wall, Mrs. Emil Blanck and Miss Dorothy Dixon met Monday afternoon to lay plans for a Civilian Defense training program.

Goals selected included a training course in first aid, blood typing of every individual in the county, and a training course in home nursing.

Training programs will include training for survival in case of atomic attack. Six precautions for surviving an atomic attack are:

1. Try to get shielded. If you have time, get down in a basement or subway. Should you unexpectedly be caught out of doors, seek shelter alongside a building, or jump in any handy ditch or gutter.

2. Drop flat on ground or floor. To keep from being tossed about and to lessen the chances of being struck by falling and flying objects, flatten out at the base of a wall, or at the bottom of a bank.

3. Bury your face in your arms when you drop flat, hide your eyes in the crook of your elbow. That will protect your face from flash burns, prevent temporary blindness and keep flying objects out of your eyes.

4. Never lose your head. Don't rush outside right after a bombing. After an air burst, wait a few minutes then go help fight fires. After other kinds of bursts wait at least one hour to give lingering radiation some chance to die down.

5. Don't take chances with food or water in open containers. To prevent radioactive poisoning or disease, select your food and water with care. When there is reason to believe they may be contaminated stick to canned and bottled things if possible.

6. Don't start rumors. In the confusion that follows a bombing, a single rumor might touch off a panic that could cost your life.

County PMA Committee Elected

In the county convention held Friday in Stratford, R. C. Buckles was re-elected chairman of the Sherman County Production and Marketing Administration Committee. Hoyse A. Carter was elected vice-chairman; and Bob Evans the regular member. Joy Smith and Bill Harland were named alternate members. The committeemen will take office December 1.

The committeemen, elected by delegates from each farming community in Sherman County, will administer the 1952 agricultural conservation program, price support operations, the Federal Crop Insurance, all of which are geared to the Nation's defense production efforts.

The committeemen are all farmers who are familiar with conservation and production problems in Sherman County. The county PMA office is located at the courthouse.

The services of the committeemen are available to all the farmers in the county. Although they are not full-time employees of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, they are available at any time to help the farmers of Sherman County with conservation, price support and crop insurance problems.

In the words of R. C. Buckles, PMA committee chairman, "In these times when so much depends on the production from our farms, these committeemen are in key positions. The Agricultural Conservation Program they administer is available to all farmers in the county to help them produce what is needed for defense and at the same time protect and improve their land for abundant production in the years to come."

"The price support programs help farmers of Sherman County obtain a fair price for what they produce."

"The committeemen are all farmers. They were elected by farmers and they are here to serve the farmers of Sherman County. At the same time the programs PMA committeemen administer are designed to benefit the entire country. The purpose is ample production today and continued production tomorrow."

Pennsylvania Discovers Draft Records of 1777

HARRISBURG, Pa.—Records of what is believed to be the nation's first draft were found recently by state officials digging into old state records.

Auditor General Weldon B. Heyburn said the records are contained in a book entitled "Appeals," dated July 2, 1777, covering mostly Philadelphia draft cases.

The book, of handmade paper and bound in cardboard, contains, in the original handwriting of the appeal agents, the action taken on men who were drafted into the Pennsylvania militia during the Revolutionary War.

Heyburn said draft exemptions in those days were for much the same reasons as today. He said, however, there was one notable exception in draft policy. Men called up for duty could hire substitutes.

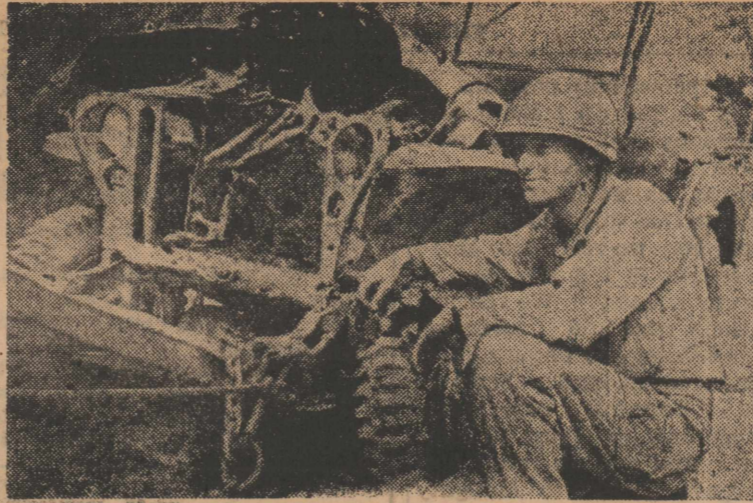

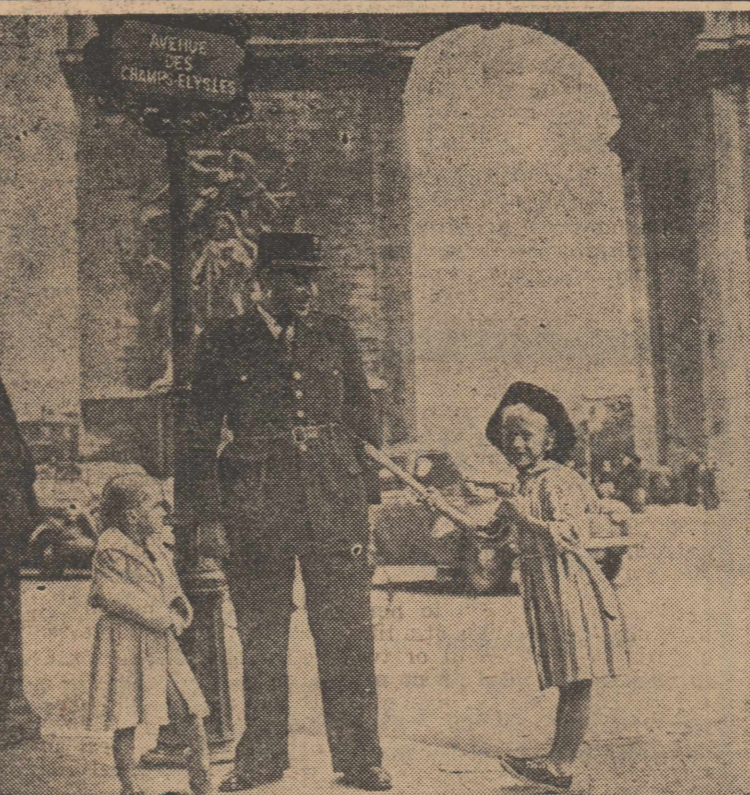

After that, his mind cleared, he tackles his problems with far greater success than he once could have thought possible through such a simple process.

His second principle of overcoming worry and fear over his affairs is to go mountain climbing. Once he considered a mountain too formidable, even a steep, hilly city discouraged him. Then one day he met a woman in a street in San Francisco, that city of steep hills. She appeared desperate as she stood and gazed upward, contemplating reaching the top by no other means than her own two feet.

Dr. Gabriel went to her and suggested that she practice taking just a few steps at a time, then stopping to breathe deeply and rest for a moment or two. She agreed, and they arrived at the top together with no more acceleration of heartbeats than if they had walked on level ground. You see, it was only one step at a time that they had to take. "And," says Dr. Gabriel, "one step at a time enables anyone to climb the steepest mountain without any greater effort than walking on a level road."

Texan In Line For Presidency

The office of Speaker of the House has grown in prestige during Sam Rayburn's tenure, it is pointed out in the current (November 24th) issue of The Saturday Evening Post.

A full-length article on the venerable Texan cites the fact Congress has raised the Speaker's salary and changed the presidential succession law so that he would become Chief executive in event of the death of both the President and the Vice-President.

In "They're Just Crazy About About Sam," author Paul F. Healy finds that Rayburn himself has added to this prestige by becoming a strong Speaker and he has held the post over nine years, longer than anyone else in U. S. History.

Few men have dealt so closely with such a cross section of human nature in the raw, Healy says. He has managed to move adroitly through a series of national crisis with two presidents of contrasting temperament background, and simultaneously ride herd on 434 usually hot and bothered colleagues, each from a different part of the country and each a full-blown personality in his or

her own right.

The story says one of the secrets of his success is that he goes beyond his duties as presiding officer of the House, leader of his party in the House and highest advisor to the President on legislative matters to function as a combination father-confessor, counselor and Dutch uncle to members on both sides of the aisle.

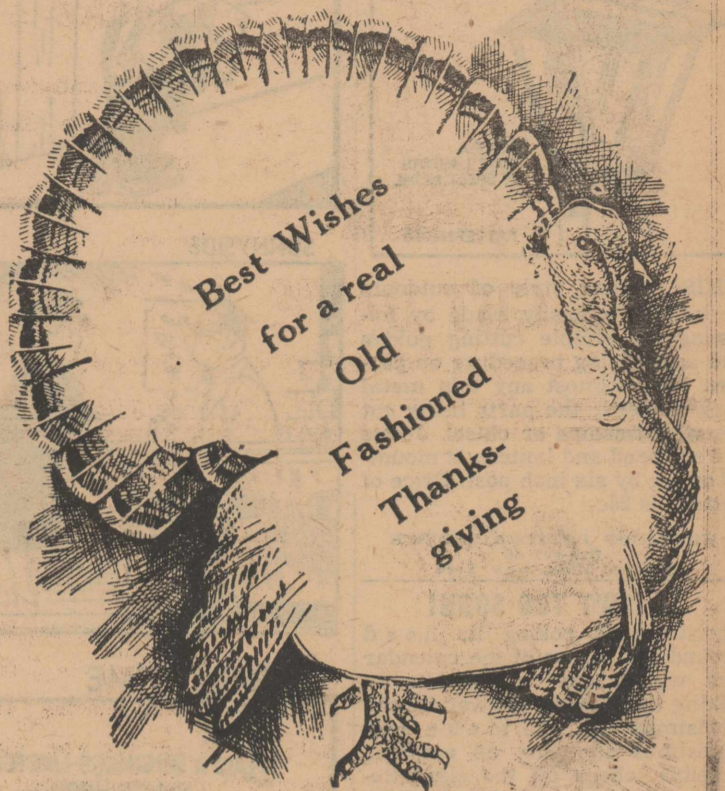
Rayburn likes Congressmen. He figures he has served with nearly 3,000 of them during his 39 years in Washington and has tried to know intimately as many as possible. Evidence that they also like him is reflected in the statement of Representative Abraham Multer, a New York Democrat, that to the new members of Congress Rayburn has been more than a leader, "he has been our guardian angel."

Both Republican and Democrat members are said to seek him out continually for advice on their personal problems. Even wives of congressmen have gone to the 69-year-old Speaker, who is a bachelor, for tips on how to handle their prima-donna husbands.

At the same time, Rayburn is reported to receive more proposals of marriage by mail than any other bachelor in Washington.

Healy also says that this holder of the second most powerful political post in the Govern-

ment is the country's pre-eminent expert on how to pass laws and placate politicians.

Peanut Butter Bait

Start Sewing Gay Gifts Now For Fast-Approaching Holidays

STARTED MAKING what list for Christmas presents yet? Most of the lists have a way of growing while the budget shrinks, so why not start sewing some things now for a happy solution to both?

Some presents like dresses, pinafores, bed jackets and coveralls are made to order, with certain people in mind, but there are many others which need no attention as to size. In this group belong the napkin and tablecloth sets, lingerie cases, towels of all descriptions, aprons, knitting bags and bureau runners.

You can start from scratch with the remnant bag as a supply source. If necessary, check on some remnant counters for more materials and notions counters for trimmings to add the festive look. Or, if you're pressed for time, just add some trimmings to simple, ready-made things.

Too much cannot be said for the personal touch you give presents. They're warming, thoughtful and inspiring. You give a little bit of yourself in every present, and people like it.

If you plan to make many presents then do it on a schedule to speed the work. Sew all aprons at one time; cut all pinafores when you're doing those. Have all towels ready to trim at one time.

Once you've started on a project, you get into the swing of making that particular item. Finish all of

Colorful Towels Are Always Welcome

Brides need towels, but so do older homemakers who find theirs are on their last few days of service. These, then, can fill a need in almost any home, and the most amateurish seamstress can make them.

Linen remnants can be utilized if you want lovely towels, but cotton from old sheets, pillow cases, flour and feed sacks can also be used. Plain white toweling is easy to finish with bias binding about at the notches counter. If desired, cut some cotton dress remnants and make binding from that.

If desired, make plain finishing seams on the towels, and then run a band or two of rick rack, narrow

band trimming or other trimming a little above the seam. Use a machine stitch through the center of the rick rack.

Dainty face and small hand towels may be hemmed, and then have a narrow edging of lace attached to them. This is usually done by hemming in small stitches.

Monograms Personalize Any Type of Gift

Perhaps you've already made plain towels, or purchased some pillow cases, handkerchiefs or bridge table cov-ers. Maybe you're contemplating making lingerie cases or smocks. If these are plain, too plain for gifts, and you have someone special in mind, plan to monogram them.

Monograms are available in transfer patterns which can easily be applied to any of the above items. These are then stitched to make the monogram in any desired color by needle and thread.

Another way to apply monograms is to buy felt monograms in the desired size and combination, one, two or three letters. Apply the stitching over these to cover the felt, and you have a nice, raised monogram.

Individualize Pinafores With Trimming Effects

If you have little nieces, grand-

daughters or neighbors' little girls in your circle who come in for presents, nothing would be nicer or more glamorous than pinafores. Clever strategy in the form of crisp ruffles, edgings, eyelet embroideries and big sashes and bows can transform any simple basic pattern into a thing of real beauty.

It's easy to achieve the sweet, fluffy effects with a "uffler" attachment on the sewing machine. Other trimmings which may be made with this same attachment, suitable for pinafores include plaiting and sewing to the garment in one operation, making dainty plaited or gathered roses, puffed ribbon and tuck shirring.

Other trimmings which are effective on little girl's pinafores include applique work, lace insertions and even narrow cordlike tuckings. These may be in contrasting materials, selected especially for the age and coloring of the little girl.

To be at their nicest, use sheer materials in the pinafore, as they will be worn over a simple dress during cooler months. Organдие is an excellent choice because it's already starched, but other sheer cottons like nainsook voile and dimity may be used.

Add style to the simplest pinafore with wide hems which give them a luxurious look. Long, wide sashes tie most readily into zig, pert bows that are so attractive.

Smocking Transforms Dresses Beautifully

Dainty and durable smocking is especially appropriate for little girls' dresses, and pinafores, as well. You'll find that machine smocking done with a gathering foot attachment is quickly applied.

It will iron and wash more easily than hand smocking, too, and any mother who has many dresses to launder will appreciate this feature.

Heavy duty thread and embroidery silk in contrasting color will yield pleasing effects. Try some red or white with an aquamarine dress, dark blue with yellow, coral with green and pink on white.

In doing smocking, remember to lengthen the stitch to seven or eight to the inch. A longer stitch increases the fullness of the gathers, while a shorter stitch decreases it.

When you purchase dress fabric for little girls, it's smart to buy some extra to use for a pair of matching panties. If the dress material is too heavy to use on panties, select lighter weight material but match the color to the dress as closely as possible.

Slide fasteners are excellent to use for children's clothing as the youngsters are not too adept at buttons. Furthermore, they assure a neat closing and prevent the need for replacing buttons or snaps.

These Presents Will Please Women of All Ages

Career girl or homemaker will be pleased with an attractive apron or two. Depending upon the activities of the woman in question, select an apron which will please her most. Some like the clever hostess aprons while others prefer attractive bib types which may be used for busy days.

Half aprons in many styles can be made from about a yard of material. Percale or muslin is especially nice when it's touched with contrasting banding or scalloping in plain or print. This same material may be used for ties and pockets, too.

Bib aprons are most practical when they're made in prints which will not show the dirt, or dark colors lightened with bright trimmings.

Why We Worship

Lesson for November 25, 1951

FEWER than two out of every three Americans belong to any church or synagogue. Yet the traveler across America is never long out of sight of some house of worship.

With or without a cross, with or without a paint, every few miles there will be a church or chapel or meeting-house, where like-minded people meet to worship the One God.

Other churches are non-liturgical, or free, in their mode of worship, varying all the way from churches with optional forms of worship on out to snake-handling sects like the "Church of God with Signs Following," where you never know one minute what is going to happen next.

The liturgical churches, too, are different as can be. Some liturgies are filled with chanting, incense, long and not easy for a stranger to follow. Other liturgies are brief and simple.

The insides of these various kinds of churches are just as different as the interiors of hotels—all the way from the elegant Waldorf-Astoria down to the ramshackle boarding house of a frontier town. The leader of the worship may be clad in vestments gorgeous in the extreme, or in a plain black gown, or dressed in shirt-sleeves.

The "man from Mars" would be so bewildered by all this that he would ask: Is there anything at all that these different kinds of worship have in common?

Communion

For an answer, we can go back more than 3,000 years to the time when Moses was organizing his people's worship as he organized the rest of their lives. You would hardly have recognized that little "tabernacle" in the wilderness as a place of worship at all; it looked like neither church nor synagogue.

And what went on in the tabernacle would look strange to a Jew of today, stranger still to a Roman Catholic, stranger of all to a "non-liturgical" Protestant. And yet, what went on to make that tabernacle possible in the first place, and what went on in it afterwards, give us the answer to the question: What do all the innumerable forms of worship have in common?

First of all is communion with God. In true worship we become aware of Him; in the New Testament phrase, we "approach with boldness the throne of Grace." Worship is right when it actually brings the worshiper into a cleansing consciousness of the nearness of God,—when, indeed, he feels and knows that it is "in Him we live and move and have our being."

Not every one reaches this divine awareness in the same way.

Consecration

BUT there is another sure to worship: Consecration. However varied the order of worship may be, one part of it will be found nearly everywhere: the offering.

This is actually one of the most important parts of the service, though it is often neglected and "skimmed." For the offering is not only important in itself, but it is a great symbol of what worship ought always to be, a call to dedication.

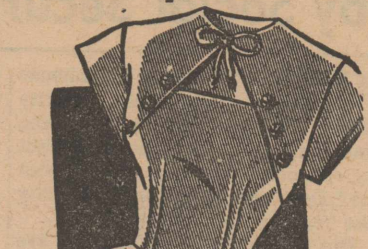
Into the offering plate go bits of silver, green paper, checks . . . money? Yes, and more. This represents something of the life and work of the worshippers. Every man has some better moments when he would generously like to do something to help the world. On Sunday the church harnesses his vague good will. It gives him a channel for his generosity.

What a man gives ought never to be TO the church but THROUGH the church; it would be an expression of gratitude to God from one who knows that his whole life is God's gift.

Greenland's Iceberg Export Drops Behind

Greenland's largest export, icebergs, hit a new low this year when, of an output estimated at 10,000 to 15,000 bergs, none succeeded in reaching the crowded shipping lanes between North America and Europe.

The largest Arctic icebergs take off from the continually advancing glaciers and icecap fringe of Greenland's west coasts, says the national geographic society. In an average year about 400 of the total production survive a 1,800-mile southward drift before disintegrating in the warm Gulf Stream. This year no icebergs were reported below the 46th parallel along the southern tip of Newfoundland.

Moving south through Baffin Bay and Davis Strait to Labrador, many of the crystal "castles" and plain "flattops" jam against the coast or are caught in the natural traps of islands and bays. A few swing into the Labrador current and continue southward. Some drift toward Belle Isle Strait and some move around Newfoundland by way of Grand Banks to invade main traffic arteries and threaten shipping.

Major Arctic icebergs are produced by about 18 "name" glaciers. The Humboldt, near Thule, north of Cape York, is one that supplies sizable models. 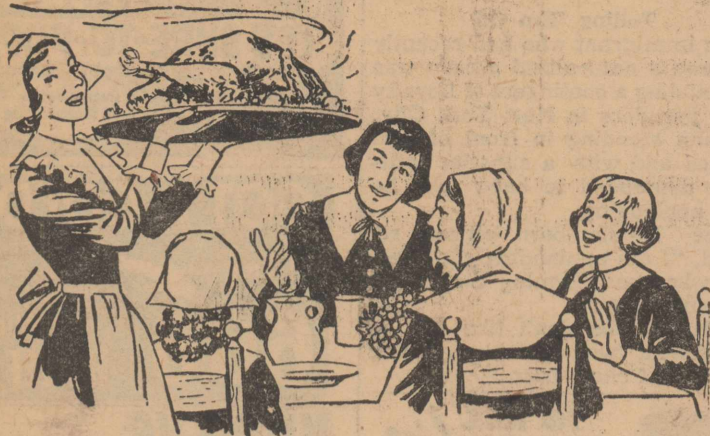

Farm Workers Are Protected By Social Security Benefits

AN EMPLOYEE of a greenhouse called his local social security office. "I hear that people who work on a farm have been brought under social security. How about me? Do I now have social security like regular farm workers?"

The answer was: "Yes, you are a farm worker."

It was explained that, for old-age and survivors insurance purposes under social security, a "farm" is defined in its broadest sense. It includes not only a greenhouse when used primarily for the raising of agricultural or horticultural commodities, but any other acre or fraction of an acre commercially used for agriculture, horticulture, or animal husbandry.

Equally broad is the social security definition of a farm employee. It includes not only the man on a tractor in a prairie wheat-field, and the man at the potting-bench in the greenhouse, but also some 600,000 other regular workers, whether hired to herd sheep on a New Mexico mesa, or manage milking-shorthorns on an Iowa stock farm.

Whether or not the job of a farm worker is covered for old-age and survivors insurance depends on three things: First, his employment by the farm operator during a three-month qualifying period; second, his regular work for the same employer during the calendar quarter immediately following the

qualifying period; third, his earning of cash wages of \$50 or more in each three-month period after the qualifying period.

The "qualifying" three-month period does not in itself count towards social security payments, but the first step to that end for a farm worker is the "qualifying quarter." It must be a calendar quarter—that is, a three-month period beginning with January, April, July, or October. The worker who is employed by one operator continuously during a calendar quarter may then begin to get social security credit for his wages in the following quarter, by working 60 days or more on a full-time basis for the same employer for cash wages of \$50 or more.

The test that he must continue to meet, quarter after quarter, is the same. He must work for this nurseryman on some 60 days, and be paid \$50 or more in cash every calendar quarter. As long as he meets these conditions, his cash earnings from his work will be credited to his social security account, and he will be building towards old-age and survivors insurance protection. However, if in any future quarter he fails to work as a nurseryman for less than 60 days, the continuity will be broken. He will no longer be a regular employee, no matter how much in cash he is paid for less than 60 days of work

Picnic Hints

Picnickers who like to eat in comfort will welcome a few tricks to make the outdoor meal a pleasant one. Crude picnic tables may be transformed into an attractive setting for a lunch if strips of pastel colored shelf paper are laid from end to end and firmly anchored in place with cellophane tape. To prevent the guests' paper napkins from sliding off the lap, provide short strips of the same cellophane tape to hold them in place. This is advisable in a high wind. Paper doilies will dress up the picnic plates. To hold in place, use the same tape.

Glamour Behind Glasses

Charm-wise women can make jewels of their eyes with artful make-up behind their glasses. Here's how: With a sharpened eye pencil, use casual, easy strokes to draw a line just above the lashes to the corner of the eye or a little beyond it. Next, apply eye shadow with a brush just over the lash line. Apply the deeper shade first, if you use two shades. Use your fingertip for the final blending. Then curl your mascara brush up from below the lashes and out to the tips. After that, apply the pencil to the brows, with swift, tiny, light strokes, touching only the brows, not the skin. Finally, go over the finished lashes with a clean and dry mascara brush to smooth and separate them.

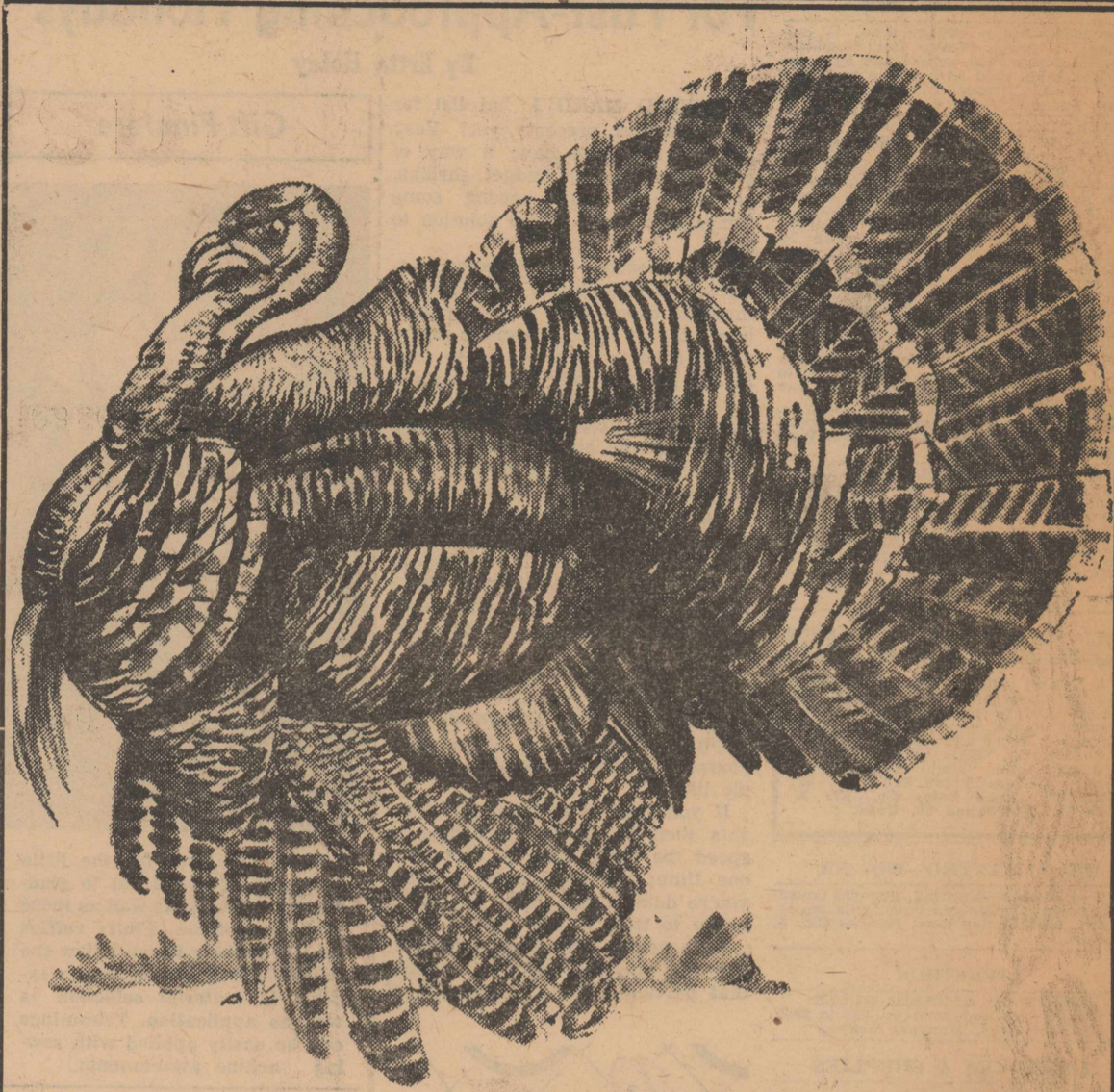
