'God's Prison Gang' Film Gives 'Answer' To Crime

"God's Prison Gang," a newly released film featuring Al Capone's getaway driver, the last member of the Bonnie and Clyde's gang, and two other notorious criminals who have become Christians will be shown at Redeemer Lutheran Church parish hall, Conrad Hilton Avenue & 18th Street, in Cisco on Sunday, June 26. The only showing in this area will begin at 7:30 p.m.

The film, shot behind the walls of New York's Attica prison, is hosted by Art

Linkletter. He tells the story of how the work of International Prison Ministry is accomplishing what more guards, higher prison walls, and greater financial expenditures have failed to do-keep released inmates from returning to lives of crime.

Telling the stories in the 44-minute film are George Meyer, Al Capone's favorite driver; Floyd Hamilton, (Public Enemy No.1) the last of the Bonnie and Clyde Gang; Jerry Graham, the "robber King" of California;

and Ted Jefferson, convicted of crimes from drugs and robbery to murder. Also featured is "Chaplain Ray," whose Dallas-based International Prison Ministry has changed the lives of thousands of inmates over the past 18 years.

The Reverend Dell J. Crockett, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church, said he hopes all citizens concerned about the problem of rising crime will attend the free screening of the film.

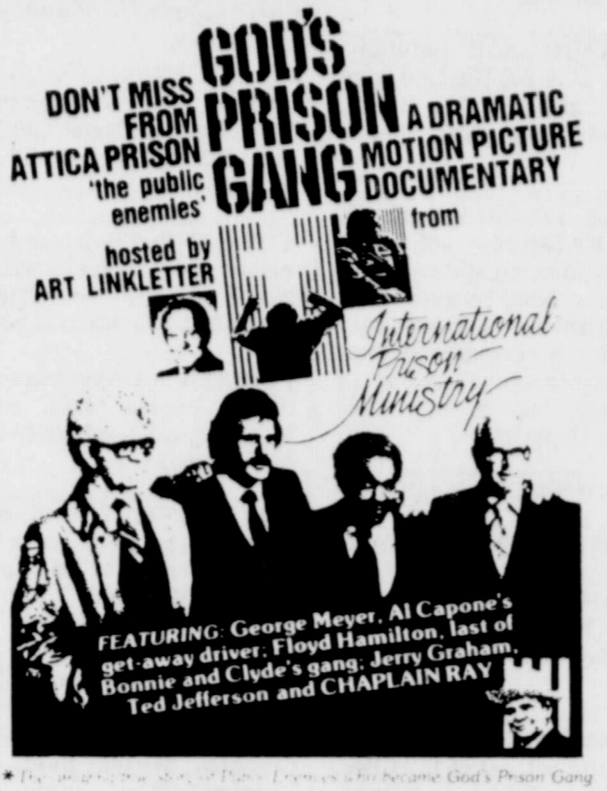
Motorcycle Is Abandoned Here

Did you know that most leases allow the manager to seize personal property, such as radios and cameras, for nonpayment of rent, if the provision is underlined or in bold print in the lease?

Without a written lease that specifically gives the right of seizure, the manager must go to court to seize the property.

In addition, a tenant cannot be locked out of an apartment for failure to pay rent. However, the manager may change the door lock when rent is overdue if written notice is left on the door telling where the key can be picked up at all hours, regardless of whether the overdue rent has been paid.

If a tenant moves prior to the end of the lease term, that tenant is liable for the rent to the end of the lease. The amount the next tenant pays in rent for the unexpired lease term of the previous tenant, however, must be credited to the previous tenant. Know and comply with your lease terms for a pleasant renting experience.

PURCHASING NEW HOME AFTER SELLING CAN CUT TAX BILL

If you have owned your home for several years, you have probably found that its value has gone up.

Consequently, if you were to sell the home, a net gain would be realized. According to the Internal Revenue Code, this gain must be reported on Form 2119 as taxable income.

A number of exceptions allow you to postpone such taxation. For instance, none of the gain is taxable if you can meet the following con-

ditions. First, your old house must have been your principal residence; second, another principal residence—costing more than the sales price of the former residence—must be purchased within a specified time.

For residences sold after July 20, 1981, you have two years to acquire the replacement residence. If you have specific questions about these tax rules, contact a tax expert.

EXEMPTION FROM GAIN ON SALE OF HOME

If you are a home owner aged 55 or older you may be aware that you are eligible for a tax exemption of \$125,000 on the gain from the sale of your residence.

You may not, however, be aware of some of the fine points relating to this provision. For instance, you can only use this exemption once in your lifetime.

If you are married and claim the exemption on a joint return, neither you nor your spouse are eligible to claim it again. If you or your spouse should later remarry, neither partner in the new marriage can claim the exemption.

Should you and your spouse file separate returns, however, you are each allowed a separate exemption of \$62,500. There are additional requirements for claiming this one-time tax exemption. For those call your local office of the Internal Revenue Service.

TEXANS PAY LESS FOR HOMES

A recent survey by the Texas Real Estate Research Center shows Texans are paying less for homes than the nationwide average, but are making larger monthly payments.

More than half of surveyed Texas homebuyers paid less than 10 percent down for

their house. Nationally, surveys indicate less than one out of three homebuyers made such low down payments.

Texans are buying new homes to a much greater extent than U.S. consumers overall. A greater portion of these Texas homebuyers use savings as the primary down payment source, while equity in a previous home is the major down payment source for buyers nationally.

Types of mortgages do not vary significantly, but Texans depend more heavily on mortgage companies than do homebuyers outside the state. Overall, Texans appear to have fewer economic constraints in purchasing a home and generally have newer, larger homes than the average homebuyer nationally.

KNOW WHAT YOU ARE BUYING OR SELLING

When entering into a real estate transaction make sure that you know specifically what you are buying or selling.

Many disputes arise at the time of closing the real estate transaction which could be avoided if both parties clearly understand the concept of real property.

Real property or real estate is land and anything attached to its surface.

For example, a chandelier that may have sentimental value to the seller may be the source of dispute. If the seller failed to specify that the chandelier was not to remain with the property then it is considered a part of the sale. Similar problems can

arise over mail boxes, stationary gas barbecue pits, shrubbery, portable buildings on a slab and so forth.

When in doubt, specify in the earnest money contract that the item does or does not remain with the property. For more information about what's included in a real estate transaction, talk to a real estate broker.

Travel Expenditures Generate County Payrolls

Over 3 billion dollars were spent by travelers in West Texas in 1981, according to the most recent figures available from the U.S. Travel Data Center and reported by West Texas Chamber of Commerce magazine, *This Is West Texas*. Total expenditure

growth in West Texas was 18 percent compared to a statewide growth of 15 percent.

According to the *This Is West Texas* story, it was found that nine West Texas counties were among the top twenty Texas counties in highest total travel expen-

ditures. These include Tarrant (3rd), El Paso (6th), Potter (12th), Lubbock (13th), McLennan (14th), Midland (15th), Extor (18th), Taylor (19th), and Wichita (20th).

Total travel expenditures for Eastland County was

\$5,948,000.00. Entitled "Travel in West Texas Its Impact on West Texas Economy," the *This Is West Texas* article attributes an excellent highway system and emphasis on travel by various West Texas cities for the travel expenditure increases.

Travel generates 129 jobs in Eastland County for a travel payroll of \$1,071,000.00. Travel means \$122,000.00 in state taxes and \$36,000 in local sales tax here.

West Texas travel meant over \$645 million in travel generated payroll in West Texas while generating 65,602 jobs. West Texas cities benefited from travel tax receipts of over \$31 million.

Texas Theme Park Is Closer To Reality

JARRELL—Plans for a new major theme amusement park to serve the I-35 corridor metropolitan areas of San Antonio, Austin, Killeen-Temple and Waco became two steps closer to being carried out June 6.

The first step was the signing of an agreement by a new corporation called "Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park Inc." to purchase the 75 acres formerly used by the Matterhorn Restaurant in Bell County on I-35 between the Prairie Dell and Jarrell exits. The seller is a bank which originally financed the construction of the Matterhorn Restaurant facility.

The former Matterhorn property includes a 70 ft. high concrete replica of the famous Matterhorn Mountain, 36 recently constructed buildings, a 3.3-acre fishing and boating lake with a wide and long concrete walkway along the edge of the lake, and a working miniature railroad with two trains, one-

half mile of track and a depot inside the former Matterhorn Restaurant which was located inside the Matterhorn mountain replica.

The scale, scheduled to be completed on or around June 15, 1983, provides that 10 of the 75 acres will be separately deeded from the balance of the land.

"The separate 19-acre parcel, which has some frontage on I-35, will be used to construct a recreational vehicle park and campgrounds to be called "Prairie Dell Lake Camping World," noted Phillip Fry, president of Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park Inc. and a developer and operator of mobile home parks and RV/camping parks in Arizona, Texas and the Midwest.

The second step, also on June 6, was the signing of a joint venture agreement to purchase \$5 million worth of major amusement rides from the owners of the rides once used at a former

amusement park in Ohio. The rides purchased include an eight-story high giant ferris wheel, a large sky ride with 80-ft. high supporting towers, a Super Roundup ride, a portable bumper car building with bumper cars, a flying scotter, an aerial rocket ride, a Tilt-a-Whirl, a Scrambler, a Rotor, and a wide variety of children's rides and other amusement park rides and equipment.

The next step being taken by Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park Inc. is the organization of a joint venture of Texans to build the largest wood roller coaster in the world.

"Seven million dollars of capital is required to construct such a coaster," noted Fry. "To qualify as America's biggest coaster, the Prairie Dell Lake coaster will have to have a first-thrill train drop of 180 feet and enough track length to give a four-minute ride of screams and thrills."

Prairie Dell Lake Amusement Park will open on a limited basis sometime in middle or late summer.

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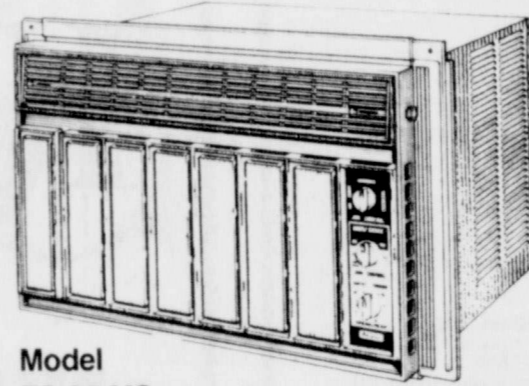
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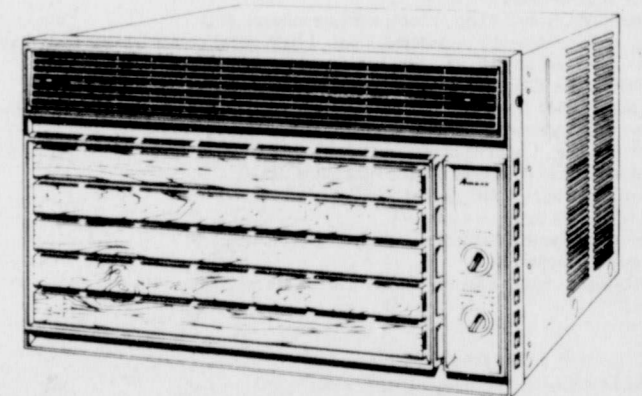

Within Mother Nature's domain we have friendly bugs such as ladybugs, honeybees as well as many others, then we have the unwanted bugs such as aphids, whitefly, spider mites, mealy bugs etc. The friendly bugs have helped through out the years to control the unwanted bugs through Mother Nature's environmental balance. Also, Livestock Handling the Easy Way, How to Work Beef Cattle Better, Sell 'Em or Keep 'Em Alternatives Panel, New Products in the Cattle Business, Integrated Reproduction Management and Program Your Beef Operation for a Profit.

Many of America's outstanding beef cattle experts, prominent ranchers and industry leaders will deliver addresses during the three days of IRR concurrent sessions. Each session will also be repeated at a later day or time for the ranchers' convenience.

Noted speakers sharing their expertise include T.C.U. Ranch Management Director John L. "Chip" Merrill; University Pretoria (South Africa) animal science department head Dr. Cas Maree; University of

Florida livestock geneticist Dr. Marvin Koger; Frank Moffett, D.V.M., Dilley.

Also, Dr. Pat Reardon, Chaparral Ranch, La Pryor; Dr. Tom Woodward, Texas America Bank, Fort Worth; livestock handling specialist Temple Grandlin, Urbana, Ill.; feedlot operator Kenneth Cox, Devine.

Also, Waymon Ashley, American Angus Association, Fort Worth; Lovell Kuykendall, American Hereford Association, Kansas City; and W.M. Warren, Santa Gertrudis Breeders International, Kingsville.

Also, Mark Quinn, D.V.M., Mesquite; Dick Fossler, Elanco, San Antonio; Bob Short, International Mineral Corp., Waco. Maree, Grandlin, Cox, Koger, Moffett and Quinn will all be available for the special "discussion session" where they can discuss in-depth problems with ranchers in an informal setting.

Participants in the beef cattle sessions also have the opportunity to attend concurrent sessions in sheep and goats, grazing management, marketing, wildlife, ranch family business management, plus a computer workshop for persons interested in computerized ranching aids. Over 100 ranching experts from 10 states and South Africa will appear on the program.

Four separate ranch tours

of progressive West Texas beef cattle, sheep and goats, grazing management and wildlife operations are available to IRR participants. The wildlife tour is a two-day tour with an overnight stay in Kerrville which visits scenic Texas Hill

Country ranches emphasizing management for wildlife operations.

All tours conclude on August 5 ending the conference, but persons who wish to make any of the four tours must register before July 1.

Minor Differences Found In Feedlot & Show Steers

COLLEGE STATION--When the smoke cleared from a recent study comparing feedlot and show steers at Texas A&M University, only minor differences were apparent.

Results of the study were aired at a Steer Production and Evaluation Symposium at Texas A&M May 20-21.

The study compared 46 steers that were put on a performance test last October in the same location and fed the same ration. The only difference was that some were halterbroken and handled as show steers while others were treated as feedlot steers.

Objectives of the study were to evaluate the performance of both feedlot and show steers and to relate this performance to the end-product of the beef cattle industry—the practical production of beef. The symposium featured these steers as live animals, frozen

animals and carcasses along with comments and opinions from a host of experts representing all phases of the cattle business.

Both groups of steers in the study compared favorably in growth and average daily gain during the 168-day feeding period. The show managed steers had a faster total growth rate—5.25 inches (measured at the hip) compared to 4.69 inches—while the feedlot steers averaged 2.25 pounds of gain a day compared to 2.19 for the show steers.

From a carcass standpoint the steers again compared favorably. However, several of the steers that were placed lower by judges during a live evaluation actually graded better from a carcass standpoint than the higher placed steers.

State Production Above 900 Million Barrel Figure

Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association reports that an 11th consecutive year of production at the maximum effective recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil fields kept 1982 petroleum production in the state above the 900-million barrel figure.

Avery Rush, Jr., chairman of the Dallas-based Association, says that figures compiled by its staff show the total petroleum output of

901,910,343 barrels included 871,780,379 barrels of crude oil and 30,129,964 barrels of condensate from wells in 214 of Texas' 254 counties.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 2,487,169 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 6,814 barrels per day. Production in 1982 boosted Eastland County's produc-

tion total through the end of the year to 132,594,726 barrels.

Crude oil and condensate production last year was 26.8-million barrels below the 1981 figure, a drop of 2.9-percent. This compares with a 3.3-percent drop in 1981 production from the year previous, Rush said.

Rush, of Amarillo, noted that this percentage of drop

of less than three-percent was the smallest in the last half-dozen years. He said he was encouraged by the continuing trend of a slowing in the rate of decline.

"The fact that 1982 production stayed above the 900-million barrels mark is attributable directly to the spectacular drilling boom in Texas during the last five years. We have drilled

almost 99,000 wells since 1977, with nearly 50,000 of them drilled in 1981 and 1982," Rush said.

"An economic and regulatory climate that will encourage a continuation of this high level of drilling activity is vital to the best interests of our state and nation. As the free world's economy continues to improve, the demand for

petroleum energy will increase. This need for more oil and gas is one that must be filled in significant measure by production from Texas wells," Rush added.

Also in a positive vein, 1982 production pushed the state's cumulative production total since 1866 to more than 47.5-billion barrels. However, for the 10th consecutive year, crude oil and condensate production in the nation's No. 1 energy-producing state was down after peaking at nearly 1.3-billion barrels in 1972.

Last year, 19 counties in the state produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil and condensate, down from 21 in both 1980 and 1981. The following listing shows 1982 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 39-million barrels.

Pecos, third last year and fourth in 1980, became the state's top producing county while Yoakum, the 1980 leader, held second place for the second consecutive year. Last year's leading producer, Gaines, dropped to third. Ector, which held third place for six consecutive years from 1975 to 1980, remained in fourth place for the second consecutive year. Gregg retained the fifth place ranking it has held since 1980.

Montgomery, which was No. 16 last year, and Brazoria, which was No. 17, were the only two counties to leave the 10-million-plus listing.

Gregg, the first Texas county to produce more than two-billion barrels of crude oil and condensate in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with cumulative total through 1982 of 2,812,400,388 barrels. Ector, through the end of last year, had produced 2,397,529,526 barrels, while Andrews had

produced 2,054,626,749 barrels as of Jan. 1, 1983.

Plans Revealed To Drill In P. Cameron Field

Chase-Mann Petroleum Inc. of Ft. Worth has revealed plans to drill a 4,000-foot developmental well in the P. Cameron Field. The operator has 93-acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 42, Blk. 4 and has designated the venture as the No. 1 B. McGough. Drillsite is four miles northwest of Eastland.

Location has been staked by Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge for a 3,750-foot developmental probe in Eastland County's REB Field, four miles north of Eastland. The well is designated as the No. 2 Tankersley "A". Drillsite will be in a 70-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 15, Blk. 4.

Flowing natural gas at the rate of 93,000 CF per day on a 3/4-inch choke, the No. 3 White is a successful new developmental well in Eastland County's Lee Ray Field. P&R Oil Inc. of Eastland is the operator.

The well exhibited absolute open flow potential of 95,100 CFD. Location is in a 332-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-1913, about six miles northwest of Eastland.

After entering the pay zone at 3,872 feet, the well bottomed at 4,135 feet and will produce from a set of perforations ranging from 3,880 to 3,906 feet into the hole.

George Harris of Abilene has filed for permit to drill a 1,650-foot wildcat for oil or gas eight miles northeast of Rising Star, in Eastland County's John Sapp Survey, No. 34. The explorer will be known as the No. 1-A-S Agnew. The operator has 20-acres under lease.

The No. 1 C.E. Graham, a developmental well in Eastland County's JMJ Field, is scheduled to be drilled eight miles northeast of Cisco. Richey & Company Inc. of Ft. Worth is listed as the operator. Location is in a 100-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-222. Projected total depth is 4,300 feet.

A 500-foot wildcat for oil or gas is planned by Gro-Tex Inc. of Paducah at a drillsite two miles northeast of Dothan, Eastland County. The location is in a 390-acre lease in the TE&L Co. Survey, A-520. Well's designation is the No. 2 Jobe.

Southwestern Energy of Burleson has revealed plans to drill a 650-foot developmental probe in the Eastland Regular Field, three miles north of Scranton. The well will be located in a 76-acre lease in Eastland County's B.B.B. & C. RR Co. Survey, Sec. 2, Blk. 2 and is to be designated as the No. 1 Jewell.

At a location seven miles west of Cisco, N.T. Apple of Merriam, Kansas has completed the No. 19, 21, 22 and

23 Roy Adams, four new oilers in the Eastland Regular Field.

Drillsites were in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's W.W. Sublett Survey, A-1193.

The wells each showed potential for pumping 10 barrels of crude oil per day, all on open chokes. Total drilling depths ranged from 428 feet to 459 feet, with pay zones being logged between 360 and 422 feet. Each was perforated for production with intervals ranging between 360 and 450 feet.

Location has been staked by Hanvey Production Co. of Dallas for a 4,300-foot wildcat in Eastland County. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 Hanvey-Scott. It is in a 40-acre lease in the SPRR Co. Survey, Sec. 503, five miles northwest of Cisco.

Westrock Co. of Grand Prairie has filed for permit to plug-back, for shallower pay, at the R.E. Harper, in the Eastland Regular Field. The well is in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's O.P. England Survey, A-578, two miles southwest of Ranger and has a proposed total depth of 3,300 feet.

Pumping 34 barrels of crude per day, a new producer has been finalized in the Ranger Field by Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge. The location is in a 440-acre lease in Eastland County's HT&B RR Co. Survey, Sec. 127, five miles northwest of Ranger. Well's designation is the No. 2 Earnest.

Total drilling depth was 3,750 feet, with the pay zone being entered at 3,400 feet. The well was perforated to produce from an interval 3,402 to 3,505 feet into the hole.

A wildcat for oil or gas is scheduled for spudding one mile northeast of Gorman by N.L. Apple of Lewisburg, Kansas. The well will be known as the No. 2B Wesley Warren, with projected total depth of 800 feet. It will be situated in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 3, Blk. 1.

The No. 7A Starr, a developmental try in Eastland County's Scranton Field, is scheduled to be spudded two miles south of Scranton. With projected total depth of 2,000 feet, the well will be in a 5-acre lease in the William J. Morgan Survey, A-375. J.J. Johnson of San Angelo is the operator.

Van Oil Corp. of Duncanville has posted first production data for the No. 107 J.S. Brown, a new gas well located in the Fair Field, nine miles south of Ranger. Drillsite was in a 120-acre lease in Eastland County's McLennan County School Land Survey, A-368.

With total depth of 3,393 feet, the well entered the pay zone at 3,252 feet and will produce from an interval 3,252 to 3,266 feet. It showed potential for 117,000 CF gas per day on a 1-inch choke. Absolute open flow was rated at 130,000 CFD.

Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 Henderson, a 4,000-foot developmental try in the Snow Field, six miles north of Eastland. The operation will be in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 8, Blk. 4.

March Figures Down 14.35% From Last Year

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 452,822,019 Mcf of gas in March, down 14.35 percent from field runs a year earlier. That brings the total gas production for the year to date to 1,382,720,664 Mcf of gas.

Marketed gas production in March totaled 374,065,184 Mcf and reflected a 15.91 percent decrease from the March 1982 volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines, carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.

Gas exported from Texas in March totaled 198,782,437 Mcf. Exports of Texas-

produced gas in March totaled 151,310,472 Mcf, and reflected a 27.85 percent decrease from the year-earlier month.

Texas gas production in March came from 234,264 oil and gas wells.

In February 1982, Texas wells produced 432,402,219 Mcf of gas. Marketed gas production in February totaled 356,859,036 Mcf. February exports of Texas-produced gas totaled 152,870,188 Mcf.

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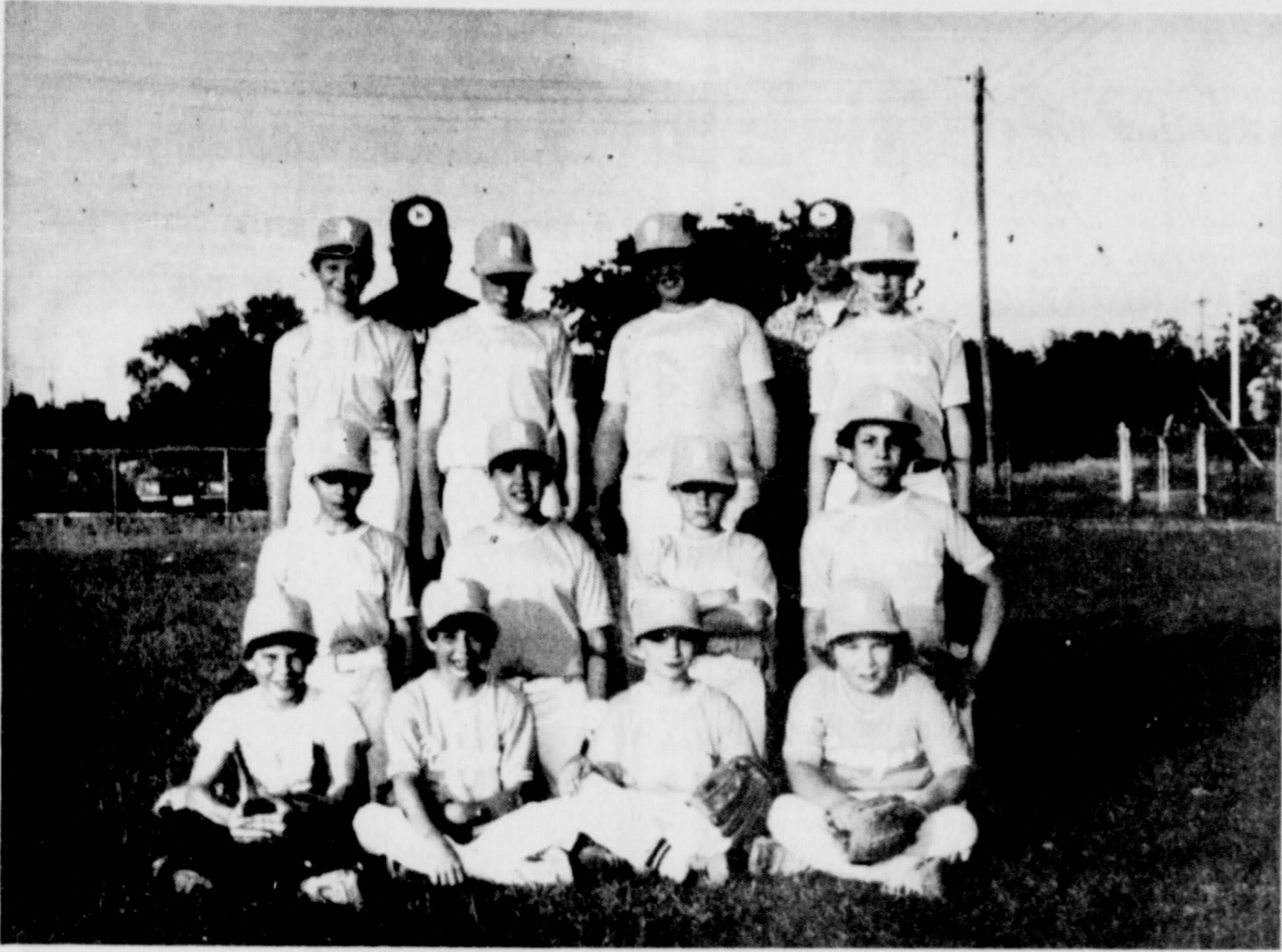

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Ashley Bailey is a 9½ month old baby girl from Clyde, Texas, whose days to live could well be numbered by a faulty bile duct in her liver. She and her parents are currently waiting for a donor liver to be identified, hopefully before the clock runs out.

Interest in Ashley's case has spread throughout the country — even into the White House — at first financial assistance for the family was sought, then state legislation was passed to fund a special pilot project that would benefit the infant, and, finally the long wait for a donor began.

Two months ago, Ashley's family contacted me to try to help facilitate Medicaid fun-

ding from the transplant. In the ensuing weeks, my own interest in the case has given me a deep awareness of many of the important issues we now face in regard to transplants, including the questions of the cost of such medical care and how a donor is located.

Amidst the excitement of the medical miracles brought about by today's organ transplants, we often overlook the serious moral and ethical questions involved; questions being confronted on several fronts at this time.

Ashley's case illustrates several of these important issues. Financial problems have now been resolved and Ashley's doctors at the University of Minnesota Hospital have said her condition is as good as it is going to get, before she enters a period of steady decline. Only a donor liver is needed.

At the request of her family, I worked to try to attract national media attention to Ashley's need; attention that had proved successful for other transplant patients.

The father of one of those patients—Jamie Fiske—made an appeal for Ashley at a recent high level conference on transplants attended by a wide array of medical professionals across the country. Members of my staff questioned the Surgeon General of the United States at that conference, asking what hope could be held out for those patients in immediate need, such as Ashley.

Those efforts have triggered other questions: What of that child whose Congressman chooses not to speak up in his or her behalf? Is their need lost in the midst of publicity that only a few such cases receive? How can you justify such efforts for one child, when there are many, many others also waiting for donors?

Even as I recognize the validity of those questions, my answer is a simple one: At some point in almost every parent's life, a nagging question presents itself, usually in the dark of night. If there were a fire and I knew I could save only one of my children, which child

would I save? The answer to that age-old question is, "You would save the first child you could."

So, in Ashley's case, the answer is the same. How can any member of our society say, "No, if I can't help them all, I won't help even one."

Ultimately, as individual transplant cases receive widespread attention, public awareness of the overall need is achieved. It is through that public awareness — that emotional impact that one child's fight for life can have — that we will all move closer to the point where we, as parents, as doctors and emergency room personnel will be able to break through the grief of a death of a child to be able to give the gift of life to another, unknown child.

Certainly the media has a role to play in this massive public awareness campaign, but you and I as individuals have an equal role. We begin by talking with family members; by signing a donor card and making our family, friends and physician aware of that decision; by asking our service club or church group to sponsor discussions to help increase

awareness. In short, it is our responsibility to care and then go beyond talking about

an issue such as this to acting upon that issue in the best manner possible.
