VETERANS' BENEFITS are an important part of the economy in Eastland County. It surprises most of us to learn that slightly over two and a half million dollars was paid by the Veterans Administration to veterans here during 1987. County Service Officer James Wright who has served for some 37 years reports that the biggest portion is in the form of compensation and pensions: \$2,380,820.00. An additional \$76,256 was paid for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation and \$129,475.00 in insurance and indemnities, for a grand total of \$2,586,551.00 for the year.

IN A similar light, the county's 395 retail outlets had fourth quarter sales in '87 of \$27,756,000; that's up 0.7 per cent for the same period of '86 quarter when the sales were \$27,557,808.

Use tax purchases amount to \$15,004 and \$11,619,449. was subject to taxation, according to new figures from the Comptroller's Office. Figures were down for the quarter in Stephens, Comanche, Erath and Palo Pinto, but up in Callahan. The Abilene MSA had a drop for the quarter.

E.M.H. Administrator Marcia Carr shares a very worthwhile editorial from the Noted Paul Harvey in connection with 1988 National Hospital Week.

Harvey writes well: **Are We Lucky to Live Now!** Americans, it has been open season on doctors and hospitals. Insurers and lawyers, economists and Ralph Nader condemn the doctors and hospitals for charging too much, for operating too much, for sloppy lab work and for keeping us waiting too long.

My, it was refreshing to hear from Dr. George Lundberg the other day. Writing in the AMA Journal, this Chicago physician said that for patients this is "the golden age of medicine."

In the 1980s we are so accustomed to a medical miracle a day that we don't even pause to applaud anymore.

Our doctors now have the know-how and the equipment to prevent, diagnose and successfully treat or manage most all serious diseases.

An organ transplant isn't even news anymore, unless it is "five organs at one time."

Huge expenditures for research have inundated us with new machines, devices, techniques and chemicals.

We are doing with lasers things we could never do with a knife. We are putting legs under the legless almost as good as new. We are benefiting from equipment that we have not yet learned how to spell in magnetic resonance imaging, monoclonal antibodies, DNA probes, endoscopy and positron emission tomography.

And look at our much maligned hospitals. By the world's standards they are magnificent! At the end of the Second World War our nation's hospitals were old and decayed, overcrowded and many rural areas had no hospitals. Today, despite some acknowledged aging buildings, we have splendid modern facilities for hospital in-patient and out-patient care everywhere needed in our country.

For the first time in a hundred years, we have enough physicians, despite an acknowledged oversupply in some areas of the country - better too many doctors than not enough.

And doctors, for all of their problems, have myriad choices: the solo practice; group practice; federal, state, and local government

practice; academia; HMOs; PBOs; IPAs; industrial medicine, public health and mega-corporation opportunities. Similar pluralism exists for hospital affiliations.

This year our nation is going to spend eleven percent of its entire gross national product on medical or health care. No other nation on earth even comes close!

And look what modern communication has done for modern medicine. A physician at Mayos can stand at a television screen, focus television cameras and thus guide a surgical procedure two thousand miles away.

The practice of medicine is shifting towards prevention as we try to halt the transmission of AIDS, herpes, tobacco addiction, stop the practice of drinking and driving, and encourage proper nutrition for maintaining resistance to disease.

As Dr. Lundberg suggests, this is "the golden age of medicine": for patients and for practitioners. Wow, are we lucky to live now!

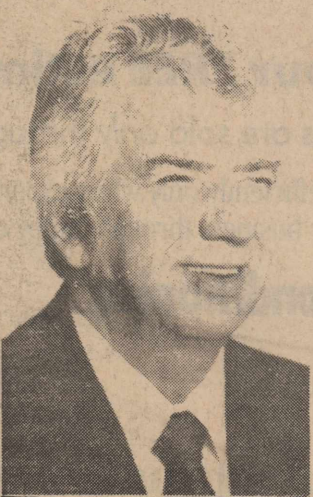
Aaron Receives Honor

And the teams' achievements have been many this year.

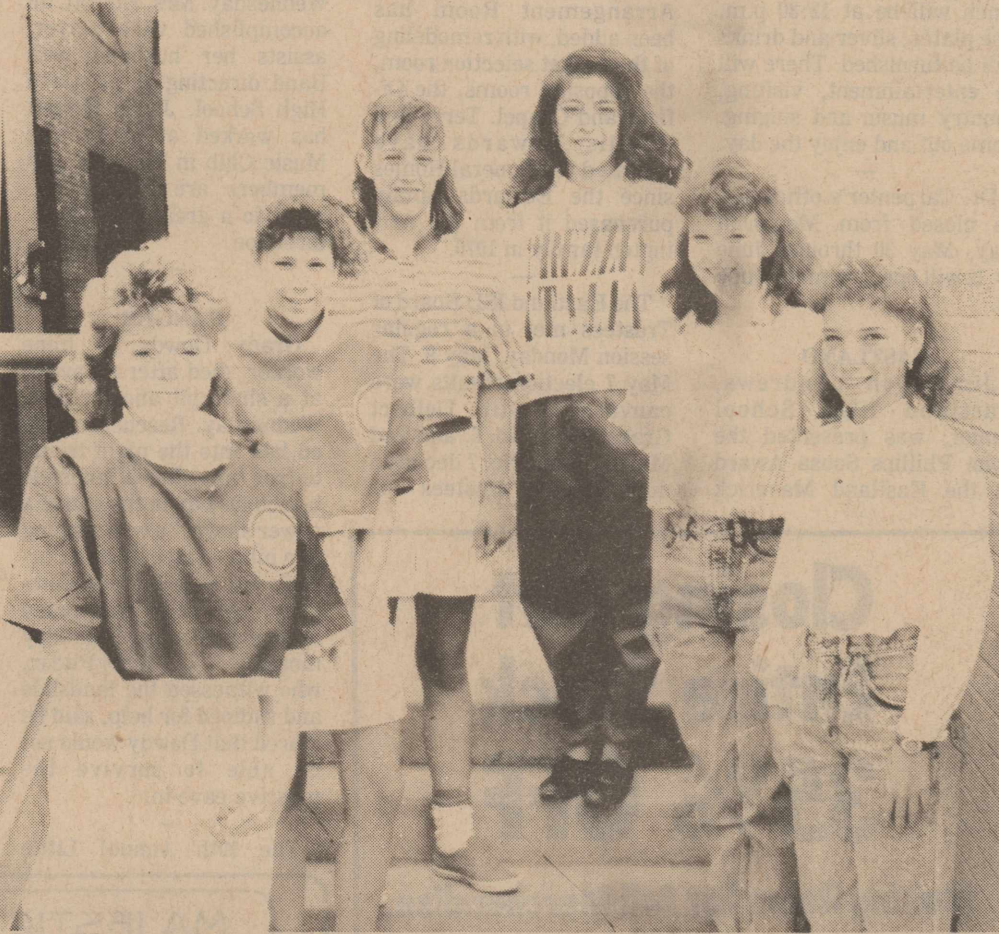

You may still help a work team or leave a contribution at the Chamber office to help complete a worthwhile project. And volunteer workers could probably use a cold drink before the projects are finished.

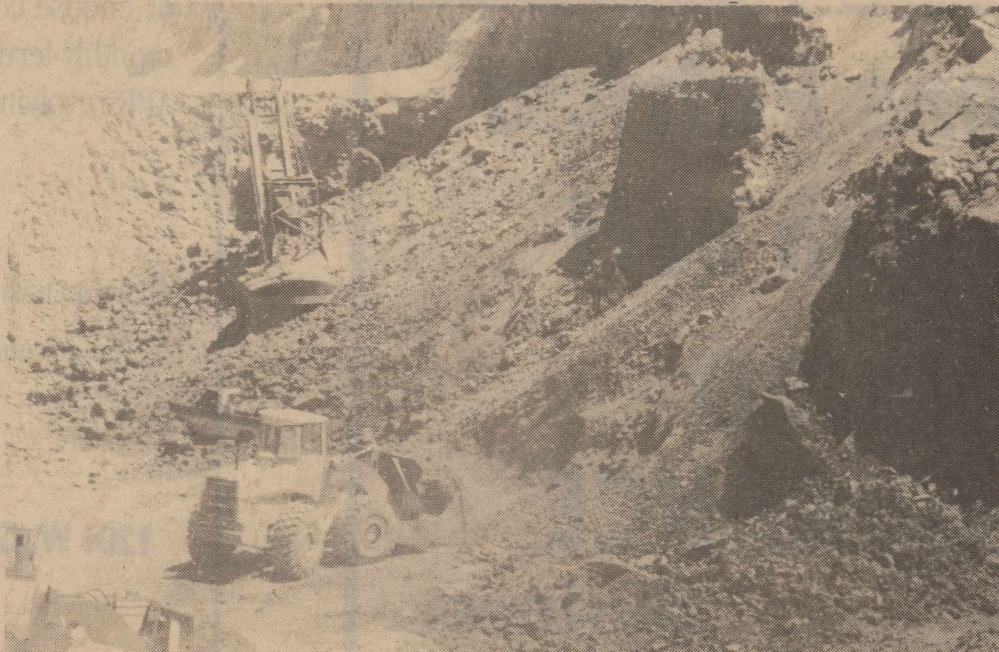

Pharmacy Topics

Long-term study in Finland of a cholesterol-lowering drug, Gemfibrozil, shows that it reduces the rate of heart attacks by 34 percent. While total cholesterol were lowered only slightly, levels of high-density lipoproteins increased markedly. Gemfibrozil causes fewer side effects than other anti-cholesterol drugs.

Diabetics seem to get fewer calluses when they wear cushioned running shoes. A Salt Lake City podiatrist reported on an 18-month survey.

Relatively new surgical instrument, a hysteroscope, enables doctors to examine the uterus without making an abdominal incision. Used mostly for diagnosis and biopsy now, the scope is expected to simplify certain surgical procedures.

A large dose of magnesium, given as soon as a heart attack victim gets to the hospital, seems to protect against dangerous arrhythmia, an Israeli study found. Normally, the heart loses magnesium -- and stable electrical activity -- at the time of an attack.

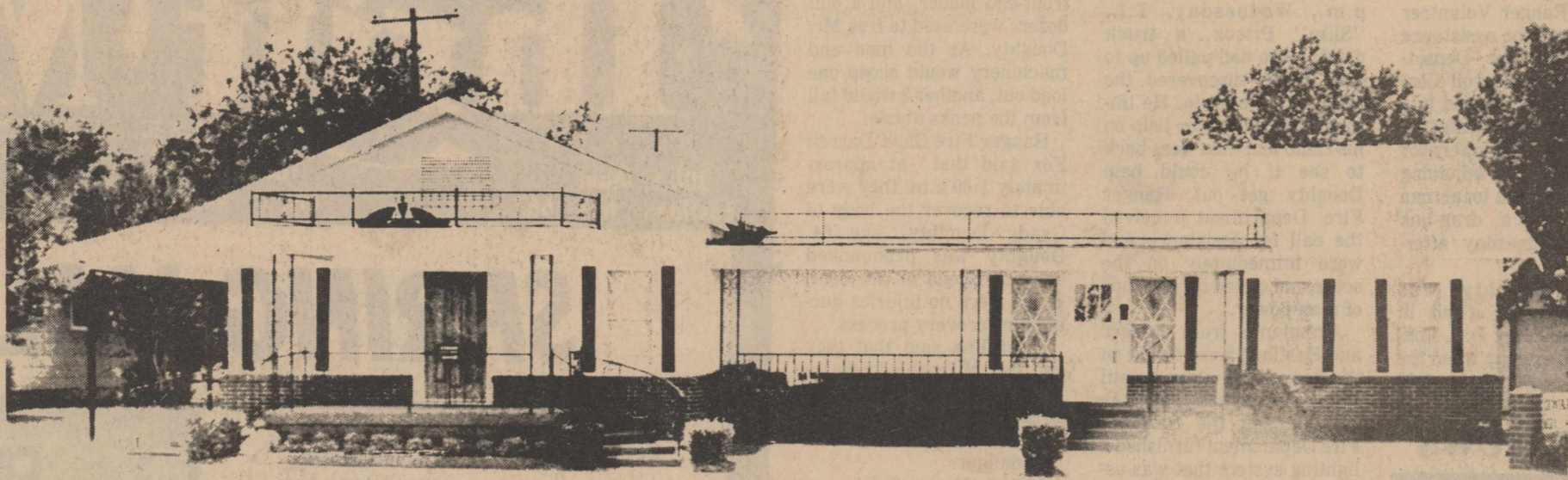

Cave-In Claims Ranger Man

Fifteen Ranger Volunteer Firemen with the assistance of Eastland Fire Department and Bob Carroll Construction crews worked into early Thursday morning to free a machine-operator after a shale-pit adjoining wall caved in on a local man in a cab of a drag-link machine Wednesday afternoon.

Grady Doughty was loading shale at a pit in Ranger leased by B.C. Construction Company when the accident occurred at 2:00

p.m., Wednesday. T.L. "Slim" Pitcox, a truck driver, who had pulled up to load shale, discovered the start of the cave-in. He immediately called for help on his radio and then went back to see if he could help Doughty get out. Ranger Fire Department received the call for assistance and were immediately on the scene and called for backups of man-power.

Ambulance from Ranger and Eastland were called on the scene and stayed until the recovery was made. As the sun set, the Eastland Fire Department furnished a lighting system that was used throughout the night.

Due to the size of the pit (70-80 ft. in depth) and the dry conditions of the earth and shale, recovery procedures were very difficult and dangerous.

Oversized machinery,

front-end loader, and 3 bull dozers were used to free Mr. Doughty. As the men and machinery would scoop one load out, another 2 would fall from the peaks above.

Ranger Fire Chief Darrell Fox said that at approximately 1:00 a.m. they were able to recover the body of Grady Doughty, age 64. Doughty was pronounced dead on scene of accident. There were no injuries during the recovery process.

Chief Fox said that they had lots of trouble removing the body from the wreckage, and that firemen and workers were in constant danger.

MSHA (Mining Safety and Health Administration) a Division of the U.S. Department of Labor are presently investigating the accident. The cause of the accident will not be known until the investigation is completed.
