Dear Citizens of Cisco:

Ambulance service for a community is something we rarely think about seriously until such time as we need it desperately. Then, in many cases, no dollar value could be placed on our being able to pick up a telephone, and in a short time have an emergency vehicle manned by trained personnel at our doorstep.

Some two years, when your present council took office, Cisco was faced with the prospect of having to dig into city tax funds in order to subsidize emergency ambulance service for our community. We listened to several proposals from various companies wishing to serve us, and frankly none of the possibilities that were open to us seemed palatable. Then the company which is presently serving us came forward with an innovative subscription membership plan, which the city council elected to go with. From then to now we have had ambulance service, and have not had to pay one cent of subsidy. We hope very much that the situation can continue.

Patterson Ambulance Service has not reached its needed number of subscribers--850--at this time, and they have indicated to us that they will still accept memberships during the coming week, or through August 19. Memberships cost \$39.00 per family for one year. Whether or not you think that you'll have need of the service during the coming year, your subscription will still help enable this company to continue serving our community. And who can say when you might have a medical emergency in your family?

On behalf of all members of the city council, may I urge you to secure a membership subscription with Patterson Ambulance Service by August 19, if you've not done so yet. They may be obtained at the City Hall, or for further information call 442-2111 or 629-2882. Let's band together to maintain our ambulance service in Cisco!

Council Plans To Hold Special Meet Monday

A special meeting of the City Council will be held at 7 p.m. Monday to discuss possible court action in the city's sewage disposal problems and to swear in a new Councilman, according to an announcement Friday by City Manager Mike Moore.

A scheduled conference between city and state officials here Thursday was postponed at the request of the Attorney General's office until 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 23, Mr. Moore reported. The subject of the meeting will be the Attorney General's plan to file suit against the city for non-compliance with state regulations governing sewage disposal. Mr. Moore said the Council

would study the probable court action and determine if and what can be done immediately to improve operations at the sewage disposal plant. The plant was built in the 1920s and is too small to adequately take care of the present needs, Mr. Moore said.

The city has been working on plans for a new and adequate sewage disposal plant for several years and recently obtained an option to a 40-acre tract of land for use in the project. State officials will be advised of the city's efforts to improve the sewage plant, Mr. Moore said. A new Councilman, who was expected to be chosen in a special election this Saturday (Aug. 13), will be sworn in. He will replace Loyal Lundstrum, who resigned the Place III post after he was charged with murder in the shooting death of his wife last March. Roy Dennis, local grocery store owner, was the only candidate for the vacancy.

Budget Approved For CISD System's New Fiscal Year

A budget providing for \$2,120,667 to operate the Cisco Public School system during the 1983-84 fiscal year was approved by the board of trustees at their regular monthly meeting last Monday night. A tax rate of 53 cents per \$100 valuation, an increase of two cents, was also approved.

The new budget provides for expenditures as follows: instructional expense, \$981,944; instructional resource, media and administration, \$159,627; guidance, health, transportation and co-curricular student services, \$287,426; general administration, tax office and debt service, \$292,210; and plant maintenance and operation, \$399,460.

Revenue anticipated for budget requirements in-

cludes \$871,889 from local sources and \$1,248,778 from state and federal sources. The local revenue will amount to about 41 per cent of the total income.

Supt. James Couch said the board will continue a policy to allocate budgeted funds into a special building fund, which will eventually be used for a new primary school building. The fund had \$210,000 in it as the new fiscal year begins, Mr. Couch said, and the new budget proposes another \$189,122 for the fund. This plan will allow the erection of a new building without an expensive 30 year loan program, he added.

In other action, the board set the price of school lunches at \$1 for the new school year. Breakfast will cost 35 cents.

M.D. Garage was the successful bidder for a contract to maintain school buses, and Gulf Oil Company won a contract to supply the school system with gasoline and oil. Borden Milk Company was the successful bidder for a contract to supply milk for the cafeteria, and the First National Bank was designated as depository for school funds for the next two years.

A new policy adopted by the board will prohibit the use of tobacco products by students on school property during school hours.

A designated area will be provided for faculty members to smoke, Mr. Couch said.

Mrs. Carol Hancock, a recent graduate of Abilene Christian University, was employed as homemaking

teacher for the high school, replacing Mrs. Randy Angel who resigned recently. Mrs. Janice Turner, wife of Principal Mike Turner, was hired as a part-time instructor for gifted and talented students. There will be two classes for this group, Mr. Couch reported.

Mr. Couch told the board that everything was in readiness for the new school year to begin Monday, Aug. 22. Faculty members and administrators have been holding in-service meetings to complete preparations, he added.

The 1983-84 school population is expected to be about the same as the past two years - around 900 students. The average daily attendance last year was 884 with total enrollment topping 900, the superintendent said.

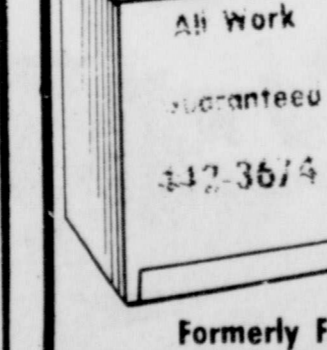

Tax Rate For Coming Year Is Set For City

A tax rate for the City of Cisco's 1983-1984 budget will be 52 cents per \$100 valuation, it was reported at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council at city hall Tuesday night. The 52 cent rate represents an increase of 2.9% over the past year.

City manager Mike Moore said that a report from Steve Thomas, chief appraiser and assessor for Eastland County, show that city property values have increased

\$1,363,682 to \$53,972,332 for the coming year. The increase was due to new buildings and improvements.

Mr. Moore said that an ordinance setting the tax rate at 52 cents would be submitted at the Council's August 23 meeting. The Council is currently working on the budget that will become effective Oct. 1, and both September meetings will consider budget matters, Mr. Moore said.

In other action, the Council ordered a public hearing for 7 p.m. on September 13 at City Hall for the purpose of determining whether the improvements described for eight properties are "each dangerous structures and a public nuisance." If the properties are found below minimums as provided by building codes, they will be subject to condemnation, the council was told.

The properties were listed as follows: frame house, 301 West 2nd; frame and siding residence, 103 East 15th; frame residence and out-

building, 1900 Avenue E; siding and frame residence, 1512 Avenue G; frame residence, 703 East 11th; brick residence, 1206 East 16th; and frame and stucco residence, 1510 Conrad Hilton.

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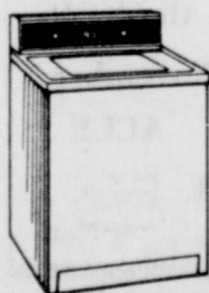

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ton. Poets have hailed her as the "Mother of Exiles." She has survived hurricanes, floods and explosions to become the symbol that says "America" to the people of every continent.

Now, for the first time since her dedication in 1886, the Statue of Liberty needs our help. Last year, National Park Service engineers informed President Reagan that Miss Liberty was in alarming condition. Beneath her hand-hammered copper skin is an intricate web of 2000 iron armature bars, designed by famous French engineer Alexandre Gustave Eiffel. Over the decades, many of these bars have deteriorated to less than half their original thickness. A decision is being made whether to coat the bars with a material that can stand abrasion or to replace them with a more durable metal such as stainless steel. The statue's copper skin, which weighs 200,000 pounds, has also been thinned by air pollutants and acid rain. Pieces of the torch have fallen into the waters of New York Harbor; the torch and portions of the right arm may have to be completely replaced.

President Reagan could have responded to this grim news by asking Congress to appropriate the millions needed to restore the Lady of Liberty. Instead, he is asking Americans to join in a tremendous national effort to rescue her - and to rededicate the nation to the values she represents.

The President knew that the immense, 151-foot figure was not built with government money. The people of France, inspired by a committee of private citizens known as the Franco-American Union, had dug into their pockets to raise the two million francs (then \$400,000) that enabled sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi to devote nine years to Lady Liberty's creation. A similar fund drive was launched in the United States to pay for the

pedestal. Joseph Pulitzer, himself an emigrant from Hungary, put the power of his newspaper, the New York World, behind it. Eighty percent of the \$101,091 raised by that appeal came from Americans in amounts of less than a dollar.

These days, that money would barely pay for repairing the hem of the statue's skirt. But President Reagan was convinced that a wealthier America would respond to an appeal to restore the Lady to her original beauty and strength - with voluntary contributions from the people. He asked Lee Iacocca, chair-

man of the Chrysler Corp., to form a federal advisory commission to organize fund raising.

The 20-member commission, which includes Bob Hope and former president of the United Auto Workers Union Douglas Fraser, knew at the outset that Miss Liberty's troubles would not be its only concern. A few thousand yards from the Statue of Liberty lies Ellis Island, where almost two-thirds of the nation's immigrants entered the United States. Closed in 1954, Ellis has fallen into ruin. The commission decided that both the symbol of freedom and the gateway to it should be restored. The cost: \$230 million.

Even before the campaign was officially launched, people began responding. Bridgeport, Conn., concluded that a gift to Miss Liberty was a perfect way to say thank-you to the nation. Early in December 1982, a local toy center for poor children, known as Christmas Village, had been destroyed by ar-

son. Sympathetic people from all over the country had donated enough money to restore the center before the holiday. Instead of sending thousands of thank-you letters, Bridgeport organized its own fund-raising campaign and collected \$3600 for the Statue of Liberty, all from nickles, dimes and quarters contributed by schoolchildren.

After one of the commission members, T. Robert Zochowski, spoke at the Walter C. Black elementary school in Hightstown, N.J., students organized a highly original festival, releasing hundreds of red, white and blue balloons with notes in them asking finders to write and learn more about the Statue of Liberty's birthday party. In addition, they raised \$200 selling 35-cent bags of chocolate-chip cookies. In Tucson, Ariz., the Manzanita elementary school staged a three-mile Liberty Run with students going from door to door to collect pledges for the run. They raised \$2400.

Adult groups have been equally enthusiastic. The Veterans of Foreign Wars of Hicksville, N.Y., held a casino night that raised more than \$1100. Jersey City's Business and Professional Women's Club has begun collecting what it hopes will be tens of thousands of pennies under the slogan: "Copper pennies for the restoration of the copper gown of Lady Liberty."

In 1986, the Statue of Liberty's 100th birthday will be commemorated by a rededication ceremony on October 28. And the commission has also decided to hold a special celebration during the week of July 4th. The tall ships from all over the world that made our Bicentennial so memorable have been invited for another visit. The heads of state from dozens of countries will be on hand. The Army and Marines will parade, Navy ships will boom out salutes and Air Force jets will zoom overhead as a rejuvenated and rededicated Lady of Liberty declares to the watching world America's continuing commitment to freedom.

Shed & Hay Burn For \$25,000 Loss

A hay shed with some 1,800 bales of hay were destroyed by fire of undetermined origin at the Ernest Reich farm south of Cisco last Tuesday afternoon and

night. Observers said the loss could exceed \$25,000.

The hay shed was 40x100 feet in size and it contained 300 huge round bales and 1,500 square bales of hay that had been harvested and stored in recent months. The blaze broke out around 1:30 p.m. Tuesday and Cisco firemen took equipment there to fight and control the fire.

The hay continued to smolder Tuesday night, Wednesday and Wednesday night and was still smoking Thursday. Tim Reich, son of the Ernest Reichs and John Gerhardt, their son-in-law, spent Tuesday and Wednesday nights at the scene to help prevent the fire from breaking out again and spreading.

Firemen speculated that the blaze might have been caused by sparks from a nearby electric fence or from spontaneous combustion. Observers said the round hay bales were worth about \$30 each and the smaller square bales around \$1.75 each.

The Reich family expressed appreciation to Cisco Rural Fire Department members and to neighbors and friends for their help in fighting the fire.

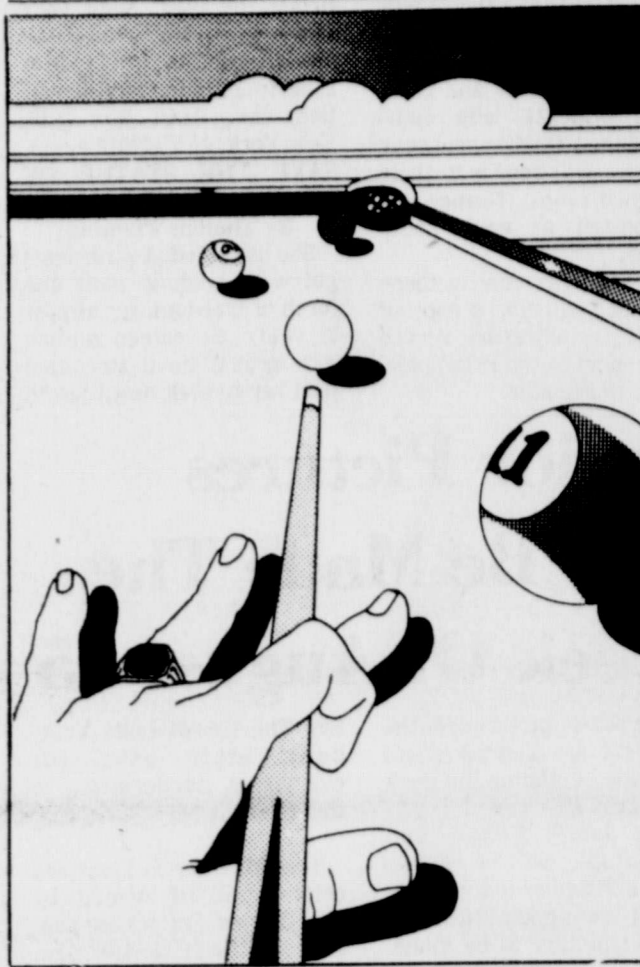

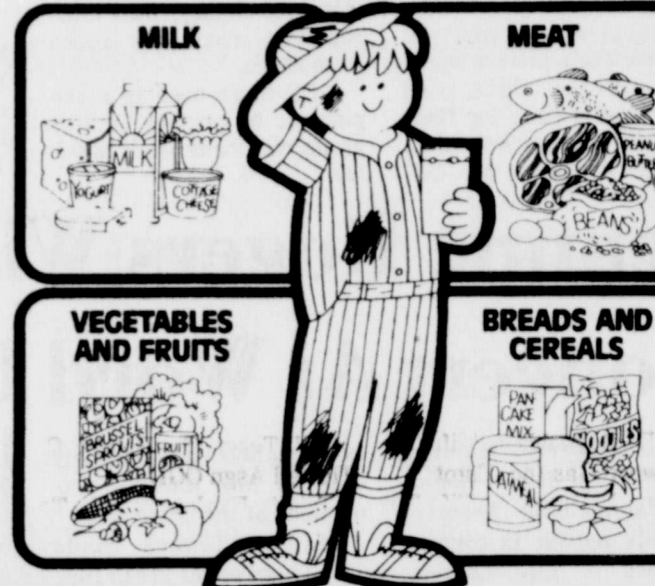

Secretary of the Interior James Watt today presented the first semi-annual District Safety Award for Excellence (SAFE) for environmental and human safety concern to four oil companies operating offshore.

Commenting on today's award presentation, Watt said, "The environmental record for offshore oil and gas production is exemplary. It's time that the companies helping to maintain the record are commended. Today's awards do

just that while, at the same time, instilling an incentive for all companies operating off America's shores to achieve excellence in environmental protection, human safety and technological advances. Recognition of these

superlative private sector efforts through the SAFE Award Program will help lead to an even more positive safety record."

Today's awards recognize companies who have conducted their offshore oil and gas operations in a safe and

environmentally sound manner for the 6-month period ending June 30, 1983.

Award winning companies in the gulf of Mexico are: Shell Offshore Inc. Rig 12 for the Houma District, Amoco Production Company for the Lafayette District, Shell Off-

shore Inc. for the Lake Charles District, Arco Oil and Gas Company for the Metairie District, and Union Oil Company of California for the Texas District.

In the Pacific the award winner was Shell California Production, Inc. for the Ventura District.

Continually improving offshore environmental safety record," Watt said.

"Since 1970, when new drilling technologies and environmental controls were

implemented in offshore operations, more than four billion barrels of oil have been produced. Since then, only 791 barrels have been lost due to blowouts."

Daily potential of 48 barrels of oil on open choke was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 3,464-ft. bottom. Production will be from perfora-

tions 3,440 to 3,456 feet into the wellbore.

At a location four miles northwest of Carbon, SRG Oil Corp. of Abilene has finalized a new oil production in Eastland County's Dead Horse Creek Cisco Field.

The well is designated as the No. 5 Holt, pumping oil at the rate of 41 barrels per day on open choke.

Location is in a 336-acre lease in the H&TCRR Co. Survey, Sec. 9, Blk. 3. Bot-

tommed at 810 feet, the well will produce from perforations 774 to 778 feet into the hole.

Pierce-Western Oil of San Angelo has revealed plans to drill a 1,999-ft. wildcat for oil or gas five miles northwest of Rising Star. The operator has 10 acres leased with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TCRR Co. Survey, Sec. 41, Blk. 2. The venture has been designated as the No. 1 Mesa Kidd.

Sun Exploration and Production Co. of Abilene has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Ranger Field. The No. 2 Coker-Gregory showed potential to pump 26 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

The operator has 81 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's S.J. Robinson A-424, four miles northeast of Eastland. The well will produce from an interval 3,274 to 3,300 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,514 feet.

At a drillsite six miles northwest of Eastland, LARB Oil Co. of Coahoma has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 2 Paul Hodge, pumping oil at the rate of 32 barrels per day on open choke.

With the price of conventional houses continuing to rise, more and more people are looking at condominiums as alternative shelter. Remember, however, that like most purchases, condos have advantages and disadvantages.

A condominium entitles you to all the benefits of homeownership. Property taxes and the interest on the mortgage loan are deductible from your income tax. You also benefit from the buildup in equity, increase in value and pride of ownership.

But condos also involve other people. You own one of many units. You have a vote, but the majority will rule on such matters as pets and exterior changes.

Condo ownership can be more complex than ordinary homeownership. Ask questions and investigate before signing any legal documents.

RRMs MAY OPEN THE DOOR FOR YOU

It's called the renegotiated rate mortgage or RRM, and it may provide a means for you to buy a home you could not otherwise afford.

The RRM is a short-term loan of usually two to five years but with payments based on a 25- to 30-year repayment schedule. When the short-term loan expires, you may renew the loan at a new rate offered by the

lender or you may shop for a better rate elsewhere.

Lenders have constraints which provide that the interest rate not be adjusted by more than one-half percent per year or 5 percent over the life of the mortgage. You pay no penalty for retiring the loan after the first term, and you are guaranteed renewal at the new rate if you so desire.

The RRM represents a compromise between you and the lender. It is likely to become more popular while interest rate trends remain uncertain.

TRY A LOAN ASSUMPTION

In these days of tight money and high interest rates for housing, taking over someone else's mortgage may be the least expensive way for you to become a homeowner.

Assuming the payments on an existing low-interest home loan could prove less

expensive than paying for a new loan at current market rates.

When evaluating an existing loan in comparison with obtaining new financing, consider these things. Does the existing mortgage allow for an assumption? If it does, can the lender change the terms of the loan or charge significant assumption fees?

What would be your liability under the loan assumption? In some transfers, the seller remains solely liable for the mortgage note, even though the buyer takes over the payments. In other assumptions, the buyer takes over liability along with the payments.

INSPECT BEFORE YOU BUY

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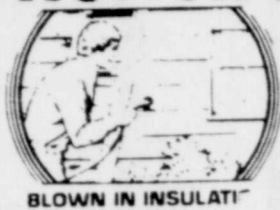
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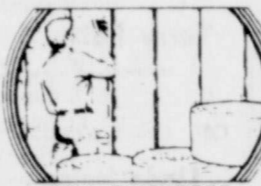
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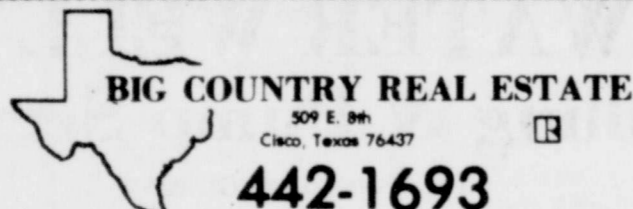

Last week I ended my article with a quote from a speech given by Dr. George Beto, a former director of T.D.C. and well known criminal justice authority, stating that only an extremely small percentage of criminals actually are sent to T.D.C. This means that there is a large percentage of criminals who are free in society. In this same speech Dr. Beto also stated that the prison population today was made up of the same people it always had, "the poor, the stupid, and the inept." He felt if we let loose the whole

prison population today it would not have a serious impact on crime statistics since prisoners make up such a small segment of the criminal population. In fact a study was done in another state where a relatively random selection of prisoners were released and followed. The study found there was no higher rate of recidivism (those being sent back) in that group than in a group of prisoners who were released as a result of the regular parole procedures.

With these statements in mind and with the need to reduce the T.D.C. population and state prison expense, let us consider some different ways the state will try to work with some of these criminal offenders - which this week will be probation services.

The Adult Probation Commission (APB) budget was increased by 111 percent his past session by the Legislature. APC is the state agency responsible for probation services and other pre-prison diversion programs at the community

level. They provide state dollars to local probation departments so that services can be increased and improved at the community level. The reasoning behind this move is very simple. The more offenders treated within their own communities, the fewer sent to T.D.C. and, therefore, the lower the T.D.C.'s construction and operation costs will be. Of the \$114.6 million dollars appropriated to APC,

\$82.4 million dollars will be distributed to reimburse local probation departments for presentence investigations, to fund community residential treatment centers and other special projects, and also to provide for more probation officers so that caseloads can be reduced.

Since a major portion of APC's dollars go to the above mentioned areas, let me briefly explain a little about each of them.

A Blue Ribbon Commission for the Review of the Correction System, in their December, 1982, Report to the Governor, recommended the use of pre-sentence investigations. Toward this

end, H.B. 1178 which I sponsored at the request of APC, was passed by the Legislature requiring that a pre-sentence investigation be done on those who have been convicted or pled guilty to a crime. It requires the probation department of a court to do a social or personal history work-up on each of these individuals prior to sentencing so that a more informed decision of the Court can be made, so that information is available to determine a more appropriate supervision plan, and finally, so that concise information can be shared with T.D.C. and the Board of Pardons and Paroles, should the judge or jury decide that a particular offender cannot be treated within the community. The use of pre-sentence investigations will take a large portion of the money APC distributes to the local probation departments.

Part of the APC money being distributed at the local level may also be used to fund residential treatment centers. These are small group homes within the community where an offender is sentenced for a certain

length of time; however, he may be allowed to leave during the day to go to his job in the community. This is a community treatment program which has been created in some of the more populated areas of the state rather than the more rural districts.

Finally some of the APC locally distributed funds may be used for the salaries for addition probation officers. These are the people who work directly with the offender to provide any needed counseling or supervision and to insure that probation conditions are being followed. These conditions might be taking part in a drug or alcohol counseling program, doing community service, working at a job, going to school or other requirements the judge orders before granting probation. With a lower case load a probation officer should have more time to actually spend supervising and counseling each of his probationers. Hopefully, this will set them on a "straight and narrow path" and after completing the probationary period, they will not "run afoul" of the law again.

Grass Clippings Can Be Used In Compost Pile

COLLEGE STATION--- Instead of throwing away grass clippings when you mow your lawn, put them to use in a compost pile, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

Dr. William C. Welch, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material.

Make the compost pile 4 to 6 feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.

The simplest composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil, says Welch. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ration per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer, advises the horticulturist.

Water the pile thoroughly when completed, add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy. Leaves decompose slowly if too dry, Welch points out.

Turn the compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed decomposition. Within six months to a year, your compost will be ready to use.

Unless the can is dented or swollen or somehow damaged, it is likely to be safe to eat. It may even taste OK. But you wasted that 69 cents anyway.

Your money was wasted because you are not getting what you paid for. By now, much, if not most, of the good food value is gone, and probably a lot of the flavor is, too. Don't count on getting much more than the calories from the original food.

Crape Myrtle, *Lagerstroemia indica*, is a deciduous shrub or small tree that has been cultivated in the Southern United States for more than 150 years. The plant was introduced to the United States from Asia and has become associated in this country with Southern gardens and ante-bellum derives its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true myrtle.

The flowering season begins in June or July and continues until fall. Each long panicle is comprised of hundreds of one- to two-inch red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. Leaves are often garnet tinged in spring, glossy dark green in summer and dull to intense yellow, orange or red in autumn.

When the leaves fall in the winter, the crape myrtle becomes a living sculpture. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character with smooth bark varying in color from light straw to rich deep brown. The bark exfoliates in early summer to reveal new bark ranging in color from light pink to pale green.

Full sun is necessary for good flowering. Crape myrtle is cold hardy throughout the Southern United States. The planting site should be slightly elevated and open to allow free air movement to avoid mildew problems. For example: planting near a wall is undesirable because of restricted air movement around the plant.

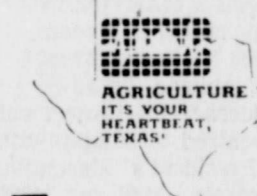
Crape myrtle tolerates a wide range of soil conditions, but grows best in a heavy loam that is slightly acidic (pH 5.0 to 6.5). Nutrient requirements are minimal; high fertility levels produce excessive vegetative growth and fewer flower panicles. Application of 5-6-6 or 8-8-8 fertilizer in early spring at the rate of one to two pounds per 100 square foot of planting bed may be beneficial to

established plants, especially those growing in poor soils. Mulches of cedar bark or hardwood chips are beneficial in retaining soil moisture and minimizing soil temperature fluctuations during the summer.

The ideal time for transplanting container-grown crape myrtle is late spring or early summer, when new shoots are emerging. Balled and burlapped or bare-root plants are best transplanted during dormant period.

Deep soil watering is required periodically during dry periods in summer when the plant is actively growing and producing flowers. Insufficient watering may prevent flower formation and result in premature leaf drop. Crape Myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form. However, tip pruning to remove old flower clusters will promote more abundant flowers and renewal of new wood. Small, twiggy growth should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and allow free air circulation. Crape myrtle can also be trained into single-stemmed, tree-like plants by removing all but the strongest stem while the plant is young. Spanish moss may be found growing on Crape Myrtle. It should be removed to allow better circulation.

The Crape Myrtle is virtually insect free and has few disease problems. When planning additions to your landscape include the beautiful crape myrtle for beauty as well as maintenance free.

Chip Lee - Plant Pathologist, George Alston - Agronomist, Jesse Coker - Entomologist and Gordon will be at the clinic to discuss individual peanut problems.

The clinic will be at the Carbon Farm Supply in Carbon from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. and at the Pioneer Farmers Co-op from 1:00 p.m. until 3:00 p.m.

Peanut growers are invited to meet agent and specialists at the clinic, discuss individual peanut problems and bring plant specimens for diagnosis if they wish.

August Heat Is Hard For Many Houseplants

August can be a very hard month on houseplants, especially now that we are in a "heat wave". Hanging baskets are most likely to suffer since they tend to dry out faster, especially if they are in plastic pots. I would recommend you check them several times a week to make sure the soil is not too dry. Any plants that are hanging outside certainly need close checking.

Some houseplants need special attention this month. Crotons shouldn't be fertilized anymore in order for them to rest. Monstera plants need to be fertilized for the second time.

August is also the month many houseplants are attacked by pests: spider mites, aphids, white flies, scale, mealybugs, slugs and snails. It is best to keep a close watch for any of these

pest and take immediate action if you see any of them. There are several different sprays out on the market that are good to use; however, read the directions carefully as some sprays damage certain plants. I think the easiest way to prevent bugs is to bring each plant to the kitchen sink and gives the leaves a through spraying with the water sprayer.

A beautiful houseplant that is easy to grow is the striped inch plant. It bears a close resemblance to their relatives, the wandering Jews, but their color is deeper and more varied. It prefers bright indirect or filtered light and a constant supply of water. As they age, they do tend to become woody and unattractive, so either cut them back to the soil line or repot them into smaller pots.

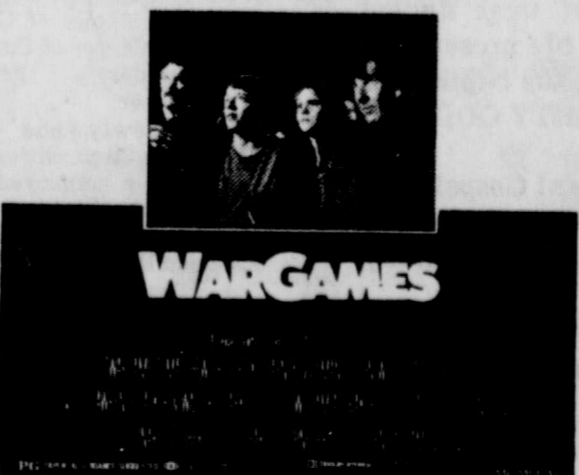

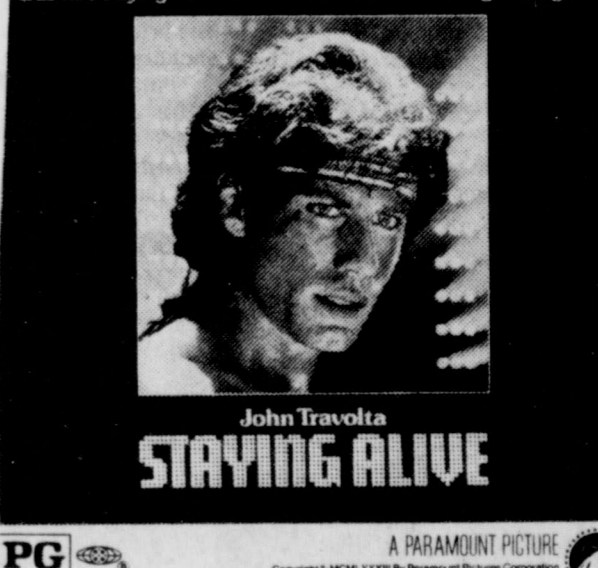

The program will begin at 12:05 p.m. and adjourn by 12:55 p.m. Please bring a sack lunch and drinks will be provided.

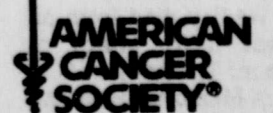

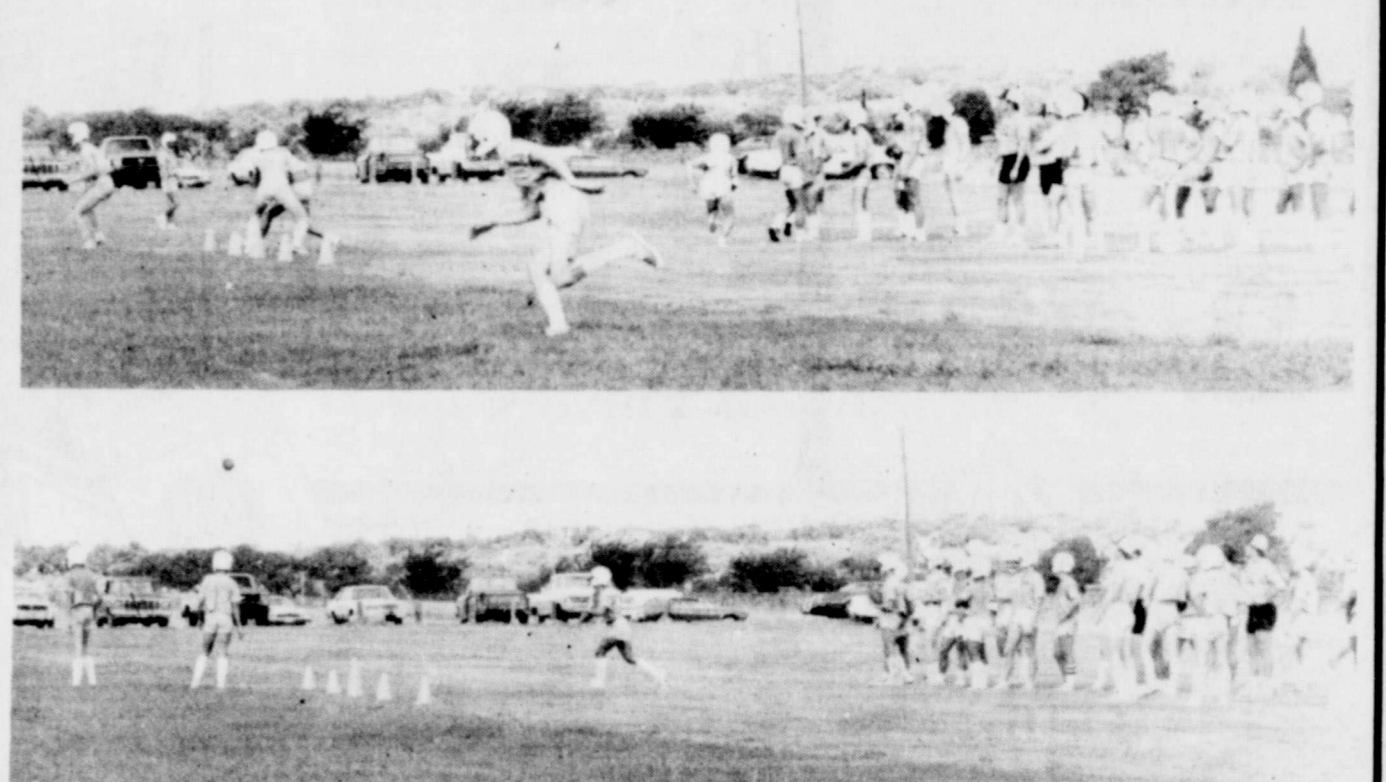
District Attorney Emory Walton reported that the man was paroled from prison last June after serving some 10 years of a life sentence received in McCulloch County for being a habitual criminal.
