If you are shopping for a home loan, you should be aware the effective rate of interest available for housing varies with individual lender and with the type of loan.

In May 1981, typical interest rates were 15.5 to 16 percent for fixed-rate mortgages. Rollover mortgages—whereby rates would increase or decrease every three years—were available in the 15 to 15.5 percent range. The Federal Housing Administration loan rate also was 15.5 percent, but points charged to the seller raised the effective rate above that level.

Remember, if you are interested in purchasing real estate, shop around for the best lender terms. And don't forget to investigate closing costs along with the effective interest rate. Your real estate broker will assist you with this important task.

### ZERO-LOT-LINE HOMES INCREASING

Some developers are trying to keep land costs down through a technique called zero-lot-line construction. Zero-lot-line homes are placed on small lots and are set off to the side of the lot rather than positioned in the center as with conventional housing.

The typical zero-lot-line

home has a windowless wall on the lot line, assuring privacy in the side yard of the home next door. Zero-lot-line construction achieves the economical land use of high density housing without sacrificing the privacy of single-family detached home ownership.

One reason for the increasing price of homes is the increasing cost of land. The price of a lot now accounts for about 15 to 30 percent of the cost of a new home. So, if you are trying to buy more home for less money, you should investigate a zero-lot-line housing development.

### THE GROWTH OF RURAL TEXAS

If you have noticed some new building activity in the small towns around the state, it is not surprising. Rural Texas is growing.

For the first time in half a

century, rural counties are generating population increases. The figures gathered in the 1980 census tell the story. After losing people steadily since the 1930s, the state's 64 rural counties—those with no town of more than 2,500—had a net population increase of more than 66,000 in the 1970s.

That is an average gain of more than 1,000 per county, and many of these counties are at least 100 miles from any big city.

So, while the states metropolitan areas still attract the greatest number of people, a sizeable group of old and new Texans are deciding that rural areas are the best place for them to live.

### BATHROOMS FOR THE ELDERLY AND HANDICAPPED

Here are some ideas that can make the bathroom safer for an elderly or handicapped user.

The shower floor should be

flush with the floor outside, and a seat and flexible hose are conveniences in the shower. The wet surfaces of showers and bathtubs can be made more slip resistant by applying adhesive-backed strips of nonskid material. Colored paint to indicate hot and cold water faucets is helpful. To prevent accidental scalding, water should not be heated to more than 120 degree Fahrenheit.

If the bathroom is used by someone in a wheelchair, lavatories should be supported well enough to hold a person's weight. Bathtubs should be low-rimmed, with convenient grip handles mounted on the walls beside the tub.

By using these simple, accident-prevention ideas, you can make life at home safer and more convenient

for an elderly or handicapped resident.

### HIGH INTEREST RATES PROMOTE FHA LOANS

Interest rates of Federal Housing Administration (FHA) mortgage loans have risen to historically high levels. On the surface, this action appears to make such loans less useful for borrowers. In fact, it is part of an effort to make them more useful.

When the FHA interest rate is lower than conventional rates, lenders require payment of certain fees called discount points to increase the income generated by the loan. Since the number of points paid by the borrower is limited by law, the seller of the home must pay any additional points.

Faced with paying these fees, many sellers are reluctant to sell when FHA financing is proposed. Maintaining interest rates closer to conventional rates helps make FHA financing more acceptable to sellers—and even in today's inflated market, financing rather than cost is the greatest barrier to home ownership.

# Texans Have Pessimistic Outlook Toward Crime

Well over one-half (57%) of the Texans who responded to the latest Texas Crime Poll said they were afraid they would be the victim of a crime during the next year. More than a third (36.4%) of those who responded had been victims of at least one crime in the previous year.

The poll was conducted by the Criminal Justice Center at Sam Houston State University. Dr. Raymond H.C. Teske, Jr., director of the Center's Survey Research Program, said that Texans in general are rather pessimistic when it comes to their outlook

toward crime. A total of 1,442 Texans from 1974 of the state 254 counties, selected at random, responded to the most recent survey. Six in 10 (61%) said the crime problem in their community has become worse in the past three years, and about half

(51%) expect it to become worse during the next three years.

As a response to their fear of crime, four of five (80%) say they have placed at least one type of security device in their home for protection.

In the past five years, said Teske, there has been a significant increase on those who have installed door bolts. In 1977, in response to an earlier Texas Crime Poll, 31% said they had installed door bolts. That figure increased to 43% in the latest poll.

Respondents were asked about their experiences with crime for a year (1981) and for their lifetime. Of the 1,442 respondents, 525, or 36.4%, reported having been the victims of 1,128 crime incidents in 1981. Respondents also reported 3,962 lifetime victimizations, or an average of 2.75 victimizations per respondent.

Crimes which occurred most frequently were home burglary (32.5% lifetime, 13% in 1981); motor vehicle theft (15.6%, 5%); other theft (34.4%, 12%); assault

with body (21.8%, 5%); assault with weapon (9.6%, 1%); and rape or attempted rape (7.5%, 1%).

"Crime has a significant impact on Texans' lives," said Teske, "because most Texans either experience serious crime personally or know someone who does."

According to the survey, 73.7% of the respondents knew at least one person who was the victim of a crime

during 1981, and one in ten (9.5%) knew at least one person who was a victim of murder. Almost a third (30%) knew at least one person who was a victim of murder during their lifetime.

One in 10 (9.4%) of all respondents and 11.3% of female respondents knew someone who was the victim of rape or attempted rape during 1981, and 27.7% knew at

least one person who was a victim of those offenses during their lifetime.

Although many people experience crime, said Teske, not all report those crimes. Only slightly more than half (54%) of the respondents who were victims during the previous year reported the crimes to a law enforcement officer.

The crime type most likely to have been reported was

robbery (91%); followed by burglary of a home (77%) and motor vehicle theft (70%).

The reporting rates for other crimes were: arson or attempted arson (50%); rape or attempted rape (50%); other theft (48%); vandalism or malicious mischief (42%); assault with body (39%); fraud (37%); and assault with weapon (35%).

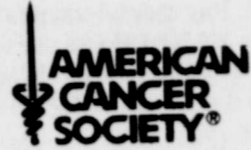

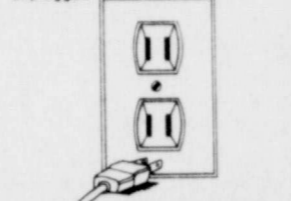

## Congressional Comments

**Cong. Charles Stenholm**

WASHINGTON, D.C.—It's been called the salvation of American agriculture, and a boondoggle complicated enough to stump Rube Goldberg. It's been hailed as a money-saver, and assailed as the most expensive farm program in history. It's the Payment-in-Kind (PIK) program, and it has been the focus of agricultural policy since it was first proposed last fall.

At that time, it had become clear that something had to be done about the massive crop surpluses that were keeping farmers'

prices low. Not only did these surpluses perpetuate the farm recession, they also made government price support costs skyrocket: from \$4 billion in 1981 to \$12 billion in 1982 to a projected \$21 billion in 1983.

The Department of Agriculture designed and implemented PIK in a remarkably brief period. The program was not an initiative of the Congress, though many farm-state legislators welcomed PIK as "the only game in town." County ASCS workers burned the mid-night oil to get the program details out and the paperwork done, and when the smoke cleared it turned out that far more farmers had decided to participate than anyone had thought likely. Producers who signed up for PIK agreed to take a large portion of their acreage out of production so surpluses would be drawn

down; in return, they would receive surplus commodities from government - and producer held stockpiles.

Response was heavy. The latest USDA projections estimate that U.S. cotton production could be reduced by almost a third from last year, U.S. wheat production by a fifth, and corn prices by two-fifths. These reductions are not expected to increase consumer food prices substantially, but they offer real hope of getting farm production back into balance and so are good news for most farmers.

But the heavy participation has caused another problem: Because the farmers who are entitled to PIK aren't necessarily the same ones who have the surplus grain, the government has had a hard time finding enough PIK commodities to go around. It has even required some farmers to "plant for PIK," that is, harvest their current crop, take a government

guaranteed price for it, and then sell it again on the open market.

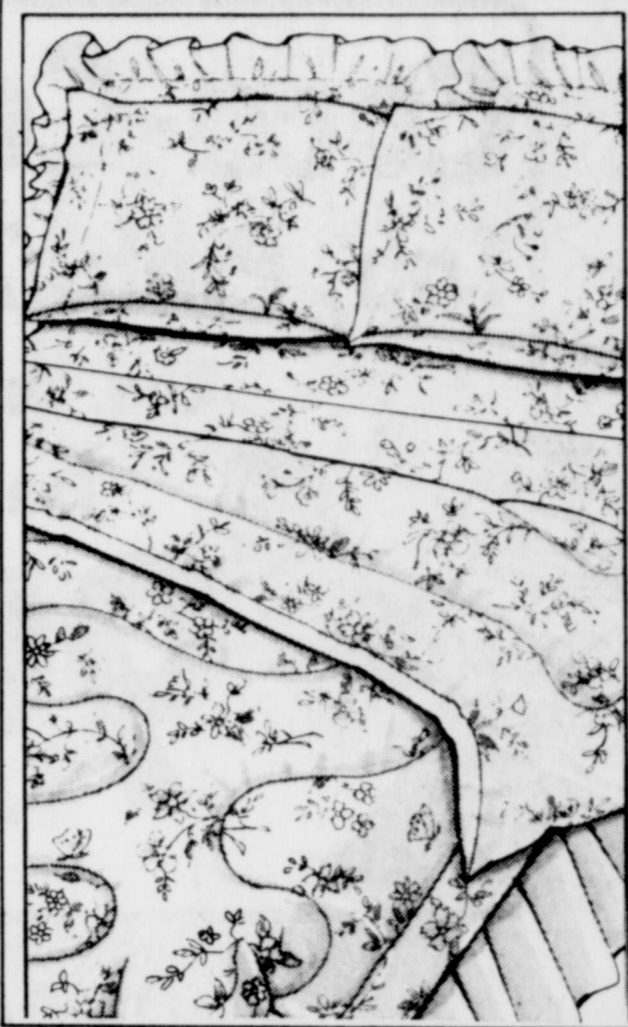
PIK has caused some problems. After all, a program that helps raise grain farmers' prices will also have an adverse effect on livestock raisers and dairymen in the short run. Small agricultural businesses have also suffered from heavy PIK participation. Yet the program will likely achieve at least a "breathing space" for agriculture. And while farmers catch their breath, they should begin thinking about what comes next. Clearly, PIK is a short-term measure. Massive over-production and equally massive taxpayer costs mean that something has to change in agricultural policy. Now is the time to begin deciding the directions for the future - to go beyond PIK and achieve a coherent and workable food and fiber policy for the rest of the 20th century and beyond.

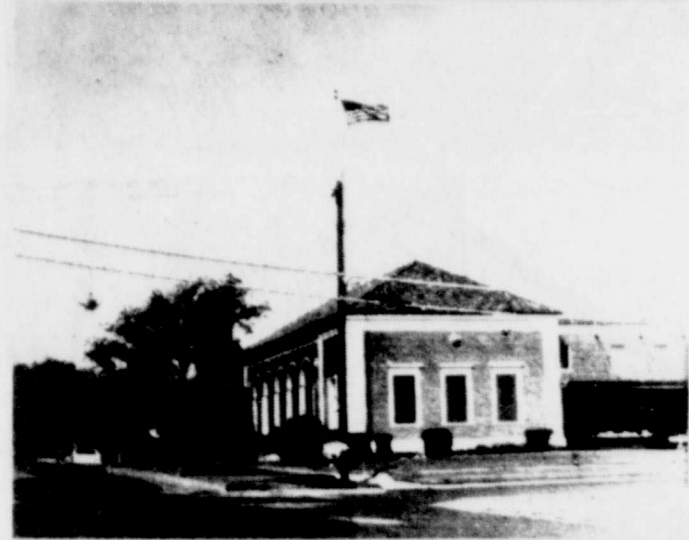
**Kerry Wilson Graduates From ACU**

**Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

**Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies**

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. Southwestern Bell is proposing changes in the structure of the present private line and foreign exchange services. Changes in these rates may affect customers of other telephone companies. ## House Of Representatives

### Jim Parker-District 65

In the encounters I have had with many of you since the end of the 68th Legislative session, I have noted a good deal of misunderstanding as to pay and benefits afforded a State Representative.

I think each of you should know how much money I am paid and why I am paid the money. As I stated in an earlier article, the first order of business for the 68th session was to give ourselves, as state represen-

tatives, a \$1,000 per month increase in expenditure monies. I voted against the measure because 1) I felt I could run my office at least as cheaply as my predecessor and 2) I thought it a little hypocritical to give ourselves a 20% office expense increase at a time when we did not have the

funds available for many meritorious projects that we inadequately funded.

Specifically, each state representative is allowed \$7,500 for the first month of the session; \$6,500 per month for the remaining months of the session; and \$5,500 per month during the interim. These funds are used to pay staff, telephone expenses, postage, and general office costs for both my Austin and district offices, if I choose to spend state funds to actually set up a district office. Most of the rural representatives and some of the more conservative urban representatives habitually turn back in fairly large amounts of money to the state that they have not used. At this writing I have \$11,000 in unused state funds and would anticipate I would at least be able to turn in around \$20,000 at the end of my two-year term. The unfortunate part of this is that too many state represen-

tatives feel if they have it, they ought to spend it. Obviously, if everyone attempted to operate as frugally as I am, the state would be \$3M better off at the end of my term. Relatively speaking, that is not a lot of money, but "every little bit counts."

My salary is a flat rate of \$600 per month for 24 months and I am paid while the Legislature is in session, for a 140-day session, the sum of \$30 per day for expenses. Additionally, I receive mileage, during the session, at the rate of 23 cents per mile for a round trip home and back per week. That is the total pay package and I cannot use any of the "office expense funds" for my personal use. There will be a referendum on the November, 1984 ballot whereby you, the voter, can increase the amount we receive daily for expenses to roughly \$75 per day. While the cheapest hotel room I could find was \$35 a day (within reasonable distance

to the Capitol) and while I would at least like to have my expenses covered, I would urge you not to vote "yes" on that referendum issue on my account because I knew what the job paid when I asked for it.

I would like to be paid a much, much better salary, but one of the things that has made the Texas state government one that works is, I believe, the fact we are not full-time paid politicians, but "plain vanilla" people, just like you, who are compelled by economics to get down here, tend to the business at hand, and get back home to try to make a living.

It is a public service job in the strictest sense of the word and I think it should remain so.

Recently I have received a lot of inquiries about fish emulsion and seaweed as a fertilizer. For many years we have known that fish emulsion has been an excellent fertilizer for house plants and for bulbs. One of the most important advantages of fish emulsion is that it is a slow release fertilizer thus lessening the chance of fertilizer burn. Fish emulsion has a good supply of the trace elements that our plants require for strong growth.

Seaweed is a truly 100% organic fertilizer for your plants. Seaweed has been known to free up the nutrients that are tied up in the soil by promoting the natural biological functions of the soil. By freeing these nutrients in the soil means faster growth and more uniform blossoms for healthier plant. Your primary plant food source in seaweed is ascophyllum nodosum seaweed. Seaweed has proved to be very beneficial for vegetables by promoting larger and more uniform fruit from a much healthier plants.

Your Garden Editor has used both of these items by combining them on bulbs and vegetables for many years. The tomatoes and the cucumbers were much

larger and the plants were very healthy where this combination of seaweed and fish emulsion was used. This same combination of seaweed and fish emulsion was used on Tulips, Hyacinths and Dahlias and the same types of results were achieved. The tulips were much larger with a better color texture and the Dahlias produced the same results. The Hyacinths not only produced larger blooms but also produced a much more fragrant flower.

I have wondered why some fertilizer company did not combine the seaweed and the fish emulsion into one fertilizer and market it for the gardening public. Recently my thoughts on this was put to rest with the introduction of a product called "Sea Born" plant food (fertilizer). "Sea Born" has a guaranteed analysis of five per cent nitrogen, ten per cent phosphoric acid and ten per cent soluble potash with the secondary plant foods of Baron, Iron, Mafanese, Molybdenum and Zinc. This combination of fish emulsion and seaweed fertilizer is what we have needed for a long time.

Due to meeting room space limitations, IRR participants must be limited to the first 750 who register. If space is available, late registration can be done at the door.

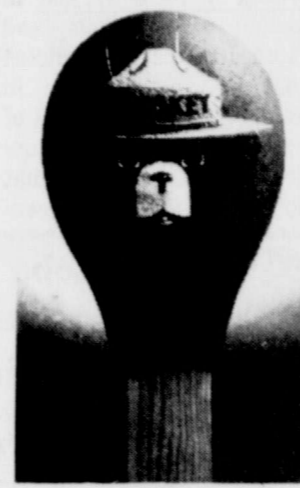
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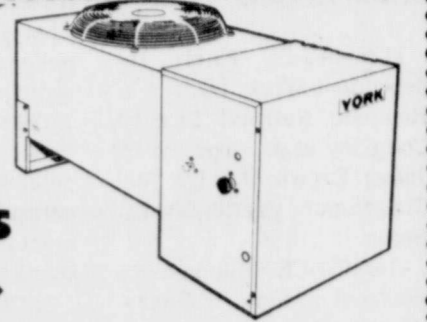

Such Statement of Intent includes the proposed revisions of tariffs and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change, the effect the proposed change is expected to have on the revenues of the Company and the classes and numbers of utility customers affected. Systemwide retail adjusted annual revenues are expected to be increased 11.4 per cent by the new rates. 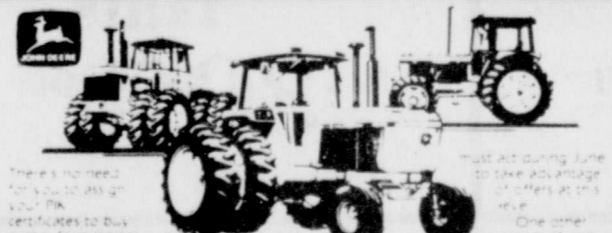

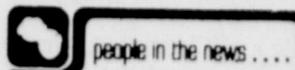
