## Last Day Draws Near For Ambulance Drive

Tom Patterson, owner of the Ambulance Service for Cisco and Eastland, reminds citizens that July 31 is the last day to join for the year 1983-84.

The membership fee is \$39 per person, or for a family with children under 19 yrs. of age living at home. The membership fee has increased \$3 this year, due to the fact insurance companies will not pay 100% of the ambulance fees, and there are cuts in medicare and medicaid.

"The Ambulance Service is a community endeavor and not necessarily a personal one," states Patterson. "I would like to continue with the membership being supported by the citizens of Eastland and Cisco as it has been in the past."

"Without continued support we will no longer be able to provide an Ambulance Service to these communities."

At present 400 members from both cities have joined the service, which is 1200 short of the 1600 needed. Non-members who call the Service will be expected to pay cash for each time they use it.

With membership, however, a person has ambulance service for admittance to any hospital within a 60 mile radius of Eastland.

Patterson states his appreciation for the public support of the Service for the past three years, and hopes that it may continue. Membership blanks can be obtained at Cisco and Eastland City Halls. They are also available with the Ambulance advertisement in the newspapers. Completed forms may be mailed to P.O. Box 912, Eastland, Tex. 76448.

## Golden Triangle Declares Stockholders Dividend

Golden Triangle Royalty & Oil, Inc. (GTR) declared on July 20, a 5% stock dividend payable September 30 to stockholders of record August 29. Golden Triangle has 13,259,416 shares outstanding and, after paying this dividend, will have 13,922,387 shares outstanding. Fractional shares will not be issued, but a cash payment will be made in lieu thereof. The Company's transfer agent is Texas American Bank/Fort Worth N.A., P.O. Box 2604, Fort Worth, Texas 76113, phone (817)338-8423.

As of July 1, GTR had retired all of its long term debt and had paid all of its short term obligations and it is now in a positive cash position.

Under 81,762,240 gross surface acres, GTR holds a 3,543,151 net royalty acre interest covering fifteen oil and gas concessions in Queensland, Australia. These concessions are being explored by such companies as Esso Exploration & Production Australia, Inc. (a subsidiary of Exxon Corporation), Tenneco Oil & Minerals of Australia, Inc. (currently drilling) and others, all of whom are obligated to bear the costs of exploration. Although there is as yet no production on Australia concessions in which Golden Triangle holds interests, the Company's vast exposure enhances the possibility of future discoveries of oil or gas on the Queensland areas where the Company does have overriding royalty interests. Exploration on these areas is continuing in 1983 by the operating companies, at no cost to Golden Triangle.

A seismic program is being completed by Kugler and Newberry on GTR's most important holding in western Queensland, in preparation for drilling their first well, probably later this year, on a concession totaling

•Passed until the next meeting the consideration of having a service contract for the copy machine in the District Clerk's office.

•Heard the County Auditor's Quarterly report.

•Approved the routine bills and accounts.

Landowners whose property boundary is marked by a stream may wonder what would happen if the stream changed its course. Do they stand to gain or lose large quantities of land overnight due to a sudden shift of the stream?

The answer to this question depends on what caused the watercourse to change. There are three possible causes: avulsion, accretion and erosion. Avulsion is the sudden change in the course of a stream caused by flooding. Avulsion may cause the creation of a new stream bed but the boundary remains at the old location.

Accretion is the gradual increase of buildup of land caused by the normal movement of water. Erosion is the wearing away of the land caused by the normal movement of water. If the stream shifts due to accretion or erosion, the property's boundary shifts accordingly. If you have questions concerning your ownership rights, please contact an attorney.

**THE LEASE AGREEMENT**  
For a pleasant renting experience, both tenant and manager will benefit if certain provisions are specified in the lease.

These points include the amount of rent, when, where and to whom it is payable and any refund provisions should the tenant move before the lease expires. The

date the tenant may move in and the expiration of the lease should also be specified.

In addition, mention should be made of the number of persons allowed as tenants, the amount of security deposit, if any, and the conditions under which that deposit will be refunded. The lease should describe who pays for electricity, water, gas, telephone, cable TV, garbage removal and repairs.

Further, the lease should describe rules about pets, musical instruments, stereos, TV antennas, washers, dryers, water beds and so forth. Don't forget to spell out who has responsibility for yard maintenance and to outline the terms under which the landlord may inspect the premises. Remember, the more complete the initial lease agreement, the less chance there is for later conflict.

### WHAT IS A ZONING ORDINANCE?

A city zoning ordinance has two basic parts, a text and a map. The ordinance needs both of these to be effective and understandable.

In some jurisdictions, amendments or changes to the text occur frequently, therefore, it is important to examine these amendments as well as the text. Until the text is reprinted, these amendments can normally be found attached to the back of the ordinance. Be sure to ask the zoning official whether you have all of the amendments.

The zoning map relates the text of the zoning ordinance to specific parcels of land in the municipality. Usually, a short section in the text of the ordinance refers to the map. This section normally states that the zoning map is part of the ordinance, even though it is not shown in detail in the text.

For more information about zoning in your

municipality, call your city planning office.

### SELECT HOME WITH GOOD TRAFFIC PATTERNS

Here are some tips that will help you select or design a home with good traffic flow patterns.

Experts suggest that your main entrance should lead people directly into the living room and be easily accessible from the driveway is also desirable. This entrance can be used for bringing in groceries and wet or muddy children.

The room arrangement of the house should allow you to go from any room to any other room without passing through a third room, and the living room should be isolated from the normal traffic flow of the house to permit undisturbed conver-

sation or entertainment. The kitchen is the heart of the house and should be central to all areas.

Finally, routes between all rooms in the house and the outdoor areas should be short and direct.

### TEXAS BUCKS THE RURAL LAND TREND

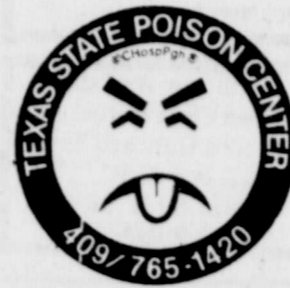
If you want to predict rural land market trends in Texas, don't look at the rest of the nation. During the last decade, national trends have not been a sound basis for predicting movements in the Texas rural land market.

For example, farm land values did not escalate during the 1970's in Texas to the extent they did in farming areas of the mid-west. Texas ranchland continued to appreciate during the 1970's and early 1980's, showing lit-

tle or no response to depressed economic conditions in the livestock industry.

These trends illustrate the fact that economic forces behind the demand for rural land in many regions of the state have not been entirely dependent on the net returns from agriculture.

Recent stresses felt in the agricultural sector of the economy have not had a dramatic negative impact on Texas land values based on the latest available figures from mid-1982.

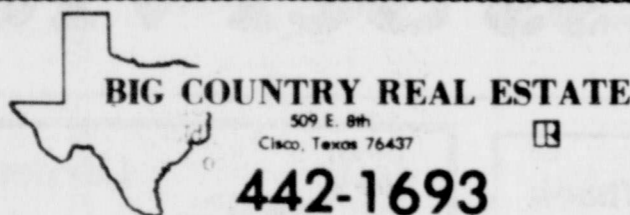

# Commissioner Orders Sale Of Land

AUSTIN--Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro today issued an order for sale notice on approximately 120 tracts of land that had previously been ordered forfeited by the Veterans Land Board. The owners of the delinquent tracts failed

to comply with a July 22 deadline to bring payments current for reinstatement. The action was taken at the monthly meeting of the Veterans Land Board. Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "The sale

is in keeping with my commitment to run the Veterans Land Program in a sound, efficient business-like manner."

"In order for the Veterans Land Board to continue offering generous terms to our veterans, a strong delinquent collection policy must be maintained. Some loans on this list were as old as four years with no payments made. If we are going to continue to close loans on this program in 90 days, payments will have to be made on time," Mauro stated.

Delinquent contract holders have until August 15 to vacate the land.

"The Veterans Land Program has never cost the taxpayers a single penny. By running the program on a sound, business-like basis, I intend to ensure that it never will."

The September 30 sale will be by sealed bid only with a minimum bid set by the Board. A bid form, the list of forfeited tracts, bidding instructions and directions as to how to reach each tract for inspection will be available August 31 from the Veterans Land Board 1700 North Congress, Austin, Texas 78701.

Mauro said that reducing the number of delinquent accounts will provide additional money for new loans to Texas veterans who have applied to the Veterans Land Program.

"My commitment to a closely-monitored collection policy on delinquencies will ensure that not a single tax-dollar is wasted on this program. I believe this policy will best serve the needs of the state and our Texas veterans," Mauro said.

Approximately 40 of the more than 250 contract

holders that received delinquent account forfeiture notices from the Board on July 1 brought their accounts up to date and were reinstated. An additional 65 contract holders have

brought their accounts up to date but are pending reinstatement based on receipt by the Veterans Land Board of Tax certificates showing proof of tax payments.

## Program Offers

### Wheat Insurance

Additional insurance protection at no additional cost is available to Eastland County wheat growers who qualify to participate in an Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) program, according to Ardell M. Kalmbach, district director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

The IYC program is designed to enable farmers with a history of high yield to obtain insurance guarantees based on their own production experience. Kalmbach explains that for each bushel an IYC participant is able to document that yields have been above the local average, up to \$3 an acre of extra insurance protection can be obtained at no increase in the premium.

To be eligible, the FCIC official adds, a farmer must have accepted proof of acreage and production for least the three most recent crop years. This information should be taken to the local ASCS office to obtain the necessary yield certification.

Once this certification of yield has been obtained, it simply a matter of submitting it to the agent who is writing the insurance policy. The extra coverage will be added automatically, according to Kalmbach. Federal Crop Insurance policies, which are backed by the U.S. Government, are written by independent insurance agents and private insurance companies.

The Federal Government pays up to 30 percent of the premium cost as well as administrative and sales costs, and the balance is paid by the policyholder. Protection is provided against most unavoidable causes of crop damage.

Eastland County wheat growers wishing information about the eligibility requirements for the IYC program should contact the ASCS Office in Eastland, Texas. ASCS can also provide a list of local agents and companies authorized by the FCIC to offer the insurance.

## Garden Editor

Throughout the years of gardening we have seen many different types of sprayers. You may remember one of the first types of sprayers with a round reservoir holding about one pint liquid with a long tube with a plunger on the top side of the reservoir as the reservoir lays on its side. You sprayed by pulling

the plunger back and forth. This sprayer was called a flit gun.

Then we have the hose-on sprayer with a container containing the item to be sprayed connected to the end of a garden hose. As water passed through the hose it acted as a syphon pump as it mixed and sprayed the item to be sprayed at the same

time. Then we come to the pump up tank sprayer. At first we mixed the item to be sprayed in a galvanized metal tank and pumped air into the tank by a handle on top of the tank as we carried the tank from plant to plant.

There were problems with this sprayer, the galvanized tank eventually pitted and rusted out. Then later the tank was changed to a plastic tank eliminating the

rusting an the weight problem with the galvanized tanks. You were still limited to the height of this tank type of sprayer would reach. When you had the galvanized tank with this type spray there were additional problems when the tank became pitted there would be some residue left in the tank that would be mixed and sprayed the next time you sprayed. This created some very serious problems when you were using the same tank for spraying if insecticides, fertilizers and weed killers. I have heard many comments that similar problems occur with the plastic tank as the various chemicals to be sprayed re-act against the plastic of the tank.

Now we have available a portable power sprayer for the home gardener. With this type of sprayer you mix the item to be sprayed in a large container and then place the intake hose in the container containing the item that you wanted sprayed with this method of spraying you can separate containers just for insecticide, fertilizer and weed killer. This type of sprayer will give you the height to reach the top of most of your trees. This is a "Dobbins Power Sprayer" that weighs only eleven pounds and operates by an electric 110 volt motor. The pump is a horizontal simplex plunger type with a direct

couple to the motor. The construction of this entire power sprayer is very simple.

This is the type of power sprayer we have waited for, for many years. It is truly a

gardener's dream come true.

## Marketing Economist

### Predicts Tight Beef Supplies

COLLEGE STATION-- While marketing of fed cattle in May was up 12 percent from last year, reduced placements of cattle on feed indicate that beef supplies are going to be tight later in the year, says Dr. Edward Uvacek, Jr., economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The June seven-state cattle on feed report shows that large supplies of cattle are being marketed and that the April-June quarter will probably be close to the 9 percent increase anticipated in the year, Uvacek says.

But continued low placement levels during May as in recent months are going to result in a fed cattle marketing level of 9 to 10 percent below last year for the July-September quarter, he says.

He adds that unless placements increase drastically within the next few weeks, the fourth quarter fed marketings will also be substantially reduced.

This reduced fed cattle supply, however, will be partially offset by some increased pork production, he maintains.

Fortunately, broiler production should remain below the level of a year ago, at least during the next three or

four months. Both chick placements and egg hatchings have been from 1 to 2 percent below last year for the last several weeks. Thus, beef's competition from other meats should only be up slightly during the rest of 1983.

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
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

# Teachers Submit Reform Proposal

AUSTIN - The 95,000 member Texas State Teachers Association recently submitted a comprehensive proposal for education reform in Texas public schools to the Select Committee on Public Education, chaired by H. Ross Perot of Dallas.

views of the majority of the state's teachers on the direction educational improvements should take. Included among the many recommendations for reform are calls for higher standards for students, teachers and administrators; better salaries for teachers; state mandated discipline policies; return of grade integrity and

teacher authority; the revamping of teacher and administrator education programs; and strong educator evaluation systems.

"Ultimately, the success of any reforms will depend upon the classroom teachers' ability to implement them," Young said. "For this reason, it is critical that teachers' needs and views be solicited in every step of the process."

Young, an instructor in the College of Education at Texas Christian University, said the most pressing need for immediate reform is in the area of teachers' salaries.

"There is a clear and immediate need to raise all teachers' salaries by at least 24 percent over the next two years because the current shortage of qualified, certificated teachers in Texas constitutes a genuine emergency," he added.

The president said TSTA cautions the Select Committee and the public to be wary of merit pay schemes which are touted by many to be "cure alls" to the many problems in education.

"While a case for some form of master teacher or merit pay certainly can be made, we must recognize that it will not solve the teacher shortage; it will not address the need to alter our manner of educating potential teachers; it will not

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



## Southwestern Bell Using Talking Computers For Directory Assistance

A talking computer may help you the next time you call Southwestern Bell's directory assistance service.

The company has begun a new system to save time and money in providing numbers in the 817 area code. Called Audio Response System, it's a multi-million dollar, computerized "number quoter" — the second in the state following Houston.

When you call directory assistance an operator will answer and locate the number you want a computer screen. Instead of giving you the number, the operator punches a button that activates a computerized voice which repeats the number twice. It then tells

the customer to hold the line if further assistance is needed. If the customer remains on the line, the call is connected to another operator at no extra cost.

By not having to repeat the number to customers, operators will be able to work about 25 percent faster. The average directory assistance call had taken about 22 seconds. That will be shaved down to about 17 seconds, meaning operators can serve more customers per hour.

The 280 directory assistance operators in area code 817 presently handle about 176,000 calls each day. By saving just five seconds per call, the company can

save up to 230 work hours a day. That means thousands of dollars saved each month, helping to fight the ever-increasing cost of providing quality phone service.

Local customers calling directory assistance will reach an operator in one of three locations: Fort Worth, Hurst or Wichita Falls.

The system is operated by "voice chips" which provide synthetic sound. This insures that the tone and volume are constant. Western Electric installed the equipment. The same charge still applies to directory assistance calls — 10 free calls each month and 25 cents for each one over 10.

## Many Children Don't Outgrow Allergies

A widely held misconception is that most children with allergies outgrow them. The truth is that only about half will outgrow allergies at about age 15 and the rest stay the same or get worse, says the Texas Medical Association.

Neglecting treatment in hopes that the child will outgrow allergic reactions can make the youth's early years miserable. This is particularly true with asthma, a respiratory disease that often arises from allergies.

The child often is unable to get a good night's sleep, often misses school and may be unable to take part in sports or have a normal social life. Parents should consider that their child's present and future physical and emotional health may be affected by not seeking treatment.

Allergies are abnormal responses to certain substances in the environment. The substance that produces the allergic response is called an allergen. It is not essentially a harmful substance since most people are not affected by it. Allergens can be something you touch (wool, animals, rugs), something you inhale (pollens, molds, house dust, animal hair), or something you eat or drink.

The allergic response may take many forms—skin inflammation, particularly in infancy; hay fever; chronic problems with sneezing and itching; a runny nose; and the coughing, wheezing and congestion that characterize asthma.

The usual method of treating allergies in children is to identify the allergen and remove it from the child's environment. This calls for careful observation and cooperation by parents.

In some cases, the cause can be identified quickly and the allergen removed easily. Examples are when a child's attacks are worse when close to a pet or when the child sleeps on a feather pillow. In many cases, skin tests identify the allergen, especially if it is in the air.

In other cases, the allergy can be controlled with a series of injections of the specific allergen in hopes of building immunity. This method is about the only effective one for pollen allergies, although it is ineffective for food allergies.

## Ranchers May Be Selling Wildlife Enterprises Short

SAN ANGELO--Southwestern ranchers are selling their wildlife enterprises short, believes a county agricultural Extension agent headquartered in one of Texas' most densely populated white-tail deer areas.

Duery Menzies, Fredericksburg, will discuss the importance of wildlife marketing during wildlife concurrent sessions of the International Ranchers Roundup (IRR) at the San Angelo Convention Center beginning August 1. Registration and program information is available through the San Angelo Convention Bureau (915/653-1206).

Menzies says wildlife marketing is a very new field, one many ranchers must become accustomed to working in. He points out, furthermore, that wildlife management, itself, is such a new field that ranchers are just beginning to practice good management techniques.

He maintains that it makes little rationale for ranchers to develop an excellent outdoor experience for hunters and not market that opportunity. Menzies compares that ideology with developing a premier herd of breeding cattle only to sell them for market prices at the nearest commercial auction barn.

The IRR speaker says wildlife remains the one area in which a rancher can set his price rather than take the market price offered. When a rancher has a marketable product such as wildlife, take the extra step to market it; otherwise, be prepared to accept what the marketplace will pay, he warns.

Wildlife marketing is not as much selling a product as it is furnishing the means to an outdoor adventure, Menzies says. In wildlife marketing, the rancher is selling or offering an experience. Since all hunters have dreams, anticipation, hope and exciting past experiences of hunting progress, these thoughts in their

mind become reality on the hunting lease.

Ranchers, he stresses, have the rights to make management decisions that affect the hunters' harvest and enjoyment, which is just another form of marketing.

Menzies suggests that when advertising of hunting leases is done, that it be directed to the market wishes to draw from or the type of people a rancher wants to attract to his ranch. A rancher desiring to lease to doctors or lawyers should, for example, advertise in their respective professional journals. City newspapers are a reliable source for reaching urban area hunters.

Word of mouth continues to be the best advertising asset available to ranchers and landowners, Menzies stresses. Word passes quickly through hunting circles which ranches do their best to attract hunters and strive for repeat customers.

Bow hunters, photographers, backpackers and artists have their own publications and are fairly easy to reach. The latter three groups seldom hunt to harvest wildlife, but are persons avid to capture the spirit and beauty of wildlife on film, canvas or simply enjoying seclusion with nature. These groups represent markets virtually untapped, he notes.

Negotiating hunting fees, hunter services, hunter relations and wildlife harvest methods will be discussed during this sequence about wildlife product marketing at the IRR.

SUMMER FRUITCAKE

3/4 cup Hershey's Cocoa  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water  
1/4 cup shortening  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1-1/4 cups sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3 eggs  
1-1/3 cups unsifted all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
2/3 cup milk  
Citrus Filling (recipe below)  
Sweetened fresh fruit:  
1-1/4 cups each: strawberries, sliced peaches, blueberries or cherries  
1/2 cup green grapes

Combine cocoa and 1/2 cup sugar in a saucepan; add water and shortening. Cook and stir constantly over low heat until shortening is melted and sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat; cool. Cream butter or margarine with 1-1/4 cups sugar and vanilla in large mixer bowl. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Blend in chocolate mixture. Combine flour, baking soda and salt; add alternately with milk to creamed mixture. Pour into two greased and floured 9-inch cake pans. Bake at 350° for 35 to 40 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pans. Cool completely. With serrated knife, carefully slice each cake layer in half horizontally to make four thin layers. Place 1 layer on serving plate; spoon about 1/3 cup citrus filling onto layer. Top with 1 cup sliced sweetened fruit. Reserve remaining for top layer. Top with second layer, repeat with filling and fruit until all layers are stacked. Arrange remaining 3/4 cup of fruit in decorative design on top layer. Top with any remaining glaze. Garnish with grapes.

Citrus Filling

1 cup sugar  
1/4 cup water  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons cornstarch  
1 cup orange juice  
1/4 cup lemon juice

1/4 cup water  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 teaspoon grated orange rind  
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Combine first 5 ingredients and water in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture boils. Boil and stir 1 minute. Remove from heat; stir in remaining ingredients. Chill. About 2/3 cup filling.

## Cisco Public Library Has Interesting Past

Due to the Prevailing "cut-backs" of Federal/State/Local financial assistance to educational, cultural and/or many other facilities for community service, the Cisco Public Library needs more help from the citizens. YOU can make the Difference!

According to its history which was written in 1950, by its first President, Mrs. C.H. Fee, the Twentieth Century Club was organized eighty-five (85) years ago this past April (1983). The following seven (7) ladies signed their names as members: Mmes: J.B. Ammerman, J.J. Winston, J.J. Butts, Frank Vernon, L.E. Brannin, John T. Wilson and C.H. Fee. Elected for officers were: Mmes. Fee, president; Brannin, vice president; Mrs. Wilson Secretary/Treasurer. Two of these ladies have family representatives who are members of the Club today, viz., Mrs. Wm. Butts Wright (Polly), and Mrs. Goe. P. Fee (Katherine).

Mrs. Fee's history records that, "The newly elected president called a meeting for the next week". The organization of the club was completed; before long, the limit of 15 for the membership was filled raised to 25 for the membership limit. At the age of two (2) years, "the Club assumed a tremendous responsibility".

According to Mrs. Fee's account, Mr. Frank Vernon was the founder of the Cisco Public Library, originally housed in the Vernon home and with a circulation number of one: Lou Wallace's "Ben Hur". Further, it relates, "Mr. Frank Vernon, Editor of the Cisco "Round UP", had declared that 'Cisco must have a Public Library' He wrote to Mr. Carnegie, who was at the time building Public Libraries." Mrs. Carnegie answered, but the terms were more than the Cisco businessmen could afford. Nevertheless, Mr. Carnegie sent a check for \$250.00, to which Mr. Vernon added contributions enough to

"cause the Library to become a reality".

"In 1900, Mr. Vernon's health required a change of climate. He asked the Twentieth Century Club to become custodians of the Library, which responsibility the Club assumed." and now, for eighty-three years Cisco Twentieth Century Club has owned, operated, cared for and helped the City maintain (financially) the Cisco Public Library.

## Cisco Receives July Tax Check

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one percent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind." Houston received the largest July check—\$6.8 million. Cisco's July payment was \$8,522.44 bringing their 1983 total to \$12,839.40. They are down 6.73 percent from last year.

Eastland received the biggest check in the county for

July, \$8,603.85 down 8.72 percent from last year. Eastland's 1983 receipts so far is \$114,949.18. Ranger's payments are down 22.29 percent from last year. Their July check was \$4,744.87 bringing their 1983 total to \$63,379.47.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA received \$7.8 million, down from last July's payment of \$9.4 million. San Antonio received \$1.1 million, bringing the yearly total to \$12.4 million, up 10 percent over 1982.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The July checks were for taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by the end of June.

## Microwave Ovens Are 40% Efficient

COLLEGE STATION—Microwave ovens have the advantage of speed, but not always the most effective means of saving energy, says home economist Bonnie Piernot.

Microwave ovens are about 40 percent efficient in converting electrical energy into heat in food, while wasting little of that energy in heating the air around the food. Standard electric ovens are 14 percent efficient and gas ovens are 7 percent efficient in this same task.

"Since the microwave absorption of foods depends on their water and salt content, microwave cooking is not equally energy saving for all foods," states Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

According to the

specialist, research shows the greatest energy savings when cooking small to medium quantities of concentrated foods such as meats, potatoes, desserts and TV dinners.

Foods such as corn, broccoli and similar vegetables require more energy to cook with microwave than with conventional electric surface units.

"For any normal saucepan operation, the cockpit of an electric range is as energy efficient, or more so, than the microwave oven," she adds.

Since the biggest advantage of the microwave holds over conventional cooking is time, the choice of which appliance to use may be largely a matter of whether energy or time is more valuable to the consumer, Piernot says.

## 12th Annual Folklife Festival August 4-7

SAN ANGELO—If the pioneers needed something, they usually found a way to make it.

At the 12th annual Texas Folklife Festival, August 4-7, Shirley Smothers and the Cisco Civic League demonstrates two examples of pioneer ingenuity: making "rush lights," or tallow torches, and baking hoecakes.

As Smothers and company explain, the pioneers lit up the dark frontier night with rush lights, which they made from cattails and tallow. At the Festival, the group shows visitors how the cattails are dipped again and again in tallow made from beef fat until the coating is thick enough to provide a long burn. At night, to the delight of Festival-goers, the rush lights are lit.

Fieldwork could make a body hungry, and sometimes

the kitchen was a long walk home. At the Festival, the League demonstrates how settlers cooked cornmeal cakes over an open fire on the blade of a hoe—thus the name "hoecakes"—and offers samples to visitors.

The Folklife Festival is an annual celebration of the state's ethnic diversity and pioneer heritage sponsored by the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio. Each year nearly 6,000 hard-working, fun-loving Texans come together to share the folkways of their ancestors with some 100,000 Festival visitors.

Just about every facet of life on the Texas frontier is spotlighted at the Festival, including pioneer chores, skills, arts, crafts, music,

dancing, games and food.

Visitors are encouraged to participate in the many activities. They can spin a lariat, cane a chair, milk a goat, shear a sheep; learn to whittle, weave and spin thread; jump on the stage and learn the various dances, clap along with the fiddlers, folksingers and bluegrass bands; make "Depression" bread in coffee cans, pat out a tortilla, make a hoecake, and more.

International food and entertainment are two star attractions at the Festival. Dressed in exotic native costumes, Filipino tinkling dancers and Mid-East dancers dazzle the crowds, while folksingers and gospel groups touch visitors' hearts and souls. The Festival menu includes such authentic dishes as Jewish falafel (pita bread with stuffing),

Spanish camarones a la plancha (grilled shrimp), Mexican fajitas, six kinds of sausage and three kinds of egg rolls.

As visitors to the Folklife Festival discover every

year, the list of things to do, see, hear, taste and touch is endless!

Tickets for the 1983 Texas Folklife Festival are \$5 for adults (\$4.50 in advance) and \$1 for children ages 6-12; children under 6 are admitted free. Dear Customer:  
The City of Cisco during the month of June, 1983, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date. The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.

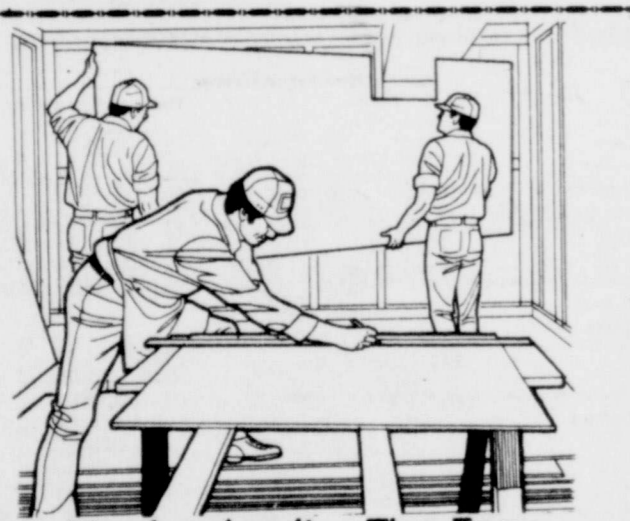
