

Cotton Bowl Religious Festival October 19th

Dr. Daniel A. Poling of New York and Philadelphia, one of the nation's busiest and most dynamic clergymen, will be the speaker at the mammoth non-denominational Cotton Bowl Religious Festival here Sunday night, October 19, Dan D. Rogers, chairman of the festival Laymen's Committee, has announced.

The second annual festival

will be held on the final evening of the 1952 State Fair of Texas. All gates to the fairgrounds will be thrown open on this night and there will be no admission charge after 6 p. m., Mr. Rogers said.

"The festival last year was attended by about 45,000 people, one of the largest religious gatherings of its type," Mr. Rogers said. "We hope that an even larger crowd will attend this year's festival to hear Dr. Poling, who is widely respected as a speaker and a writer."

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sented by combined committees of prominent laymen and pastors from the Dallas area, with the full cooperation and sponsorship of the State Fair. Thirty-one ministers are serving on the Pastor's Committee.

A well-known layman will be invited to preside at the festival. Dr. M. E. Sadler, president of Texas Christian University, will read the scripture. The Rev. Luther Holcomb will deliver the invocation.

Eight massed robed choirs will furnish an impressive musical background for the festival. The 50-piece Texas Salvation Army state band will play.

Two outstanding college choirs have accepted invitations to participate. The TCU choir from Fort Worth and the North Texas State College A Capella choir from Denton will present special numbers.

Dr. Poling is editor of the Christian Herald in New York. He is the father of one of the famous four chaplains of three faiths who went down with their ship in World War II after giving away their life preservers. He serves as chaplain of the Chapel of the Four Chaplains, an inter-faith memorial to the four heroes in Philadelphia. He has been pastor of Marble Collegiate Church in New York and Baptist Temple in Philadelphia.

Clean The Oven

Do you forget the oven when cleaning the kitchen range? Do you neglect this part of your equipment because it is closed and out of sight?

Miss Lucile King, Home Demonstration Agent, says ovens benefit by special care. "Ventilate them after use," she suggests. Leaving the door open to cool helps keep it clean and fresh. It also prevents rusting from closed in steam.

The agent recommends ammonia to remove scorched-on grease in the oven. Apply with a cloth or set a dish of ammonia in a closed oven overnight to let the fumes loosen the soil. Then scrub lightly with a very fine steel wool or fine powder like whiting and wipe off.

OPERATORS ARRESTED ON TEXAS HIGHWAYS

AUSTIN — Over 21,000 truck operators were arrested last year on Texas highways and more than a million dollars was paid in fines and additional registration fees. These startling figures came to light in the annual report of Major Kent Odom, Chief of the License and Weight Division of the Department of Public Safety. The report, released this week, covers the fiscal year ending August 31, 1952. Overloading, operating faulty equipment and improperly registered trucks accounted for the great number of arrests.

The law fixes the maximum loads allowable on Texas highways at 58,420 pounds, but according to the reports, loads have been apprehended weighing over 130,000 pounds.

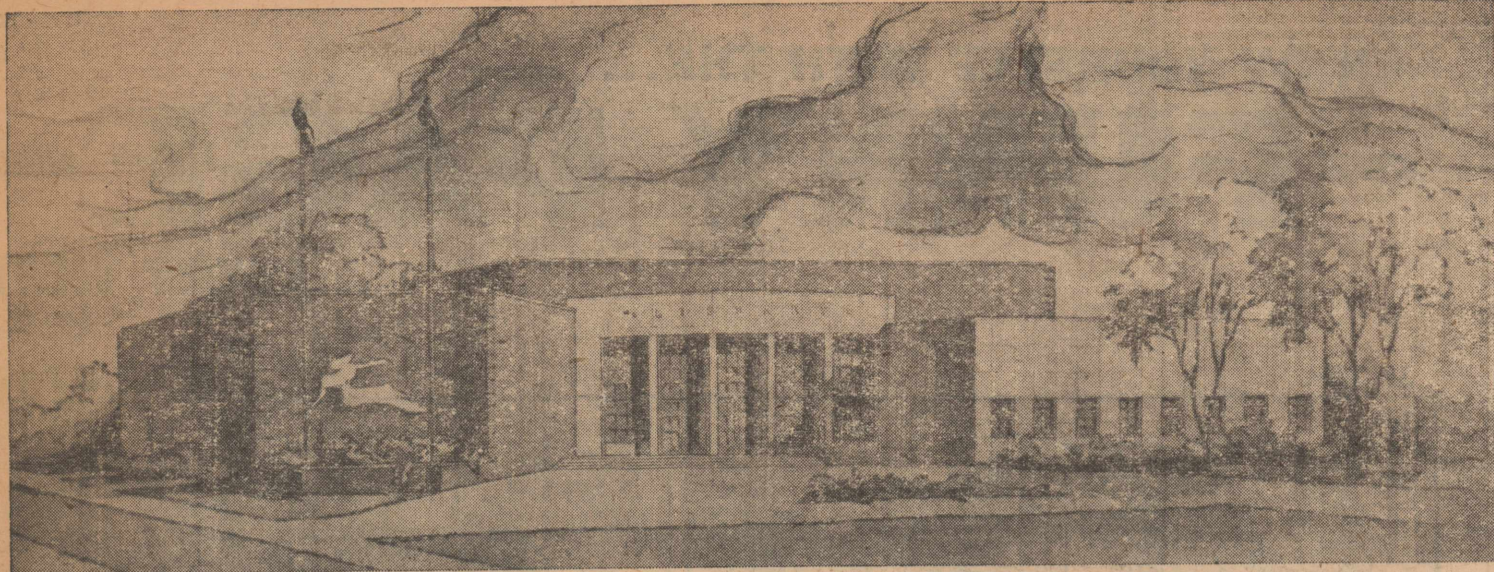

High Income Vs. High Outgo

As everybody knows, the national income is higher than it ever was. So are wages and prices, the two have a habit of moving pretty much in unison and so are taxes. Armies of people are earning two or three times as much as in the pre-war era.

Yet a great many Americans, despite this statistical prosperity, are going deeper and deeper into debt. High incomes have been offset and then some by higher outgo. That is the theme of a Wall Street Journal news article aptly headed "Debts, Debts, Debts."

The paper cites case histories of people its reporters interviewed in various cities. These people represent a wide range of occupations and incomes. A Chicago steelworker earning more than \$5,000 a year is worried and in debt, the strike intensified his troubles, but he had them before it was called. A Detroit couple earning \$6,800 has cut its entertainment budget in half and hasn't saved anything for over a year. A \$20,000 a year executive has no debts outside of charge accounts and a big mortgage, but thinks he may have to buy a new fur coat for his wife on the installment plan. A San Francisco stenographer said she's always \$50 behind, and that her last vacation put her \$250 in the red.

These comments, the Wall Street Journal points out, square with Federal Reserve Board figures on outstanding consumer credit. When last August began, the total was \$21,200,000,000, a record, which marked a \$2,000,000,000 jump in one year. They also fit in with a Bureau of Labor Statistics report, covering the 1950 financial experience of families in various income brackets in 91 communities. During that year the average family in this group had income after taxes of \$4,300 and spent \$4,700, for a \$400 deficit.

A superficially confusing aspect to the picture is found in the fact that savings, as well as debts, are also at record levels, the Commerce Department finds that they were rising at the annual rate of \$16,500,000,000 during the second quarter of this year. That is accounted for, in part, the Journal says, because "this definition of savings, of course, includes a lot of things many people wouldn't consider savings, such as payment of debts on consumer goods, so the bigger such debts, and the more the repayments, the more the "savings." Also the 50 cent dollars make larger totals.

Lots of people are getting along nicely and are staying out of debt. The Journal quotes a number of these good managers, some in modest income markets, who have more possessions than ever and still are making both ends meet. But they seem to be exceptions to the rule.

Here is one fly in the ointment of this depreciated money era, and various developments substantiate it. For instance, the steel strike made a hole in automobile production. Yet this scarcity of cars, which some dealers thought would bring in a flood of eager searchers for new machines, was accompanied by a scarcity of buyers. Save for a small handful of makes and models, no one has to wait for the new car of his choice, despite the drop in factory output.

To sum up, most of us have many more dollars to rattle around than we ever had before—but they don't go very far. And many of us are substantially worse off, if we make an honest accounting, than in times when

prices, taxes and incomes were all much lower.

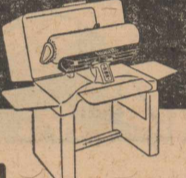

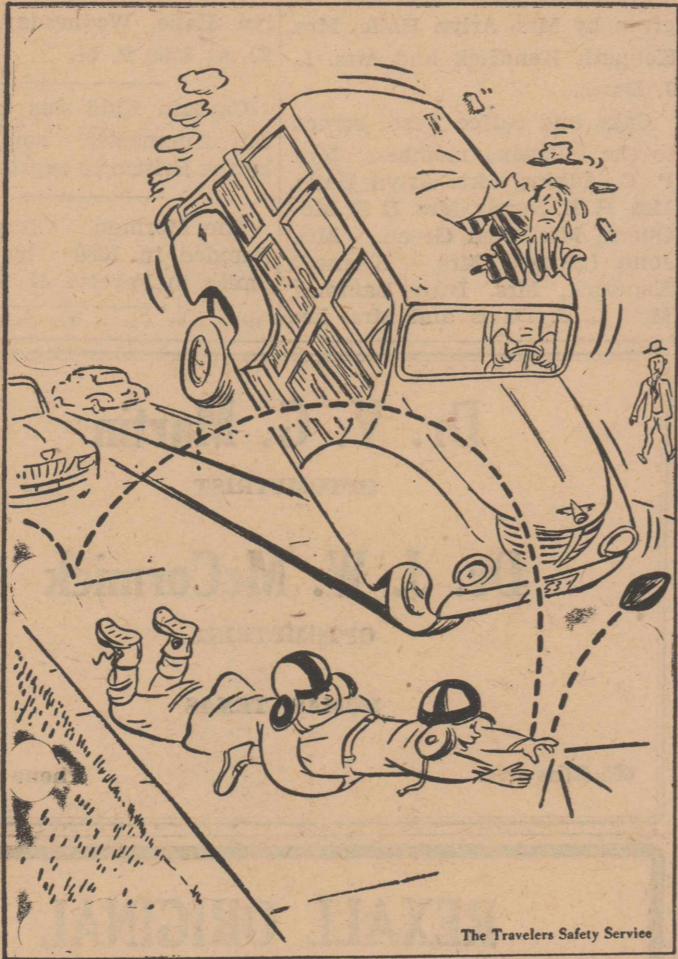

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons BY DR. KENNETH L. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 6. DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalm 40: 1-8.

Sincerity

Lesson for October 19, 1952

SOME say an insincere person isn't what he seems to be. That is not quite true. An insincere person is what he seems to be, only not all the way through. He is what he seems to be, on Sundays, or part of the time, or when he's feeling just right; or perhaps he is what he seems to be, but only on the surface. The rest of the time, or underneath that surface, he is something quite different. Everybody likes sincere people, nobody wants to have much to do with the insincere.

Getting Down to Cases

Jesus, of course, demanded sincerity. "Jesus would rather be denied by a true man than confessed by a liar." He did not use the word "sincere" or "sincerity," but (as was his habit) he came down to cases. He first shows that a generous giver, and a praying man, may be insincere. When is generosity sincere? When is a man all-the-way generous and when is he only top-layer generous? Jesus suggests that it isn't what we give, but why we give, that points up a test for sincerity. It is very doubtful whether Jesus meant to say that any one ever hired a trumpeter to toot for him when he dropped some money into the collection plate or wrote a check for the Red Cross. What he means to say is that when a man gives with the hope that his gift will attract attention and produce applause, he is not really generous. He doesn't have the recipient's interests at heart; he is thinking only, "How well people will think of me!" Or again, that odd saying, "Do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing" suggests that sometimes you are generous in order to please your favorite audience: You. You are generous in order to feel self-satisfied, your right hand (so to speak) brags about your left. The sincerely generous person is the only truly generous one; and the only sincerely generous person is the one who wants to give, not to be complimented, even by himself.

What Is Sincere Prayer?

Another concrete case that Jesus takes up is prayer. There is a story that once a minister was told after service: "Doctor, that was the most eloquent prayer ever delivered to a Boston audience." Jesus would say that a prayer delivered to an audience—Boston, Bombay or Barber Junction, no matter where—isn't a prayer, it's just a way of showing off. A certain professor of English used to quote famous authors in his public prayers: "As Shakespeare has said, O Lord... Thou rememberest what the poet Browning hath said..." Now there's no use quoting poetry to the Lord; that's suited to a speech, not to a prayer. Of course Jesus did not mean that we are never to pray in the presence of others. He himself prayed in public on various occasions. Leading others in prayer is a rare gift and should be cultivated. But while prayer, sincere prayer, can be with others and for others, it should never be to others. Some preachers "beat the congregation over their heads with a prayer" as the saying is. Some deacons have been known to put long and dull prayer-meeting talks into the form of a prayer. One elder well-versed in Scripture used to go through the whole story of the Bible, in outline, every time he was called on for a prayer.

Sincerity in Devotion

Jesus points out where sincerity is most important of all: in our devotion to God. We cannot serve God and Mammon. God does not want part-time devotion. By serving God, Jesus means living by God's side, under God's orders. Serving Mammon means more than simply serving money—most Mammon-worshippers would deny that they "serve" money. It means living your life not as God would have you but in order to "get ahead," to make money, to stand well with people who have money. Serving God means living as Jesus lived, for others; serving Mammon means trying to be served by as many persons as possible. Success, in Mammon's terms, is measured in terms of how many people work for you; success in God's terms, is measured in terms of how much you have helped others. Sincere devotion to God must be devotion all life through.

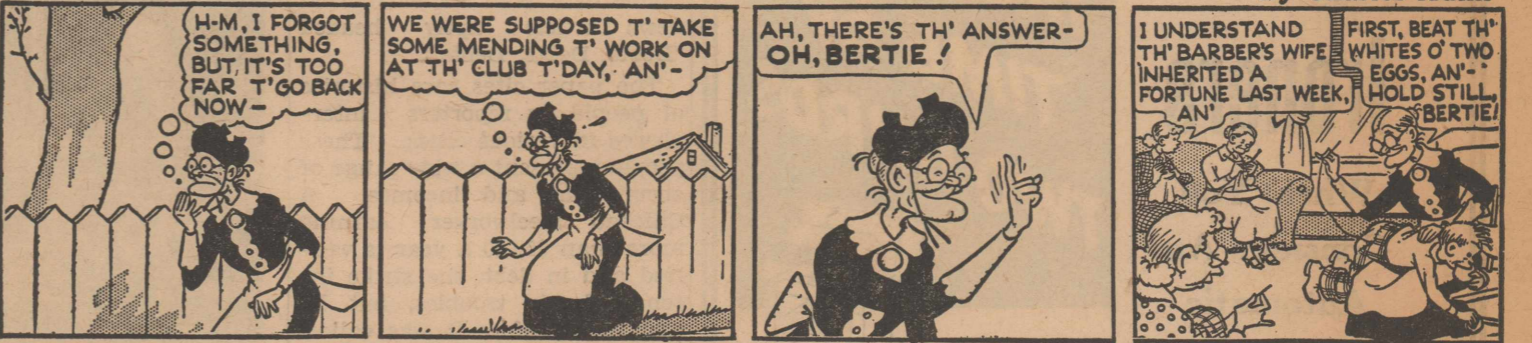

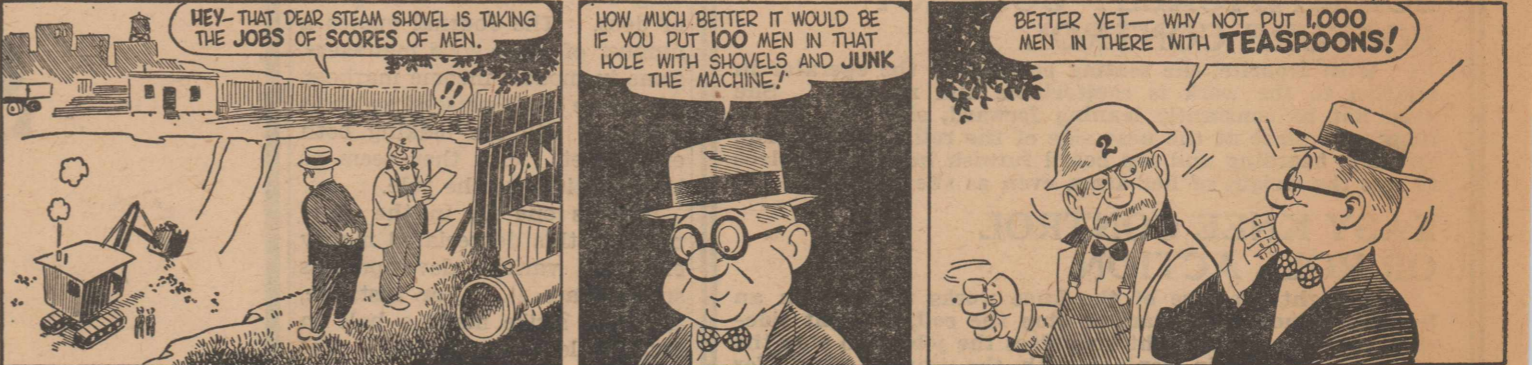

Sunday's Sermon

Rev. Robert H. Harper Jesus and the Law Lesson: Matthew 5: 17-20; Mark 10: 17-22 Golden Text: John 1: 17

THE LESSON text presents a comparison between the Law and the Gospel, between the Ten Commandments and divine Love. Jesus first assured his hearers that he was in no wise opposed to the Law, and he promised that nothing would pass from the law till all be fulfilled.

But the Law must be kept in spirit as well as letter; it must exceed the meticulous care of the scribes and Pharisees. Jesus declared that true greatness would depend upon keeping the Law in spirit.

Mark tells of the rich young ruler who came to Jesus, inquiring the way of life. Doubtless handsome and richly dressed, scion of culture and high privilege, he came seeking truth and with the expectation of speedy and proper answer. He was a lovable young man, for it is said that Jesus looked upon him and loved him. And he was a "model young man," for he had kept the Commandments from his youth up.

The ruler lacked only one thing, but that was the whole thing. He had kept all the Commandments but in effect had broken them all because he had not learned the Law of Love. He had refused to make the priceless gift of himself to God. Now Love cannot be had at the bargain counters. It cannot be summoned by the strongest resolutions of the human will. It comes only through faith in Jesus.

A PEAK AT THE STARS

AS FAMILIAR as any nursery rhyme are the words and music of Gene Autry's radio signature, "I'm Back in the Saddle Again" . . . To the millions of Americans who hear it every Saturday night on CBS Radio, it's the prelude to a shrewdly balanced, homey half-hour of folk music, comedy, adventure, drama and simple story-telling . . . A typical show opens with a comic interchange between Autry, chief comedian Pat Buttram, guitarist-singer-comedian Johnny Bond, and possibly Ruby Dandridge as Raindrop . . . From there it moves through a neatly-paced cycle of songs by Autry, the Cass County Boys, the Pinafores and Frankie Marvin.

In a conversational mood, Autry slips into the telling of the week's dramatized western tale, in which Autry always does his modestly-offered best on the side of virtue, law and decency . . . While the listeners are still recovering from the story's frankly and warmly sentimental ending, Autry and the entire ensemble serenade them once again with a mellifluous western number, backed by the music of Carl Cotner's orchestra . . . A pleasant half-hour well spent.

Jet Space Plane Will Cruise Void

Atomic-powered planes capable of flying tremendous distances at high speeds will be in use within the next few years, a Yale physicist predicted recently.

William W. Watson, professor of physics, also declared that the next logical step after atomic planes will be the multiple-jet space craft driven by atomic fuel. Prof. Watson, who worked on the atomic bomb project during World War II and is now chairman of the physics department at Yale, pointed out that such an aircraft would be technically possible in the not too distant future.

"Such a ship," he said, "could cruise in empty space, using forward jets as brakes. Its skipper could navigate it into an orbit at any desired height above the surface of the earth, then turn off his engines and become an artificial satellite of the earth."

"He will also be able to travel to the moon, if he wants to investigate that cold mass without an atmosphere. The almost limitless range because of long-lasting atomic fuel makes all this possible."

Space navigators will have serious problems, however, as the sun's radiation is going to endanger them and they also might collide with a meteorite, he said.

Prof. Watson also foresaw early use of atomic land-power in this country.

"There are four separate industry hook-ups at present," he said, "making feasibility studies of atomic power production. The plan is for the industries to build reactors, use the power, and then return the uranium to the Atomic Energy Commission which originally supplied it."

"The commission will extract from the returned uranium the plutonium formed by intense neutron bombardment during reactor operation. Plutonium is the new long-lived radioactive element which is itself fissionable and is therefore of great value."

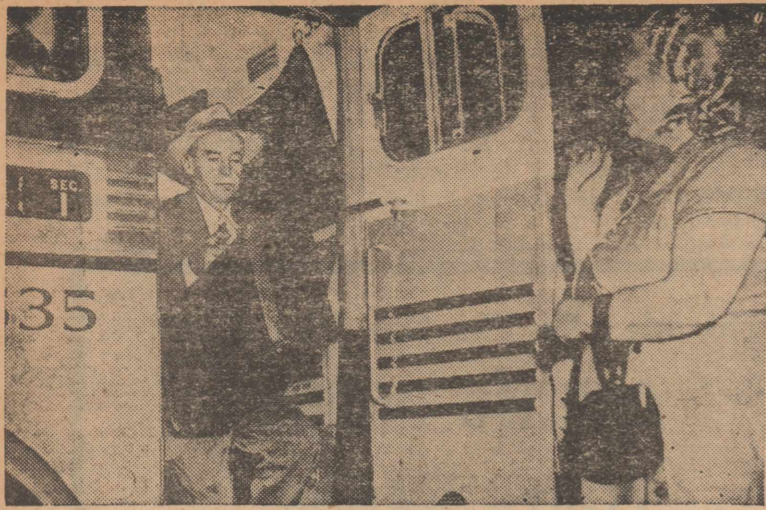

Think of your favorite musical organization — whether fine concert band, symphony, dance, or radio orchestra, and remember this, most of the musicians of today's choice musical organizations were members of their school band or orchestra in their youth! Why not put yourself in this musical picture? Join the school music classes and build a reputation and income for tomorrow! Even though you don't care to follow music as a career, it can help you earn your way through college.

The organization of a Fourth and Fifth grade band program was underway this week as a group of interested parents met Thursday night at the grade school music room where a display of musical instruments of all types was shown and demonstrated by band director John H. Schnabel. Band classes for this group will start next week.

A series of tests to determine the aptitude of the pupils in grades 4 through 7 was the first step in selecting the persons interested in starting in the instrumental program. This was followed by a check of physical characteristics to determine whether the instrument selected by the student would be best suited for him physically.

Arrangements have been made with a reliable music company for a trial rental plan so that the pupils will have a three months period to further demonstrate their qualifications on their selected instruments.

Although fifty new instrumental pupils has been set as the goal for the 4th and 5th grade band, over 75 have indicated their desire to start with the new group. Membership in this group will lead to future membership in the 50-member Stratford High School Band. This is a Stratford "Music" year.
